## Horns to Face Tough Jayton

The powerhouse of District 3-B, the Bronte Longhorns, will go up against another powerhouse Friday night when the Jayton Jaybirds will come to Bronte for a district encounter. Jayton probably has the best team the Longhorns have played this season.

Bronte has a perfect 7-0 season record while the Jaybirds have a 6-1. Both of the teams have 4-0 district records. Points scored and points allowed by opponents give the Longhorns a slight edge, however. The Longhorns have picked up an awesome 290 points while allowing their opponents only 22. The Jaybirds have scored 174 points while allowing their opposition to make 90 points.

So, it's almost sure to be quite a battle.

Forsan, who still has to meet the Longhorns, also has perfect 7-0 and 4-0 records for 1974, so the Horns need this game tonight to stay in the running.

Last week, Jayton took a win from Roby to the tune of 42-0. The Longhorns downed the Lions 57-6 week before last.

Alan Barbee remains as the district's No. 1 pointmaker with 133 points. A Jayton back, Mark Fincher, is in second place with 72 points. However, Barbee has some help in making points for the Longhorns, as Nelson Coulter is third high man in 3-B with 60 points to his credit. Bronte's Jim Dan Raughton has scored 39 tal-

lies and Bobby Bailey has racked up 28 this season.

### Rating Unchanged

Various ratings of the strength of the Longhorns are unchanged from last week. Harris still rates the Horns as the No. 2 team Class B team in Texas. Associated Press sportswriters left them in the No. 3 spot in the state. The Abilene Reporter-News says they are still the best Class B team in the Big Country.

With the resignation of Sheriff Doug Robertson, the Executive Committee of the Democratic Party issued the following statement:

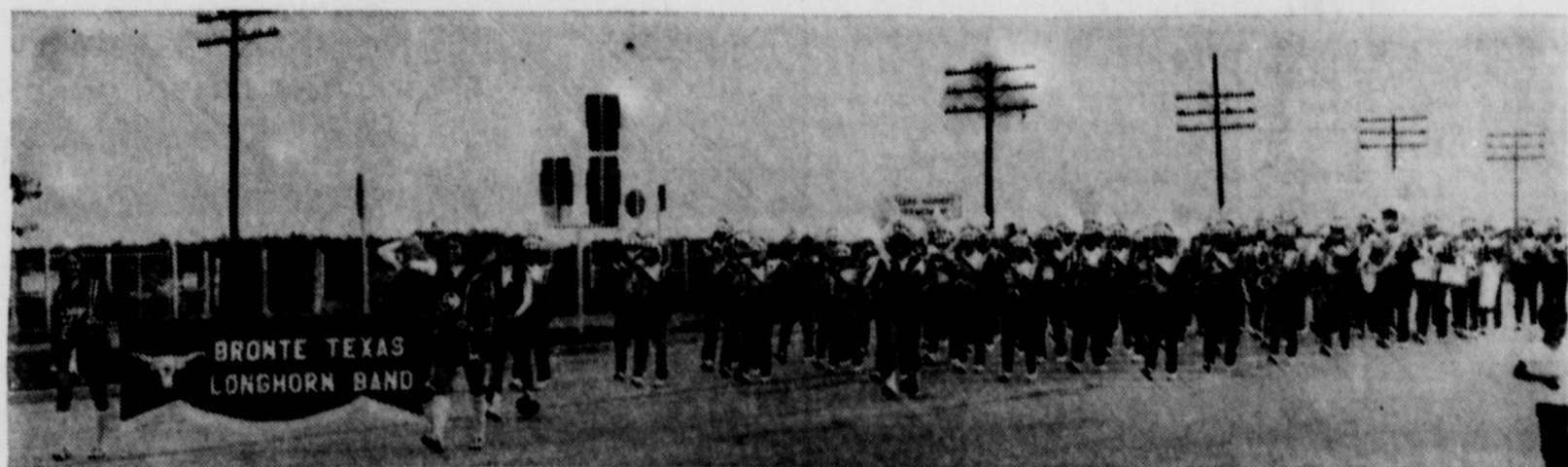

# Horns Take Homecoming Victory, 49-0

The Bronte Longhorns were crowd pleasers—and there was a crowd—Saturday night when they took an easy 49-0 victory from the undermanned Loraine Bulldogs.

Coach Gerald Sandusky exhibited a great deal of kindness by playing his second stringers a lot of the time.

The crowd of Bronte boosters was great. The Bronte side was completely filled and hundreds of Longhorn fans had to hang over the fence to see their favorite football team keep their season record clean with a 7-0 tally.

## First Quarter

Alan Barbee took the Loraine kickoff and was downed on the Longhorn 39. Barbee then went for 5 yards, Turney Coulter made 2 and Barbee added 2 more. Nelson Coulter made 4 and a 1st down on the Loraine 48. Second play on the next series saw Quarterback N. Coulter pass to Jim Dan Raughton for a 49 yard pass and run play and a TD. Barbee's kick was good and it was 7-0 with 9:06 left on the clock.

Barbee boomed the kickoff to Ralph Chavez on the goal line and he was stopped on the 20. A penalty moved the ball back to the 15. Loraine made 3 but shortly lost 2, bringing up 4th and 8. The punt went to Raughton who made a nice return, but Bronte was penalized for an illegal block and the ball wound up on the Bronte 42. Barbee made 2 and N. Coulter got the 1st on the Bulldog 37, a gain of 19 yards. On the next play, Barbee went around right end for a 37 yard run and a touchdown. Then he kicked the EP to make the scoreboard read 14-0.

Barbee kicked to Chavez and Randy Leigh and Kit Carlton nailed him on the 29. Billy Ren Lee nailed the Loraine runner on the next two downs for no gain and an incomplete pass brought up 4th and 10. Tommy Green's punt took a Bronte bounce and Bronte took over on their 46. On the first play of the series Nelson Coulter elected to keep the ball and it was a good choice. He was able to manage 54 yards and a touchdown for the Horns. Barbee's conversion kick was all right and it was 21-0.

Barbee kicked to the Chavez on the 10 and he ran it out to the 29. Thanks to the fine defensive work of B. R. Lee, Leigh, Marvin Ensor, Raughton, Barbee, and Paul Cervenka, the visitors soon faced a 4th and 12 situation and they had to punt. It went only to the Loraine 47. Donald Butler made 4 yards and Wayne Coalson added 3. But the younger men on the Longhorn team were unable to make a 1st down, so Coalson got off a beautiful punt to the Loraine 9 yard line, to end the first quarter of the ball game, 21-0.

## Second Quarter

Chavez, Green and Garcia carried to the 20 for a 1st, but they soon faced a 4th and 6 and had to punt. Raughton made a nice run back and the ball was on the Loraine 47. Coalson and Randy

Leigh picked up 7, but a recovered fumble brought up 4th and 3. Leigh tried to make it but wound up short and the ball went over on the Bulldog 39.

Short gains and a 15 yard fine against the Horns gave Loraine a 1st on the Bronte 34. Green and Chavez made a couple of gains, then a pass to Merket moved the ball to the 21 for a 1st. The Bulldogs moved down to the 16, then a fumble was recovered by Mark Lee on the 19.

Alexander made 11 and a 1st on the 30. A 17 yard pass to Bailey was good for another 1st on the 47, and another toss to Bailey was good for 13 yards and another 1st on the Loraine 40. QB Coulter tossed a couple of incomplete passes, then connected with Barbee, who was tackled just short of the goal line, to end the half.

## Third Quarter

Barbee's second half kickoff was brought out to the 20. A pass to Merket gave the visitors a 1st on their 33. After three more tries they punted to the Bronte 33. T. Coulter went for 7 and N. Coulter got 4 for a 1st on the 44. T. Coulter picked 7 more, and brother Nelson got a big 33 yarder to the 16 for a 1st. It was Alexander's turn to carry the ball on the next down, and he carried it around right end, sidestepping tacklers, for 16 yards and a touchdown. Barbee added the EP and the score was 28-0.

McDaniel brought Barbee's kickoff out to the 32. Two ground gains and a pass gave the Bulldogs a 1st on their 43. Then on 3rd down a Loraine fumble was picked up on the 48 to give Bronte the ball.

A face mask penalty moved it to the 33. Leigh, Coalson and Parker all carried but were unable to make the needed 10, so Coalson punted to the Loraine 12. The Loraine boys got two 1st downs and had the ball on their 40 when the third quarter ended.

## Fourth Quarter

The Longhorn defense tightened up on the Bulldogs and they faced a 4th and 20 situation. The punt went to Raughton on his 35 and he returned it 30 yards to the Loraine 35. However a flag was down and the ball was brought back to the Bronte 31. Barbee got 3 and then took the ball from his 34 yard line and went an amazing 66 yards for a touchdown. After his long run he was still able to kick the PAT to make the Longhorns out front 35-0.

Vallejo brought Barbee's kickoff out to the 36. A couple of plays later Barbee recovered a Loraine fumble to give Bronte the ball on the Loraine 39. Coalson made 2. N. Coulter carried twice for 9 yards and a 1st on the 28. A pass to Raughton gave Bronte a 1st on the 9, and Barbee went over the right side on the next play to give the Horns another touchdown. Barbee's kick was okay and the scoreboard lighted up with 42-0.

Garcia took Barbee's kickoff and was tripped up on his 30. A 3rd down pass try didn't work out for the Bulldogs, as Barbee intercepted it on the 35 and went in for another counter. He then kicked his seventh extra point of the night to make the score 49-0.

After Barbee's kickoff the Loraine lads put the ball in play on their 19. They lost 5, gained 3 and then fumbled and the ball was recovered on the 26 for Bronte.

Leigh carried for a yard, then Coalson carried three time but didn't get the needed 10 yards, and the ball went over on the 21. The Loraine crew tried three desperation passes and their punt wound

up the ball game. Score: Bronte 49, Loraine 0.

tified by the state as a qualified law enforcement officer, having attended school for 240 hours and studied all phases of law enforcement work.

**Precinct 4 JP**

Another curious development in this election is a campaign by citizens in Precinct 4 to elect a justice of the peace for their precinct. They state as their reason for wanting a third JP in Coke County is that they are not allowed to vote on the person before whom they would have to appear in case they were picked up for a law violation. This newspaper has been told that the names of Earl D. 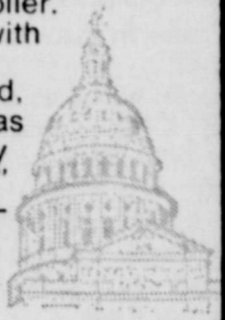

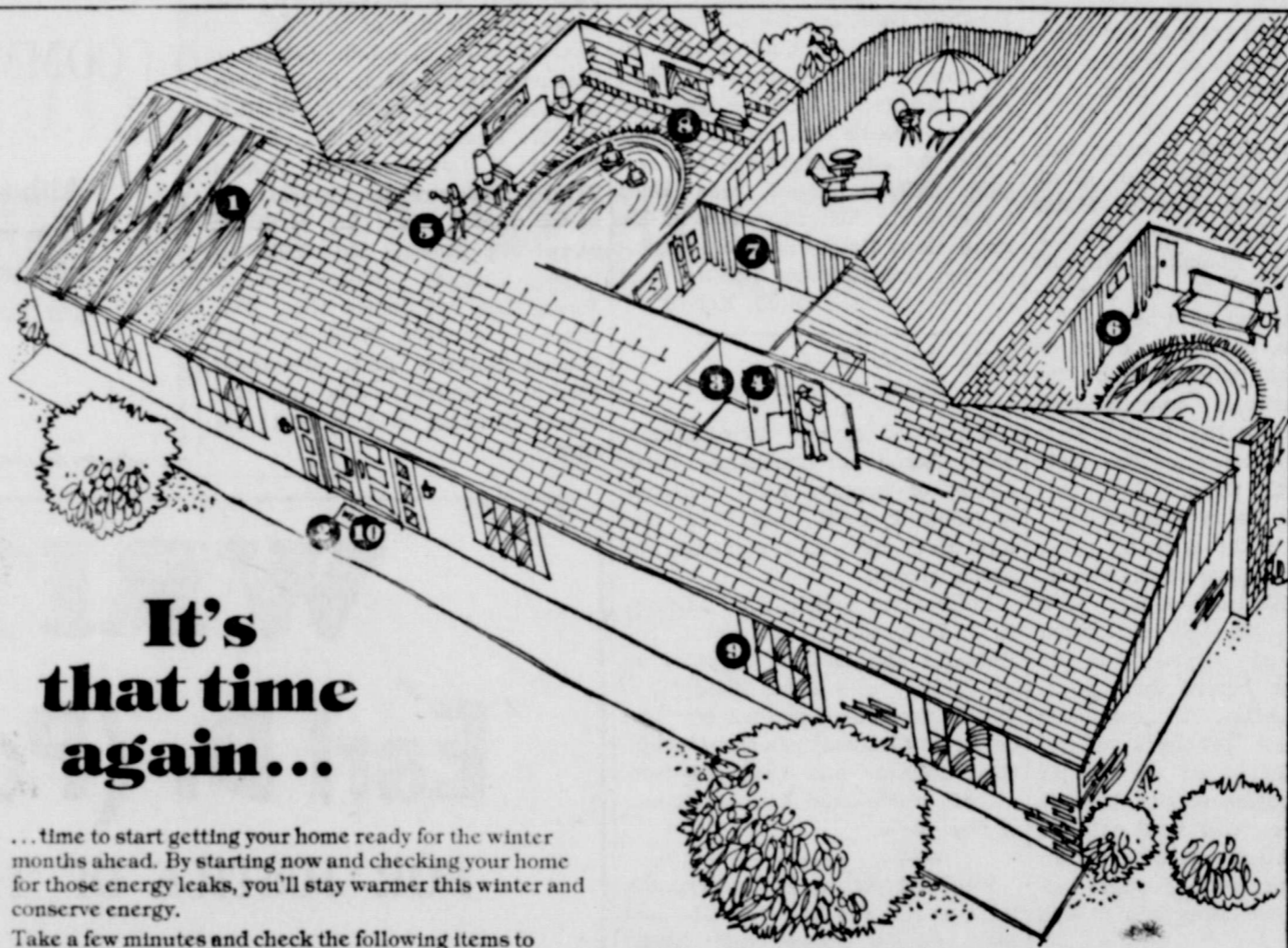

- 2 Weatherstrip doors and windows, and caulk cracks and crevices to prevent drafts and the loss of heated air.
- 3 Maintain heating equipment for maximum efficiency by having it checked by a competent serviceman.
- 4 Dirty filters cause heating equipment to work harder and use more fuel. Check your filters every 30 days. If they're the permanent type, clean them according to the manufacturer's directions. If they're the disposable type, replace them at least every 90 days.
- 5 Don't be a "thermostat jiggler". Turning the thermostat up or down doesn't cause the equipment to heat or cool faster. It simply works longer to satisfy the setting. The national conservation program calls for settings of no more than 68°F. in heating weather. If you are going to be away for several days, lower the temperature to 60°F.

- 6 Don't place curtains, furniture or other objects in front of heating registers or return air openings. This blocks the flow of warm air.
- 7 Open blinds and draperies on sunny days to help heat your home during the day but close them at night to help reduce heat loss.
- 8 Keep the fireplace damper closed when the fireplace is not in use.
- 9 Storm doors and windows are not customarily used in this part of the country, but they do reduce heat loss. As a temporary substitute, a sheet of clear plastic stapled or tacked over screen doors or windows works well.
- 10 Keep the opening and closing of doors to a minimum to reduce the loss of warm air.

Nov. 5 is just around the corner, the day you will vote for the person to represent you for the next two years in the Texas Legislature.

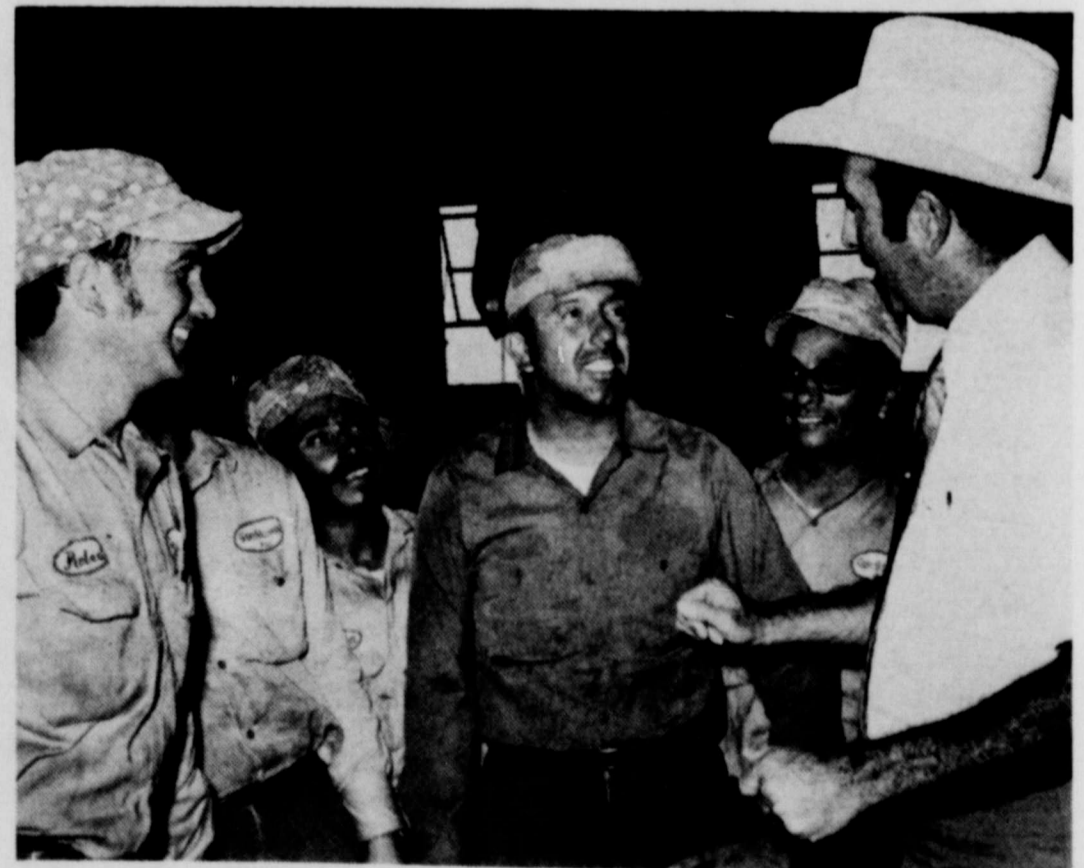
Now is not the time to introduce a candidate new to the political scene, or unfamiliar with problems facing this rural district.

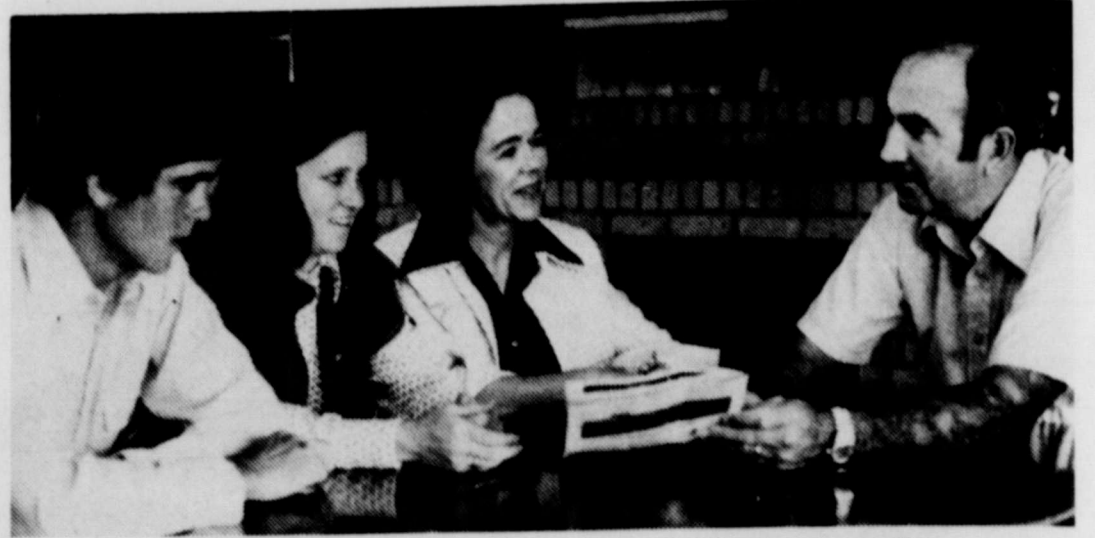

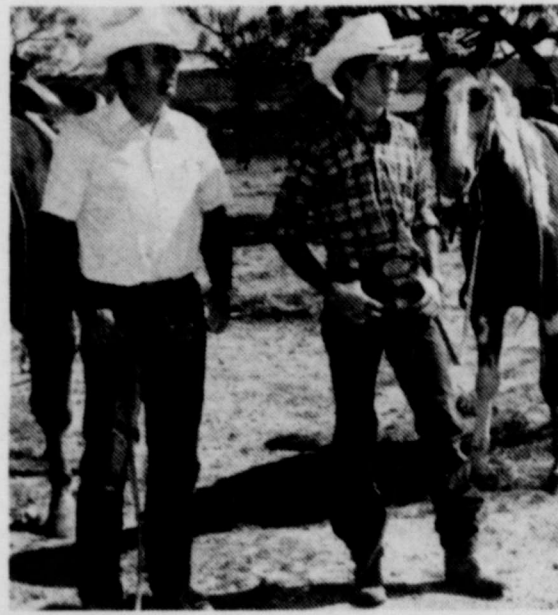

Rich Anderson, a fifth generation Texan, was born in Midland in March, 1929. He attended Lovington, N.M. public schools and graduated in 1946. From there he went to the University of Oklahoma and received a B.A. in history with minors in sociology and psychology. In 1951 he married Barbara Clayton, a third generation Texan, and they soon moved to Borden County where they have lived for the past 22 years.

# About the Issues:

**WATER FOR WEST TEXAS:** "If Texas is to continue its growth in agriculture and industry, then provision must be made for more water. A water resource development program is critical to the citizens in our district. We have a problem, but we must be realistic about the situation. One of the ways we can deal with this is with an effective mesquite eradication project which would save millions upon millions of gallons of water which are now evaporating. And instead of taking water from other parts of our great state, we should investigate the possibilities and begin negotiations on transporting water from Canada."

**INDUSTRY:** "I am all for bringing new industry into West Texas, but before we do we must first examine our own labor situation. We can't fill the jobs we now have available, we just don't have the manpower. Part of this stems from the district being a semi-arid area which limits the population we can support. And this all ties into the development of a water resource program."

**EDUCATION:** "This is probably the biggest problem facing the upcoming legislature. We must find an equitable way to finance schools without equalizing taxes all over the state. I am against having all taxes going in to a general fund and then having the state allocate them. Each area should take care of itself."

"We must not tax the land on what it sells for, but rather on what it can produce each year. And I feel this is something that needs to be written into the constitution."

"We must also find a way to put a cost of living clause in teacher's contracts. My mother was a school teacher and I have been on the school board for nearly nine years, so I know the problems these educators are facing."

**LAND USE:** "A bill, which will become a reoccurring issue, was recently defeated in the U.S. Congress which would have established a land use policy for the entire United States. But in order to protect the freedom of the individual on a local level, I am against the federal government stepping in and telling us what we can and can not do with our land."

"The U.S. Government is the largest land holder in the country, and they do not have a land use program of their own. If such legislation is necessary, I believe in formulating a land use policy in Texas, with emphasis on local control."

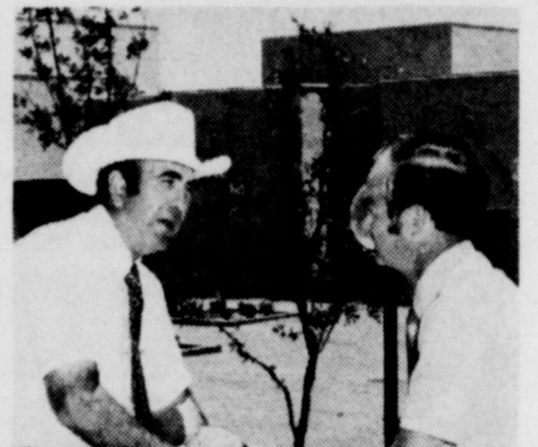

Rich discusses the progress of industry in West Texas at a magnesium plant in Snyder.



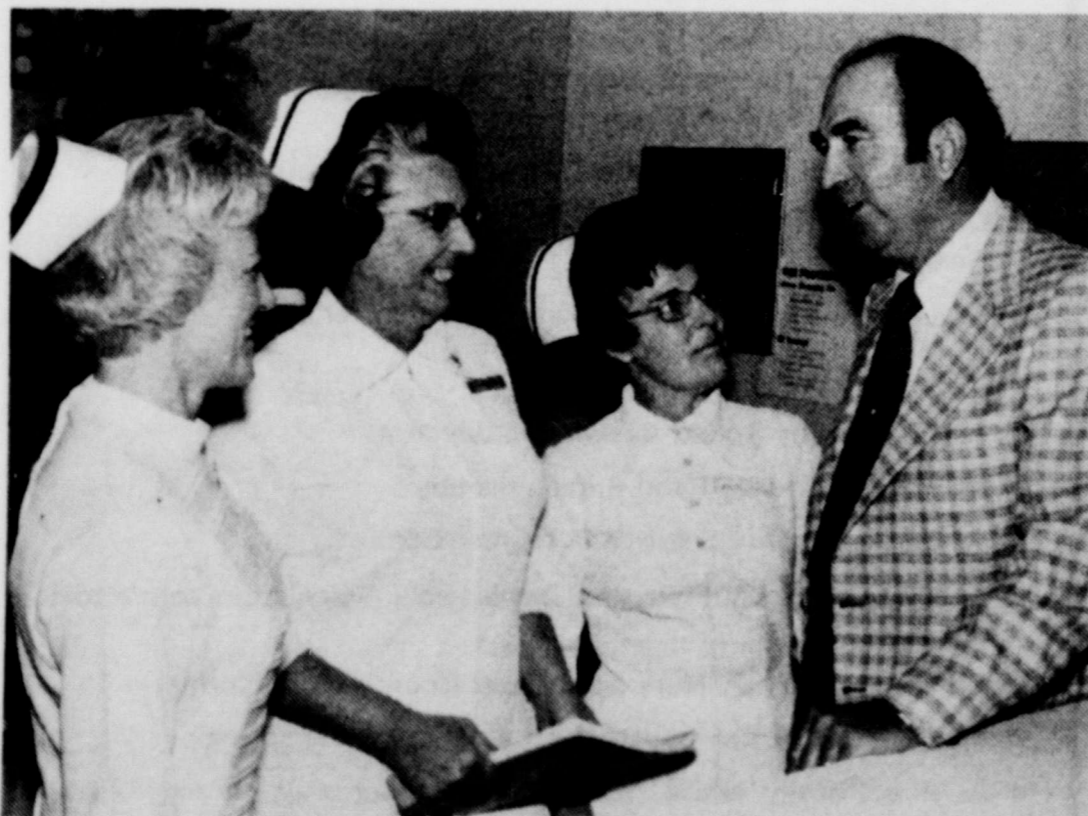

## Vote for the man, not the party

Our constitution guarantees us the right as free Americans to cast our vote for any individual that deserves and merits the office or position indicated on the ballot. At no point are we inhibited from voting for the person of our choice because of any political ties.

In a primary election we may indicate membership in a political party. But in a general election each individual has a right to vote for a candidate of his choosing.

In a primary election we sign a ballot which states we pledge to support a particular political party. Legal opinions have shown over and over again that pledging to support and pledging to vote a straight party ticket are two different matters. We can vote for the candidate of our choice.

Nov. 5 vote for the person of your choice. It is your constitutional right and your duty as a citizen.

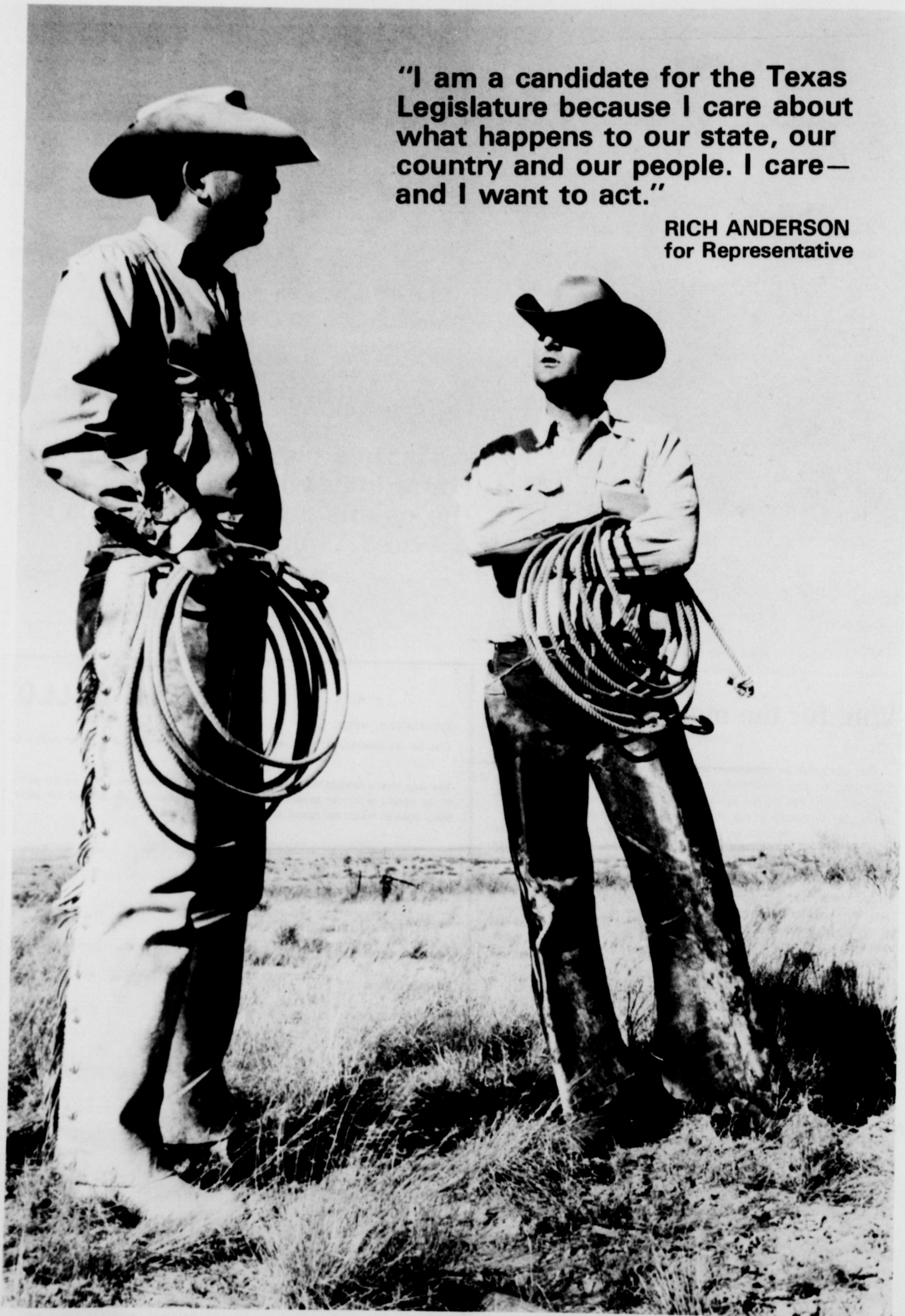
