## Horns In Bi-District Game

### Longhorn Stats Are Impressive

The Bronte Longhorns of 1974 have piled up some impressive statistics since they opened the 1974 football season back in September at Robert Lee. They have scored 397 points for an average of 39.7 per game. Their opponents have scored 35 points for an average of 3.5 per game. The team has racked up 2566

yards rushing and 1126 yards passing for a total of 3692 yards, which figures out to be about 2 1/2 miles of offense.

Alan Barbee has run off with scoring honors for the team, having a whopping 204 points in 10 games. Nelson Coulter has 66; Jim Dan Raughton has made 45; Bobby Bailey has 34; Wayne Alexander has 30; Marvin Ensor, Turrey Coulter and Randy Leigh each have 6.

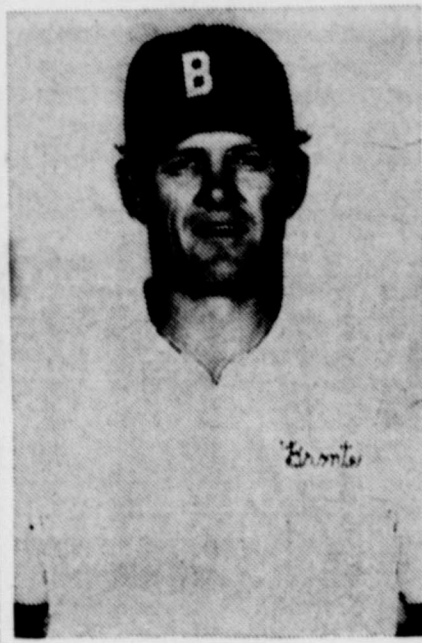
The passing record shows that N. Coulter completed 44 of 96 passes for a 46 per cent completion record, 14 good for TDs. The figures below give the story on pass receptions:

The Bronte bunch averaged 367.4 yards per game for the season and 406 yards per game in district play. They allowed their district opponents 124 yards per game and season opponents 137 yards.

Bronte's first down total was 179 for an average of 17.9 per game. Opponents made 72 for an average of 7.2.

They averaged 254.8 yards rushing and 112.6 yards passing per game. A total of 19 punts were needed for an average of 32.9 yards per game.

The mighty Bronte Longhorns will play Sanderson Friday night in Ozona for the 3-B and 4-B bi-district championship. Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m. in the Ozona Lion stadium.

Admission prices will be \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for students.

Bronte will be the host team at the game. Longhorn fans will occupy seats on the west side of the

stadium and will enter gates at the northwest or southwest corners. Parking for Bronte fans will be on the west or south side of the stadium.

Bronte School will be dismissed at 2 p.m. Friday after a pep rally at 1:30.

The Sanderson Eagles won the District 4-B championship last Friday night when they defeated Dell City 27-8. The win gave the Eagles a spotless 4-0 district record. However the Eagles' 6-4 season record can hardly match up with Longhorns' 10-0 record for 1974.

In season scoring the Longhorns have made 397 points while the Eagles have racked up 193. Bronte has allowed their opponents 35 points while Sanderson allowed their opponents 217.

The Longhorns have retained their various ratings this week. Harris still rates them the No. 2 Class B team in the state only behind Big Sandy. Associated Press sportswriters still give the Horns the No. 3 spot in Texas behind Big Sandy and Wortham. Abilene Reporter-News still says they're the best in the Big Country.

San Angelo officials will call the bi-district contest. Ozona School will furnish the announcer, clock operator and chain gang.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said this week that the Ozona School had been most cooperative in setting up the game and providing their facilities. He expressed appreciation to them from the Bronte School and community.

All Longhorn fans are urged to travel to Ozona Friday afternoon and boost their team on to the regional playoffs. Winner of the Bronte-Sanderson game will face the winner of the Sundown-Lefors playoff.

## Coke County Approved For 1974 Drouth Loans

Farmers and ranchers in Coke County who sustained production losses as a result of the drouth during the period Sept. 1, 1973, to Sept. 1, 1974, may be eligible to receive an emergency loan from the Farmers Home Administration.

Those who have not received an emergency loan to assist them in recovering from their loss may apply for such a loan at the Farmers Home Administration county office at 1901 Lamar in Sweetwater before the close of business Aug. 15, 1975.

These loan applications will be taken under the terms of a new law enacted Jan. 2, 1974. Individual examination will be made of each application to determine date of the disaster occurrence and emergency loan benefits for which the applicant is eligible.

Loans based on qualifying production losses may include funds to reimburse applicants for production expenses which went into damaged or destroyed crop and livestock enterprises, but not to produce new crops during 1975.

Payment terms depend on the purposes for which the loan is used and the applicant's payment ability. No loan may exceed the actual loss sustained. The interest rate for these loans is 5 per cent and there will be no principal cancellation. These loans must be secured by crops, livestock, farm machinery, or real estate.

### NO MORE UNSTAMPED MAIL DELIVERY

Postmaster Noah Pruitt Jr. reminded customers that effective Sunday, Nov. 17, the U. S. Postal Service has discontinued delivering mail on which there is no postage.

Postmaster Pruitt said Postal Service officials estimate that cost of the service costs approximately \$18 million annually.

After Nov. 17, letters mailed without postage will be returned to the sender if there is a return address, or to the dead letter office, instead of being delivered as postage due mail as has been the custom.

"Naturally we realize that someone could inadvertently forget to put a stamp on a letter or that a stamp could come off prior to cancellation, so we urge mailers to be sure to include a correct return address on their mail," Pruitt said.

## Christmas Mailing Dates Announced

Postmaster Noah Pruitt Jr. has released the following dates as deadlines for Christmas mailing to insure delivery before Dec. 25:

Surface mail (letters) for contiguous 48 states, Alaska and Hawaii, Dec. 15 and airmails, Dec. 20; parcels (surface mail) for contiguous 48 states, Dec. 10; Alaska and Hawaii, Nov. 30. Parcels, airmail, 48 states, Dec. 21; Alaska and Hawaii, Dec. 20.

Overseas military mail: Azores, Canada and Arctic: airmail, Dec. 9. PAL, Nov. 30; surface mail and SAM, Nov. 25; South and Central America, airmail, Dec. 2; Europe, airmail, Dec. 11. PAL, Nov. 27; Africa, airmail, Dec. 9; Near East and Far East, airmail, Dec. 2; Far East, Pal, Nov. 27.

Pruitt advises everyone to mail Christmas cards and packages early.

# Longhorns Down Forsan to Win 3-B Title

A cold windy night on a Forsan Buffalo field was not enough to discourage the Bronte Longhorns from accomplishing what they set out to do back in September — win 10 regular season games and the District 3-B championship. They finished their perfect season last Friday night at Forsan with a convincing 35-6 win.

## First Quarter

Alan Barbee's kickoff to the 10 was returned to the 33 by Thixton. Four plays later Soles punted to the Bronte 22. Barbee picked up 15 on the first play, and on the second play the Buffaloes picked up a Longhorn fumble at the Bronte 40. One running play netted nothing, but the next play netted 40 yards and 6 points as Soles swept right end with just three minutes expired in the first quarter. Soles kick failed and the Buffaloes led 6-0. The Longhorns were behind for the second time this season.

Jim Dan Raughton returned the Forsan kickoff to the 42. Nelson Coulter hit Wayne Alexander with a 7 yard pass and Barbee picked up 2 and a 1st down on the Forsan 43. Coulter got 4 and a big 18 to the Buffalo 21. Barbee had gains of 5 and 4 before the Longhorns lost another fumble at the 5. The Buffs worked up for a 3rd and 1 when Mark Lee made a fine defensive play that forced a Forsan punt.

Raughton took the punt at the 40 and returned it all the way to the 5, but a clipping penalty brought it back to the 41. Barbee got 4, then Coulter hit Raughton with a 40 yarder that carried in on the end zone. Barbee converted and the Longhorns led 7-6.

Soles returned Barbee's kickoff to the 40. Three incomplete Buffalo passes required a punt that went to the Bronte 40. On the first play from scrimmage, Coulter hit Barbee, who before the night was over was to shatter a Longhorn regular season scoring record of 210 points, with a screen pass to the left and he

traveled 60 yards to the goal line. Barbee converted and the Bronte tally was upped to 14 to Forsan's 6.

Following the kickoff the Bronte defensive wall of Coulter, M. Lee, Paul Cervenka, R. Lee, Clint Ponter, Kit Carlton and Kerwin Denton just wouldn't let the Forsan squad move the ball. Raughton took the ensuing punt from the 25 to the 45, but a clipping penalty moved it back to the 20. A Coulter-Bobby Bailey pass went incomplete, but Alexander got 6 and Barbee 10 to end the first quarter of play.

## Second Quarter

Bronte picked up two 1st downs when Barbee got 15, Alexander 6, Barbee 3 and Coulter 3. On the next series an illegal motion crippled the Longhorns and Barbee punted to the Forsan 8. Forsan picked up one 1st down before penalties forced them to punt. Raughton returned the punt to his own 40 and Bronte began one of its best sustained drives of the night. Barbee got 3, Turney Coulter 2, N. Coulter 15, Alexander 3, N. Coulter 7, Barbee 20, and Barbee got the last 2 yards. His conversion try was good and the Longhorns held a 21-6 lead.

Barbee's kickoff was brought back to the 32, but the staunch Bronte defense forced another punt. The Horns got one 1st down, then sputtered and punted. On the first play the Buffaloes tried a pass but Coulter picked it off at midfield. Two quar-

terback sneaks later the first half ended.

## Third Quarter

The Buffs had to kickoff to the Horns and on the return the local lads lost the ball via a fumble on their 37. Four plays later it was handed back to Bronte on an unsuccessful 4th down try. T. Coulter got 10 and a 1st; Barbee got 6 and 1 and N. Coulter got a 1st at the 50. Barbee got 3 and 13 and Alexander got 2 before two pass incompletions brought on a punt that died on the Forsan 5.

Forsan picked up four big 1st downs before Alexander deflected a 4th down pass attempt that gave the Horns the ball on their own 37. Coulter picked up 10 and Barbee 3 before the quarter ended.

## Fourth Quarter

Coulter got another 1st on the 40 and Barbee blasted for 28 to the 12. T. Coulter got 3, Forsan got an illegal procedure penalty, N. Coulter got 2 and Barbee got the final 2 yards and then converted and the Horns widened their lead to 28-6.

On the ensuing kickoff return, Forsan fumbled and it was recovered by N. Coulter at the 27. After a 4 yard run and two incompletions, Coulter hit Barbee with a 16 yarder that carried to the 15. N. Coulter got 9, T. Coulter 2, and Barbee got the final 4 and the final 6 points of the ball game. His kick was good and the score was 35-6.

Again Forsan could not move

the ball. Kyle Lee, Ricky Frazee and Mario Gonzales had joined the ranks of the defensive mind-

ed Longhorns. With more than five minutes remaining in the game Coach

Gerald Sandusky sent in a new set of backs. Randy Leigh, Wayne Coalson and Kevin Gibbs joined Coulter to move the ball from the Bronte 32 to the Forsan 32 before game time expired.

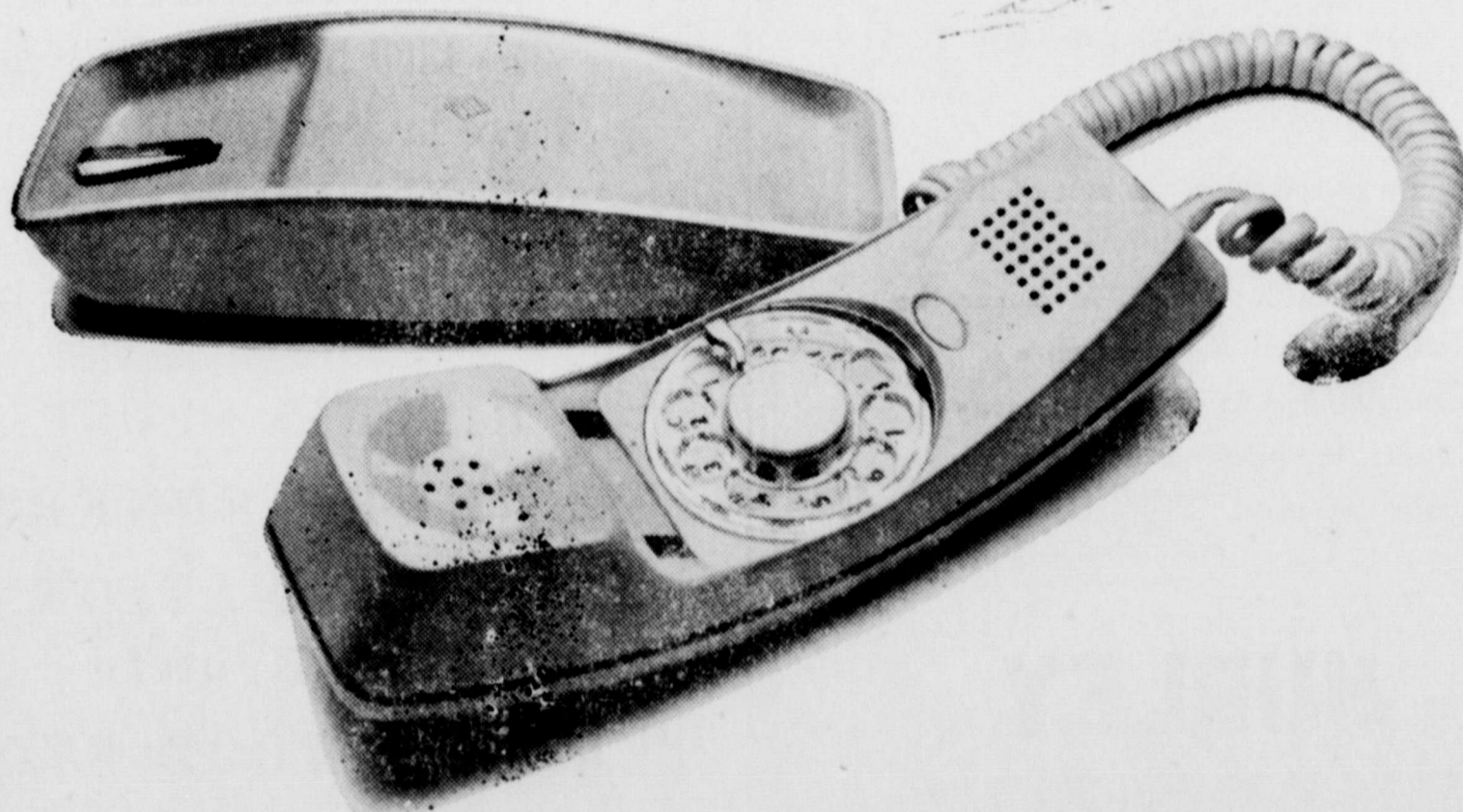

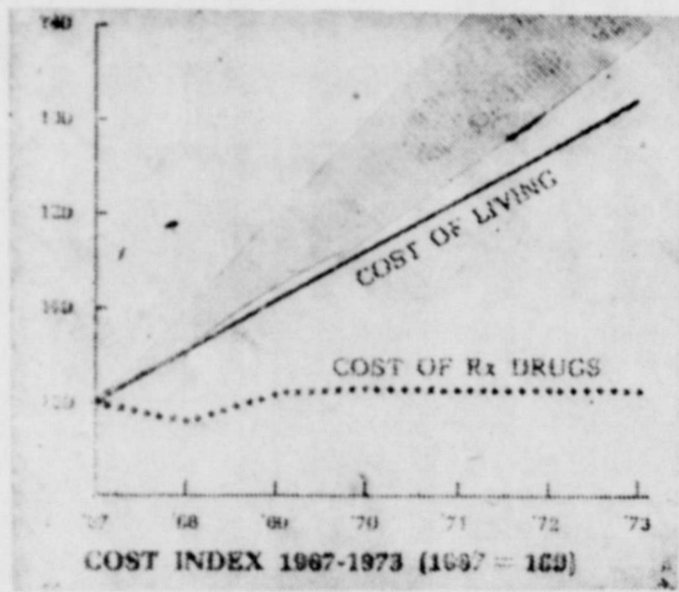
