

' A dishwasher will usually hold a whole day's dishes. It takes as much hot water and energy to wash I dish as it does a full load. Stack your dishes out of sight in your dishwasher and wait until you have a full load to turn it

Clean the filter screen often. A clogged filter can reduce the efficiency of your dishwasher.




