

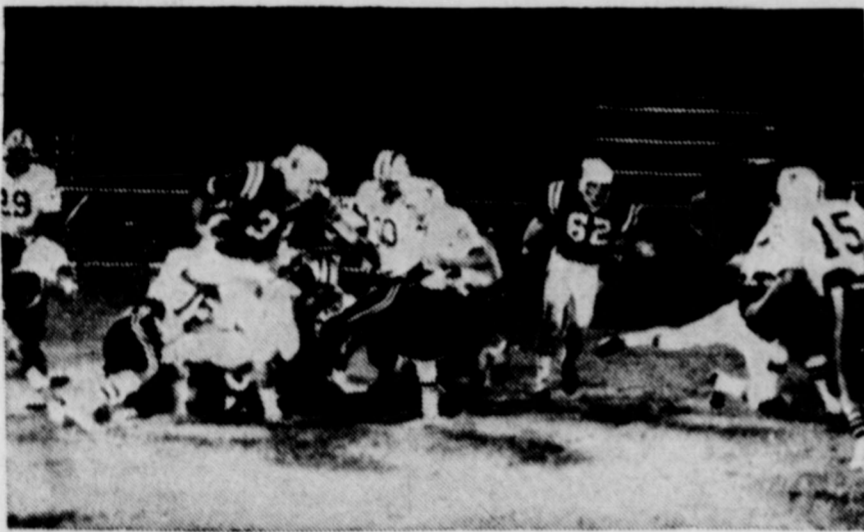

## It's County Fair Weekend

### Longhorns, Lions Tangle Tonight

The Bronte Longhorns will be on the road again this week as they travel to Roby for a 7:30 contest with the Lions.

The Longhorns' stock rose several points again this week as reports of various ratings came out. They moved from third to second place among Class B teams in

Texas in the Harris Ratings. Associated Press sportswriters moved from seventh place to fourth in Texas. Since they were already No. 1 in the Big Country ratings by the Abilene Reporter-News, they had to stay in that spot.

Alan Berbee racked up 19 points, two touchdowns and seven conversions, against Sands last week and leads the district with 73 points. Fincher of Jayton remains in second place with 52. Nelson Coulter is in third spot with 42. Bobby Bailey is seventh high pointer with 26 and Jim Dan Raughton is eighth with 25.

Bronte maintains its perfect 5-0 record for the season and 2-0 in district. Roby will go into Friday night's game with a 1-4 season record and a 1-1 district record. Bronte has scored 184 points while allowing opponents only 16. Roby has made 42 points while their opponents have racked up 142.

### Precinct 4 Group Wants Own JP

Residents of the part of Bronte which lies in Commissioner Precinct 4 presented petitions to the Commissioners Court Monday requesting a justice of the peace for their precinct. The petitions had been signed by 114 persons.

It was reported to The Enterprise that the group wanted to get a candidate certified and his name on the ballots to be used in the Nov. 5 General Election. Since the ballots had already been printed and absentee voting started Wednesday, it was not possible to get another name on the ballot.

The petitioners were told that the only way they could elect a justice of the peace on Nov. 5 would have to be by write-in votes.

A spokesman for the group told the Enterprise that they were urging voters to write in the name of Earl D. "Pete" Nutter who is a resident of the precinct.

The Enterprise was told that the reason given for wanting a JP in Precinct 4 was that citizens of the precinct had been deprived of their right to vote on the official who serves them.

For many years Coke County has operated with two JPs, one in Bronte and one in Robert Lee. However, if this move is successful, observers say in all likelihood citizens of Precinct 3 on the west side of the county will also want to elect their own JP. Such a development would give Coke County four justices of the peace.

The Bronte Enterprise is pushing for a large bicycle section and will give a \$5.00 prize to the bike entry which is judged best decorated and its rider most uniquely dressed. The same judges who select the top floats will also judge the bicycle entries.

Committee members have urged everyone who possibly can to build a float or work up an entry in the parade.

The evening meal will be a pot luck affair and everyone is requested to bring enough food for his family and guests.

All ex-students and teachers will be honored guests and everyone else is cordially invited to take part in the day's festivities.

### Absentee Voting Now in Progress

Absentee voting began Wednesday for the Nov. 5 General Election, and will continue through Friday, Nov. 1.

Persons who are going to be out of the county on election day may go to the office of County Clerk Mrs. Winnie Waldrop and cast their ballots. Persons who are going to be out of the county on election day and during the absentee voting period may request a ballot be mailed to them at an out of county address. Ballots can also be mailed to persons who are not physically able to go to the polls and for a few other reasons.

The Bronte area received more rain Sunday and Monday, with up to five inches in some spots. Dave Seibold, The Enterprise's official rain gauger, reported 3 inches. However, some residents of the city reported 3.2 inches.

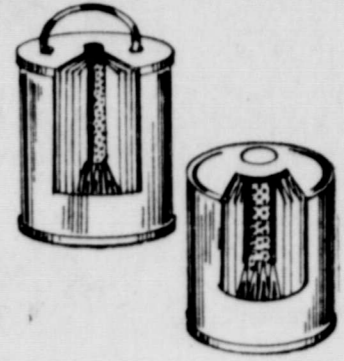

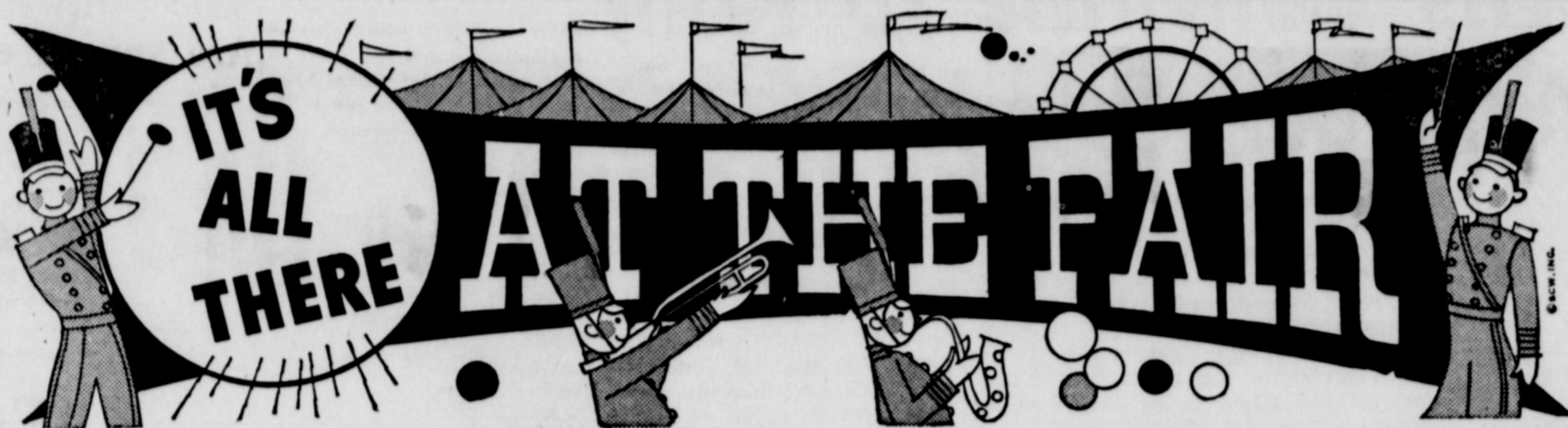

# Horns Continue to Roll; Run Over Sands, 49-2

The Bronte Longhorns showed the Sands Mustangs a lot of scorers and a tough defensive line to win their second District 3-B battle. The game was played at Sands last Friday night and the final score was 49-2. The contest left the Horns with a clean season record of five wins, no losses, and only 16 points made by their opposition.

## First Quarter

After Alan Barbee's kickoff was taken at the 5 and returned to the 20, the Mustangs got a 1st down on two plays before fine defensive plays by Mark Lee and Clint Por-

ter forced a punt from the 35.

The Longhorns took over on their own 37. Barbee got 7, Turney Coulter got 2 and Wayne Alexander got 5 and a 1st down. Barbee made 6, and after an incomplete pass, got another 21, to set the ball on the 14. T Coulter moved to the 6, and on the next play, Alexander carried it in for the Horns' first score. Barbee converted and the Horns led 7-0.

Barbee kicked off to the Sands 10. The Mustangs ran three unsuccessful plays, including a fine defensive play by N. Coulter, and punted to the Bronte 41. Bronte couldn't move the ball either, and Barbee punted to the Sands 28. On 3rd down the Mustangs took to the air, but an alert Kit Carlton intercepted and his return to the Sands 32 ended the quarter.

## Second Quarter

The Longhorns sputtered but a big 20 yard gainer by N. Coulter on a roll out put the Longhorns in a scoring position. This time it was a 4th down pass from Coulter to Bobby Bailey at the 7 that lighted the scoreboard. Barbee converted and the Longhorns led 14-0 with 10:00 left in the quarter.

After the kickoff Sands couldn't make the needed yardage and punted to the Bronte 25. It was from here that Coulter hit Jim Dan Raughton with a pass that covered 75 yards and made 6 points. Barbee's conversion kick was okay to make the score 21-0.

Barbee's kickoff was returned to the 15. The Mustangs made only 3 yards in three plays, thanks to the defensive work of Paul Cervenka. Clint Porter blocked Mustang Floyd's punt and covered it on the 5. Coach Gerald Sandusky sent in his reserves, and on 4th down, the Horns lost the ball to Sands on a fumble at the 3.

Sands couldn't move and punted to the 50. A good run by N. Coulter was nullified with a position penalty, but a Coulter-Barbee pass netted 20, Coulter got 9 and Barbee blasted for 15 to place the ball on the 9. It was from there that Marvin Ensor blasted into the end zone. Barbee's conversion made it 28-0, to end the half.

## Third Quarter

The Longhorns continued their sandblasting job in the second half as Barbee returned the kickoff to his 35. N. Coulter got 7 and 20, Barbee added 5, Alexander hit for 4, Barbee picked up another 25, and a Coulter-Bailey pass set the ball on the 6 yard line. Barbee carried it in from there and also kicked the EP to make it 35-0.

Sands took Barbee's kickoff at the 2 but were bottled up due the fine plays of Porter and Ensor. After the punt N. Coulter got 10 yards before his pass intended for Bailey was intercepted. Sands was unable to make it and punted. Bronte tried a couple of pass plays that did not work and Barbee went back to punt. The snap went over his head and he had to run back and cover it, but the play gave Sands its only two points of the ball game, with two minutes left on the clock. That

ended all scoring in the third quarter. The rest of the third period was rather uneventful.

## Fourth Quarter

After a Sands punt N. Coulter got 15 but that was it and Barbee punted into the end zone. On Sands' first play Raughton recovered a fumble at the 15. Coach Sandusky's reserves were again in the ball game, but they fumbled the ball back to the Mustangs at the 16.

Sands took to the air and Barbee intercepted one of the aerals at the 45 and returned it all the way for 6 points. Barbee converted to bring the score up to 42-2.

The Mustangs ran two plays and N. Coulter thrilled the Bronte fans with an interception of a pitchout and returned it 35 yards for the final Longhorn TD. Barbee's kick made it a perfect 7 of 7 extra points and the scoreboard said it was 49-2.

Other good performances were noted by Kerwin Denton, Eddie Angel, Billie Ren Lee, Kyle Lee and Ricky Frazier.

## OIL NEWS

Sun Oil Co. has recompleted its No. 10 J. Brannon for 269 barrels of 42.3 gravity oil, plus eight barrels of water. Gas-oil ratio was 892-1.

Located in the Jameson Field, it was a former Strawn producer and was originally drilled to 6,314 feet. It spots 660 feet from the south and 467 feet from the west lines of 460-1A-S. M. Conner.

Production was through 16-64 inch choke and perforations at 5,737-756 feet.

The Rawlings multipay field has gained its second upper Jennings oil producer and a location south extension to that pay. It is Exxon Corp. No. 7 R. F. Butler and had a pumping potential of 61 barrels of 49.2 gravity oil, plus 151 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 82-1.

Production was through perforations at 5,096-108 feet. It formerly produced at 5,500 feet. Location is 735 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east lines of the northeast quarter of 397-1A-H&TC. It is about three miles north of Bronte.
