Food contains protein, carbohycrates, fats, vitamins, minerals and water. All of these are nutrients: that is, they nourish the body.

Since food is vital, you need to know about the nutritive content of foods, which ones are the best sources of the various nutrients, and how to combine them into a healthful, balanced diet.

There is a great deal of talk about one particular group of nutrients-vitamins. Vitamins are very important but you should know that vitamins do not create energy or build tissue by themselves.

The important thing is to remember that no one food does everything and all foods have something to offer. A variety of different types of foods will provide all the nutrients most of us need.

PROTEIN: After water and possibly fat, protein is the most plen- ordered o tiful substance in the body.
