Each school district was assessed a local fund assignment of 30 cents per \$100.00 value for 1975-76. In dollars this added a \$41,000 burden to the Bronte District. In 1976-77 the rate will be 35 cents per \$100.00 and will assess the Bronte District an additional \$18,500. This action of the Legislature carries no protest action or reversal decisions.
