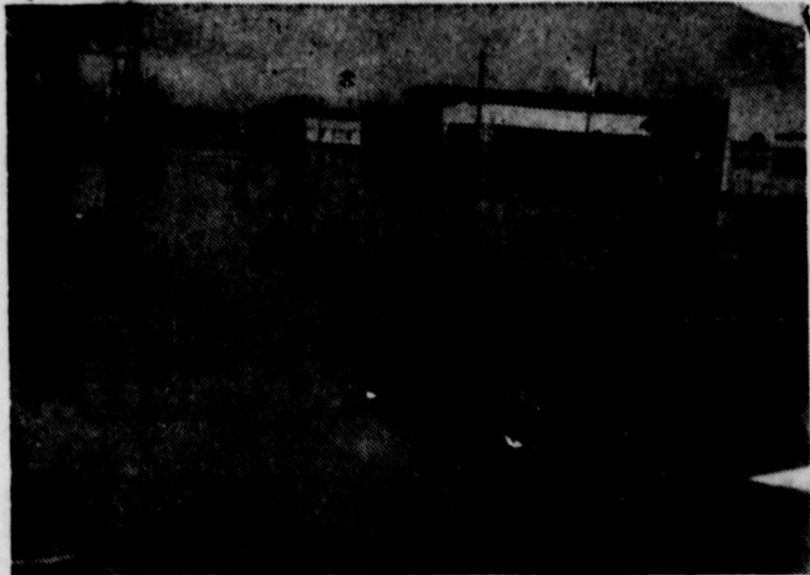

### Welcome Rain Falls Sunday

Up to 1.4 inches of rain fell in Bronte last Sunday right after noon. Most measurements in town were a little over an inch. Cloudy weather and light drizzle were in the weather picture Saturday, and Sunday brought a hard shower that dumped the moisture. Heavy clouds built up in the west Sunday morning and were moved in by a cold front. Farmers and ranchers were delighted with the rain, and seem-

### Seibolds Glad to Be Back in States

Mr. and Mrs. Dave Seibold recently returned from spending 45 days in London visiting their daughter and family, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Fletcher, Curt and Terri. The trip was not their first to England, but Dave said he was so glad to get back to the U. S. that he felt like kissing the soil when they landed in Florida.

The Seibolds said prices were at least double compared to U. S. prices. Bread was \$1.00 a loaf; six pounds of meat cost \$25.00.

A total of 57 million people live in England in an area not as large as Texas. Even though the coal miners' strike was not on when they were there, all lights went off at 10 p.m.—no TV after that time. Night shoppers carried a lantern or candle. Inside stores, each counter had a lighted candle placed on it so shoppers could see the merchandise.

"We think the gas shortage is bad in the states," Mr. Seibold said. "but in England gas was \$1.25 per gallon and one could buy only three to four gallons."

The Seibolds didn't do as much sightseeing as on former trips because of the gas shortage and the bomb scares. They heard several bombs explode, some only a few blocks from the Fletchers' home.

Since there was not much chance to travel around, Dave haunted the museums, in which the English take great pride. He said it was most interesting to see the progress man has made in the last 500 years.

Dave said the average American does not "appreciate living in the good old United States like he should."

Coke County has gained a discovery and a wildcat has been struck recently.

The discovery is Mann Rankin of Midland No. 1 Cargile, 12 miles north of Robert Lee. It is spotted 660 feet from the north and 1,127 feet from the east lines of the northwest quarter of Section 300, Block 1-A, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 227 barrels of 45 gravity oil. Flow was through a 12-64 inch choke and perforations at 5,198-5,200 and 5,260-70 feet, treated with 600 gallons of acid.

Sojourner Drilling Corp. of Abilene No. 1-A R. E. Hickman Estate is planned as a 4,100 foot Cisco wildcat for the area eight miles southwest of Bronte.

Drillsite is 3,400 feet south of the northwest corner of James W. Davidge Survey 967 1/2, on a 139 acre lease.

The purposes and objectives of CERP were outlined by the speaker and she related the recognition requirements and recognition points available for participation in the many different continuing education activities being offered in this program.
