The screwworm threat no doubt has been lessened by the onset of cooler weather, but six additional cases have been confirmed in Coke County during the past 10 days. The yearly total for the county now stands at 48 cases, most of which came in October.

The most recent cases were re ported by Paul Burns, from his place on the north side of Lake Spence: Roy Tinkler, 12 miles southwest of Robert Lee; and Bobby Roberts, from his place six miles south of Robert Lee. Also, Bryan Gartman, from eight miles north of Robert Lee near Sanco; Barton Waldrop, from his place near Hayrick; and one case by Bill Blair from his place 31/2 miles west of

The threat of screwworms has been lessened by the cool weather, but probably not stopped. During the warm part of the day temperatures will climb high enough to activate insects. We still need to watch for and report possible screwworm cases.


