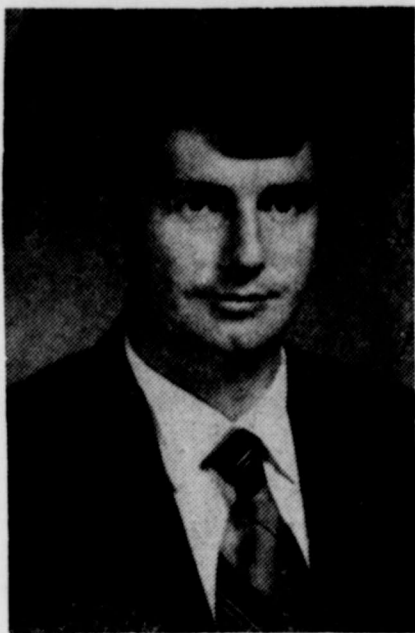
## Frigid Front Dumps Snow

Members of the Bronte FFA participated in the Midland Invitational Livestock Judging Contest Tuesday. The team, consisting of Marvin Ensor, Kerwin Denton, Kyle Lee and Dale Patterson, placed second in lamb judging.

Ensor took top individual honors with a near perfect score of 438 out of a possible 450 points. The other team members also made a good showing, considering this was their first contest of the year, said their coach, Gary York.

Seven alternates from Bronte also participated in the contest and did a good job, York said. Alternates were Paul Cervenka, Wayne Coalson, Joe Bob Ragsdale, David Bachman, Johnny Hibbs, David Jackson and Keith Eubanks.

The boys judged three classes of lambs, two classes of steers, one class of heifers and three classes of pigs.

Approximately 25 teams with 100 contestants were entered.

### DINNER POSTPONED

The covered dish dinner which was planned last Sunday at the First United Methodist Church has been postponed until a new date can be set. The dinner was not held last Sunday due to services being canceled because of cold weather. A new date for the dinner will be announced later.

The first snow and the coldest temperatures of this winter covered the Coke County area the past weekend. Many residents were surprised when they awakened Sunday morning to find the ground covered with the white icy stuff. The cold weather was brought on as the winter's worst storm moved through Texas, bringing sub-freezing temperatures to the entire state.

The storm left three to four inches of snow in the Robert Lee-Bronte area, but high winds whipped the

dry snow into drifts as deep as two feet. Abilene reported six inches of snow and San Angelo had two inches.

Rain fell early Saturday night but turned to snow and the white flakes came down until mid-morning Sunday. The temperature stayed below freezing all day Sunday and then dipped into the low teens Sunday night and Monday morning.

There was a warming trend by the middle of the week and most of the snow was melted by Thursday. Cold windy weather was on the menu for Bronte residents on Thursday morning.

### Dump Ground Hours Retold

Mayor R. T. Caperton said this week that citizens of Bronte should be reminded of the hours when the city dump ground is open.

The dump ground is open and the attendant is on duty on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9 a.m. until 12 noon and from 1 to 6 p.m. It is also open on Saturdays from 7 a.m. until 12 noon and from 1 to 4 p.m.

Mayor Caperton said the supervision of the dump ground and having certain hours for it to be open may have inconvenienced some citizens of the city but "it has certainly improved the looks of the facility and has got the State Health Department off our back."
