## **Bronte Receives** Little Moisture

Bronte and the immediate area have been both lucky and unlucky in the weather situation during the past week.

Bronte has had only a smattering of rainfall, but on the other hand, the city and area have escaped the rampaging tornados and hail storms which have been roaming books-

Traces of rain have been receiv. ed a couple of times, but they were for 1976-77. too light to measure.

Violent weather, which has been plaguing West Texas the past several days, took its toll in the Robert Lee area last Friday evening.

A hail storm which struck about 7 p.m. did heavy damage throughout the city as well as to a considerable strip of rural area in its path.

Virtually every building suffered roof damage, a high percentage of which must be replaced. There were numerous reports of glass breakage and extensive damage to mobile homes and automobiles, many having windshields broken and deep dents left by hailstones ranging up to the size of golf balls. 

I have property which has sustained damage. Who do I report the damage to, the agent or the company? How long will it be before the claim is paid?



Rather than try to contact the company itself, you should contact the agent who wrote the policy. This procedure will usually save time since the agent has all the policy information necessary to report your claim. It depends upon the type of claim as to when it will be paid. If the damage is a result of a major storm, it sometimes takes slightly longer to service due to the excessive numbers of claims turned in. Normally you should be contacted within a week's time. If the damage is quite extensive, your agent should be made aware of this fact. It might be necessary to make immediate, temporary repairs to prevent further damage.
