### Raughton Wins 200th Game as Bronte Coach

James M. (Stickey) Raughton came to Bronte in 1964 and on Monday, Dec. 30, his team won the 200th victory gathered in by teams he has coached in a little more than 10 seasons.

Raughton-coached teams won district titles in 1966, 1967, 1968, 1970 and 1974. His team lost a playoff to Forsan in 1973 after tying for the district title.

Each year a Longhorn team has won district it has gone on to win the bi-district title.

In 1966 and 1968 Raughton's teams captured the regional titles in West Texas and went on to the state meet at Austin. The 1968 team had the best record in the school's history with a 29-3 record.

Raughton's teams finished second in the district in 1969, 1971 and 1972. To summarize: in 10 seasons, his teams have won five district titles, tied for another, and finished second on three other years.

This year's team has a 14-2 record and is picked to finish high once again in district standings. Bronte fans are boosting Stickey's team this year to make him wind up with six district titles in 11 years.

Editorially speaking, it's even possible to put up with his tobacco chewing to have a coach like old Stickey.

In the boys bracket Robert Lee met Veribest at 4:15 p.m. Thursday; it was Roscoe vs. Grape Creek at 6:45 p.m.; and Mertzon vs. Eola at 9:15 p.m. Bronte will meet Sterling City at 4:15 p.m. Friday.

Second round or semi-final play

is scheduled to begin at 5:30 p.m. Friday and will continue Saturday.

Boys consolation finals will begin at 3 p.m. Saturday followed by the girls consolation contest at 4:15 p.m. Boys game for third place honors will start at 5:30 p.m. and the girls game for this honor will begin at 6:45 p.m.

The big games for the championship trophies will see the boys contest beginning at 8 p.m., followed by the girls game at 9:15.

Everyone in the Bronte area is invited to attend the junior high tournament games where they are assured of seeing some of the most spirited basketball games to be played in Bronte this year.

The concession stand will be open all during the tournament and patronage of fans is invited.

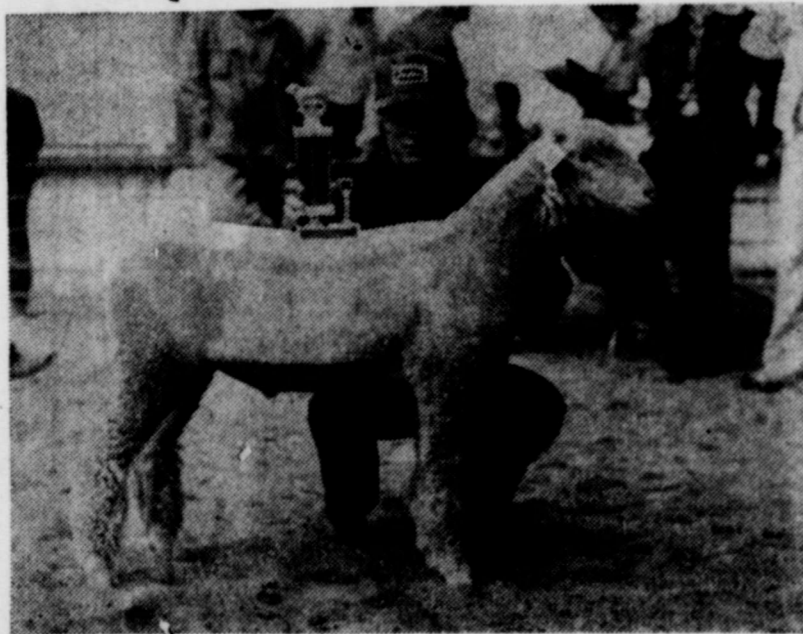
weighing 1150 pounds.

Lynn Gulley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Gulley, took top honors in the purebred registered heifer division.

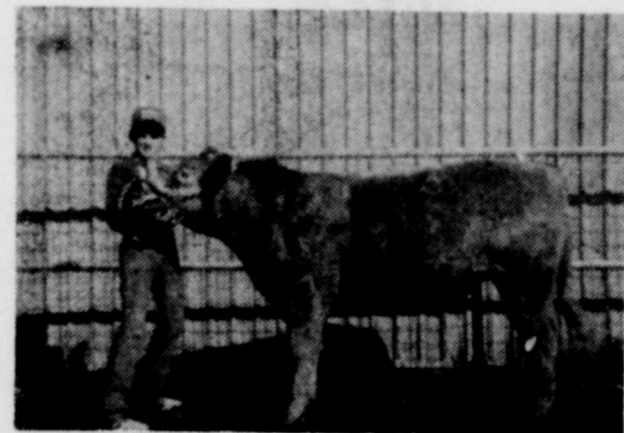

Anybody for a slump, grunt, flummery or pan dowdy? These traditional New England desserts may sound funny today, but everyone can love those luscious concoctions of juicy fruits and hot biscuit toppings. In old-time cookery slumps and grunts were boiled, while flummeries and pan dowdies were baked. This modern-day version of a pan dowdy uses canned red tart cherries to delight both the traditionalists and modernists.

**CHERRY PAN DOWDY**

- Filling**
- 1 cup granulated sugar
  - 2 No. 303 cans red tart pitted cherries
  - 1/4 cup cornstarch
  - 1/2 tablespoon lemon juice
  - dash salt
  - 1/4 teaspoon almond flavoring
  - 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
  - 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
  - 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
  - few drops red food coloring

Combine sugar, cornstarch, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg; add to cherries and juice in a saucepan. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thick. Remove from heat and add lemon juice, almond flavoring, butter and food coloring. Pour into greased 8 x 8 x 2 inch baking dish.

- Topping**
- 2 cups biscuit mix
  - 1/4 cup sugar
  - 2/3 cup milk
  - 1 teaspoon cinnamon

Stir biscuit mix and milk together until blended. Drop by tablespoonfuls into mixture of sugar and cinnamon. Place biscuits on top of cherry filling and bake in a 400° F. oven about 30 minutes. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

### Junior High

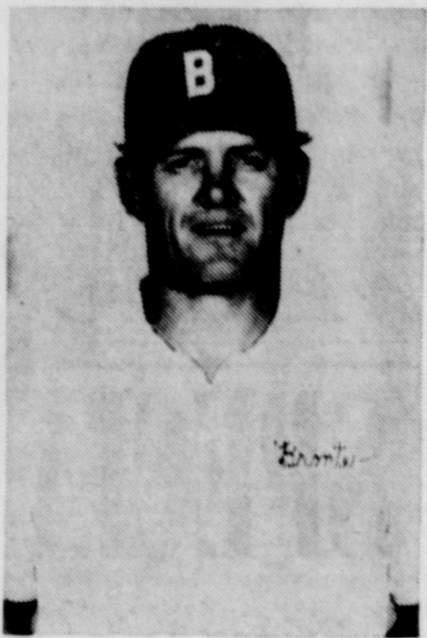
