Face-Lift Suggested For Business Area

Mayor R. T. Caperton called a meeting last Tuesday night of Bronte businessmen, civic leaders and others who are interested in improvement of the city. The

purpose of the meeting was to discuss a face lifting and rejuvenation program for the town's business district.

A great deal of interest was expressed in a project and Mayor Caperton said preliminary plans will be made shortly to kickoff the new program.

Caperton said persons with whom he has discussed the project are in favor of redoing the fronts of buildings and possibly doing away with some structures which are no longer in use and are drastically run-down.

Members of both Bronte Lions Clubs and the Bronte Volunteer Fire Department have expressed an interest in the project and the need for a project to make the downtown area safer and more attractive.

Mayor Caperton said he will keep The Enterprise informed of all developments on this matter so it can be reported regularly and completely to Enterprise readers.

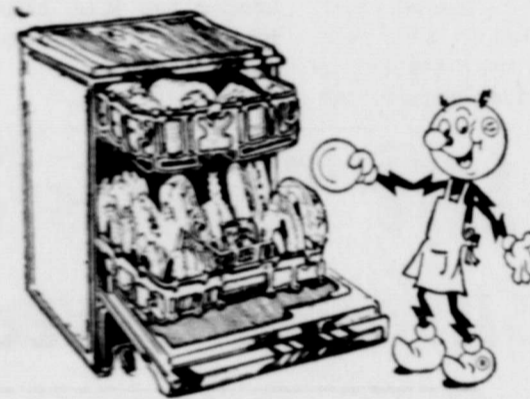

DISHWASHER SAVER-TIPS

A dishwasher will usually hold a whole day's dishes. It takes as much hot water and energy to wash 1 dish as it does a full load. Stack your dishes out of sight in your dishwasher and wait until you have a full load to turn it on.

Use only detergents manufactured specifically for dishwashers. A wetting agent helps prevent water spots on glasses and silverware.

Clean the filter screen often. A clogged filter can reduce the efficiency of your dishwasher.

WATER HEATER SAVER-TIPS

It's amazing how much water a leaky faucet will drip in a month's time and if the leaking faucet is a hot water faucet, it will waste both energy and water needlessly. As an example, a faucet dripping 90 drops per minute will waste 300 gallons per month.

To assure long life and efficiency, the water heater tank should have a small amount of water drained periodically. Once a month should be adequate. The purpose of draining water from the tank is to prevent sediment build-up in the tank bottom.

The thermostat controlling the water temperature is usually pre-set at the factory to deliver hot water at 150° F. This setting has proven satisfactory from the standpoint of operating cost and household needs.

He has participated in judging five years and was a member of the State Winning Soil Judging Team in 1973.

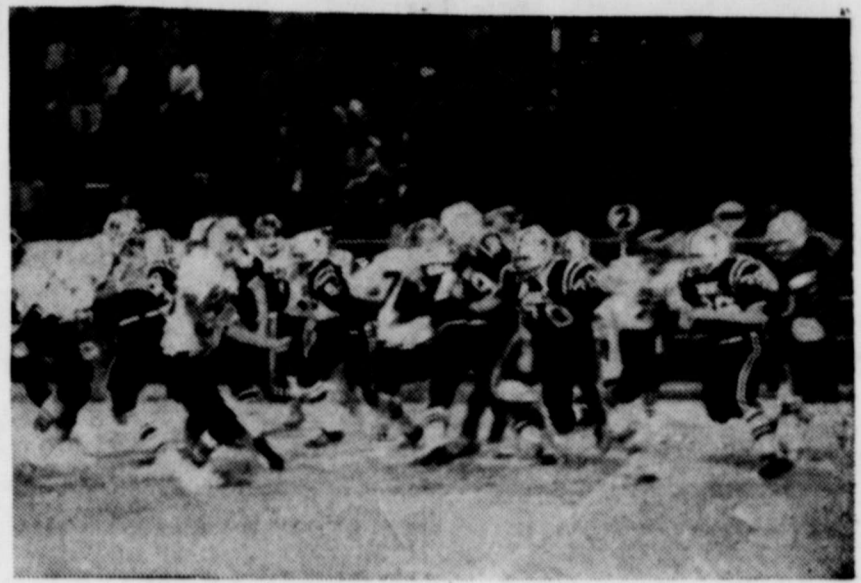
He is serving as president of the Future Leaders 4-H Club at the present time.

Horns Bi-District Champions

The Bronte Longhorns got it all together again last Friday night to take a 32-0 victory from the Sanderson Eagles in a game played at Ozona. An enormous crowd

of faithful Longhorn fans made the trip to see their team take their 11th straight game of the season and also capture the 3-B-4-B bi-district championship.

The Horns were able to put only 6 points on the scoreboard during the first half, but another 26 were added during the second half of the contest. Alan Barbee was the pointmaker of the night, making all five touchdowns and kicking two extra points.

First Quarter

Barbee's kickoff to Ricky Marquez got the contest underway. Marquez was downed on his 34. Three plays netted the Eagles 4 yards, so Steve Couch got off a good punt to Jim Dan Raughton on the 10 and he was tripped up on the 16. Barbee made 2 and 4 yards, then Marquez stole a pass and ran it back to the Bronte 33. Things didn't look too good but the mighty Longhorn defense held the Eagles to minus 1 on the next three downs, so a punt was necessary. Couch again did a good job, kicking the ball out of bounds on the Longhorn 8.

On the first play Quarterback Nelson Coulter exploded for a 36 yard gain and a 1st on his 42. Wayne Alexander made a yard and Barbee picked up almost 9. N. Coulter got the 1st down on the Eagle 45. The Eagles tightened up on the next series and the Horns had to punt. Barbee got off a beauty to the Eagle 12, but even better, the Eagles drew a 15 yard penalty which allowed the Horns to keep the ball on the Eagle 31. After a couple of short gains, N. Coulter kept on 3rd down and went around the right end and crossed the double stripe. It was all for naught, as the Horns drew a 15 yard clipping penalty which placed the ball on the 33. The locals were unable to make the needed 12 yards and the ball went over to the Eagles on their 28. Again, the fine defensive work of Marvin Ensor, Paul Cervenka and Mark Lee held the Eagles and Couch punted to Raughton on his 30.

Barbee made 4 and Alexander

blasted for 7 and a 1st on the 41. N. Coulter then streaked for 12 yards and a 1st on the Eagle 47 to end the first quarter.

Second Quarter

Coulter tried a pass but had to run, making 7 yards. Barbee got 5 yards and the 1st on the 34. Coulter tossed a 4 yard pass to Barbee, then Coulter made 6 for a 1st on the 24. Coulter got 4, Ensor added 2 and Barbee made the 1st down on the 14. Turney Coulter made a yard and Barbee carried twice for 9 and the 1st down on the 4 yard line. It took two tries for Barbee to make the remaining 4 yards and the first touchdown of the game. His EP kick was low and the score was 6-0.

Marquez returned Barbee's kickoff from the 15 to the 35. Billy Ren Lee and Alexander held Frankie Flores for no gain and on the next play Cervenka recovered a fumble to give the ball to the Horns on the Eagle 32. The Horns were penalized 5 yards for illegal motion, so Coulter tried a pass. Bernie Castro picked it off for the Eagles and they took over on their 30.

N. Coulter threw Castro for a 1 yard loss and Alexander knocked down a 2nd down pass try. A 3rd down pass try didn't work either, as Billy Ren Lee sacked QB Marvin Davis for a 4 yard loss back to his 22. The punt went to the Bronte 42. The Eagles put a big rush on N. Coulter as he tried a pass but lost 12 yards. Barbee got nice gains of 4 and 13 but it wasn't enough. He punted and Raughton and Bobby Bailey killed it on the Eagle 2 yard line. Mark Lee, Clint Porter and Cervenka stopped any hopes the Eagles had to get on the board before the half.

Third Quarter

Raughton carried the Sanderson kickoff from the 15 back to the 35. Alexander picked up a yard and T. Coulter made 4. The next play brought fans to their feet as Barbee went around left end, picked up some beautiful blocking and sailed 60 yards for a TD. His kick was good and the score was 13-0.

Barbee kicked off to Marquez on the 10 and he was wrestled down on the 30 by Ensor and Cervenka. Flores carried three times for a total of 3 yards, thanks to the defensive work of Cervenka, Mark Lee, N. Coulter and Alexander. Couch punted to the Bronte 32. A penalty and three non-productive runs caused Barbee to punt. It went to the Eagle 27. Flores made a 1st down on the 37 in three tries. But the Longhorn defense didn't allow a second 1st down, as Ensor, Barbee, Kit Carlton, Kerwin Denton, Billy Ren Lee and Clint Porter closed in on the Eagle ball carriers. The punt went to Raughton who was downed on his 38.

On the next series Barbee picked up 4 yards but that was all, so he got off a beautiful punt that

went out on the Eagle 5 yard line.

Flores carried for the Eagles but Cervenka, Carlton and Raughton saw to it that three tries netted the Eagles no yards. A short punt went to the Sanderson 34, giving the Longhorns excellent field position. Barbee went over left side for 11 yards and a 1st down on the 23. On the last play of the third quarter Bronte was fined 5 yards for illegal procedure.

Fourth Quarter

With a 1st and 15, Barbee got 7 yards. Another 5 yard penalty set the Horns back to a 2nd and 13 situation. On the next play Barbee took the ball and again received fine blocks that allowed him to go the 23 remaining yards to the goal line. Barbee's kick hit the cross bar and the score stood at 19-0.

Castro took Barbee's kickoff and made a nice return to his 40. Flores made 2, then Davis lost 8, due to the work of Mark Lee, Alexander and Cervenka. Raughton almost intercepted a 3rd down pass, so Couch punted to Raughton on the 31.

T. Coulter made 3 and then the Eagles were penalized 15 yards. Barbee went for a 1st down on the Eagle 36. He then carried for 3 and T. Coulter made 6. N. Coulter got the 1st down on the 25. Ensor made 4 and Barbee added 9 for a 1st on the 12. Next play was a goodie as Barbee went over the right side for 12 yards and 6 points. The conversion went true and the score was 26-0.

Ensor and Randy Leigh tackled Marquez on the 26 after he took Barbee's kickoff. Things started happening then as Barbee intercepted an Eagle pass on the first Eagle try. On the next play Barbee went 10 yards for another Bronte score. His PAT try went wide to the left and the scoreboard at Ozona read 32-0.

Bobby Frazee and Randy Leigh stopped Marquez' return of Barbee's kickoff on the 30. Again the Bronte defense made good as Mark Lee, Denton, Cervenka and Alexander were instrumental in bringing up a 4th and 6 for Sanderson. On the punt try the defense put a big rush on Couch and he was able to kick the ball 15 yards to the Bronte 49.

Coach Gerald Sandusky felt his charges had done a good job, so he ran in numerous substitutes and let the first stringers have a rest. But it was short lived, as a fumble gave the ball back to Sanderson. The big team went back into the ball game, as the Bronte team didn't care to have the Eagles score on them. The Eagles tried hard and made a 1st on the Longhorn 27 and another on the 14. Flores carried twice for 10 yards and a 1st on the Bronte 4 yard line. The clock was ticking and Flores was able to try twice more. It was to no avail, as the powerful Longhorn defense allowed him no gain.

Final score of 32-0 pointed the Longhorns to the north to take on bi-district winner Lefors Friday night at Spur.

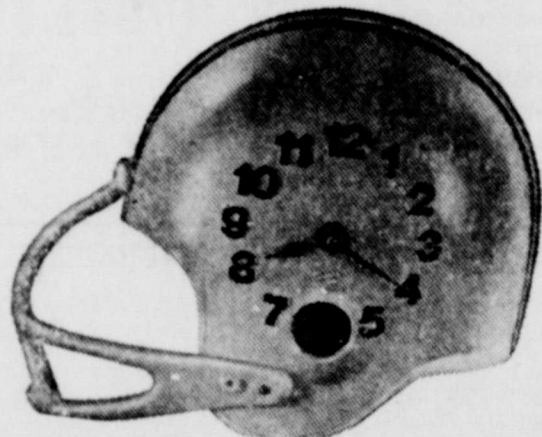
