### Bronte Area Receives Good Rains

A hard blowing storm moved into the Bronte area about 2 o'clock Sunday morning, but no serious damage was reported from the hard winds and electrical display. The cloud dumped 1.2 inches of rain in town and various

amounts over the surrounding countryside.

J. B. Mackey reported 1.30 inches at his place east of town. W. H. Thomas had only .3 inch at Tennyson, while L. W. Dunton reported an even inch at his Hayrick Valley Ranch northwest of town. From .8 on the north side up to 1.7 on the south side were reported at the Wylie Ranch located northeast of town.

The weather this week has been hot and humid and has been high. Robert Lee received about an inch last Friday night and a similar amount Saturday night. Sacco reported 1.5 inches and Silver had 2 to 3 inches along with heavy damage from hail.

The Maverick-Brookshire area received from 1 to 1.5 inches and Blackwell had .8 inch along with severe thunderstorm.

### Owen Takes Over As County Atty.

Robert E. Owen took over as Coke County Attorney June 4. He and his wife already have moved to Robert Lee and are in the process of buying the home of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Blair.

Owen was appointed by the Commissioners Court to replace Roy Ford who resigned and moved to Dallas.

The new lawyer was born and raised in Abilene and is a graduate of Abilene High School. He attended McMurry College two years and received a BBA degree from the University of Texas at Austin. He received a JD degree from the University of Texas Law School in 1959.

Owen has had 39 months of military service. He was a Distinguished Military graduate from OCS with a regular Army officer commission, and was discharged as a captain in the Reserve.

He was licensed to practice law in Texas courts in 1959. He is also licensed to practice in all four U. S. District Courts of Texas, the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit in New Orleans, the U. S. Court of Claims in Washington and the Supreme Court of the United States.

He is a former county attorney of Crockett County, and a former assistant attorney general of the State of Texas, serving as chief of the Anti-trust and Consumer Protection Division from February 1969 to December 1972.

The county attorney is married to the former Wanda Jean Roman who was raised at Knott and is a graduate of Knott High School. She is also a graduate of Hardin-Simmons University and holds a masters degree from Southwest Texas State University at San Marcos. The couple has no children.

### Only 347 Vote In 2nd Primary

Only 347 of the 2154 registered voters in Coke County cast their ballots in Saturday's Second Primary Election.

In the race for U. S. Representative, District 21, Nelson W. Wolff carried Coke County with 200 votes to Robert "Bob" Krueger's 146, but over the entire 21st District, Krueger came out the winner with 51.55 per cent of the votes to Wolff's 48.45, according to Texas Election Bureau figures.

In the May 4 Democratic Primary, Krueger polled 297 votes to Wolff's 235 in Coke County.

Krueger now faces Doug Harlan, a San Antonio Republican, in the General Election Nov. 5. Harlan won his party's nomination over three other candidates without a runoff in May.

The other race on the ballot was between Michael H. Ezzell and C. Glenn Toombs for State Representative, District 63, with Ezzell receiving 224 votes in Coke County to Toombs' 118. Ezzell won the nomination for the 63rd seat in the six county district and will face Republican John (Rich) Anderson of Gail in the November election.

In the May 4 Primary, Toombs received 412 votes and Ezzell 338 in Coke County.

The Coke County Democratic Executive Committee met Tuesday afternoon at the Courthouse to canvass the vote in the Second Democratic Primary election which was held last Saturday.

During the business meeting, the resignation of Noah Pruitt Sr. was received, with regret, by the committee. Mr. Pruitt has served as precinct judge for many years and has been very active in the Democratic Party.

Mrs. Willie B. Millikin of Bronte was appointed by a unanimous vote of the committee to serve as judge of Precinct 4.

Mr. Pruitt said he helped hold an election for the first time in 1948. Since that time he has served either as judge or assistant judge in every Democratic Primary.

He said he didn't resign his position because he didn't like the work or the people with whom he worked, but because he felt the precinct needed a younger person to serve as precinct committeeman and election judge.

Mrs. Millikin has assisted in the conduct of elections for a number of years.

Reservists to Work On Civil Defense

Residents of Cooke County are being urged to cooperate later this month with Army Reservists who are willing to improve the county Civil Defense plan through a "domestic action" project.

A nine-man team from the 488th Civil Affairs Co., Army Reserve and headquartered at Hohen, will be working with Civil Defense and

other officials in Robert Lee and Bronco between June 15-20 to locate and classify all shelter areas which would be available for use in the event of a nuclear or natural disaster, such as a tornado.

Heading up the team working in Cooke County, as well as other 488th teams working in Colman and Nolan counties, will be Capt. Allen Christensen, who lives in Robert Lee. He has commuted to the 488th's monthly drills for four years, serving as the unit's transportation officer.

Bob Lange of Robert Lee and Fred Aker of Bronco, both Civil Defense directors, have pledged their support to the Reservists and expressed appreciation for the civic action project designed to aid the two communities.

The Civil Defense directors joined Capt. Christensen in asking local citizens to cooperate with the Reservists conducting the survey. "We would like to classify all public buildings, churches, schools and private shelters, to see how many persons could be protected in case of a real emergency," Capt. Christensen said.

The team also will be working with law enforcement officials and "aux" and Citizens Band radio operators to form an emergency or alternate communications network, he said.

Results of the survey will be turned over to the Civil Defense directors for incorporation into their disaster plans, the officer said.
