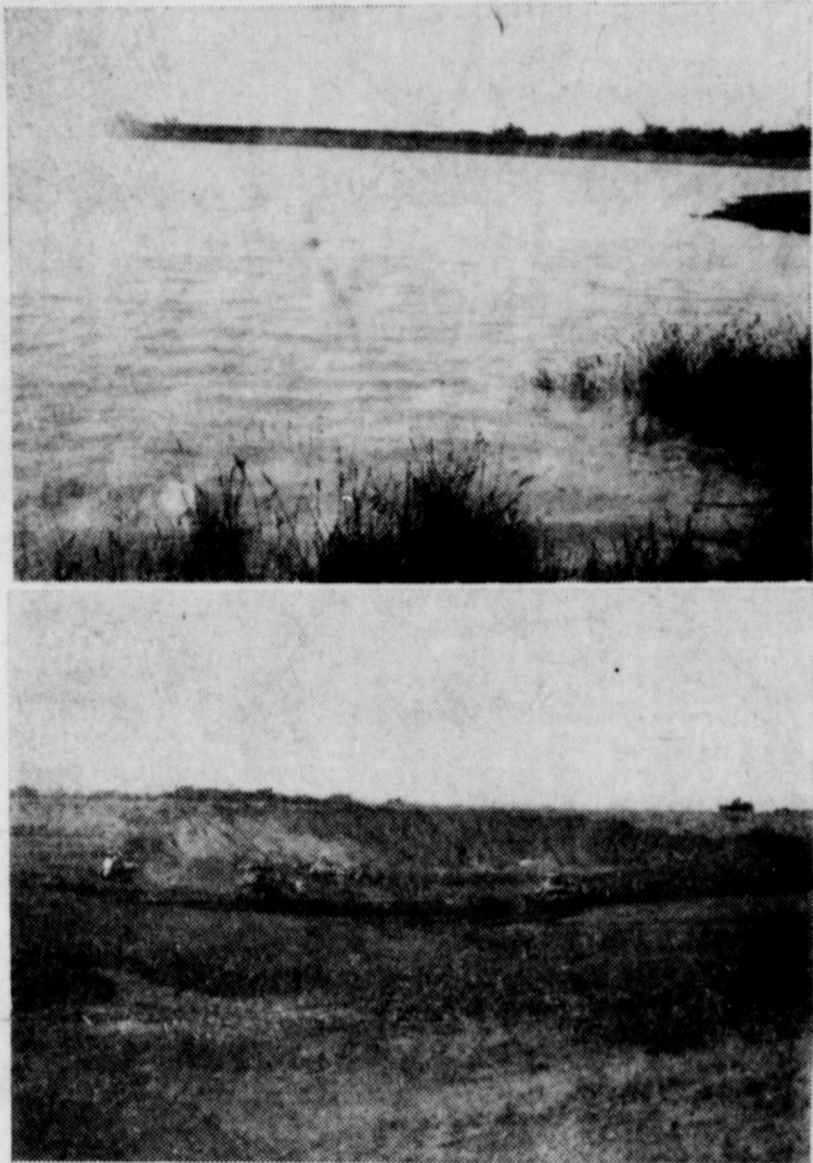

Stock of the Bronte Longhorns took a considerable jump this week after they bopped the Robert Lee Steers last Friday night, 41-0. The Horns had been rated 16th among Class B high schools in Texas by the Harris Rating System, and they leaped to third place.

Rev. C. R. Blake Resigns Pastorate

The Rev. C. R. Blake has resigned as pastor of the Tennyson Baptist Church, effective Oct. 1. He has served as pastor of the church almost five years, since January 1970.

Blake said he regretted resigning the position, but "I felt like a different voice and personality could reach some of the people I haven't been able to reach." He said his schedule would be open and he would be available for supply work.

Blake was licensed to preach in 1928, and has served a number of churches in West Texas. He was pastor of First Baptist Church in Bronte from Feb. 28, 1944, until July 1, 1948.

Since his retirement as a full time pastor he and his wife have lived in Bronte. He has been active in working with the Bronte Housing Authority and with distribution of surplus commodities. He has served as president of the board of directors of East Coke County Hospital District since its inception and still serves in that capacity.

RECEPTION TO HONOR HARRY MORRIS FAMILY

The Rev. and Mrs. Harry Morris and family will be honored with a reception Sunday from 2 to 5 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall of the First Baptist Church.

Morris has resigned as pastor of the church, effective Oct. 1. He has accepted a position as area missionary for the Runnels, Coleman and Brady Baptist Associations. The Morrises will live in Ballinger.

Creeks were swollen and the Colorado River was on a big rise Wednesday afternoon in spite of having the Robert Lee dam only a few miles up the river.

The West Texas Utilities plant at Oak Creek Lake reported 7.72 inches and a rise in the lake level of three feet. A report Thursday morning said that water was also flowing into Lake Spence, although rains in the Colorado City area and other areas of the watershed was not as heavy as in Coke County. Mountain Creek Lake this side of Robert Lee filled up and had water running over the spillway.

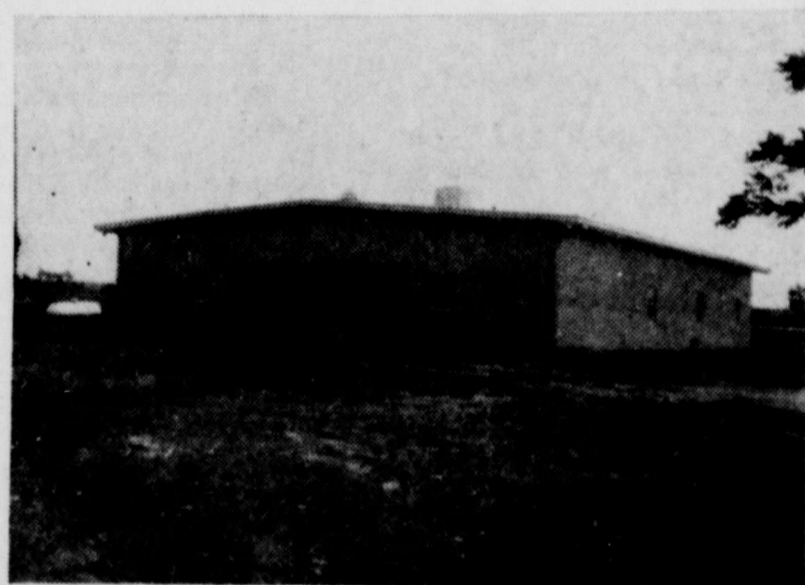
Lions Club Plans Chili Supper

Robert (Bob) Krueger of New Braunfels, Democratic nominee for U. S. Congressman for the 21st Texas District, will be in Bronte Friday (today).

An informal reception will be held for him from 2 to 3 p.m. at the First National Bank, and the public is invited.

Krueger said Wednesday that he would be in Bronte and would like to meet and visit with as many local citizens as possible during his limited time.

E. F. Glenn, president of the bank, issued an invitation to everyone in the area to come in and meet the candidate.

Krueger is seeking the position held for many years by O. C. Fisher, who did not seek reelection.

Krueger and Nelson Wolff were the two high men in the first Democratic Primary which had six candidates. Krueger went on to defeat Wolff in the second Primary.

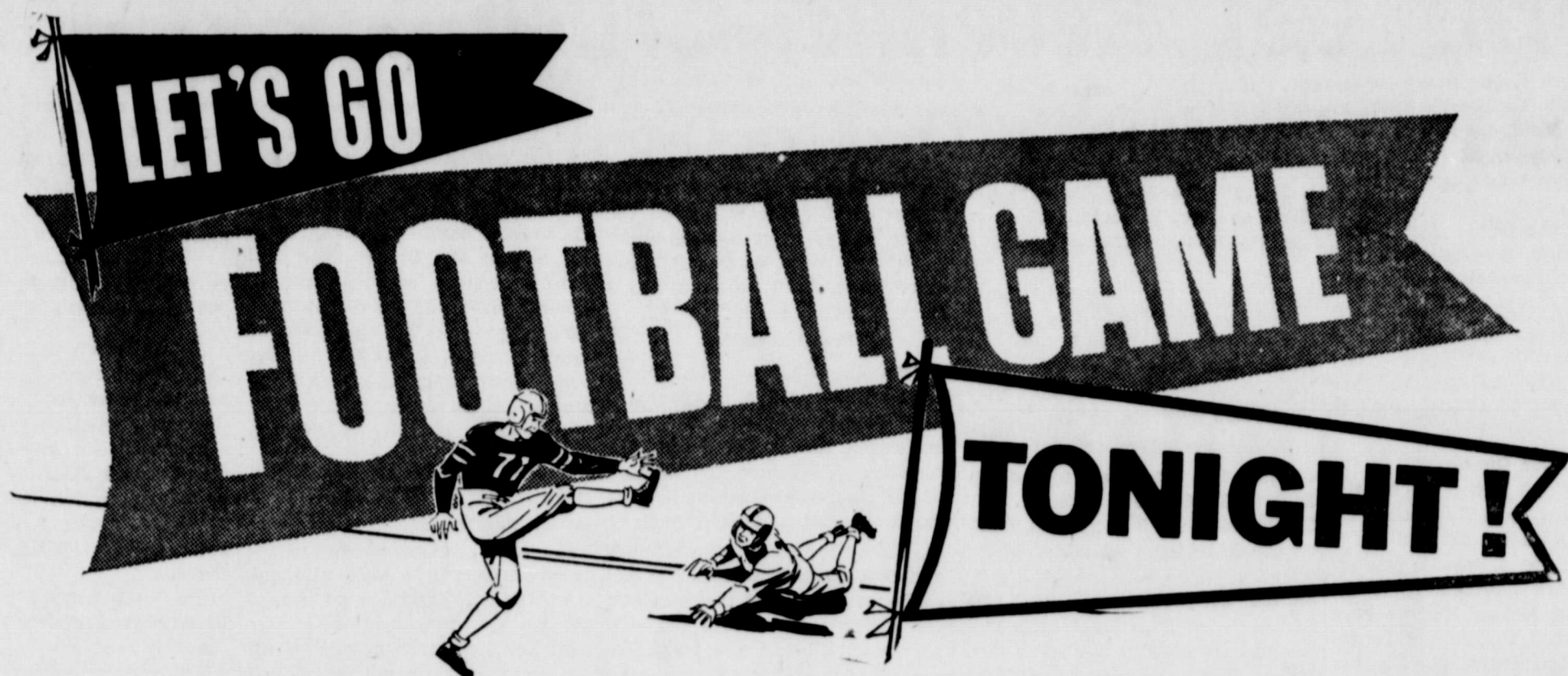

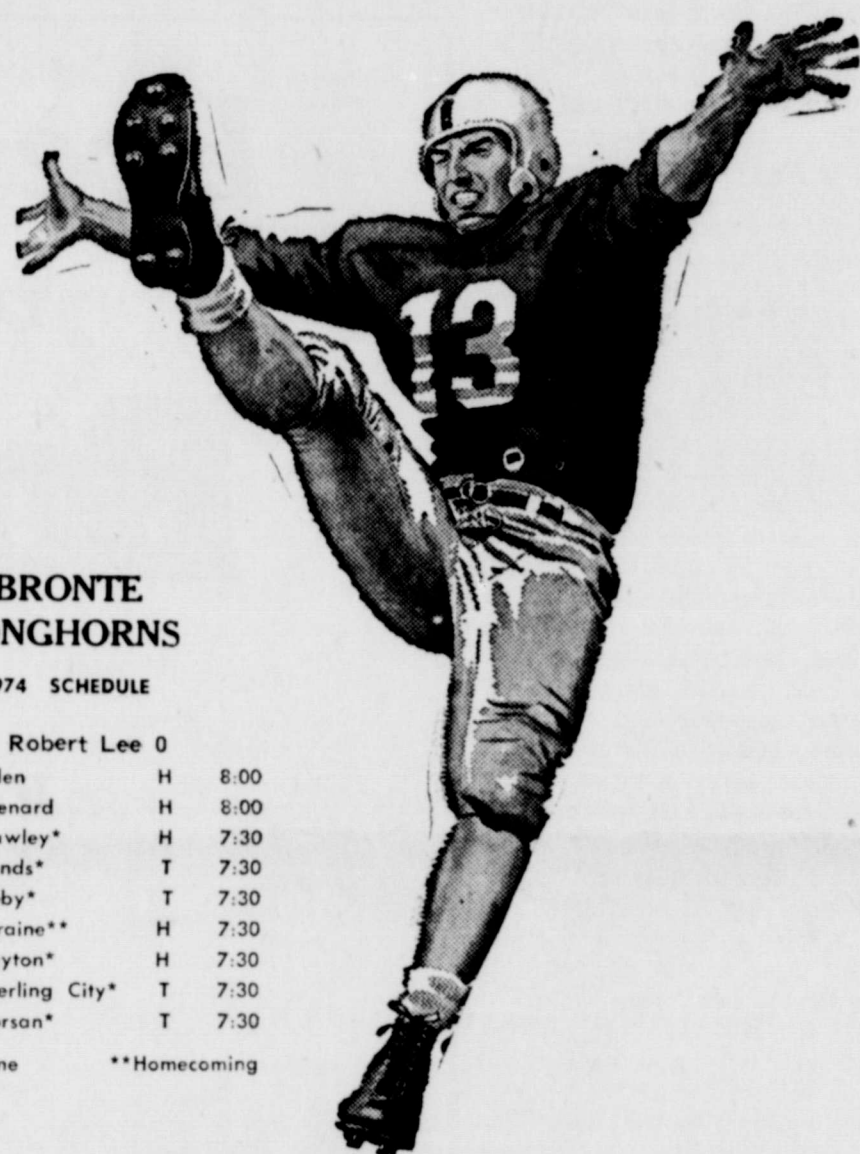

Horns Get Revenge; Crush Steers, 41-0

The Bronte Longhorns made an impressive entrance into the 1974 season Friday night when they went to Robert Lee and trounced the Steers 41-0. It was a sweet victory for the Horns after a four year dry spell in competition with their Coke County neighbors.

Word was that they needed to beat the Steers 102-0 to even up the last four years' losses. They didn't do quite that well but they did look good in scoring their 41 points.

First Quarter

Doug Herford kicked off for the Steers to Jim Dan Raughton who was stopped on the 30. Alan Barbee carried for 3, then a penalty added 5 more. Barbee made almost 2 and Nelson Coulter kept to make the 1st down on the 40. Coulter carried twice for 7 yards and a 3rd down pass was intercepted by Lyn Sockwell on the Steer 45.

The Steers couldn't make 10 yards so Sockwell punted to the Bronte 29. The Horns bogged down and Barbee punted to the Robert Lee 43. Poly Abalos and Sockwell gained 4 yards in three tries, then a pass from G. Abalos to P. Abalos moved the Steers to the 8 yard line of Bronte. Four plays later the Longhorns took over on the 1 yard line after some outstanding defensive play.

Barbee made 5 yards in two carries. On 3rd down Coulter let go a pass to Bobby Bailey on the 30 and he ran the remaining 70 yards to cross the double stripe. Bailey had some hot pursuers on his heels but he managed to fight them off. Barbee kicked the EP and the score was 7-0.

Barbee kicked off to the Steers and three plays later they were faced with a 4th and 8 as the first quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Sockwell got off a beautiful punt but it took a Bronte bounce and rolled back to the Longhorn 49. The Bronte lads were fined 15 yards for holding, then Barbee caught a Coulter pass for 15 yards but it was not enough, so he punted to the Steer 24. The Robert Lee boys had to punt after three plays and Bronte got the ball on their 31. The Steers were penalized 15 and the ball was on the 46. Coulter pitched the ball to Barbee and he got some beautiful blocking to help him make a beautiful run of 49 yards to the Steer 5. The RL team was penalized 2½ yards, then Turney Coulter went over for the counter. Barbee's kick made the score 14-0.

Barbee kicked off to P. Abalos who was knocked down on his 37. After a couple of short gains, an unsuccessful pass try lost big yards and brought up a 4th down. The punt went to the Steer 47.

Wayne Alexander picked up 7 and Barbee made 10 for a 1st on the RL 36. Alexander made another 7 and Barbee went to the 20 for a 1st. Coulter slipped around left end for 19 yards and a 1st on the 1, then he slid through the line for another counter. PAT try failed and it was 20-0.

After Barbee's kickoff the RL team tried a pass play but Jim Dan Raughton intercepted it and was stopped on the Steer 31. Barbee, Alexander and Coulter made enough for a 1st down and Marvin Ensor went for 3 more. A 2nd down pass try was intercepted by Sockwell on his 3 yard line. A couple of plays later Barbee snagged a Robert Lee pass and went down to left side for another TD. Barbee's kick was good and the score was 27-0.

P. Abalos took Barbee's kick and was hit on the 37. First down play resulted in a fumble which was recovered by Kerwin Denton. Halftime was drawing near and

nothing spectacular happened before the whistle blew.

Third Quarter

Barbee kicked off to start the third quarter. Sockwell took it to his 31. Bronte was penalized 5 yards and Sockwell made a 1st on the Steer 44. P. Abalos made 9 yards, then Mark Lee caught Sockwell for an 11 yard loss. G. Abalos lost back to the 35, bringing up 4th and 20. Raughton took Sockwell's punt out to the 31.

Barbee went 14 yards for a 1st on his 45. Alexander picked up 3, and T. Coulter added 1. N. Coulter kept for 9 yards and a 1st on the RL 42. A couple of plays later P. Abalos intercepted a pass on his 25 yard line. But the Steers couldn't make it and had to punt. It went to Raughton who

was downed on the Steer 44.

Alexander ran for 5, then the Steers were penalized 15, giving the Horns a 1st on the RL 30. A couple of short gains moved the ball to the 28, then Barbee broke through for a 1st on the 12. Alexander went for 9 yards to the 3 as the quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

Alexander went for the 1st on the 1 and carried a couple more times, lacking only inches getting across the double stripe. On 3rd down N. Coulter got through for the score and Barbee's kick was okay. Score: 34-0.

A Steer penalty allowed the Longhorns to kickoff from the RL 45. Barbee booted it into the end zone to give the Steers the ball on their 20. Robert Lee was soon

faced with a 4th and 9 and Sockwell punted to Raughton who moved out to the RL 44. Alexander and Barbee carried for 8, then a time penalty brought up 3rd and 11. Coulter made 13 yards for a 1st on the 30. Bronte drew a 5 yard procedure penalty and T. Coulter made 4 before Sockwell stole a pass on his 25. Sockwell drove to his 37 for a 1st, but two plays later Ensor recovered a RL fumble on the Steer 39.

T. Coulter made 9 and Barbee got the 1st down on the 28. Alexander made 6. T. Coulter got the 1st on the 18. Alexander carried twice for 9. Then Barbee swung around left end for 14 yards and a touchdown. Raughton kicked the EP and the score was 41-0.

Barbee had time to kickoff be-

fore the clock ran out. Final score: Bronte 41, Robert Lee 0.

The entire Longhorn defensive team played great ball, allowing Robert Lee only three 1st downs and 76 yards total offense.

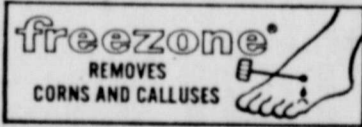

HISTORICAL MARKER TO RECOGNIZE COKE

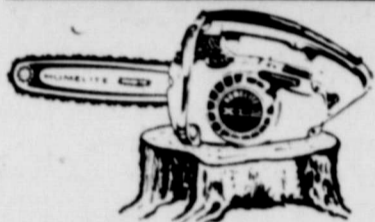

This is the centennial year for Tom Green County. It was 100 years ago that application was made to separate from Bexar County.

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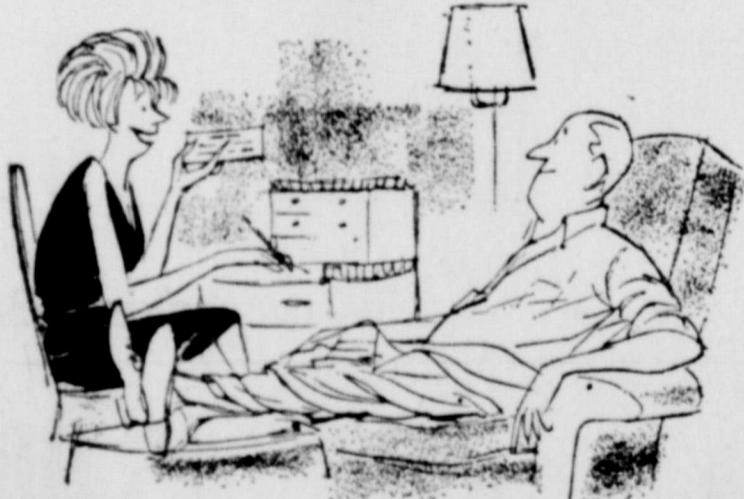

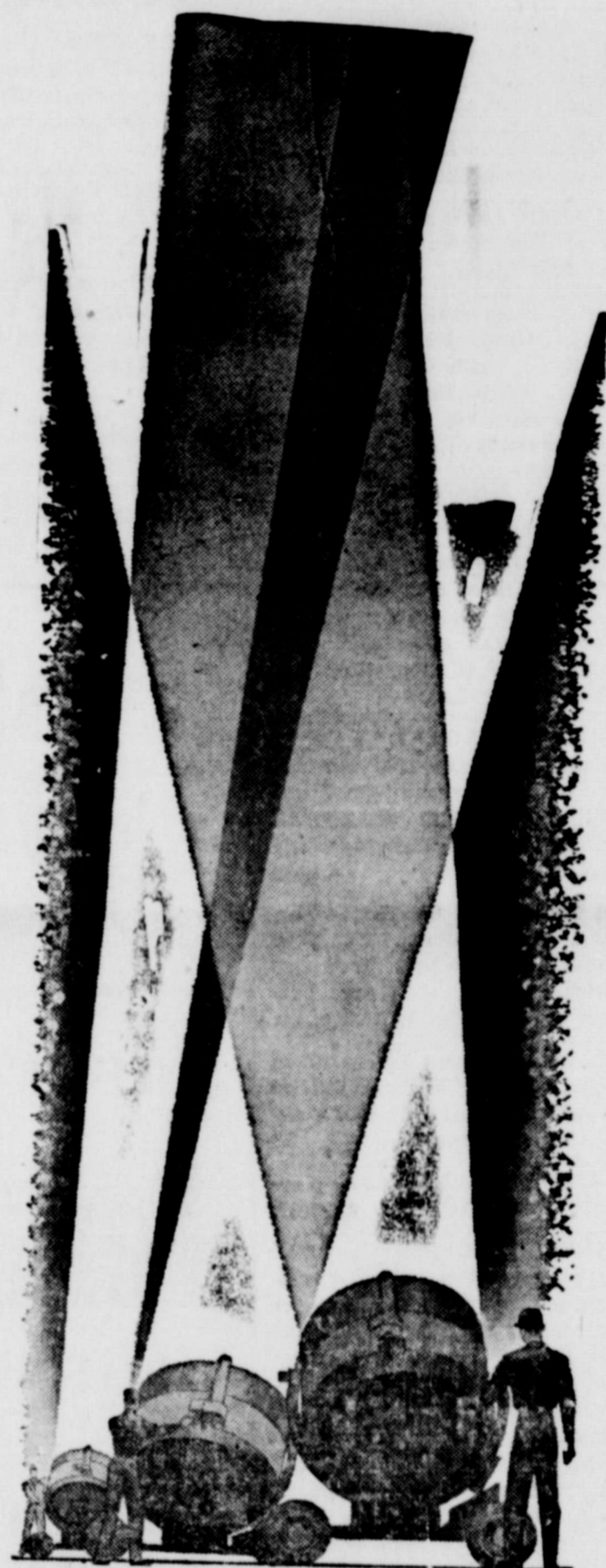
