Girls Finish Third In Regional Tournament

Bronte High School's girls basketball team won third place in the regional basketball tournament held last weekend on the campus of

Tarleton State University at Stephenville. The girls won a 53-51 thriller from Lipan to take the third place honors. The girls were all tied up, 51-51, with two seconds left to play when Shelley Cumbie took the last shot of the game and made it good, to give Bronte the two point margin.

The Longhorn girls took their first game Friday afternoon with Midway by a 45-40 score. Sherrie Coalson had a big 35 to lead the scoring. Leah Barbee hit for 6 and Cumbie made 4 more.

It was the second game that threw the girls when they lost to Brock 71-58. Again Coalson had the big score with 48 points; Debra Hibbs had 8, and Shelene Tidwell hit 2.

In the 53-51 win over Lipan, Coalson made 29; Tidwell 13; Hibbs 7; and Cumbie 4.

Coalson was named to the regional all-tournament team.

Brock, the team that defeated the Bronte girls, went on to win the region and will take part in the state tournament at Austin.

Bronte Kicks Off Bicentennial Plans

Twenty-eight persons were present at a meeting last Thursday night at the City Hall to begin planning for Bronte's participation in the Bicentennial Celebration of the United States of America. July 4, 1976, is the 200th birthday of the nation.

Mayor R. T. Caperton gave the opening address and welcomed the group.

Louis Thornton was named overall chairman of the Bicentennial Committee. Others appointed to head other facets of the observance include: Dayton Jackson, Horizons; Mrs. Margaret Brunson, Festival; and C. B. Barbee, Heritage.

The mayor said a concentrated effort will be made to beautify the city during the Bicentennial period.

Any group or club that wants to undertake a project in connection with the celebration is welcome to do so, but such projects will have to be cleared with the committee before they become a part of Bronte's official program.

A meeting for businessmen is planned to discuss needs of the downtown area.

A raft of elections will be held in Bronte on Saturday, April 5, when voters will go to the polls to vote on the usual city officers, school trustees and hospital district directors. But this year something new

has been added—voters in the city will decide whether or not to levy a 1% city sales tax on themselves. Final notice calling the sales tax election is being published in this week's Enterprise.

March 6 is the deadline for filing for the various elected official positions.

Three vacancies will exist on the school board, as terms of Delbert Coalson, Dale Thompson and Grady Coulter expire. Coulter and Billy Jackson have filed for a place on the ballot, and at least one more candidate is needed. Candidates should file in the office of Supt. C. B. Barbee.

Terms of City Aldermen L. O. Clark and Louis Thornton expire in April and both have filed for reelection. Other candidates should file with City Secretary Mrs. Helen Kirkland.

Likewise on the hospital board, the two incumbents, C. E. Bruton and Glenn Sims expire this year. Other candidates should contact Roy Stout or Bruton.

**PAUL'S SECOND
TRIAL HELD**

(News as it might have been written if there had been newspapers 1900 years ago.)

Paul, arrested over two years ago in Jerusalem on charges of defiling the Jewish Temple, faced Governor Festus last week in the second trial for his life.

Special prosecutors from Jerusalem came down to this city and presented the case against Paul. He acted as his own counsel and plead "not guilty" to all charges.

Festus then proposed that Paul be taken back to Jerusalem and stand trial there. But Paul appealed his case to Caesar's High Court in Rome. Festus then remanded him to jail until he can be transported to Rome.

Paul, once Saul of Tarsus, was formerly appointed Special Prosecutor by the Jewish San Hedrin to stamp out the sect known as "Christians," followers of Jesus of Nazareth who was executed several years ago in Jerusalem after being convicted of blasphemy.

Later Paul about-faced and became a member of that despised sect, and has been a travelling evangelist for many years. He spent most of his time travelling over Asia Minor and into Greece. Upon his return to Jerusalem he was promptly arrested and has been held in jail now for two years.

Now he faces trial before Caesar. Many folks in this country will breathe a sigh of relief when this controversial figure leaves for Rome.

OF
PROPOSED
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975**

**NUMBER ONE
ON THE BALLOT
(S.J.R. No. 3)**

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivisions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

**NUMBER TWO
ON THE BALLOT
(H.J.R. No. 6)**

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$.10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."

ORDINANCE CALLING SPECIAL ELECTION FOR ADOPTION OF LOCAL SALES TAX WHERE PAPER BALLOTS ARE USED

AN ORDINANCE ORDERING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF BRONTE, TEXAS, ON THE QUESTION OF THE ADOPTION OF A ONE PERCENT (1%) LOCAL SALES AND USE TAX WITHIN THE CITY; DESIGNATING THE DAY OF ELECTION AND THE POLLING PLACE; APPOINTING ELECTION OFFICIALS THEREFOR; PROVIDING THAT ALL DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS SHALL BE QUALIFIED TO VOTE; PRESCRIBING FORM OF BALLOT; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF ELECTION; CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO SAID ELECTION; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village; Now Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRONTE:

Section -1. That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of Bronte, Texas, on the 5th day of April, 1975, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said City, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

"AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

Section 2. That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said City, and the polling place and presiding officers for said election shall be, to-wit:

Polling Place: Bronte City Hall
Presiding Officers: Mrs. Willie B. Millikin, Presiding Judge; Mrs. Tricia Stout, Alternate Presiding Judge.

The Presiding Judge at such election shall appoint two clerks.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Bronte, Texas, shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, of Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT

INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section 5. That election judge and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is

clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given: (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said city, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place in each of the election precincts of the city not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election. It is hereby found and determined that The Bronte Enterprise is a newspaper published with the

City of Bronte, Texas, and is a newspaper of general circulation within said city.

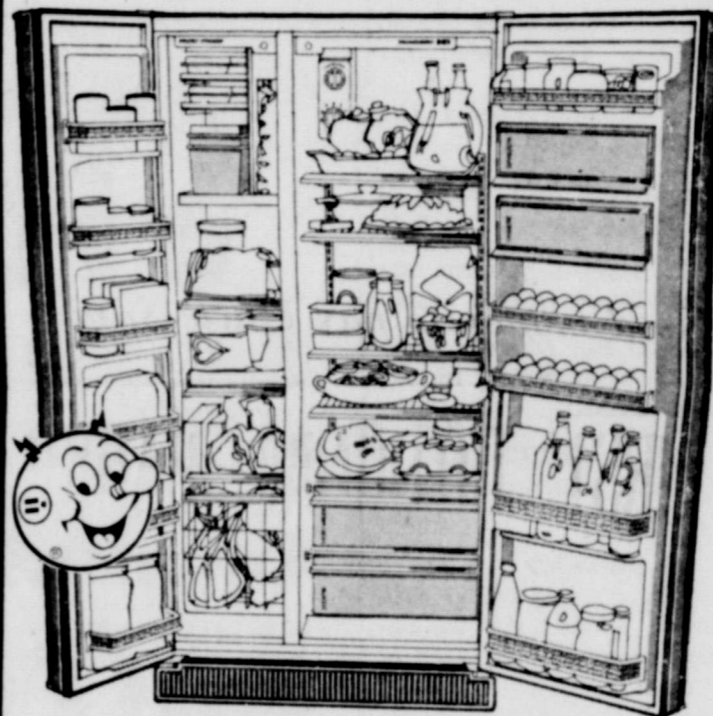
