# Horns Seek Tenth Victory



The 1974 Bronte Shorthorns

The Bronte Longhorns will find out tonight if they are really good or if they have only been lucky the first nine ball games of this season. They will travel to Forsan for the final regular game of the season. The Horns have looked pretty good thus far as they have

piled up nine successive victories with no ties and no defeats.

The Forsan Buffaloes also have a beautiful record for 1974, having 8-1 for the season and 5-1 in District 3-B play.

The Buffs' only defeat came last Friday at the hands of Jayton who downed them 32-6. By comparison the Longhorns defeated the Jaybirds 26-0 the week before.

### Bronte Holds Ratings

The mighty Longhorns are still rated as the No. 2 Class B team in Texas in the Harris rating. Associated Press sportswriters allow them the No. 3 spot and the Abilene Reporter-News says they are No. 1 in the Big Country.

Alan Barbee added 28 points last Friday to his 147 for a total of 175. Nelson Coulter and Jim Dan Raughton were well watched last week and didn't add anything to their 66 and 36 points, respectively. However, Bobby Bailey added 6 for a season total of 34. Wayne Alexander got 12 points last week to make his season total 30. Marvin Ensor, Turney Coulter and Randy Leigh have each accounted for 6 points.

The Longhorns already have a tie for the district championship cinched, and a win tonight will give them the undisputed title. Sanderson is the winner in District 4-B and will be the team for District 3-B champs to play for bi-district.

All Longhorn fans are urged to follow the team to Forsan tonight. They need the support of everyone.

## Ensor Appointed County Sheriff

J. Lee Ensor, who has been serving as chief deputy sheriff of Coke County for the past several months, has been appointed sheriff by the Coke County Commissioners' Court, effective Nov. 15. He will replace Sheriff Doug Robertson, who has resigned the position, effective Nov. 15.

At the time of his resignation Robertson also announced that he was not a candidate for reelection, even though he had been elected the Democratic nominee for the job. He endorsed Ensor for the job and a write-in campaign was begun for the General Election on Nov. 5. Ensor won the race easily with 587 write-in votes.

## French Services Held in Odessa

Funeral services for Jack Dempsey French, 51, of Odessa were held Tuesday afternoon at Hubbard-Kelly Funeral Home in Odessa. Burial was in Sunset Memorial Gardens.

Mr. French died early Sunday morning in a Lamessa hospital after an apparent heart attack.

He was born Feb. 4, 1923, and moved to Odessa from Cisco in 1962. He married Frances Martin Oct. 5, 1963, in Odessa. He was a Baptist, and Air Force veteran and a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, two step-sons; two daughters; one brother, G. E. French of Bronte; one sister and three grandchildren.

## Hunting Season to Start

Hunting season for deer, turkey and quail in Coke County will open Saturday, Nov. 16.

Open season for deer is Nov. 16 through Jan. 1, two deer of either sex, bag limit. Hunters must obtain tags from land owners to kill antlerless deer.

Open season on turkey is Nov. 16 through Jan. 1, bag limit two of either sex. Hunters will notice some additions to this year's

hunting licenses: turkey tags. "It is unlawful for any person to kill and possess a turkey without attaching a turkey tag from a valid hunting license to the bird, and this tag must remain attached to the bird until arrival at its final destination," according to Game Warden R. L. Flanagan of Robert Lee.

Quail season opens Nov. 16 and runs through Feb. 16, 12 per day limit and 36 in possession limit.

Coke County is split by U. S. Highway 277 for duck and sandhill crane hunting. In the area west of Highway 277, duck season is open from Nov. 4-24 and Dec. 7 through Jan. 19. East of 277 the season is from Nov. 9 through 24 and Dec. 9 through Jan. 19. Bag limit on ducks is from one to seven ducks in the aggregate of 100 points, according to a point system which hunters should check.

Most all of Coke County is in Zone B for sandhill crane hunting. The season is Nov. 30 through Jan. 26. Daily bag limit is three; possession six.

A brochure entitled "Migratory Game Birds Hunting Digest 1974-1975," is available where hunting licenses are sold.

County Clerk Mrs. Winnie Wal-

drop called attention to a new regulation which requires hunting licenses to have the Drivers License or Social Security number of the purchaser on it.

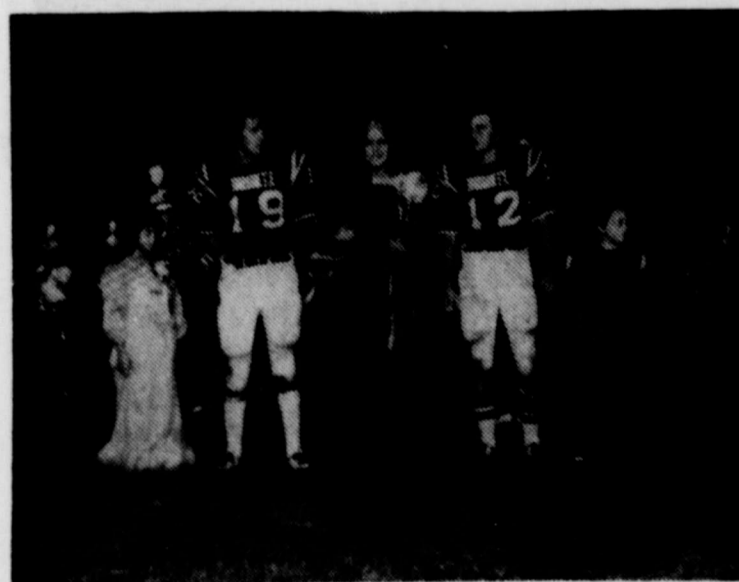

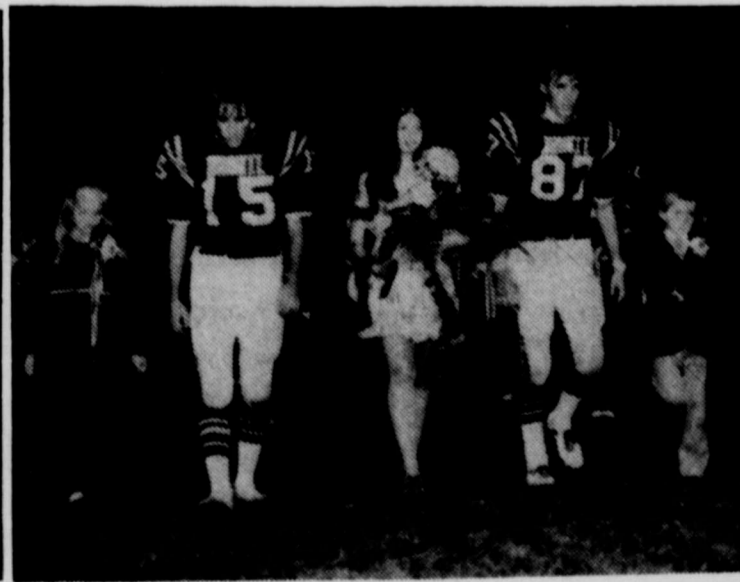

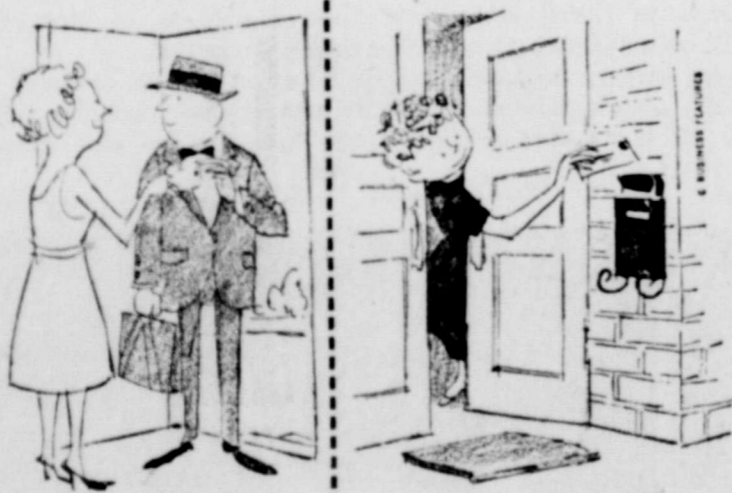

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## Sterling City Latest Longhorn Victim, 46-7

The Bronte Longhorns moved one notch closer to the District 3-B crown last Friday night by eliminating a big Sterling City team 46-7. The running of Alan Barbee, who had a 7 yard per carry average and four touchdowns, and the passing of Nelson Coulter, who threw for three TDs—two to Wayne Alexander and one to Bobby Bailey—proved to be the undoing of the Eagles.

### First Quarter

Barbee returned the opening kickoff to the 29 and it appeared the Longhorns were ready to go to work. Coulter made runs of 10, 4, 4 and 3. Turney Coulter ran for 6, 7, 1 and 2. Alexander picked up 5, and Barbee blasted for 8, 4, 3 and 3 to move the ball to the Eagle 11. The roof caved in there because successive holding and clipping penalties moved the ball all the way back to the 44. First down and 44 yards to go is a challenge but the Longhorns accepted it. Coulter's pass to Jim Dan Raughton, who had two defenders draped on him all night, went incomplete. Coulter then hit Barbee for 15, Bailey for 10, and Alexander for 19 and the TD. Barbee converted and the score was 7-0.

The scoreboard clock had quit working by this time and remained inoperative for the remainder of the game.

Davis took Barbee's kickoff at the 10 and returned to the 20, but a clipping penalty moved it back to the 11. Copeland, a hard running back, began a drive consisting of short runs and aided by two big 15 yard Bronte penalties. He carried it over from the 5, for only the fourth time the Longhorn goal has been crossed this year. The conversion was good

and the score was 7-7. Billy Ren Lee and Kerwin Denton made great defensive plays in the Eagles' drive.

Raughton returned the kickoff to the 20 and Coulter carried for 4 and Alexander for 8 and a 1st down to end the quarter.

### Second Quarter

Barbee lost 3, a Coulter-Raughton pass failed and the QB got sacked, so it was time for a punt. Barbee punted to the Eagle 25 and on the 1st down Denton recovered an Eagle fumble on the 39. The Eagles got it back on the next play on the 45 when a hard tackle jarred it loose from Coulter's hands.

Great defensive plays by Coulter, R. Lee and Denton forced a Sterling City punt that died on the Bronte 32. It was here that the great offensive line, made up of Kit Carlton, Ricky Frazee, Denton, Clint Porter, Mark Lee, Bailey and Raughton began to open holes that the backs poured through for big gainers. Alexander carried for 5 and 4 and Barbee gained 13, 1, 2, 8, 15, 1 and 3—the last carry good for six points. Barbee converted and the score was 14-7.

Following the kickoff, a penalty and good defensive play by Paul Cervenka and R. Lee kept the Eagles deep in their own territory. Bronte took the punt, could not move the ball and punted back to the 15. On Sterling's first play, Denton intercepted a pass and returned it to the Sterling 12. On the next play Coulter hit Bailey for the TD. Barbee converted and the Longhorns led 21-7. The Eagles were able to run two plays before the half.

### Third Quarter

Barbee's kickoff was returned

by Davis to the 31. Three plays and short yardage later the Eagles tried for a 1st against a strong Longhorn defensive line that held on the 40. Seven plays later Barbee carried it in from the 1 after gains of 21, 3, 7 and 3, and the help of a 15 yard Coulter run and a Sterling personal foul. Barbee missed the conversion and the score was 27-7.

Sterling City got one 1st down after the kickoff but that was all Porter, Cervenka and R. Lee would allow. When the Eagles punted, Porter partially blocked it and the Longhorns took over at the 50. Coulter picked up 5 and Barbee got another 5 and a 1st at the 40. Alexander for 4 yards, and Barbee got the next 36 on a sweep to the right to make 6 points. He missed the conversion and the score was 33-7. Wet balls, wet grass and wet shoes made place kicking unpredictable.

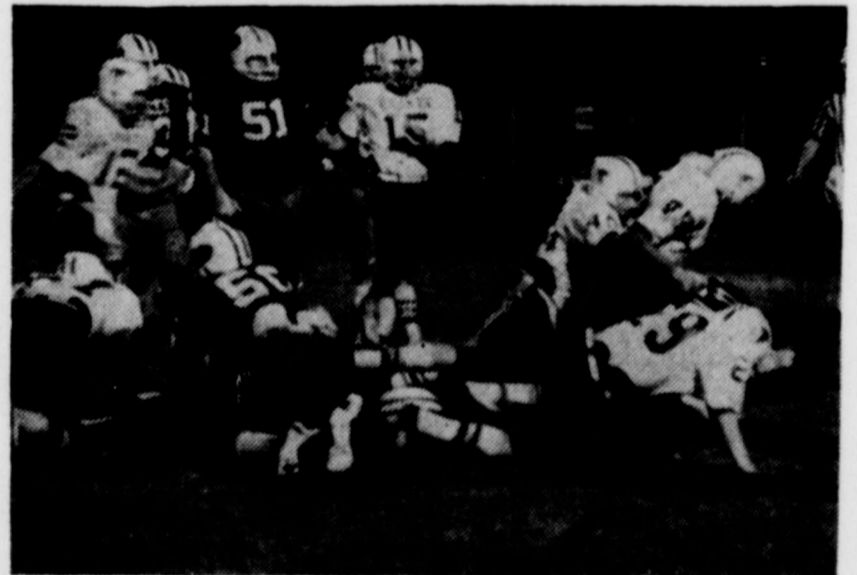
Following the kickoff, the Eagles picked up one 1st down before the defensive plays of Marvin Ensor, Carlton and Barbee forced them to punt. The snapper could not stand the pressure of the center of the Bronte line and snapped the ball over the punter's head. Mark Lee brought the punter down on the 13 and the Longhorns took over there. On 3rd down from the 9 Coulter found Alexander in the end zone for 6 points. Barbee converted and the Longhorns had upped their tally to 40. The Eagles still had 7.

Following the kickoff an odd series of events began. Sterling ran two plays and fumbled to Bronte, the Longhorns tried three unsuccessful passes and punted to the Eagles, and two plays later the

Eagles gave it back to Bronte via a Cervenka fumble recovery at the 9. On the first play Barbee carried it in for 6 points but missed the conversion try.

Following a short kickoff, and Eagle 1st down and a punt, the Longhorns again owned the ball at their own 10. Some new backs made their appearances at this time and took over where the old

ones left off. Wayne Coalson got 2, Donald Butler 7 and Randy Leigh 4 and a 1st down. Again the same combo worked—Coalson 4, Butler 4 and Leigh 3 and a 1st on the 35. The final whistle blew and another exhibition of Longhorn desire, dedication and application ended with a 46-7 victory, the ninth of the season against no losses.
