

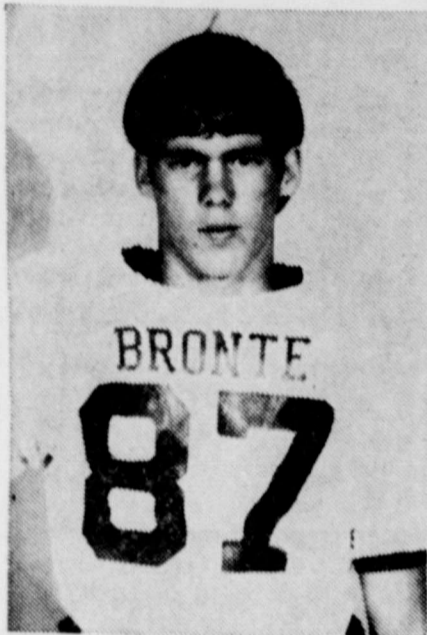

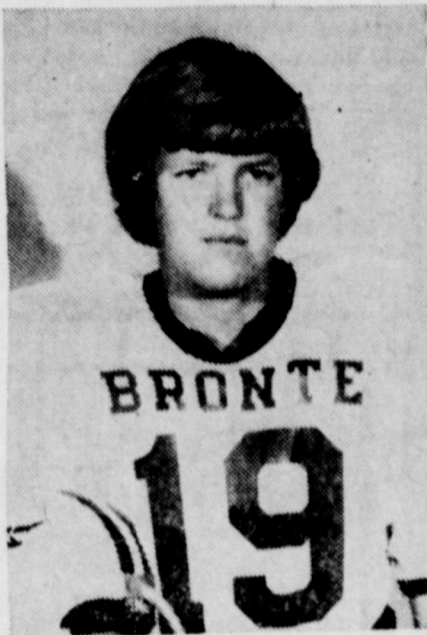

3 Horns Named All-State

The 1974 Bronte Longhorn football squad gained more honors last week when three of its members were named to the Class B All-State team. Those honored were Jim Dan Raughton, Alan Barbee and Nelson Coulter. The teams are picked by

Bloodmobile Due Jan. 29 in Bronte

Citizens of Bronte and the surrounding area will have the opportunity next Wednesday, Jan. 29, to be of a great deal of help to area persons who are ill and need blood, when a Bloodmobile will be here to take donations of the life-giving red liquid.

In addition to helping other folks who are in trouble, local residents can guarantee themselves and their families all the blood needed in case of illness at any cooperating hospital in the United States.

The Bloodmobile is being sponsored in Bronte by the Noon Lions Club. The Lions feel that the Bloodmobile is a worthy project and members are asking complete cooperation from the citizenry of the area.

The Bloodmobile will be located near the City hall on Jan. 29, from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. The unit is operated by Blood Services of San Angelo, a non-profit corporation which supplies blood to hospitals in a wide area of West Texas. Hospitals served include Bronte Hospital, the West Coke County Hospital in Robert Lee and all the hospitals in San Angelo.

Residents of the Bronte area are asked to give a pint of blood when the Bloodmobile is here.

Anyone who wants further information is invited to call the co-chairmen of the Lions Club project: M. E. Patterson at 473-4811, or Mickey Pierce at 473-2691.

Anyone who needs transportation to and from the Bloodmobile is invited to call Clifford Clark at 473-5261, and a ride will be provided at no charge.

Several Bronte merchants have registration cards. Donors are asked to fill out one of the cards and leave them at the merchant's place of business.

Persons who are 17 years old will be welcome to give a pint of blood if they have parental consent.

Mark Fincher of Jayton was the only other player from District 3-B to receive All-State honors. He was placed on the first offensive team as a running back.

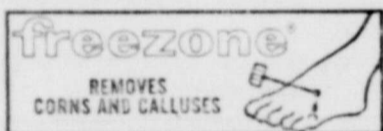

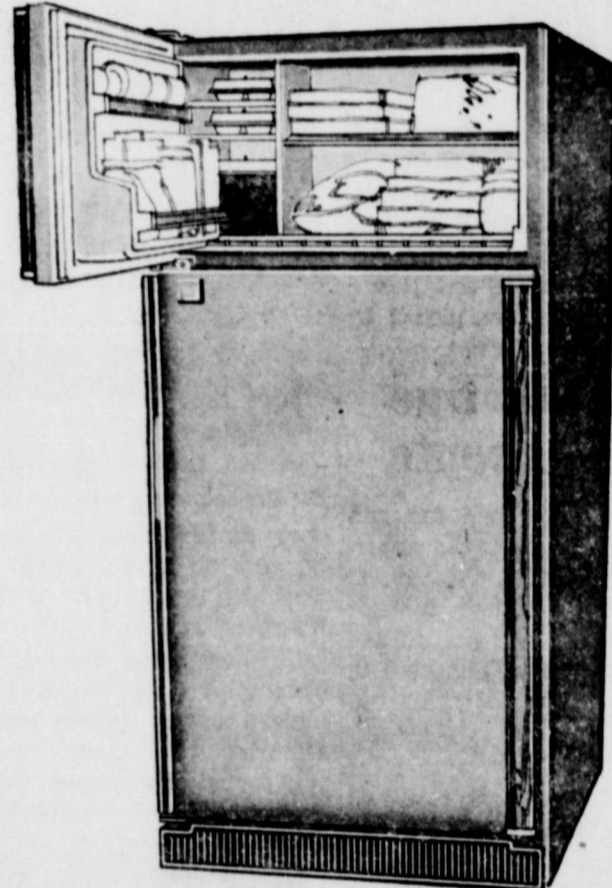

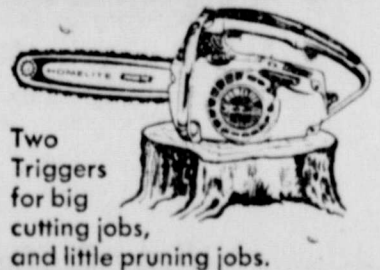

President James M. Raughton of Bronte presided.

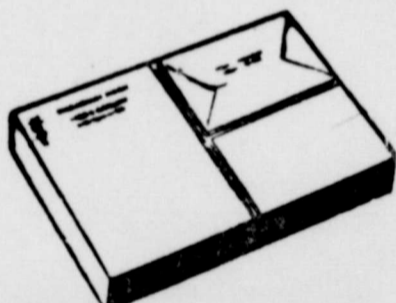
On the program was Mrs. Jeanette Boster of San Angelo who gave a presentation of TSTA's proposals to be presented to the 64th Legislature.

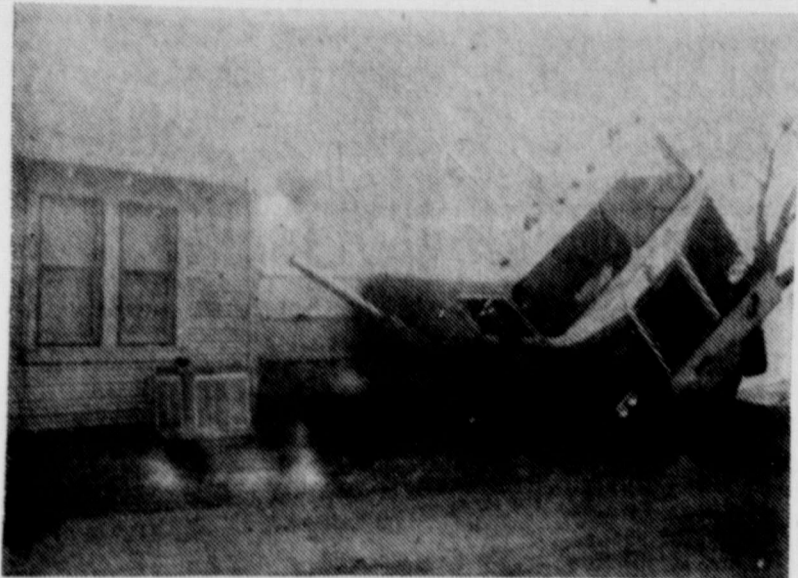

Truck Barely Misses Adkins House

Big Cattle Truck Wrecks in Robt. Lee

Two men escaped with minor injuries when their large tractor-trailer cattle truck overturned shortly after 2 a.m. Saturday at the "Y"

intersection in Robert Lee. The rig, owned by T&W Transport, Inc., of Abilene, and loaded with 84 head of cattle, failed to make the curve and flipped to its side, coming to rest a few inches from the front of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Mae Adkins, just west of the Skelly Station building.

Mrs. Adkins, her two year old daughter, Michelle, and her sister, Debra Read, were in the house asleep when the accident occurred. Mr. Adkins was away at work.

Driver of the truck was Wendell Gallaway and with him was Sherman West, both of Abilene, who had loaded at San Angelo and were headed north on Highway 208 when the accident occurred. They were reported to be taking the load to Pheonix, Ariz. A heavy fog at the time made driving hazardous.

As the big truck left the road, it sheared off highway sign posts and a water pipe and gas meter to the Adkins home. Gas spewing from the broken line created a hazard, along with diesel fuel leaking from the truck's tanks. City employees Sherman Williams and Gary Williams were called to shut off temporarily the gas and water. Robert Lee firetrucks stood by until the truck was moved at 11:15 a.m. Saturday. Other trucks and equipment were brought in to remove the cattle which survived the wreck as well as the carcasses of those killed. It was reported that 31 head of the stock were killed in the accident or had to be killed at the scene because of injuries.

Highway Patrolman Bobby Hart investigated the accident, assisted by Sheriff J. Lee Ensor and Deputy Marshall Millican.
