Parker Recaptured After Prison Break

Danny Parker, 21, of Bronte was one of two inmates of the Oklahoma State penitentiary at McAlester who were captured Tuesday after their escape from the prison. Parker and Lonnie Johnson, 25, were taken into custody by a tactical squadron of the Oklahoma Highway Patrol and young female hostages they were nolding were freed.

Parke, is serving a term in the Oklahoma prison for forgery and was due for consideration for release in 22 months.

The following story was released Wednesday by United Press International concerning the escape of Parker and Lonnie Johnson:

MEEKER, Okla. (UPI) - Two prison escapces armed with a rifle and shotgun Tuesday surrendered before a steady advance by bloodhounds and officers, freeing the second of two teen-aged hostages without warning their demands for money and a getaway car

Red haired Kim Thomas, 16, her face stained by tears of joy, emerged from the fugitives' wooded hiding into the embrace of an uncle.

She said she was not hurt, but told officers that near the end of the lengthy ordeal one of the fugitives pointed a gun at her and threatened to "blow my head off."

"You know, I tried to have a conversation, ask them if they were guilty, being in the pen," she said-"They said no. I said well, I can understand that. I go, I want to live, I don't want to die and I'll do


BACK IN CUSTODY - Escapees from the Oklahoma State Prison are back in custody after their recapture Tuesday. Left is Danny

Mr. Litttle was born July 27, 1889. in Travis County and came to the Maverick community with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Little, in 1901.

Ira A. Bird

Pioneer Ira A. Bird 90 Year Old Honoree

Ira A. Bird was born Dec. 15, 1881, in a log cabin on the bank of Falls Creek eight miles from Hico! in Hamilton County. When he was five years old his family moved to the part of Tom Green County which was two years later organized into Coke County. They settled near Yellow Wolf Creek in the little village of Sanco.

Mr. Bird grew up doing all the chores common to an early day family in the country. He attended a one room school, the lumber for which his father hauled in a wagon from Ballinger. When he was 17 years old he took the state examinations and received a First Grade Teacher's Certificate which was the best Teacher's Certificate at that time, and he started teaching his first school which was the Horse Mountain School north of Sanco while he was still 17.

He married Mary Maud Cosby from north of Big Spring when he was 18. When the grasshoppers ate everything in this country, even to the bark on the mesquites, they went to Big Spring where he secured a section of land by taking part in a land rush. While homesteading their land they lived in a half dugout where Mrs. Bird cooked their food on a cow chip fire. Later they moved back to Sanco and still later to their ranch where he has lived ever since. Mrs. Bird died in 1968.

The Birds have two daughters. Mrs. Evelyn McKinley who lives with her father, and Mrs. Nolan Pentecost who ranches with her husband near her father.

Mr. Bird has been engaged in the ranching business all of his life, and has raised registered Hereford cattle for 58 years.

He was elected and served two terms as county commissioner of Coke County. He took the lead in establishing and carrying on the Sanco Camp Meeting for 22 years, and helped sponsor an annual Christian Youth Camp at Sanco for a number of years. He has always been active in community and church work and is a member of the Evangelical Methodist Church.

Mr. Bird has continued very active and alert through his 93 years, and still operates a small part of his ranch and runs a few sheep and a very few head of cattle. He drives his car around the ranch, does a little yard work, reads a lot and remains interested in everything that goes on around him. He feels that keeping busy and interested in things is one secret to living a long and satisfying life.
