
The short course, sponsored by the Coke County Program Building Committee, will be held in three. parts, on November 8, 15 and 22. Each of the sessions will be at 7:00 p.m. The Robert Lee State Bank and the First National Bank of Bronte are cooperating in the short course and will provide refreshments for the participants.

The first session on November 8. will be conducted by Robert H. Kensing, Texas Agricultural Extension Service Economist, of San Angelo. Mr. Kensing will discuss the acquisition, use, accumulation, conservation and transfer of properties. Also on the agenda will be estate planning-type of property alternatives for transfer, finding the right kind of help, and managing taxes related to estates, income and inheritance.

The second session, on November 15. will be taught by Robert Owen, Coke County Attorney. Mr. Owens will discuss wifls: what is a will? probating wills, the lega limplications of leaving no will and the legal implications of gifts consisting of real property and or personal

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## Can we afford four more years without effective leadership?

Health Care: "We need a nationwide health care delivery system which will make adequate health care a right for all people."

Have everyone leave the house immediopen to help ventilate.

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


