Boy Scout Sunday To Be Observed Here

Sunday Feb. 3, is Scout Sunday throughout the United States and the occasion will be observed with special services at the First United Methodist Church in Bronte. Jack F. Moore of San Angelo, the new Scout Executive of the Concho Valley Council, will be guest speaker. Bronte is in the Tri-Rivers District, one of five districts in the council.

Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts will have special parts in the service which starts at 11 a.m. Royce Lee, church lay leader and chairman of the nominating committee of the Tri-Rivers District, will in-

troduce the speaker.

Moore came to San Angelo to become Scout Executive on June 15, 1973. He had served in a similar position in Augusta, Ga., since August 1970. He began his professional career in Scouting in Lubbock.

Moore and his wife are both graduates of Texas Tech University. They have three children and the family is active in the Methodist Church and in school and community projects.

The Rev. Russell Heaner, pastor of the church, said, "Bronte is indeed fortunate to have Mr. Jack Moore as the special speaker on the first Scout Sunday since he has come to the Concho Valley Council. Everyone who is interested in Scouting is urged to attend and give Mr. Moore an enthusiastic welcome."

The Bronte project will be 80 by 50 feet, giving 4,000 feet of floor space. Approximate cost of the structure is \$50,000.

J. D. Burk was the successful bidder on the Bronte and Robert Lee projects with a total bid of \$140,674.
