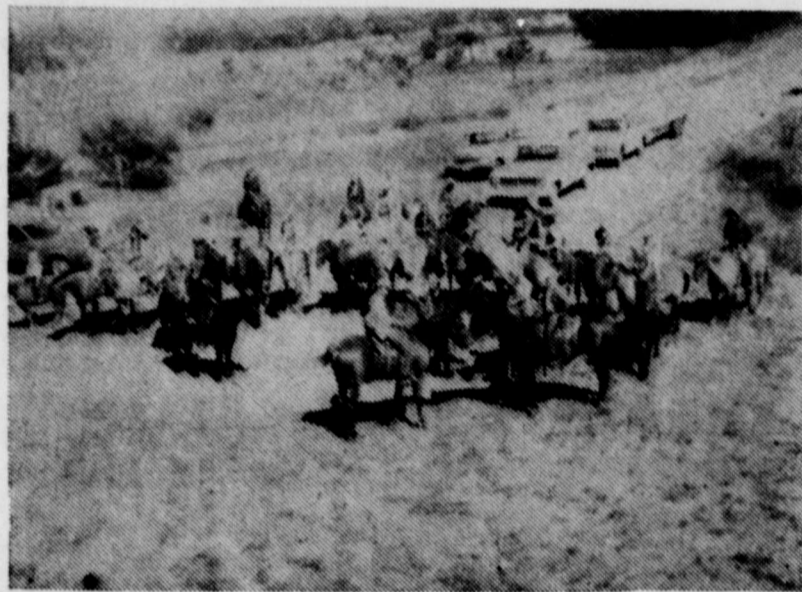

## 302 Register at P. O. Observance

A total of 302 persons registered at the observance of the 84th birthday of the Bronte Post Office on Sept. 19. The observance was sponsored by the Coke County Historical Survey Committee.

According to information obtained from official postal agencies and the National Archives and Records, the Bronte Post Office was established Sept. 19, 1890, and has had 11 different postmasters.

Postmaster Pruitt is still serving and stated that the Bronte office serves about 1000 customers through 390 rented boxes. It has one rural route and two star routes covering 150 miles.

Funeral services for Delmir Morris Sheppard, 49, of Midland, were held Thursday of last week at 5:30 p.m. in the First United Methodist Church in Robert Lee with the Rev. A. A. Kendal, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Robert Lee Cemetery under the direction of Newby Funeral Home.

Sheppard, a native of Robert Lee, was fatally shot in the head early Wednesday at his trailer home southwest of Midland. His wife, Audrey McArthur Sheppard, was charged with murder.

He was born in Coke County April 21, 1925, son of W. D. and Norma Whiteside Sheppard. He was a World War II veteran and operated a pipeline service firm in the Midland area.

He is survived by his wife of Midland; four sons, Stanley Wayne, Johnny Temp and Harold Mack of Midland, and A. J. of North Dakota; a daughter, Norma of North Dakota; his mother and step-father, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Ruth of Robert Lee; a sister, Mrs. Jack (Nelda) Brock of Austin; a brother, Bert Sheppard of Spearman; and three grandchildren.

The County Court session held Sept. 16 brought varied results with the 35 cases on the docket.

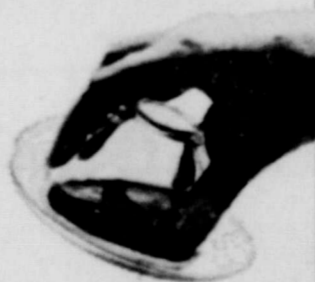
Four of those charged were fined and given probated jail sentences. Six of the cases were dismissed and the remainder are waiting for jury trial.

**Kickapoo Dams Work, Rains Show**

The floodwater retarding structures on the Kickapoo Creek Watershed above Bronte worked very well during the recent heavy rains. Water went through the principal spillway (drawdown tube) on three of the dams. Excess water was held in the flood detention pool and released at a controlled rate of flow to prevent flooding downstream. This was shown by water flowing in the Middle and West Kickapoo Creeks through Bronte for over 10 days.

If all the water stored above the dams had run off without restriction some flooding might have occurred on the creeks downstream. L. W. Duncan reported that the dam on his place northwest of Bronte lacked just a few feet going through the emergency spillway. And one of the dams on the Ed Rawlings ranch had water close to the emergency spillway.

The dams that functioned worked as designed and there was no danger of failure on any of them. This is another example of a whole community working in conjunction with civic clubs and other local organizations, and with state and federal agencies to benefit the rural and town people in the same project.

The directors of the Kickapoo Water Control and Improvement District are responsible for the operation and maintenance of the structures to keep them safe and in an effective working condition. Technical assistance is furnished the directors by the Soil Conservation Service. Directors are Carroll Robbins, Preston Davis, Royce Fancher, Louis Gallaway and L. W. Duncan.

# Horns Score Early, Late To Defeat Menard, 20-0

The Bronte Longhorns started out with a sustained drive and scored against Menard here last Friday night, then it was nip and tuck until late in the fourth quarter before the Horns could put together another scoring drive. But they held Menard to zero and went on to win the game 20-0.

## First Quarter

Bronte received the opening kickoff and put the ball in play on the 20. Alan Barbee carried for 2 and a Menard penalty made it 2nd and 3. Barbee then went 17 yards for a 1st on his 44. Nelson Coulter ran 14 yards to the Menard 42 for another 1st. Barbee picked up 2 and Coulter added 1. Coulter then kept for a 1st on the 30. ## Second Quarter

The next series didn't click and Menard took over on their 27.

The Jackets moved to the Bronte 41 on a pass play. Then Harold Graham carried twice for 21 yards and a 1st on the 20. Murchison made 9 to the Bronte 11 and it looked like the Yellowjackets meant business. Next play, however, resulted in a fumble and Alexander recovered on the 4 yard line. A Menard penalty moved the ball to the 9 and N. Coulter carried to the 14 for a 1st. Another run by Coulter moved it to the 29 and he kept again for 4 as the second quarter ended.

## Third Quarter

Barbee's kickoff was brought

back to the 33. A couple of short gains and a 15 yard face mask penalty against Bronte gave Menard a 1st on the Bronte 49. The Menard lads went for another 1st on the 39. The next three plays gave them only 4 yards, so Walker punted into the end zone.

Starting at the 20, N. Coulter went 11 yards for a 1st on his 31. Menard was penalized 5 yards and Coulter tried to pass. He seemed to be trapped but worked his way out of a hopeless situation for a 1st down on his 46. Next play was a pass to Raughton for another 1st on the Menard 35. Bronte was fined 5 yards and Menard then drew a 15 yarder to put the ball on the 21. Next play resulted in a fumble recovery by Menard on their 29. ## Fourth Quarter

The Menard defense was tough, so Barbee punted the ball into the end zone. The Yellowjackets got to moving well, making 1st downs on their 31 and the 50. Then the Longhorn defense showed its mettle as the Jackets faced a 4th and 13 situation. Raughton took the punt and was hit on his 21 yard line.

Barbee went for 5, N. Coulter added 2 and Barbee made the 1st on the 33. N. Coulter then tossed the ball to Barbee who, in turn, passed it to Raughton for a big 52 yard gainer to the Menard 15. Menard drew a major penalty down to the 7 and Barbee made a 1st on the 3. Barbee made short gains on the first two downs, then N. Coulter fooled everyone by faking to Barbee and keeping the ball himself to cross the double stripe on 3rd down. A pass play to Bobby Bailey was good for two extra points and the score was 14-0.

Sammy Sanchez was downed on his 28 after taking Barbee's kickoff. The Jackets completed two passes for a net loss of 12 yards. After an unsuccessful 3rd and 4th down the ball went over to the Horn on the Menard 14. N. Coulter went for 4 and a 2nd down pass to Raughton was good for another TD. The conversion kick was blocked and the score was 20-0. The clock showed 31 seconds.

Barbee kicked off and the Jackets moved the ball out to their 41 for a 1st down. Next play saw Kit Carlton intercept a pass, as the final whistle sounded.

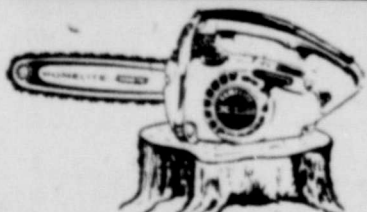

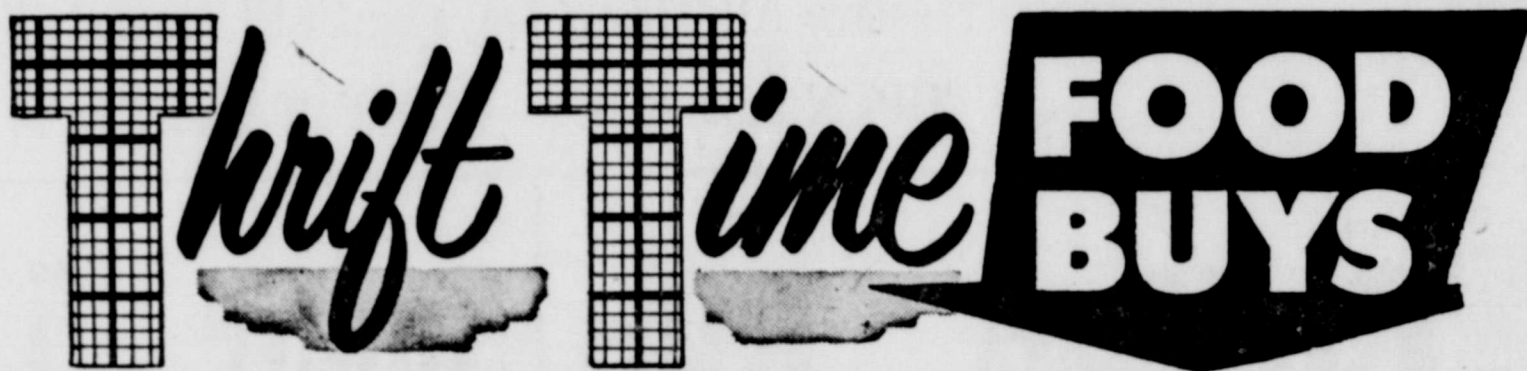
