## Longhorns, Bearcats Dominate 25-B Teams

Both the Bronte Longhorns boys and girls basketball teams claimed several spots on the all-district teams announced this week. The local teams, along with the Hawley Bearcats, dominated the District 25-B selections which were chosen at a meeting held in Abilene Wednesday morning. All five starters for the Longhorns received mention while seven members of the girls team were named.

The Longhorn girls, district champs and third place finishers in the regional tournament, landed three spots on the first team, two on the second and two on the honorable mention list.

Named to the first team were Sherrie Coalson, a junior, at forward; Sherri Cooper, sophomore, at guard; and Sharon Cooper, a senior at guard.

The remainder of the first team included Cindy Collins of Eula and Linda Jordan of Hawley at forward; Terri Scott of Hawley and Rebecca Freeman of Trent at guards.

Named to the second team from Bronte were Leah Barbee, a sophomore, at forward, and Laura Glenn, a junior, at guard. Others named to the second team were Gay Dinson and Julie Henderson of Hawley, Robbie Freeman of Trent, and Mickey White of Eula.

Receiving honorable mention from Bronte were Shelley Cumbie, a sophomore forward, and Debra Hibbs, a senior forward.

The Longhorn boys also did quite well, having two named to the first team, one to the second, and two more receiving honorable mention. The Horns finished second to Haw-

ley in the final district standings. The Bearcats went on to place third in the regional tournament.

Named to the first team from Bronte were Jim Dan Raughton and Alan Barbee, both senior members of the Longhorn team. Other members of the mythical team were Joe Rodriguez and Phil Hay, both of Hawley, and Marshall Connell of Blackwell.

Wayne Alexander was the only Longhorn named to the second team. He is also a senior in BHS. Other members of this team are Don Ely of Blackwell, Terry Goodman of Eula, Don Lambert of Hawley and Steve Bland of Trent.

Given honorable mention from Bronte were Kit Carlton, a senior, and Nelson Coulter, a junior.

April 5 will be voting day in Bronte. Four elections will be held at the city hall on that date. The usual school trustee, city alderman

and hospital district director elections will be held, but qualified voters who reside in the city will also vote on a one per cent city sales tax.

### City Dads Contract For New Fire Truck

Bronte City Council opened bids last Thursday night and purchased a new fire truck for the Bronte Volunteer Fire Department. Total cost of the new unit was \$15,982.

A Ford truck chassis was purchased from Ivey Motor Co. of Robert Lee for \$7,032, while needed fire fighting equipment for the truck was purchased from Fire Appliance Co. of Wichita Falls for \$8,950.

The Wichita Falls firm agreed to deliver the completed unit 120 days after the date when they receive delivery of the truck.

Financing of the new truck was handled with funds from the City of Bronte, Coke County, the city's federal revenue sharing funds and the Bronte Volunteer Fire Department.

One city official told The Enterprise that the new truck will be used exclusively in the city limits of Bronte and not allowed to go out into rough country to fight grass fires. Another truck is being equipped for fighting fires in rural areas.

### WORK DAY SCHEDULED AT LOCAL GOLF COURSE

A work day has been scheduled for Saturday, March 15 beginning at 8 a.m. at the local golf course. Members are urged to bring their hoes, shovels, rakes and other equipment and be there ready to renovate the golf course.

A big majority of incorporated cities in Texas already have the one per cent tax, but Bronte has never voted before on this issue. City officials say they are pushing for its passage, as they have to have more money to make up the additional costs of providing services to citizens at today's inflationary prices. They say it's either an increase in property taxes or a sales tax, if the customary services are to be provided.

Two vacancies exist on the City Council this year and only the two incumbents, L. O. Clark and Louis Thornton, have filed for a place on the ballot.

Considerable interest has been shown in the school trustee election where six candidates are running for the three vacancies which will exist next month. Grady Coulter is the only trustee presently serving who is running for re-election. Others who have filed for a spot on the ballot include Billy Jackson, Jim Morrow, Martin Lee, Luis Charles and A. D. McCarty.

Dale Thompson and Delbert Coalson, the other trustees whose terms expire, are not seeking re-election. Holdover trustees are Glenn Skelton and Russell Carlton, who have one more year of their three year term to serve, and James Oscar Koenig and James W. Lee, who have two more years to serve.

In the election for directors of the East Coke County Hospital District, incumbents C. E. Bruton and Glenn Sims have filed for re-election.

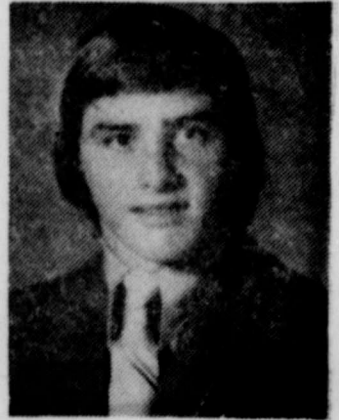

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### Easter Seals Lad Presents First Seals to Governor BRISCOE RECEIVES EASTER SEALS

Easter Seal letters have been mailed to Coke County residents, according to Judge W. W. Thetford, Coke County Easter Seal representative of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas. Thetford serves as contact for disabled persons needing Easter Seal rehabilitation services and also as treasurer of the Easter Seal Appeal in Coke County.

The first sheet of 1975 Easter Seals was presented to Gov. Dolph Briscoe by Jeff Krajca of Wichita Falls, 1975 Texas Easter Seal Child,

in behalf of the state society. Jeff, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Krajca Jr. of Wichita Falls, has been under treatment at the North Texas Easter Seal Rehabilitation Center in Wichita Falls since 1972.

The Texas Easter Seal campaign, which will continue through Easter Sunday, March 30, is to raise funds to help in the treatment and rehabilitation of crippled children and adults in Texas.

The Easter Seal Society of Texas and its affiliates will conduct the traditional Mail Appeal, House to House and Neighbor to Neighbor Campaigns and a variety of events throughout the state. Over 35,000 volunteers, led by Miss Greer Garson, the 1975 Easter Seal Appeal chairman, and 234 local Easter Seal chairmen, will participate in the traditional campaign. Through these volunteers, the Texas Easter Seal Society is represented in every county in Texas.

Coke County contributors are invited to mail or take their donations to the office of Judge Thetford in the Courthouse at Robert Lee.

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## Former RL Man Has Bright Idea

A San Angelo man who grew up in Robert Lee has come up with an idea that has proved to be of great help to farmers and ranchers who carry a rifle in their pickups—and even more help to large number of persons who help in the production of the item.

Johnny Elkins has invented a gun rack which requires no holes to be drilled in the pickup cab in order to mount the rack. Elkins' idea has been found practical, allowing the gun rack to be mounted with blades that fit down between the rubber weatherstrip and the glass in the rear of the pickup cab.

Elkins, a long time carpenter and contractor in San Angelo, is now vice president and general manager of the E-Z Mount Corporation of San Angelo.

In addition to supplying farmers and ranchmen with a useful item in their everyday business, the firm has put hundreds of hands to work which might otherwise be idle. The parts of the rack are manufactured by a Midland plastics firm, but are assembled by residents of the San Angelo Center at Carlsbad. Another sheltered workshop for assembling the product was recently opened in downtown San Angelo and is operated MH-MR Center of San Angelo.

Elkins said when he first had the idea he thought it was a good one and would sell, but added, frankly, he had no money to work with. He took his idea and went to Marvin Hanz, San Angelo attorney and the men formed a corporation with Hanz as president. The two men worked on the design and development and has patents pending.

Another helper in the success story is Elkins' wife, Ann. The two work together in handling marketing of their product and often attend sporting goods shows to demonstrate the merchandise.

Beginning marketing operations from the back of a pickup, the operation has expanded into a nationwide market and into Canada.

Profits from the operation go into a trust fund that supports the workshop, its equipment and supervisors. The mentally retarded workers are paid in accordance with their abilities to get the work out.

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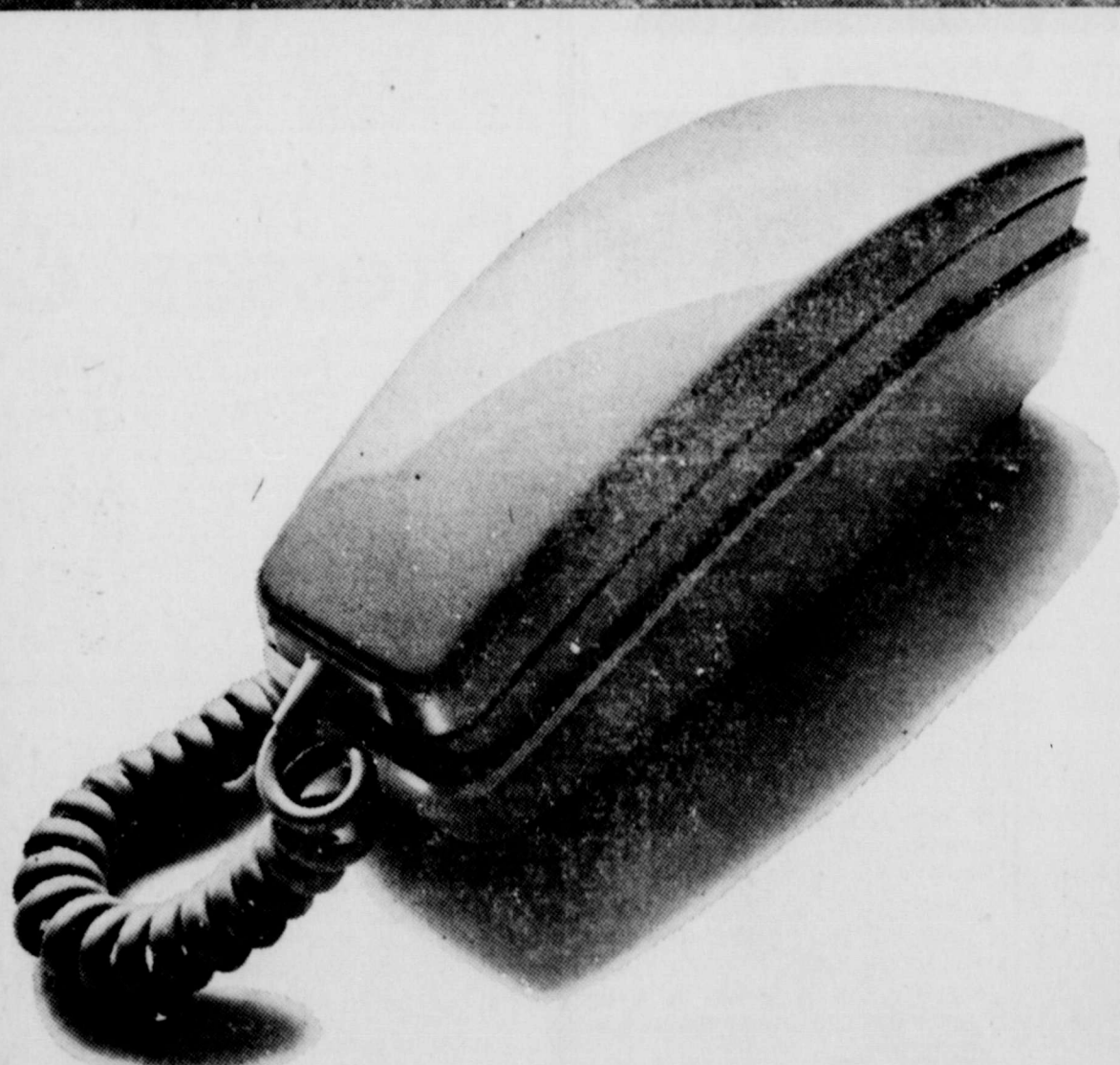

The Bronte FFA Chapter participated in the San Angelo Livestock Show last week in several areas. Marvin Ensor, Kyle Lee and Tim Lee exhibited three finewool lambs in the show. They faced tough competition and did not make the premium sale.

### Calf Scramble

The boys in the calf scramble Thursday night had better luck, as Dale Patterson won first place in the event and Mark Lee placed fifth. Robert Teschendorf also participated but did not place. Twenty boys take part in each calf scramble but only 10 boys can win prizes. Dale received a \$40 certificate and Mark a \$15 certificate which must be used to purchase livestock for FFA projects.

A total of 240 contestants made up the 60 teams entered in the livestock judging contest on Saturday. Representing Bronte were Marvin Ensor, Kyle Lee, David Bachman and Keith Eubanks.

The team score was 1623 out of a possible 1800 points. Awards were given only through third place and the local team did not make the top three. They did make a good showing, however, with a score only slightly below the third place team. Their score was equivalent to a percentage grade of 90.

Bronte judges made the following scores out of a possible 600: Ensor 566; Lee 531; Bachman 526; Eubanks 524.

Eubanks served as an alternate and his score was not averaged in the team score.

Ensor placed fourth in swine judging with 194 points out of a possible 200.

The Nutrition Services Division of the State Health Department says the basic food groups still are the best guide for the average person who needs the strength and vitality to meet each day's challenges. These are divided into the milk group, meat and alternate protein group, fruits and vegetables group, and the bread and cereal group. While giving you sufficient energy, these groups also supply the trace elements of minerals which your body needs.

Calcium, iron and iodine are not the only minerals you need. Most of the others—zinc, copper, sodium, potassium, magnesium and phosphorus—are widely available in so many foods that a little variety in making your choice at the grocery store takes care of them easily. Magnesium, for example, abounds in

beans and dark green vegetables.

Phosphorus shows up in the same foods that supply you with protein and calcium, although leafy vegetables contain little phosphorus.

Vitamin A: This vitamin plays a very important rôle in eye function, and in keeping the skin and mucous membranes resistant to infection. Although vitamin A occurs only in foods of animal origin, the deep yellow and dark green vegetables and fruits supply a material—caroten—which your body can turn into vitamin A. Cheese made from whole milk, or margarine enriched with vitamin A, both supply this vitamin.
