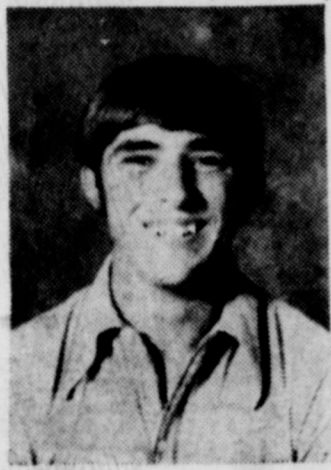

Golfers Second At Regional Meet

The Bronte High School golf team came in second at the regional UIL tournament Wednesday and Thursday of last week. Their team score was 682, eight strokes above first place Booker's 674. Booker B team was third with 725.

There was one bright spot for the Bronte team, however, as Wayne Alexander shot a low 150 to take medalist honors. He will go to state May 3 and 4.

Individual scores were: Alexander 150; Jim Dan Raughton 171; Bobby Bailey 177; Wayne Coalcraft 184; Ricky Frazier 221.

Alexander was 11 strokes under his closest opponent for the top spot in the tourney. At the state tournament he will go up against John Pueston of Salado who outshot him one stroke for last year's state medalist honors.

Livestock Judging Team Going to State Contest

Bronte High School FFA Livestock Judging Team took second place in the Area II Contest held last Saturday in Lubbock. The win gave the Bronte kids a berth in the State Contest to be held at Texas A&M University Saturday. Members of the team are Andy Eubanks, Marvin Ensor and Ker-

win Denton, with alternates Dale Patterson and Kyle Lee. J. T. Henry is coach of the team.

Only four Area II teams qualified for state, including Lorraine, Roscoe, Sweetwater and Bronte.

In an invitational contest held at Lubbock with 110 teams from Areas I and II, Bronte placed sixth, and then placed second in the contest with 45 teams from Area II.

Andy Eubanks, senior, was fourth high individual among the 320 contestants. Marvin Ensor, junior, was sixth high individual. Eubanks was high individual in beef cattle grading and Ensor was second. The Bronte team was

fast in beef grading.

Earlier in the year the team took third place in the Livestock Judging Contest at Angelo State University and was high team in cattle judging.

The State Contest will be made up of 50 teams from the top five per cent of Texas schools.

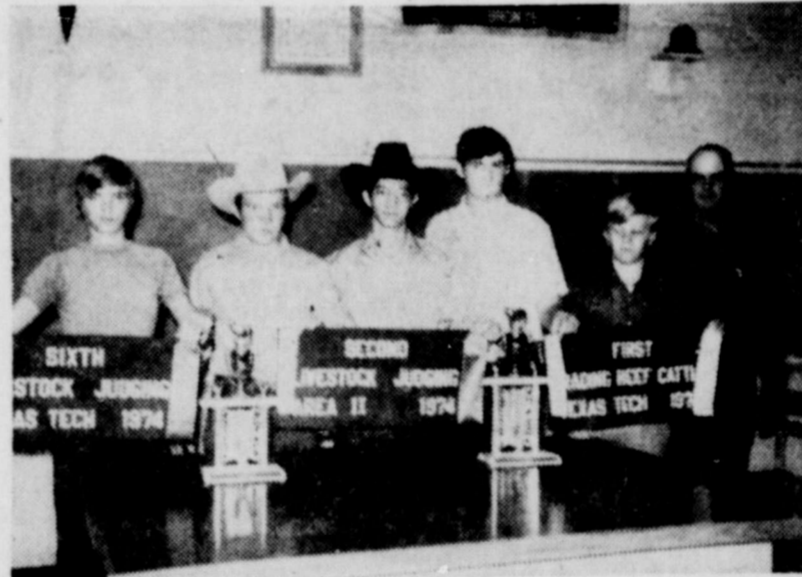

Highway Building Goes to Robert Lee

The Texas Highway Department has awarded a contract to J. D. Burk Construction Co. of San Angelo for the construction of a new maintenance Warehouse in Robert Lee.

Work began last week and the new section warehouse should be operational by late 1974, according to D. R. Watson, district engineer for the Texas Highway Department in San Angelo.

"The opening of the new facility will be with the least inconvenience to present employees," said James R. "Bobby" Evans, district maintenance engineer. The present subsection in Bronte will remain operational and will be under the supervision of the maintenance supervisor in Robert Lee, who will be named at a later date.

The new maintenance building of concrete masonry block will be on State Highway 158 east of Robert Lee. Included in the over 8,000 square feet will be offices, a meeting room, shop, stock room, equipment and material storage areas.

Some additional personnel will be needed to staff the Robert Lee facility, and Evans said anyone interested in applying for a job with the Highway Department should make application through J. B. Arrott, maintenance foreman in Ballinger.

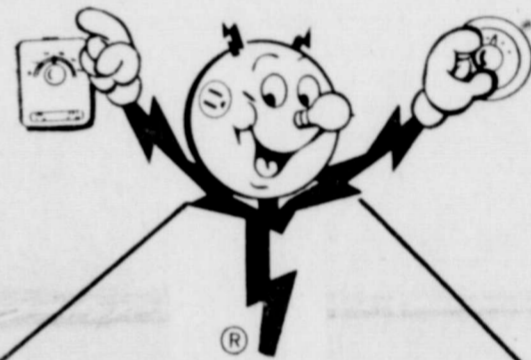

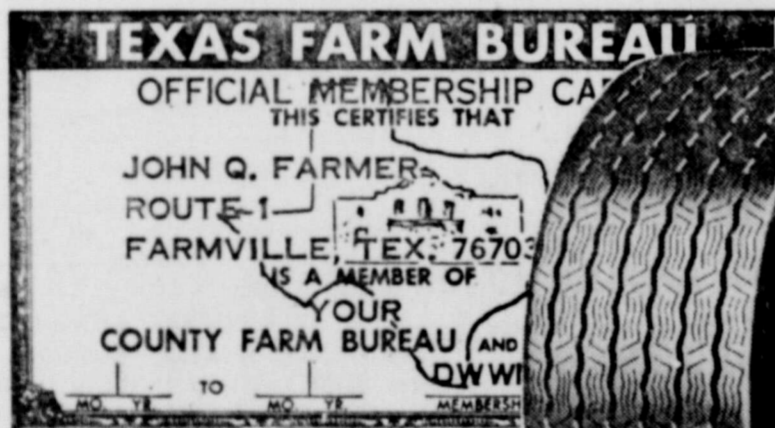

Whereas, we have forgotten the gracious hand which preserved us in peace, and multiplied and enriched us; and we have vainly imagined, in the deceitfulness of our hearts, that all these blessings were produced by some superior wisdom and virtue of our own; and

Whereas, intoxicated with unbroken success, we have become too self-sufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving grace, too proud to pray to the God that made us; and

Whereas, we have made such an idol out of our pursuit of "national security" that we have forgotten that only God can be the ultimate guardian of our true livelihood and safety; and

Whereas, we have failed to respond, personally and collectively, with sacrifice and uncompromised commitment to the unmet needs of our fellow man, both at home and abroad; as a people, we have become so absorbed with the selfish pursuits of pleasure and profit that we have blinded ourselves to God's standard of justice and righteousness for this society; and

Whereas, it therefore behooves us to humble ourselves before Almighty God, to confess our national sins, and to pray for clemency and forgiveness: Now, therefore be it

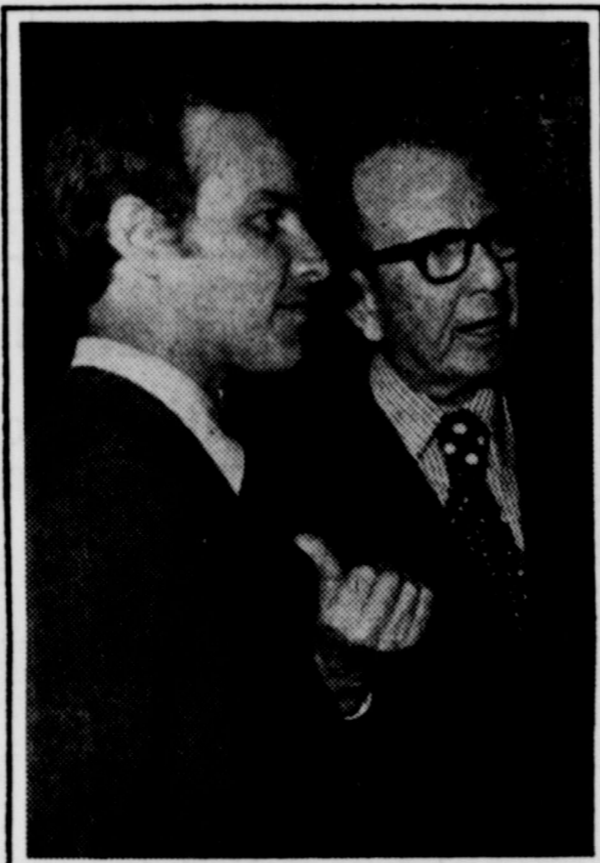
