Bank Presents \$2,000 For Bronte Face-Lift

The First National Bank in Bronte took the lead this week in the proposed rejuvenation of the city's downtown business area. Bank President E. F. Glenn presented Mayor R. T. Caperton with a check of \$2,000 to be used in the face-lifting project.

At the same time Glenn presented a check for \$750 to Blackwell firemen Jerry Ware and LeRoy Conger to be used in up-

grading the equipment of the Blackwell Fire Department.

Glenn said both gifts were prompted by the interest of the board of directors in making the

communities better places to live and do business. "It is always our wish to help in every way possible to help anyway we can to improve facilities in the area served by the First National Bank," Glenn said.

Mayor Caperton called a meeting Tuesday night of last week to discuss upgrading the Bronte business district, and a great deal of interest was expressed by businessmen and others who were present. Members of both Lions Clubs and the Fire Department also have indicated an interest in a project to make the downtown area safer and more attractive.

The mayor said some work will be in order now if the project is to be successful. A great deal of planning and information gathering will be necessary before the work can be started. He said he will have further announcements to make as matters progress.

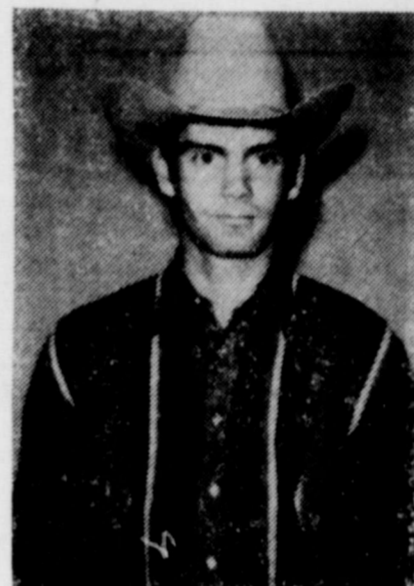

age on the first Longhorn possession. Barbee punted to the Lefors 40. The team that upset Groom and Sundown in the two previous games made two 1st

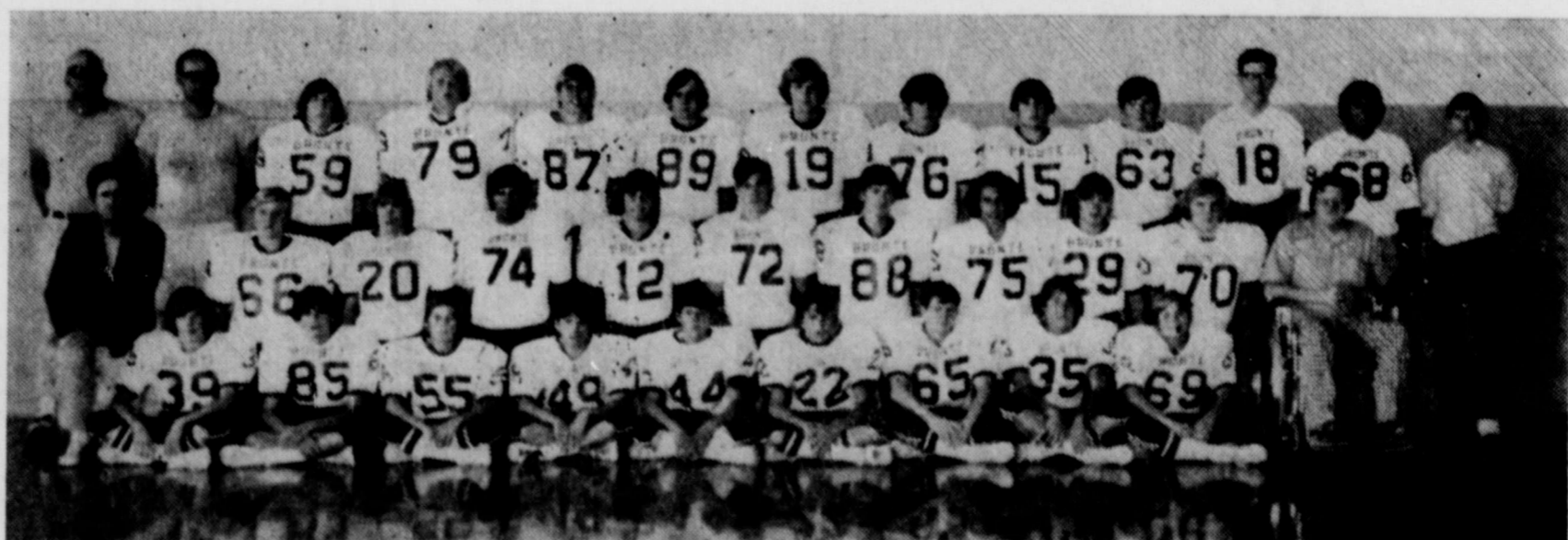
downs before fumbling to Billy Ren Lee at the Bronte 35.

Conversion Tables for Cane Sugar

With the holiday baking season beginning, homemakers are looking for ways to substitute other sweets for expensive cane sugar.

Honey, molasses or sorghum, corn syrup and cane syrup are sweetening agents that will work as well as white sugar in baking. Some general guidelines for these substitutions will help homemakers achieve economical and high quality baked goods.

* Honey. For one cup of sugar in baking, use one cup honey and reduce liquid one-fourth cup for each cup of honey used.

If about half the sugar is retained in a recipe and honey substituted for the other half, a better quality product will result.

In baking, use one-fourth tea-

spoon soda for each cup of honey. This is in addition to baking powder in the recipe when honey is substituted for sugar.

* Molasses or sorghum. For one cup sugar, use one and one-cup molasses or sorghum and reduce liquid one-fourth cup for each cup of molasses and sorghum used.

* Corn syrup. For one cup of sugar, use two cups corn syrup and reduce liquid one-fourth cup for each cup of corn syrup used.

* Cane syrup. One and one-half cups of cane syrup is equal in sweetness to one cup of cane sugar.

In cakes and cookies, replace sugar with syrup, measure for measure, and reduce liquid one-third. Cakes and cookies made with corn and cane syrups are not as sweet as when sugar is used.

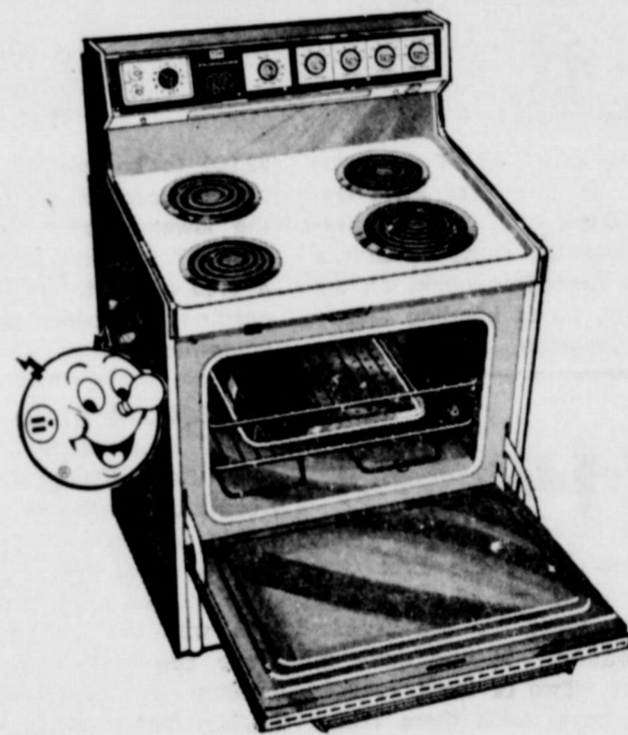

Elderly Should Eat Right Foods

(Editor's note: The following article was submitted by the Coke County Committee on Aging with the hope that it will enlighten both elderly and younger persons on the importance of proper nutrition.)

"People must be educated in the choosing of proper foods. All of us must be reminded that a proper diet is a basic determinant of good health."

In this land of plenty millions of Americans aren't eating wisely. Not because they haven't enough to eat, but because they eat too many of the wrong things

or too little of the right.

In short: Food is what you eat; nutrition is how your body uses food. If you aren't eating foods to meet your body needs, you may be suffering from poor nutrition. Some of the daages caused by severe malnutrition may be irreversible.

It is hard to say exactly when youth becomes middle age, or middle age becomes old age. Calendars tell only part of the story.

Some men and women in their eighties are still going strong; some are feeble in their sixties. The cells of an older person's body under go changes and some of the cells are damaged. The body's organs don't function as

well.

Vision is not as clear, hearing is not as sharp, and the digestive system may act up. The older person's condition is affected by all the accidents, infections and other hazards of living that he has experienced during his lifetime. This is when the results of a poor diet through the years can be seen.

All the nutrients that have been supplied—or not supplied — are giving the cells more — or less — strength to fight the aging process and disease. The food likes and dislikes developed over the years may become barriers to good nutrition.

Older persons need fewer calories. Men and women 55 to 75

years old need 150 to 200 fewer calories per day than when they were 35 to 55. But like everyone else they need the right kinds of food to keep healthy and to provide enough energy; the same kinds younger people need but in different amounts. Old age, like the teen years, is a time of learning to live with changes. Often the changes are serious and tiring.

The strains of old age may be made worse by changes in living patterns. The eating habits of the elderly can be influenced by loss of teeth, retirement, reduced income, moving out of a familiar

house or neighborhood, or the number of people with whom they live.

Local grocery stores are happy to deliver your groceries to you if you can't go and pick them up yourself. So don't let that keep you from having the right foods.

Another thing to remember is it's more fun to eat with someone.

If you live alone, why not cook a good balanced meal and invite two or three friends over to share it with you. Maybe next week they'll do the same thing. Food tastes better if you cook for more than one person.

burst over the center and outran the secondary to the goal line. The conversion kick was no good and the Longhorns trailed 6-0, the third time they were behind this season.

Raughton returned the kickoff to the 35. Barbee got 6, Coulter lost 6, a pass went incomplete, and the Longhorns were punting again. The Pirates ran two plays before B. R. Lee recovered his second fumble at the Pirates 37. The officials indicated the first quarter had ended. (The game clock had blown a fuse just before kickoff time and service was not restored until later.)

Second Quarter
Barbee gained none but a Coulter-Raughton pass got a big 15 that moved the ball to the 18. On the next play Barbee swept right end for 18 yards and the TD that tied the score. Barbee's conversion was good and it moved the Longhorns ahead 7-6 and gave Barbee a season total of 243 points.

The talented Pirates went to work from their own 35 and Greg

Beck, Jim Hix and Sawyer combined to move it to the Bronte 17. Beck then hit Phil White for a TD and converted the extra points with a run to move ahead 14-7, a lead they never relinquished. Following the kickoff, the Longhorns decided to use the airways to play catch up ball. Lefors would not cooperate and after three incompletions the punt was in order. It was a mistake letting the Pirates have the ball for five 1st downs and 65 yards later the Longhorns were in trouble to the tune of 21-7.

The Horns had to start from their own 26. On the next play Barbee got 20 yards, and the Horns were able to wedge in a run and a pass, both non-gainers, before the first half ended.

Third Quarter
The Pirates must have enjoyed marching down the field for they had four 1st downs before Clint Porter recovered a fumble at the 8. The Bronte backs combined to move the ball to the Lefors 46 before three pass incompletions turned the ball over to the boys from the north.

Fourth Quarter
Lefors ran two plays ineffectively and when they went to the air Alexander picked off the aerial and returned it to the 35. Coulter found his two best targets, and two of the best receivers in the history of the school, Raughton and Bailey, and moved the

ball all the way to the 10 yard line. Coulter then swept right end for the 6 points. The Longhorns decided to go for two extra points, but the quick pitch failed and the gap closed to 21-13.

The Pirates seemed to use the 30-35 yard line as their starting point, for it was from there they gobbled up big chunks of yardage and Sawyer carried it over from the 15. The kick was good and the Longhorns again trailed by two touchdowns.

The Horns were still pass-minded and a couple of Raughton catches and an N. Coulter run moved the ball to the 8. The Horns fumbled on the next play and blew a good scoring opportunity. The Pirates got goal-line dust in their eyes and mounted a drive that carried to midfield. Their punt was fumbled by Barbee at the 15 and the Horns showed some of their best defense by holding at the 5. Nothing the Horns tried would work and the game ended with the local boys deep in the hole.

It was a discouraging way to see the lads of Coaches Gerald Sandusky, Bob Shields and James Raughton end a season that saw them scoring 436 points to their opponents' 63. Most of the season they were ranked second in the Harris Rating System and third by the Associated Press.

From time to time throughout the season the opponent was larg-

er, quicker or faster, but no opponent had possessed all these qualities. Lefors did, and they are to be commended for putting together an excellent football team. Way back in August Longhorn boosters knew it would take a good team to beat Bronte. It finally happened, but the '74 version of Longhorns left a warm spot in the hearts of its many supporters.

Statistician Commended
School officials had praise this week for the work done this season by Statistician Jim Dunaam. Supt. C. B. Barbee said, "The good records kept by Jim will be used to bring many honors to individual players and to Bronte High School."
