

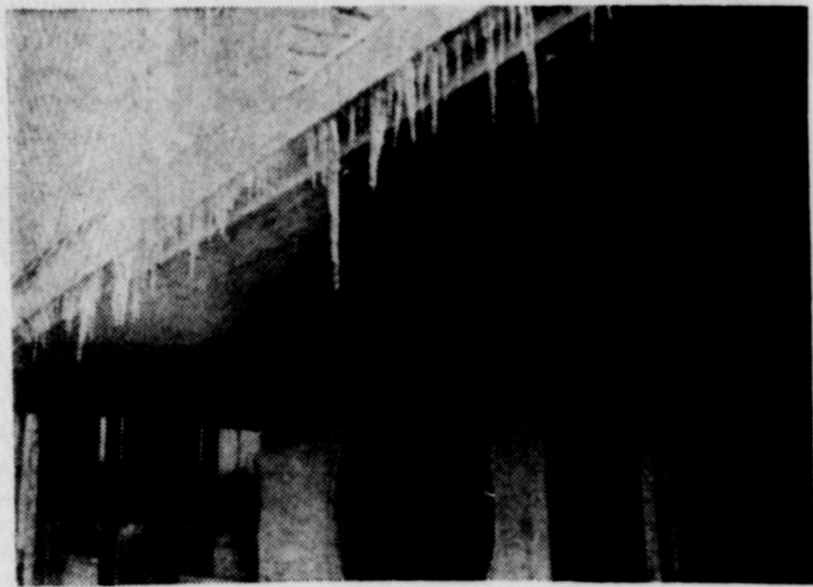

Spring Brings Sunday Ice Coat

The first day of Spring was ushered in last week with a rapid moving cold front that brought temperatures down below the freezing mark, even though the faithful mesquites had already budded out. The last official day of winter was a summery day with readings in the 90's. The warm days had caused vegetation to green up and fruit trees to bloom out before the norther

slipped in with spring.

Another blast of cold air came through late Saturday, accompanied by rolling thunder, some rain and sleet, leaving a coating of ice on everything for Sunday morning. Temperatures stayed in the 30s all day Sunday.

A warming trend Monday started the mercury on the rise again under partly cloudy skies. Cloudy, misty weather was back Tuesday morning. Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday convinced people that spring was returning.

Now everyone is wondering if this area has had its traditional Easter spell or if there is more cold weather to come before Easter arrives April 14.

Precipitation received the first week of spring was light with .13 inch recorded, bringing the total for the year to .96 inch.

Reports are that over all, not more than 10 per cent of the fruit escaped the cold weather, as temperatures dropped to 27 and 28 degrees.

The first day of spring in 1970 brought a big snow to this area, and on March 31 and April 1 in 1972, the mercury fell to 27 and 30 degrees with heavy frost.

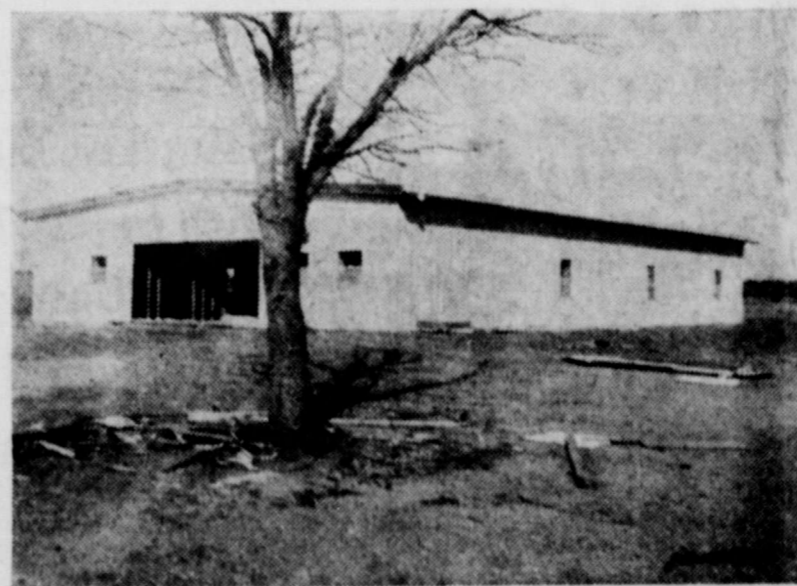
County Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs has announced that his office will stay open Saturday so the new tags can be purchased before the deadline.

Bronte High School golfers took an easy win Wednesday when the district golf tournament was played on Mountain Creek Course at Robert Lee. Wayne Alexander led his teammates with a hot one-under-par 71 to take medalist honors. Bobby Bailey made 86 for second medalist honors. Team score was 334.

Other scores were: Jim Dan Raughton 87; Wayne Coalson 90; Ricky Frazee 120; Johnny Hibbs 127.

Bronte's 334 was 75 strokes lower than second place Forsan's 409. Blackwell No. 1 was third with 422.

Both Bronte and Forsan will represent District 9-B at the regional tournament which will be held April 17 and 18 at Pine Hill Golf Course in Lubbock.

OIL NEWS

Two wells have been completed seven miles southwest of Silver by WESTEX Drilling Co. of Abilene. They are in the Jameson (Strawn) Field.

No. 1-B-68 J. W. Johnson is located 2,160 feet from the south and 690 feet from the east lines of Section 68, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 58 1/2 barrels of 45 gravity oil. Flow was through a 10-64 inch choke and perforations at 6,540-58 feet, which was treated with 1,000 gallons of acid and fractured with 19,000 pounds of sand.

Total depth was 6,703 feet, plugged back to 6,874 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 12,229-1.

The other new producer is No. 2-79 W. C. Blanks, spotting 890 feet from the north and 1,990 feet from the west lines of Section 79, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

The well had a daily potential of 35 barrels of 45 gravity oil flowing through a 10-64 inch choke. Production is from perforations at 6,295-338 feet, acidized and fractured as was 1-B-68 Johnson. Total depth is 6,380 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 8,575-1.

Exxon Corp. filed application to plug back to 5,345 feet to test the Gardner at a project four miles south of Blackwell in the Fort Chadbourne, West Field.

It is No. 67-F Sallie Odum, Account 2, located on a 533 acre lease. Site is 3,641 feet from the southeast and 2,650 feet from the southwest lines of Seth Clark Survey 475. It is a former Gray Sand producer drilled to a total depth of 5,453 feet.

Voter Guidelines Answer Questions

(Editor's note: The following article was submitted by Mrs. Cumbie Ivey Jr., Coke County Democratic chairman, in hopes that it will clarify questions which voters may have concerning the forthcoming Primary and General Elections.)

Due to changes in recent years in the Texas Election Code, listed below are some VOTER GUIDELINES. Please check carefully these requirements to see if you are properly registered in the Precinct and County of your present residence.

1. Register to vote at least 30 days prior to the Democratic Primary, which is May 4, 1974.
2. All registered voters, 18 years and older, are eligible to vote in all Democratic Party elections.
3. Present registrations are valid if you voted in a Democratic Primary or a General Election within the last three years.
4. Register to vote at your County Tax Assessor-Collector's office or with a properly deputized person allowed to register voters.
5. Notify your County Tax Assessor-Collector of change of address five days prior to election day so that you are registered in the proper precinct, if you have moved within the county.
6. On moving from one county to another, you must re-register 30 days prior to the election, if you wish to vote in your new place of residence.
7. On April 14, 1974, the absentee voting for the first primary by personal appearance at the County Clerk's office begins and goes through the fourth day preceding the election.
8. Applications for absentee voting for the first primary must be received by the County Clerk not later than the close of business on April 30, 1974.
9. Marked absentee ballots for the first primary must be mailed back to the County Clerk and post-marked not later than midnight on May 3, 1974, and received in the County Clerk's office before 1:00 p.m. on election day, May 4, 1974.
