Between \$500 and \$600 in cash was taken from the vault of Bronte High School Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning.

Mike Dyess, who was helping his father, Royce Dyess, school custodian, discovered the burglary about 7 a.m. Wednesday.

The intruders gained entry to the office of High School Prin. James L. Golsen by prying open the door going into the hall. Apparently they used some heavy instrument to knock a hole in the wall of the vault and were able to reach in and unlock the door from the inside.

Mayor R. T. Caperton paid a short visit to The Enterprise this week and was seeking publicity on a couple of matters concerning the city and its citizens.

The mayor was a little riled up over the type of phone service which General Telephone Co. has been providing here in Bronte. He said the city or any of its officials cannot take complaints about the sorry service, and certainly they could do nothing about complaints. So, Caperton said, complaints must continue to be registered with the phone company. However, the mayor said, he would like to have citizens of Bronte write down their complaints about the service and file them at the city hall.

The complaints, if registered in this manner, will give city officials something concrete to go on in any future dealings with General Tel.

Mayor Caperton had another matter on his mind, also. It hardly seems strange in these inflationary times that the City of Bronte is a little strapped for money to perform the services needed by the city's citizens. In fact, we feel that the present and past city administrations deserve a big "thank you" from all of us for having not increased city taxes during the last several years. As Mayor Caperton told us, federal revenue sharing has helped, and small increases for some services have been adjusted slightly upward. But the city government has weathered all the price increases so far and even increased our services, without an increase in taxes.

Okay, here comes the rub. The city has finally reached the point where it needs more money to supply us with the services we demand. The question is, where does additional money come from?

The mayor believes the city should vote a 1 per cent sales tax to pick up the additional needed revenue. Frankly, we have always been rather pleased that Bronte was one of the few towns in Texas that had not voted the one per cent sales tax. But, if the city is going to have to secure more revenue for

County Judge W. W. Thetford said several ceiling tile and some sheetrock in the entrance way had to be replaced. The damage, he said, was much less than was originally thought. The contractor, J. D. Burke, of San Angelo did the repair work at cost, Thetford said.

The boys now have a season record of 19-3 while the girls are 23-8.

SAVINGS BONDS SALES AMOUNT TO \$1097 IN NOV.

Sales of Series E and H United Savings Bonds for November amounting to \$1,097 in Coke County were reported this week by County Bond Chairman G. C. Allen of Robert Lee. Sales for the 11 month period totaled \$22,754 for 76 per cent of the 1974 sales goal of \$30,000.

Sales in Texas during the month of November amounted to \$17,763,713, while year to date sales totaled \$212,780,156 with 90 per cent of the yearly sales goal of \$236.8 million achieved.

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Food More Than Something to Eat

Food contains protein, carbohydrates, fats, vitamins, minerals and water. All of these are nutrients: that is, they nourish the body.

Since food is vital, you need to know about the nutritive content of foods, which ones are the best sources of the various nutrients, and how to combine them into a healthy, balanced diet.

There is a great deal of talk about one particular group of nutrients—vitamins. Vitamins are very important but you should know that vitamins do not create energy or build tissue by themselves.

The important thing is to remember that no one food does everything and all foods have something to offer. A variety of different types of foods will provide all the nutrients most of us need.

PROTEIN: After water and possibly fat, protein is the most plentiful substance in the body. The substances, called enzymes, which control the processes that keep the body working are made of protein. Protein is also part of the hemoglobin molecule in red blood cells that carry oxygen into the system. And the antibodies in the blood stream that fight off disease and infection are also protein.

Where is protein found? Meat, poultry, fish, milk, cheese and eggs provide good quantities of it. Bread and cereal are also important sources.

FATS: Fats provide energy and add flavor and variety to foods. They make meals more satisfying. Fats carry vitamins A, D, E and K and are essential parts of the structure of the cells which make up the body's tissues.

Our body fat protects vital organs by providing a cushion around them. Fats are plentiful in butter, margarine, shortening, salad oils, most cheeses, mayonnaise, salad dressing and bacon.
