Four Elections Face Voters

School Facilities Being Improved

The new track and tennis court of Bronte School are expected to be finished this week and ready for use of UIL contestants and the general public.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said, "Of course, our students who are competing in UIL track and tennis will have first priority in the use of these facilities." After they have completed their daily workouts, the public and other students are "not only invited but they are urged and encouraged to use these facilities," the superintendent said.

Barbee pointed out that these and other accommodations of the Bronte School are paid for by tax dollars and everyone is invited to use them to his own benefit.

He did point out that lights at the track and tennis courts would be turned out each night at 10 p.m. and gates will be locked for security reasons.

Barbee also pointed out that a sizeable amount of carpeting has been done at the school during the last few months, including:

The Band Hall, hallway and stairs leading to it; the office of Prin. James L. Golson and his secretary; the Speech Therapy Room; the Piano Room; the Migrant Education Room; the Remedial Reading Room; the School Clinic; the office of the elementary principal and his secretary; and the elementary teachers work room.

New carpet has also been installed in the school auditorium, including the aisles, under the first four rows of seats and in the space between the seats and the stage.

Burglars Invade Coke County Spots

Roach's Dry Goods in Robert Lee was burglarized last Thursday night with considerable merchandise stolen by the lawbreaker. Among the merchandise missing were approximately two dozen pairs of jeans, some double knit pants, shirts, underwear, etc. Also taken was approximately \$50 in cash. Sheriff J. Lee Ensor said the entire haul would amount to \$300 to \$400.

Ensor pointed out, however, that it is extremely difficult for the owner of a store of this type to determine exactly just what was taken. The burglar gained entry to the store through a back window.

Also burglarized recently was the home of C. E. Ford at Lake Spence.

Ford, an Odessa attorney, said no one had been staying at the place for about two weeks when the burglary was discovered. Missing items include a black and white TV set, a battery charger, two boat motors and a lantern. Value was estimated at least \$500, according to information released by the office of the sheriff.

Some other burglaries on the east side of the county have probably been cleared up, Ensor said, as most of the missing goods has been found in Abilene. A suspect has been apprehended in Oklahoma and Texas lawmen are trying to have him extradited to face trial in Texas.

Among the places burglarized was the farm of W. E. Hartman of Fort Worth. His place is located north of Tennyson. Items missing included a black and white TV, two saddles, a saddle blanket, two pocket knives, a lantern and a large butcher knife.

The same suspect is expected to be questioned about burglaries in the Blackwell area and other places.

Bronte citizens will have a host of decisions to make April 5 when four elections will be held.

Apparently the hottest contest to be decided will be the election of three members of the Bronte School board of trustees. Names of seven candidates have been filed either in person or by petition. Trustees whose terms are expiring include Delbert Coalson, Dale Thompson

and Grady Coulter. Coulter is the only incumbent who had announced for re-election Thursday. Others whose names have been submitted for a place on the ballot include Billy Jackson, Jim Morrow, Martin Lee, Luis Charles, A. D. McCarty and May Youngblood Glenn.

Another election to be held April 5 is to fill two spots on the Bronte City Council. Terms of L. O. Clark and Louis Thornton expire this year and both have filed for re-election.

Two vacancies will occur next month on the board of directors of East Coke County Hospital District. Terms of C. E. Bruton and Glenn Sims will expire and both have filed for re-election.

City Sales Tax Vote

Something new has been added to this year's elections which are always held the first Saturday in April. The City Council has called an election for qualified voters of the city to decide if they want to impose a one per cent city sales tax upon themselves and all the other persons who make retail purchases in Bronte.

Mayor R. T. Caperton said the City Council is pushing for the one per cent tax, as it can probably provide the revenue needed to keep services of the city at their present level without levying additional ad valorem taxes on property in the city.

Caperton pointed out that Bronte is one of the few cities in Texas who do not have the one per cent sales tax.

Balloting in all four of the elections will be held at the city hall, plus a school trustee voting box at Tennyson.

Voting on county school trustees will be held this year in commissioner precincts 1 and 3. Incumbents George Newby and D. O. King are on the ballots for precincts 1 and 3 respectively.

Services Held Here For Mrs. Conner

Funeral services for Mrs. Myrtle Eudean Conner, 66, of Big Spring and formerly of Bronte were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday in the First United Methodist Church, with the pastor, the Rev. Grady Peters, officiating. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Newby Funeral Home.

Mrs. Conner died at 7 a.m. Monday in Methodist Hospital in Lubbock after a short illness.

Born Myrtle Pairish on Jan. 31, 1909, in Erath County, she moved with her parents to Coke County in 1910, and later moved to Big Spring from Bronte in 1966 and was a saleswoman for the National Motor Club.

She was a member of the Order of the Eastern Star No. 362 of Bakersfield, Calif., and the First United Methodist Church.

Survivors include a sister, Mrs. Bonnie McAulay of Bronte; two brothers, John Pairish of Keota, Okla., and J. B. Pairish of Crane; and several nieces and nephews.

Horn Track Team 2nd at Santa Anna

The Bronte Longhorns captured second place in a track meet held last Friday at Santa Anna. The locals scored 55 points to finish behind Bangs who had 77. This was the first action of the year for the Longhorn trackmen.

Leading the local team was Jim Dan Raughton who captured first in both the 120 high hurdles and the 330 yard intermediate hurdles. His time in the highs was 16.5 and in the intermediates, 42.5.

Other Longhorns who placed included Alan Barbee, 2nd in the intermediates with a time of 43.8; Nelson Coulter, 5th in the 220 with a 24.9 time; Paul Cervenka, 5th in the broad jump with a leap of 17' 10"; Marvin Ensor, 6th in the 440 yard dash in 56.2; Mark Lee, 6th in the broadjump; and the mile relay team composed of Raughton, Ensor, Barbee and Coulter, 2nd in a time of 3:42.4.

Several other Longhorns entered in the meet and made good showings but failed to place.

Fikes Named Coke's Top Conservationist for 1974

Weldon Fikes has been selected as the Outstanding Conservationist for the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District for 1974.

Fikes operates several places in the district and has taken an active interest in improving each of the places. Some of the conservation practices that have been applied are: terrace construction, conservation cropping system, pond construction, deferred grazing, proper grazing use, brush management, and range seeding.

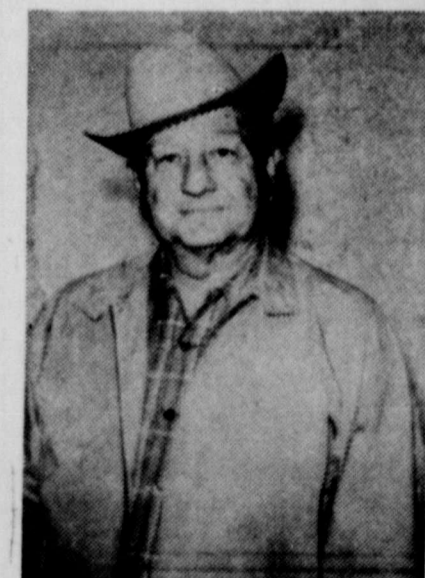
He has taken special interest in improving the productive capacity of the land by controlling undesirable brush species, followed by range seeding of adapted grass mixtures.

The primary grasses that have been seeded are K.R. Bluestem, kleingrass, sideoats grama, blue panic, and green sprangletop. These grasses produce large amounts of high quality forage. They are excellent for protecting the soil from erosion.

Fikes was selected for this honor by the board of directors of the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District.

In addition to his farming and ranching operations, Fikes also serves as Coke County auditor.

He and his wife, Bryce, have three married daughters. They are active workers in Robert Lee Baptist Church as well as civic affairs.

Flanagan Receives 20 Year Award

R. L. Flanagan, local game warden, was awarded a 20 year service pin by the Texas Parks & Wildlife Commission Friday, Feb. 28, at Austin. Flanagan and five other men were presented awards by Pierce Johnson, chairman of the commission. Also on the program was Executive Director Clayton Garrison who reviewed the men's careers with the department.

Flanagan began his work as a game warden in Burnet County in 1954. At the end of that hunting season, he went to Texas A&M for one semester, graduating in May 1955.

After graduation, he was assigned to Edinburg, Hidalgo County, for a short time and then returned to Burnet County where he was stationed at Lake Buchanan from 1955 to 1959. In 1959 he was transferred to Ballinger and came from there to Robert Lee in 1962.

He was born and reared in Comanche County, where his father, C. A. Flanagan, still resides.

He and his wife, Evelyn, are parents of two daughters, Renea, who is a seventh grade student at Robert Lee School and Mrs. Richard (Margaret) Lehr of Odessa, and a son, Randy, also of Odessa. They have one grandson, John Richard Lehr.

HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION WORK TO INCLUDE COKE

Some of the highway construction contracts let in February by the Texas Highway Commission include San Angelo area work.

The work, supervised by Durward R. Watson, district engineer, will be in the following counties: Coke, Concho, Crockett, Kimble, Menard, Reagan, Runnels, Seheicher and Tom Green.

Contract for the work was awarded to Strain Brothers, Inc., of San Angelo. Low bid was \$701,968.96.

The project, which will require an estimated 75 working days, will be under the direction of James R. (Bobby) Evans of San Angelo.

The contract calls for seal coating 152.8 miles of highway.

Actual work in Coke County includes 4.148 miles on State Highway 158 from the Runnels County line to U. S. 277 in Bronte.

Improvements in counties contiguous to Coke County which will be of local interest include 13.231 miles on State Highway 158 in Runnels County west to the Coke County Line. Both of these projects are on the Bronte-Ballinger highway.

Another stretch of improvement is described as 13.130 miles on U.S. Highway 277 from the Coke County Line to the Railroad Crossing. This includes the stretch of Highway 277 from the county line north of Orient to the railroad crossing northeast of San Angelo on the Bronte-San Angelo highway.

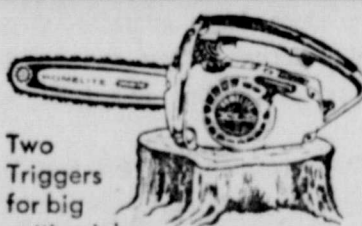

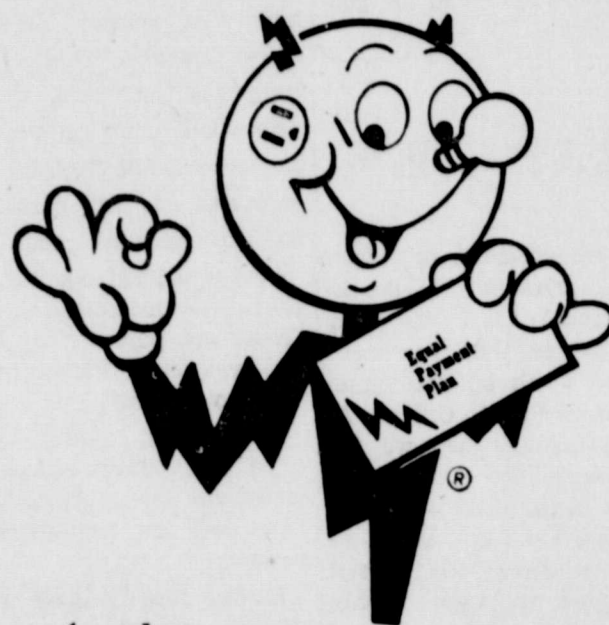

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975**

**NUMBER ONE
ON THE BALLOT
(S.J.R. No. 3)**

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 5 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivisions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

**NUMBER TWO
ON THE BALLOT
(H.J.R. No. 6)**

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$.10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."

FELIX CONTINUES PAUL'S CASE

(News as it might have been written if there had been newspapers 1900 years ago.)

Governor Felix today issued an order continuing the trial of Paul, former Prosecutor for the San Hedrin, until a later date when more witnesses would be available.

Ananias, the High Priest, accompanied by Terullus, the Special Prosecutor, went down to Caesarea to press the case against Paul who was arrested in Jerusalem last week when a riot broke out at the Jewish Temple.

Paul was accused of defiling the Temple, inciting sedition, and being a ringleader of the "Nazarenes." He plead "Not Guilty" to the first two charges, but admitted he was a member of the despised sect who contend that their leader, Jesus, is still alive. Jesus was executed years ago under Pontius Pilate, for alleged blasphemy.

Felix did not set a date for Paul's next trial. Today, Paul acted as his own lawyer and made an impassioned speech before the court.

Years ago this Paul had been hired by the San Hedrin to stamp out the sect called "Christians." After some arrests and convictions, he joined the sect himself and has since been travelling over Asia Minor and Greece, preaching that Jesus is still alive. Everywhere he goes, trouble breaks out. He has been arrested several times, but so far has escaped conviction.
