President Wilson Proclaims it the Duty of Everyone to Answer Enumerators.

Washington .- The following proclamation on the fourteenth decennial by the president of the United States subjects covered by the textbooks upof America:

I, Woodrow Wilson, president of the United States of America, do hereby declare and make known that, under the law aforesaid, it is the duty of longs, and to the farm occupied by him or his family, and that any person Grande near Roma, Texas, in May,

The sole purpose of the census is to secure general statistical information regarding the population and resources of the country, and replies are required from individuals only to permit the compilation of such general statistics. No person can be harmed in any way at Vedder Drug Co. by furnishing the information required. The census has nothing to do with taxation, with military or jury service, with the compulsion of school attenday Long Legs"—but we havent. ance, with the regulation of immigration, or with the enforcement of any national, state or local law or ordinance. There need be no fear that any disclosure will be made regarding any individual person or his affairs. Ruling on Textbook Question Is Rendered

Austin, Tex.-Where the textbook commission has adopted textbooks covering specific subjects it would be without power to adopt a different book being a general treatise on all the subjects theretofore adopted in separate books, and no such general book could be substituted in the schools for the books upon specific jects beretofore adopted, according to an opinion given Friday by the attorney general's department to the textbook committee. The opinion was prepared by Assistant Attorney General C. W. Taylor.

It is further held in the opinion that the textbook commission having adopted textbooks in physiology, physical geography, physics, chemistry and agriculture would be without power to adopt a general science text covering each of these subjects if the same consus of the United States is issued are to be substituted for either of the on specific subjects.







Austin, Tex.—The women voters of DO YOU READ? Texas Saturday won a victory when the Third Court of Civil Appeals in a stitutionality of the woman suffrage Thirty-Fourth legislature, which permits women to vote in primary elections.
