### Tennyson Church Plans for Easter

Plans are being made for special Easter services at Tennyson Baptist Church again this year, according to the pastor, the Rev. C. R. Blake.

Pre-Easter services will be held Friday and Saturday, April 12 and 13, at 7:30 p.m., with the Rev. Bennie Smith, pastor of Lindell Baptist Church in San Angelo, officiating.

Sunrise Easter services will be held atop of Mount Margaret, with Mrs. A. C. Donath of San Angelo conducting the services. Sunrise services also will be held at the church for those who do not feel like climbing the mountain, with the Rev. Blake doing the preaching.

Regular Sunday services will be held at 11 a.m., but no evening services will be held Easter Sunday.

### 4-H'ers to Sponsor Rabies Vaccination

The Coke County 4-H Clubs will sponsor a rabies vaccination program Friday, April 5, for the benefit of area pet owners.

Dr. Paul Hudman, DVM from San Angelo, will be present to administer the vaccine.

Two stops are planned for the convenience of pet owners. Dr. Hudman will be in Robert Lee in the County Park from 9 to 10 a.m. He will move to Bronte and vaccinate animals from 10:30 to 11:30 a.m.

Pet owners are encouraged to have their dogs and cats vaccinated annually as a rabies preventive measure. Pets four months of age or older should be vaccinated. The fee for the rabies vaccine will be \$4.00. Dr. Hudman can give distemper, hepatitis and other shots to pets while he is here if they are desired.

Hottest race of the three is for school trustees. Three vacancies are to be filled and eight candidates are listed on the ballot. James Arnold Tidwell is the only incumbent running for trustee. Other candidates are Grady Louis Coulter, Bill Jackson, James O. Koenig, Mrs. Nick (Susan) Arrott, Ernest Aguero, James W. Lee and A. D. McCarty.

Outgoing members are Wayne Arrott and Billy Joe Luckett. Holdover trustees are Glenn Skelton, Russell Carlton, Delbert Coalsan and Dale Thompson.

Two voting places will be in operation, at Bronte City Hall, with Mrs. Otis Smith as presiding judge, and Green's Store in Tennyson, with Mrs. W. T. Green as presiding judge.

The city election will be held at the city hall, with Mickey Pierce serving as presiding judge. Candidates include R. T. Caperton for mayor and J. T. Henry, James Badgett and Ernest Aguero for alderman. Badgett is the only candidate now serving on the council. Holdover members are L. O. Clark and Louis Thornton. Council members not seeking reelection are Mayor Martin Lee and Aldermen Mrs. Cecil Kemp and Tommy Lee.

A campaign to write in T. O. Spiller as a council member has been gaining momentum the past couple of weeks, but his name is not on the ballot.

Only three candidates are running for hospital district director. Incumbents Rev. C. R. Blake and LeDrew Arrott, along with new candidate Roy Wayne Stout, are on the ballot. Dwain Pruitt is the retiring director. Holdover members of the board are C. E. Branton and Glenn Sims.

Mrs. Willie B. Millikin will serve as presiding judge and the election will also be held in the city hall.

## FISHING REPORT from Lake Spence

Parks and Wildlife Department fishery biologists are currently engaged in a striped bass "hunting" expedition at Lake Spence.

Each year, striped bass at Lake Spence are caught and stripped of eggs during the spawning period. The eggs are hatched under hatchery conditions and the young fish are then made available to many lakes over the state.

Bill Follis, biologist in charge of the striped bass program at Spence, said last week that the largest female striper caught in nets so far was an 18 pounder.

Last spawning season, fishery men at Lake Spence hatched over two million young striped bass. Follis hopes this year's haul will amount to around three million.

Sport fishermen have been enjoying good success with striped bass at Spence. The fish have been schooling near the main body of the Coke County lake.

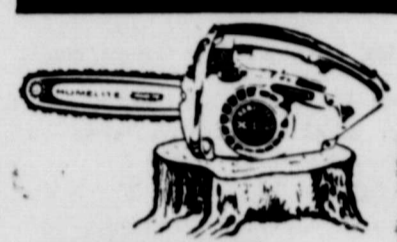
