The Bronte Longhorns will be trying to keep their perfect record intact when they meet the Lorraine Bulldogs Saturday night before a Homecoming crowd.

The Longhorns had a new experience for this season when they played Roby last Friday night. They allowed the Lions to score first and it was the first time they have been behind on the scoreboard this year. However, they corrected their mistakes by taking a 57-6 win from their hosts.

The Horns shouldn't have too much difficulty with the Bulldogs as their season records are exactly opposite: Bronte 6-0; Lorraine 0-6.

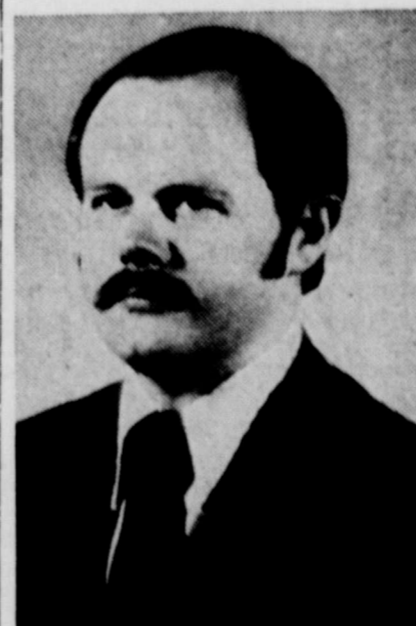
In season play the Longhorns have scored 241 points to their opponents' 22, while the Bulldogs have made 30 points and their opposition has racked up 155.

Green Authors Ft. Concho Book

Bill Green of Lubbock and former English teacher in Bronte High School, has recently had a book published which should be of interest to residents of this area.

Title of the book is "The Dancing Was Lively," and the sub title is "Fort Concho, Texas: A Social History, 1867 to 1882." The book depicts the social life at Fort Concho from its establishment in 1867 to 1882, when it ceased to be an important Army post for defenders from the Indians.

Instead of dealing with the military aspects of the fort, Green seeks to portray the loneliness and boredom of the residents of Fort Concho and the ways they tried to alleviate these unhappy conditions.

Green is presently working on his doctorate at Texas Tech and is on the staff of the Texas Tech Museum and is in charge of the West Texas ranch restoration project of the museum.

To Be in Bronte Saturday

Green plans to be in Bronte Saturday for Homecoming activities. He will have copies of his book with him and will offer them for sale. He said he will sell the book for \$8.00 a copy until Nov. 14, which is the official publication date. After that date the book will sell for \$10.00.

This book is a limited edition and collectors of West Texas Historical books probably can persuade Green to autograph any copies purchased.

Coke Has 4 More Screwworm Cases

Coke County has had four additional cases of screwworms in the past 10 days, bringing the year's total to six cases.

A case was found in a sheep by Graham Fenton on the Arledge Ranch early last week. This was followed by a case reported in a calf by Mike Hollis, just north of Robert Lee.

Two cases came from calves on the Wylie Estate, 12 miles northeast of Bronte.

County Extension Agent Sterling Lindsey said conditions have been ideal for a build-up of screwworms. One case unfound or unattended could bring on a rash of cases unless the weather gets much cooler and soon, he said. "Hopefully, cold weather will stall the screwworm in this area within the next 30 days," Lindsey added.

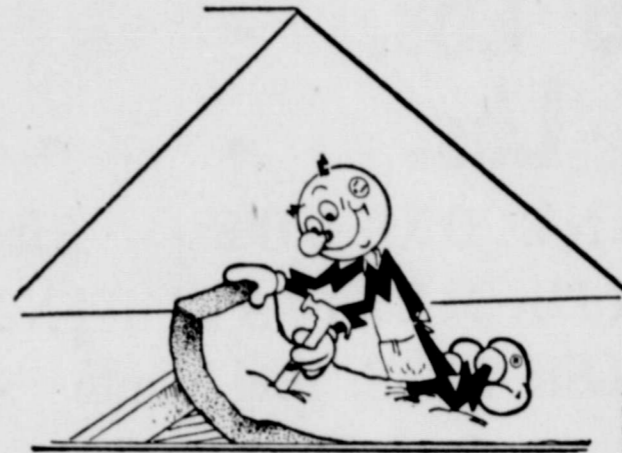

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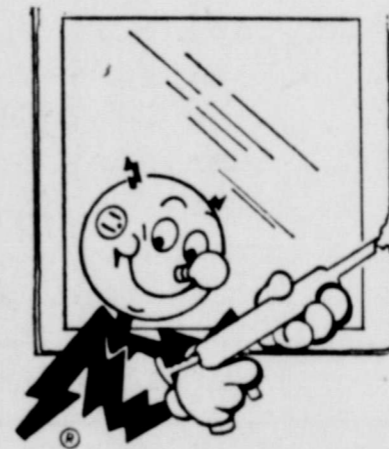

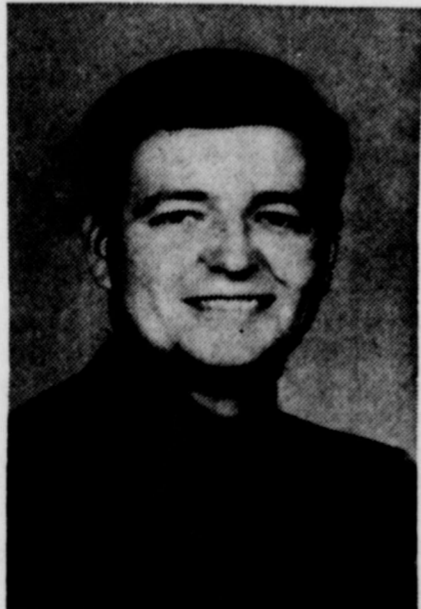

Longhorns Keep Record Spotless; Top Roby, 57-6

The Bronte Longhorns spotted the fired up Roby Lions six points, then retaliated by scoring 57 of their own in a District 3-B contest played last Friday night at Roby. The game was the third district win and sixth for the season. The Longhorns are undefeated.

First Quarter

The Lions took the Longhorn kickoff at the 15 to start the game and immediately began mixing their running game with a throwing game to move the ball to the Bronte 26 before losing it on downs. Two Longhorn running plays, one pass play and a punt later the Lions were again in possession on their own 39. The Lions again took over where they left off, which included big pass plays of 25 and 30 yards, and Carlos Jones carried it over from the 2. The Roby conversion failed, and for the first time this season, the Longhorns were behind 6-0.

The Longhorns immediately set out to correct this intolerable situation.

Jim Dan Raughton returned the kickoff to the Roby 35 but the ball was moved back to the Bronte 35 on a clipping penalty. Nelson Coulter got it back immediately with a 30 yard roll out. Alan Barbee got 20, and Turney Coulter and Wayne Alexander combined to move it to the 2 where N. Coulter sneaked it in. Barbee converted and the Longhorns were where they like to be — out front by a score of 7-6.

Second Quarter

The second quarter opened with Raughton intercepting a Lion pass and returning it to the Roby 35. On the next play the Longhorns gave it back via a fumble, at the 42. Big defensive plays by Marvin Ensor and Mark Lee stymied any further Roby drive and the Lions punted to the Bronte 20.

N. Coulter, Barbee and T. Coulter went to work with short gains and a 30 yard Coulter-Raughton pass moved the ball to the Roby 30. It was from there that N. Coulter connected with Raughton for the TD. Barbee converted, and the score was 14-6.

Barbee kicked off, the Lions couldn't move it and Bronte took their punt at the 43. Big plays in the following drive were an N. Coulter to Bobby Bailey pass good for 12 yards, and a 25 yard run by Barbee. Barbee got the last 4 yards up the middle with 1:13 left in the half. Barbee's kick was wide of the uprights and the score remained 20-6.

Although Roby made a 1st down after the kickoff on a pass play, M. Lee, Paul Cervenka and Billy Ren Lee snuffed out their running game. Raughton intercepted a Lion aerial to end the first half play.

Third Quarter

The third quarter opened with good runs of 10 and 15 yards by Barbee, but a crippling clipping penalty forced a Bronte punt from the Bronte 45. Barbee boomed it into the end zone.

Roby couldn't move and punted to Barbee at the 45. It was returned to the 35. T. Coulter got a big 10 yards but the Longhorns fumbled to the Lions on the next play at the Roby 25. Raughton broke up a Lion pass and a fine Roby draw play was nullified with a holding penalty. After the Roby punt the Longhorns took over on the Roby 45. T. Coulter got runs of 4 and 3 yards, Barbee got 10 and 3, Alexander got 2, and a pass play was good and carried to the 2. Barbee went up the middle to cross the double stripe and then he converted. Score: 27-6.

Barbee's kickoff went into the end zone. Roby couldn't move and the ensuing punt gave the ball to the Longhorns on the Roby 41. Barbee got 11, Alexander zoomed for a big 24 and Barbee carried the ball over tackle from 6 yards out. Barbee's kick was all right and it was 34-6.

After the kickoff Roby completed one pass, had an incomplection, and on the next pass attempt Barbee picked it off and galloped 80 yards to pay dirt. He proceeded to kick the conversion to bring the score up to 41-6.

Following the kickoff, Roby began to move with an 8 yard completion, a 10 yard run and a Bronte pass interference penalty. It was

all for naught as Raughton intercepted the next pass at the Bronte 20. Big plays in the next series were a 23 yard run by Barbee plus a 15 yard personal foul penalty, and a Coulter to Bailey 20 yarder. Wayne Coalson carried for 3 and 5 yards, N. Coulter got 3, then on the next play rolled into the end zone from the 4. A Coulter to Raughton pass

gave the Longhorns a two point conversion to make it 49-6.

Clint Porter, Kit Carlton and Kerwin Denton were big factors in Roby's inability to move on the next series. Raughton returned their punt to the Roby 35. Coalson got 4 and 5 yards, and the Longhorns fumbled to Roby on the next play. Roby didn't want it and Porter picked up the Lion fumble at the 10. Coalson got 2, Randy Leigh added 4 on the next play. Leigh went over right tackle from the 4 for the last touchdown of the night. N. Coulter hit Bailey for the two pointer and the fireworks subsided. Score was 57-6.

Roby had one possession and Bronte two before the last whistle blew.

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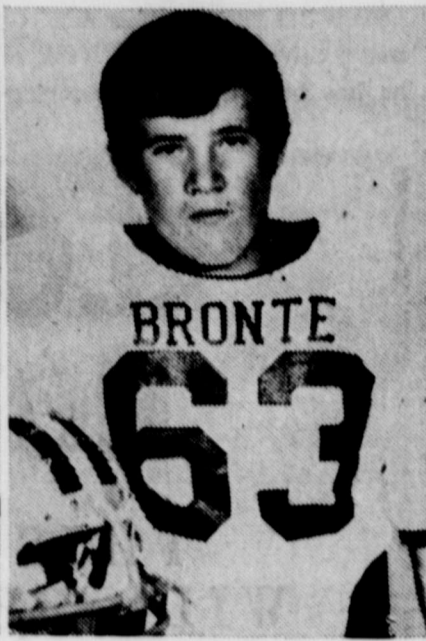

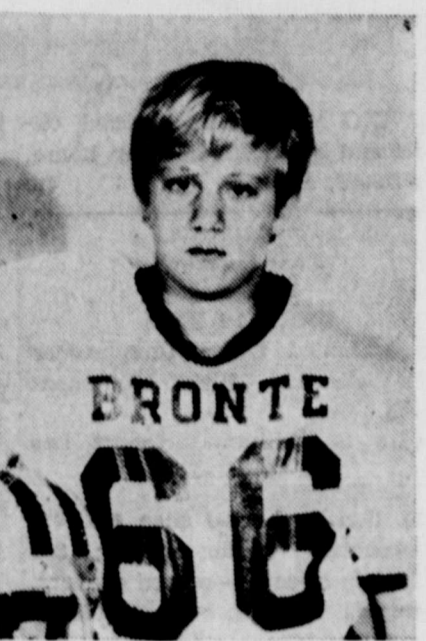

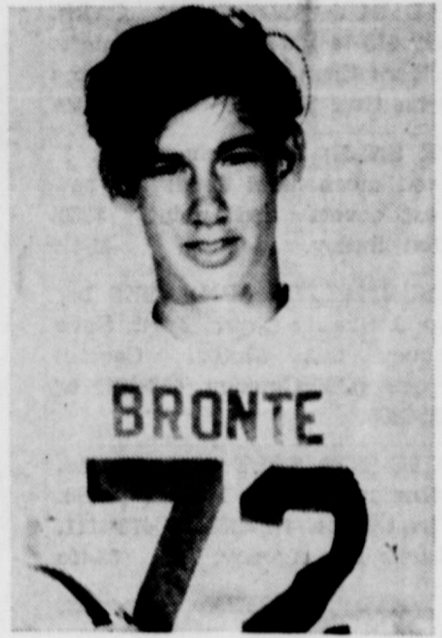
