Use Box Numbers Postmaster Says

Postmaster Noah Pruitt Jr. today urged all rural and star route postal customers served by the Bronte Post Office to use box numbers as part of their addresses to assure faster, more efficient mail deliveries from correspondents.

"Although box numbers are an integral part of most rural and star route addresses, it has recently become the practice of many postal customers to omit this element," Pruitt said.

"This practice sometimes causes mail to be returned to the sender because of an insufficient address. It has also been cited by publishers and other large mailers as one of the major causes of duplicate mailings to rural customers.

"These duplicate mailings hurt everyone," the postmaster said. "They cost the big mailers in dollars and cents, and because they flood the mail stream, everyone's mail is slowed."

The box number is as important to rural and star route addresses as the house number is to city addresses, Pruitt said.

"Unless a rural or star route address contains both the box number and the route number, it is an incomplete address and is subject to return to the sender," he said.

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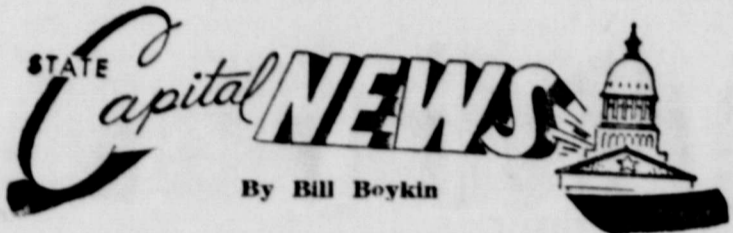

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Austin — Plenty of action for the May 4 Democratic Primary developed just before last week's filing deadline.

Mrs. Frances "Sissy" Farenthold got into the governor's race against Gov. Dolph Briscoe and promptly filed a \$3 million lawsuit, alleging he accepted illegal campaign contributions.

Houston lawyer Donald B. Yarbrough filed against State Treasurer Jesse James. Herbert "Peanut" Schroeder of Columbus challenged Agriculture Commissioner John C. White; and C. A. Kelly of San Antonio took on Railroad Commissioner Mack Wallace.

A three way Democratic race of comptroller was on schedule long before the filing deadline with Bob Bullock and Howard Edburg of Austin and Buddy F. Kirk of Houston the candidates. Comptroller Robert S. Gilveit is retiring.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, Atty. Gen. John Hill, Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong, Railroad Commission Chairman Jim C. Langdon and top appellate judges escaped Democratic opposition. But all incumbent statewide officials (except the judges) will get Republican opposition in November.

Republicans have contests for governor: Hank Grover of Houston, Jim Granberry of Lubbock, and Odell McBrayer of Fort Worth; for lieutenant governor: Gaylor Marshall of Dallas and Troy Skates of Austin; and for railroad commissioner: Dale W. Steffes of Houston and John Hall of Weatherford.

Other Republican statewide candidates include Tom Cole of Houston for attorney general; Nicholas Rowe of McAllen for comptroller; Mrs. Mary Lou Grier of Boerne for land commis-

sioner; Robert G. Holt of Amarillo for treasurer; Zack Fisher of Memphis for agriculture commissioner and Joe Cain of Houston for railroad commissioner against Langdon.

Raza Unida Party fielded Ramsey Muriz for governor and Fred Garza for railroad commissioner.

CONVENTION MOVES ON — Constitutional Convention delegates are making major decisions in committees as their work product nears the floor voting stage.

One of the big votes in the Education Committee was for retention of the \$680 million permanent University Fund for use of the University of Texas and Texas A&M University.

Voting rights (postponed due to last minute committee hangup) and education proposals are expected to be considered by the full convention late this week.

Presiding Officer Price Daniel Jr. said the convention probably will be voting every day next week, and committees which have not finished their work will have to hold night sessions.

TRUCKERS IRATE — Unhappy Texas truck drivers called on Governor Briscoe for aid in getting diesel fuel prices rolled back.

In an effort to end their strike, Briscoe dispatched an aide to Washington to confer with Federal Energy Administrator William Simon on the situation.

The governor's aide, James Rose, said his mission was "simply to convey (the truckers') position to federal agencies and congressmen."

Texas truckers also demanded an increase in the speed limit between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m.

COURTS SPEAK — Former House Speaker Gus Mutscher's appeal from a bribery conspiracy sentence (five years probation) will be heard by Texas Court of Criminal Appeals April 10 or 17.

The Supreme Court threw out a 150 day sentence for contempt of court assessed Jody Martin Parr, wife of Davall County Judge Archer Parr, because the punishment was assessed without a hearing.

Tetrahymy about a previous assault led to a Dallas man's winning a retrial on rape charges.

Short Snorts

Texas Court of Criminal Appeals still has the largest case list of any state appellate court in the nation.

President Nixon's budget includes funds for veterans out patient clinic at Beaumont and air conditioning modernization at the VA hospital in Kerrville.

Allstate Insurance Company has been called on to explain March 6 why \$4 million in policy dividends were not paid to Texas drivers.

Supplemental Income Available

Applications are now being taken by the San Angelo Social Security office for supplemental security income payments, a federal program that will establish an income floor for people in financial need who are 65 or older, or blind, or disabled. The aim of the new program is to provide supplemental payments in cases of need so that people in these categories will have a basic cash income of at least \$140 a month for one person and \$210 a month for a couple.

The program is administered by the Social Security Administration and the American Red Cross is assisting in locating potentially eligible people. While a large percentage of the people are aware of the program, and their eligibility has been determined, the agencies are concerned about those who do not know about the program.

Anyone who knows of someone who may be eligible for this assistance and doesn't know about it is requested to spread the word.

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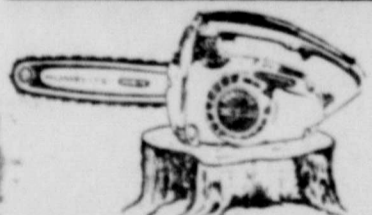
FOR THE HOMEMAKER

1. Let Nature help you to save on operating costs.
 - (a) Let the sunshine in during winter months to help cut heating costs.
 - (b) Shade your home with trees and shrubs to help cut down on summer cooling costs. Draw draperies against afternoon sun.
2. Be prudent when using appliances. Wash full loads of dishes and laundry, and follow manufacturer's owner-manual for best results.
3. Proper insulation helps secure your home against dirt and noise and defends it against outside heat and cold, offering year round comfort and savings. Insulation can pay for itself in the savings from operating cost in about 1 1/2 years.
4. You purchased fine-home comfort when you bought your air conditioning and heating units. Properly maintained, they offer you years of efficient service. A once-a-year check-up by your dealer pays dividends in savings on operating and break-down costs.
5. For savings on energy, set the thermostat on the temperature setting that provides adequate comfort (the President suggests 68°). Don't continually switch it up and down. Remember, the lower you set the thermostat in the winter the more money you save on energy.
6. Adequate lighting is essential for creating a safe and pleasing environment in every room of your home. Dust and dirt alone cause substantial losses in the amount of light produced. Systematic cleaning is important. Clean lamp bulbs (when they are cool) with a damp cloth. Conserve and save energy by turning lights off in rooms that are not needed.

STALKIN' KIN IS NEW AREA PUBLICATION

The San Angelo Genealogical and Historical Society, Inc. has announced the publication of *Stalkin' Kin*, a quarterly issue of interest to area residents. The planned format of the magazine is to contain public and family records of the Concho Valley area. In addition to helpful genealogical information, the first issue contains cemetery records of the Pioneer Rest Cemetery in Menard County and the Ben Fieldin Cemetery in Tom Green County, feature stories on early settlers—the Lackey Brothers and the Craddock, and ancestral charts of members. Continuing features will be the abstracting of early San Angelo Standard issues and land deeds of Tom Green County.

A map of the 13 counties—Coke, Concho, Crockett, Glasscock, Irwin, Kimble, Menard, Reagan, Randall, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton and Tom Green — comprises the cover of *Stalkin' Kin*.

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Planned articles for the future issues are records of cemeteries in the area as well as public count records. *Stalkin' Kin* invites Bible records or any other records of genealogical and historical value to be submitted for future publications. *Stalkin' Kin* is the first publication to cover area counties and will be published February, May, August and November. Volume I will be two combined publications and publishing of Volume II, with four quarterly issues, will commence with the November issue. Dues for the San Angelo Genealogical and Historical Society, Inc. are \$5.00 which includes the publication. Mailing address is P. O. Box 2453, San Angelo, Tex., 76901.

The Society invites all interested area residents to its meetings at 7 p.m. the first and third Tuesday nights at the San Angelo Savings Association Branch Office Hospitality Room located on FM 584 (Knickerbocker Road and S. Jackson) in San Angelo.

Mrs. Mike Lomas, president of the Society, is the former Frances Wylie, a native of Coke County and descendant of several pioneer families of the area—Wylie, Gideon, Bryan, Craddock, Morrow, Scarborough and Westbrook.

She has been active in the field of genealogy for 10 years, conducting workshops in Midland, Odessa and San Angelo. She has been instrumental in the incorporation of the Society and publishing *Stalkin' Kin*. She is presently working with officials of Angelo State University with hopes of establishing a genealogical and historical section in the library on campus.

Mrs. Lomas also is historian for Angelo Heights United Methodist Church and is compiling its history. She is also working on a family genealogy book to be published in the fall of this year.

Mrs. Lomas is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. M. Wylie and the daughter-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. George Lomas, all of Robert Lee. Her husband, Mike, is manager of the parts department of Jerry Freudenick Lincoln-Mercury. They have a daughter, Lisa, who is a student at Robert E. Lee Junior High School.

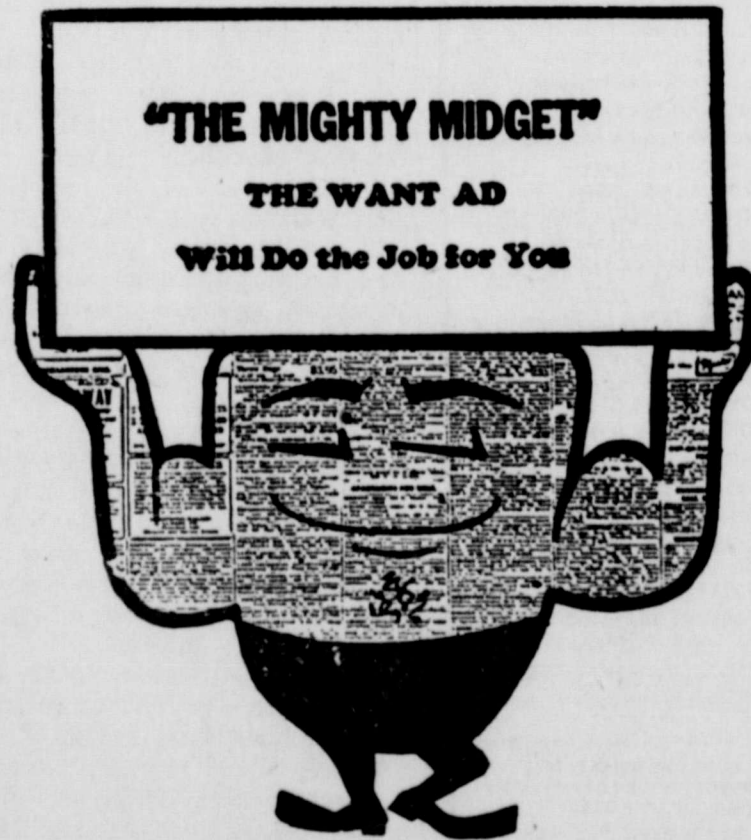

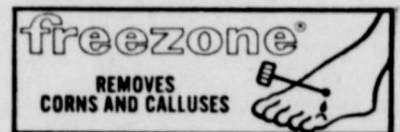

FHA OFFICE TAKING APPLICATIONS FOR BUSINESS LOANS

Preapplications for business and industrial loans in Coke and Nolan Counties may be filed with the Farmers Home Administration office in Sweetwater and Robert Lee.

This announcement was made by FHA County Supervisor Alton R. Pyburn who said provisions of the Rural Development Act of 1972 are now operative in the two counties.

Pyburn explained that a letter of preapplication is the first step in seeking assistance under the new federal program of financing local business development. The letter should briefly explain the type of industry or business, the proposed market for goods or services, and provide an estimate of the type and number of employment opportunities to be generated. Additional information may be secured by contacting the FHA office at Sweetwater or on Thursdays between 1 and 3:30 p.m. at Robert Lee.

"If the prospective business meets eligibility requirements," Pyburn said, "the applicant will be requested to submit a formal application."

Eligible applicants — individuals, partnerships, cooperatives, and corporations — should work with their bank or other private lender. Those whose applications are approved will receive loans from the private lender with up to 90 per cent guaranteed by FHA. Funds may be used to start or expand business in rural areas and cities up to 50,000 population. Loan fund may be used to purchase machinery and equipment, to buy land, buildings and permanent fixtures, and for working capital.

Public bodies also are eligible for grants to finance industrial sites that will result in development of private business enterprise.

Additional information needed by applicants or lenders is available at the FHA county office.

Farmcast

Compiled From Sources Of The Texas Department of Agriculture
John C. White, Commissioner

Numbers Down, Value Up... Feed Grain Stocks... See Your County Agent... Red Meat Production Declines.

While the number of sheep and goats in Texas is about the same now as a year ago, the number of sheep farms in the state dropped 1,000 compared to a year ago and 2,500 compared to two years ago.

All sheep and lambs in the state totaled 3,200,000 head, about the same as a year ago. The number of sheep farms in Texas is estimated at 12,500, compared to 13,500 a year ago and 14,500 two year ago.

The number of goats and kids on Texas farms and ranches as of Jan. 1 was 1,350,000, down 16 per cent from a year ago.

Nationwide, the inventory of all sheep and lambs is down seven per cent from a year ago. Texas has about 20 per cent of all sheep and lambs in the nation.

The total value of all sheep and lambs at \$32.70 per head means a combined value of more than half a billion dollars. A year ago, the value was \$468 million or an average of \$26.40 per head.

STOCKS of the four grains — corn, barley, oats and grain sorghum — totaled 288 million bushels in Texas the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes.

What stocks held in all positions are estimated at 53 million bushels compared with 87 million bushels a year ago.

Grain sorghum stocks are set at 233 million bushels down 242 thousand bushels from a year ago.

Corn stocks at 37,800,000 bushels compared with 25,800,000 bushels a year ago.

Nationwide, Jan. 1 stocks of all grains except grain sorghum and

soy beans were below year earlier levels. Stocks of the four feed grains were seven per cent below those of a year ago.

FORTY-FOUR Texas counties have been approved for use of M-44 cyanide chemical control device for predators. In this area, Mitchell, Taylor and Sterling counties were approved for use of the experimental control device. Coke County was not among the approved counties.

The Texas Department of Agriculture is in charge of the program on a state level. Commissioner John C. White said the experiment will help the \$85 million sheep and goat industry of Texas stay in existence. "The project also means more suits, sweaters, and lamb chops for the consumer," he said.

COMMERCIAL slaughter plants in Texas produced 169,200,000 pounds of red meat during December 1973. This is down eight per cent from the previous month and four per cent below the total produced a year ago.

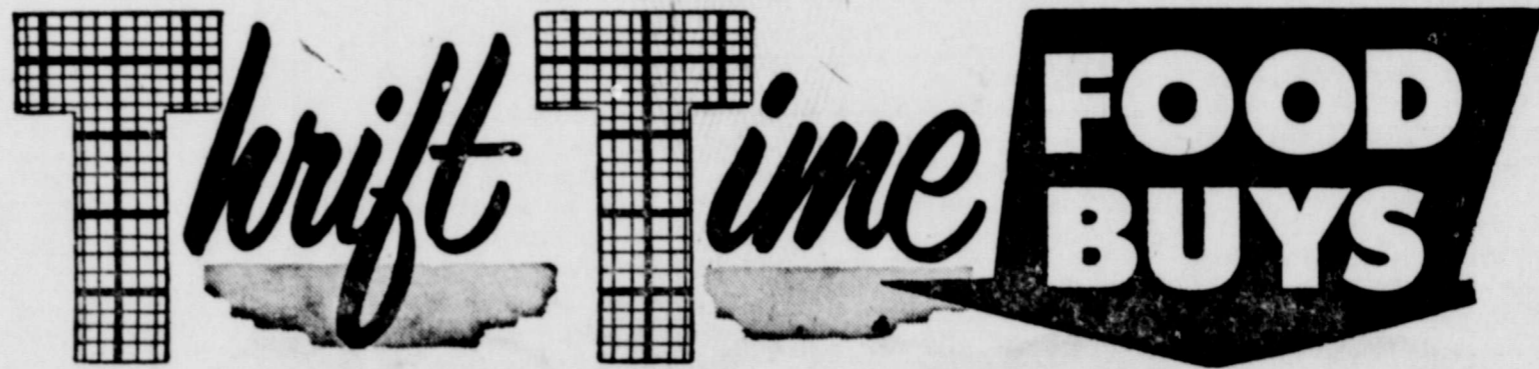
