

Justice Dept. okays new voting precincts

The US Justice Dept. has okayed new voting precincts for a majority of Castro County voters.

County-District Attorney Jimmy Davis told County Commissioners Monday the Justice Dept. will not object to the consolidation of the 16 boxes in the county into eight boxes.

"The Justice Dept. won't object to the plan," Davis told the commissioners, "but that won't prevent a suit if some minority group objects. If MALDEF (Mexican-American Legal Defense and Education Foundation) or Texas Rural Legal Aid finds something wrong, I'm sure they will let me know."

"It's obvious the Justice Dept. can't find anything discriminatory," Davis said, "so we're probably safe. I'd say we're 99% safe, and I don't believe myself it's discriminatory in any way."

The new precincts are:
 •Voting Precinct 1 will include all of the old precinct 1,

precinct 5 and precinct 10;
 •Voting Precincts 2 and 3 are unchanged;

•Voting Precinct 4 includes all of old precincts 4 and 8;

•Voting Precinct 5 is the old precinct 6;

•Voting Precinct 6 includes former precincts 7, 14 and 15;

•Voting Precinct 7 contains all of old precincts 9, 14 and 15;

•Voting Precinct 8 includes old precincts 12 and 13.

Voters in Precincts 1 through 4 will vote in Dimmitt, with Precinct 5 voters casting ballots at Hart, Precinct 6 voters going to Flagg, Precinct 7 voters will cast ballots at Frio, and Precinct 8 will vote at Nazareth.

"We will mail a notice to all voters who will be changed to a new precinct," said County Tax Assessor-Collector Billy Hackleman. "Everyone will need to make the change on the voter registration card. We will mail all registered voters in the county a new card next January."

According to exhibits com-

plied by Davis and presented to the Justice Dept., minority voting strength will remain virtually the same in the new boxes.

The commissioner's precincts will remain unchanged.

In other business at the Monday meeting, Davis talked

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Franklin 100 percent sure he's back

"Things just didn't turn out as they should have."

That's all former — and present — Dimmitt police chief Don Franklin had to say about the opportunity that fell through with Littlefield Enterprises Corp. in Brownwood last week.

"I guess I found out the old saying 'If something is too good to be true, it probably is' was right in my case," Franklin told the News last Thursday from his familiar office at the Dimmitt Police Dept. "Things just weren't what they were supposed to be, so I'm back."

Mayor Wayne Collins jokingly said last Thursday the City has not yet decided whether Franklin would have to give back the plaque city officials gave him at a going-away reception on April 30.

"I think we might have to put it in storage," the mayor joked. "Actually, we're glad to get him back. It's always good to have someone of Don's caliber, and it's good that we don't have to look for a new police chief."

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Board approves ladder recommendations

Between 25 and 45 teachers are anticipated to qualify for a \$1,500 bonus after the recommendations of the Dimmitt ISD Career Ladder Committee were approved by the Dimmitt School Board Monday night.

"We don't really know how many teachers are actually going to qualify for Step 2 on the Career Ladder," Supt. Robert Ryan said.

Besides state qualifications requiring that instructors qualify for Step 2 have a Bachelor's degree with three years tenure, or a Master's degree with two years tenure, the Career Ladder committee has also adopted provisions requiring eligible personnel have all "A's" (acceptable to DISD standards) on their 1983-84 evaluations performed by their

school administrators, and have no Corrective Performance Report in their personnel file dated during the 1983-84 school year, and must have tenure in the district.

Teachers qualifying for Step 2 will receive a \$1,500 bonus. The state has appropriated just over \$50,000 to DISD for Career Ladder bonuses for this year, and no local dollars will be used to supplement the bonuses.

"This will not necessarily be the criteria used in future years," Ryan said. "We may decide to raise the criteria to a higher level."

Ryan said about 45 of 128 teachers in the system meet the "all A's" criteria, but the choice of who qualifies for the Career Ladder lies solely with the committee.

"I'm not on the committee," Ryan said, "so I really don't know how many will qualify. I do know many teachers are not happy with the Career Ladder concept, and many will not be

happy with who is chosen to receive the Step 2 bonuses."

Board member Glenn Odom was not happy with what he termed "zero room for error" in the qualification process.

"If someone goes in and says the wrong thing to a principal or someone else, that goes on the report and they're out," Odom said. "I think in the future we probably need to look into that a little further. I think if someone meets the academic criteria, then they deserve a hard look."

The board voted 6-1, with Cheryl Pybus opposing, to departmentalize the fourth

For Gerber, the gold medal Saturday was the seventh she has won in high school, and her sixth in a row — state championships her junior and senior years in cross country, basketball and tennis.

Gerber and Heiman won their semifinal match, 6-0, 6-0, in the quarterfinals over Cervantes-Cantu of Austwell-Tivoli, then breezed past Dankworth-Brosig of Paint Rock, 6-3, 6-0 in the semifinals. Schmucker Saturday knock-

ed 20 seconds off her regional time, when she finished second to Darla Graham of Iraan, with

her 5:25.6 finish. She was bested by Graham (5:18, and also won the 800 meters) and

Cindy Harper of Woodson, who ran 5:19.

defeated in their first round match Friday in Austin by eventual champions Dana Hohn and Staci Lehnberg of Mason, 2-6, 0-6.

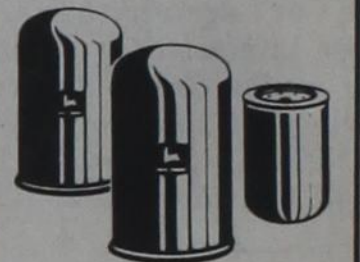

about the possible implications of a February ruling by the US Supreme Court bringing county workers under the provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act.

In several Texas counties, more sheriffs deputies are being hired in lieu of paying overtime, as the court decided in its 5-4 ruling counties should do.

"There are some major problems possible in the Sheriff's Office," Davis said. "They can only work 171 hours each month without the county having to pay overtime. Someone would have to be in charge of keeping very accurate records,

and we would have to keep those records on hand for a very long time."

Sheriff's deputy Jerry Jansa plans to attend a seminar on the implications of the Supreme Court ruling in Dallas on June 5.

Commissioners agreed to take bids for an icemaker for the Expo Building to replace the current machine, which has sustained irreparable damage, and failed to act on a request by Chamber of Commerce manager Delores Heller for use of the courthouse square for a "farmer's market."

County Judge Polly Simpson

said Heller had asked for permission to use the courthouse area so farmers could bring produce and other goods to sell, but commissioners were concerned about cost for liability insurance for the project, and the proposal died for lack of a motion.

Police are questioning a Dimmitt man in the case.

Police have questioned a Hereford man in connection with the attempted sexual assault of the two Hereford women Sunday evening south of Dimmitt.

Police reports indicate the two women were met by a man they knew near Veteran's Park in Hereford, and drove with the man to Dimmitt, where they ate supper.

The women then rode with the man to a county road eight miles south and one mile southwest of Dimmitt, where the man, who told the women he was near Hereford, got out of his pickup, then threatened to sexually assault the women.

One woman tried to run away, and pulled a knife on the man when he caught up with her, police reports indicate.

The report says the man then ran after the other woman, grabbed her by the throat, and tried to assault her. The first woman, meanwhile, flagged down a pickup and told the driver the man was beating up her "sister" (the women are unrelated).

The pickup driver, according to the women, was able to talk the assailant into handing over the knife, but then the attacker tried to pull a gun out of a pocket. The woman and the pickup driver overpowered the attacker and drove to Dimmitt, where they reported the incident to authorities.

A burglary and assault were reported to police early Monday. Mr. and Mrs. Rolando Rodriguez returned from a dance and discovered that their home at 403 NE 5th had been burglarized. Mrs. Rodriguez left to find a phone to call the

police, then returned and went into the kitchen. Apparently the suspect was still in the home and struck Mrs. Rodriguez in the head, then fled.

Rodriguez found his wife unconscious on the floor, and thought that she had fainted. Since she had a past history of high blood pressure, and could not be roused, he took her to Plains Memorial Hospital.

After Mr. and Mrs. Rodriguez returned home from the hospital at about 2:30 a.m., Mrs. Rodriguez saw someone running from their neighbor's yard, heading east. Rodriguez and his brother-in-law followed the subject and spoke to him, but he denied any knowledge of the burglary.

Items taken included a chrome .22 magnum caliber derringer, an AM/FM stereo cassette player, a Winchester .22 LR caliber semi-automatic rifle, and \$64 cash taken from Mrs. Rodriguez's purse.

Entry was apparently gained through the garage entry door at the rear of the house. Police were hampered in their investigation at the scene because the home has no electricity.

Police are asking local merchants to be on the lookout for a stolen money order for \$100, bearing the number 125114 or 125120. The money order had been left blank, and was stolen from the living room of Al Crispin at 209 Wheat. He purchased it Friday and reported it missing Monday. Merchants are asked to call police if a money order with one of the above numbers is presented to them.

Saturday at just past noon, a 1979 Chevrolet two-door driven by Edward Frank Irlbeck, 78, of Dimmitt failed to yield right of way at the intersection of Northwest Fifth and West Bedford, and struck a 1973 Ford four-door driven by Sharon Jones, 33, of Odessa. Irlbeck was ticketed. No injuries were reported. Damage to both vehicles was light.

At 12:38 p.m. Sunday, a 1979 Ford pickup driven by Jerry Matthews, 31, of Dimmitt ran a yield sign at the intersection of Southwest Seventh and Maple, and struck a 1984 Chevrolet Suburban driven by Keith Lowe, 44, of Dimmitt, with Linda Lowe, 37, of Dimmitt as a passenger. The impact forced the Lowe vehicle into the yield sign on the other side of the intersection. The Suburban sustained heavy

damage, and Mrs. Lowe complained of pain, although no injuries were visible. Matthew's pickup had moderate damage to the right front quarter.

Matthews was ticketed for failure to yield and for not having a driver's license with him.

Ramon Sanches Rodriguez, 39, of Dimmitt was driving his 1979 Chevrolet pickup west on East Halsell at about 7:30 p.m. Sunday. He stopped at the intersection with North Broadway, but then pulled into the path of a 1980 Cadillac driven by Irwin Dean Rhodes, 61, of Hereford. Rhodes was driving north, when his car struck Rodriguez's. Rodriguez was charged with failure to yield.

Considerable damage was done by vandals to the former Immaculate Conception Catholic Church building, which had been moved to 701 East Bedford and was currently vacant.

The damage was discovered about 6:15 p.m. Monday. Interior damage included broken bottles and glass on the floor. Every light bulb was broken out, the thermostat was broken, and floor tiles had been pulled up. Also, 26 window panes were broken.

Entry was apparently gained through a window. The north door was left unlocked after the vandals left. The amount of damage is unknown.

May 7, Jesse Vasquez told police the windshield of his 1983 Ford Bronco was broken by a rock thrown by a 13-year-old juvenile who had been arguing with Vasquez's 13-year-old son. Replacement cost is set at \$343.27.

"The problem we are running into is that HB 72 does not allow us to take a child out of, say, social studies to give that child extra help in reading or some other subject," Ryan said. "This would free up our resource people and give the students who need help an opportunity to receive it."

Pybus felt that fourth grade students may not yet be ready to accept the responsibility of moving from room to room for different classes.

The board renewed the contract with the Region 16 Service Center in Amarillo to provide films, audio and tape duplication services, media workshops and selected kits

and other media. The contract with the center will cost about \$3,200.

The board heard reports from Pybus and Deanne Clark about the Texas Association of School Boards Leadership Workshop they recently attended in Austin, and named Clark and Pybus as delegates to the TASB State Assembly in San Antonio in September.

The board also accepted the resignations of Lana Downing, Doug Porter, and Kim Smiley and the retirement of Faye Walker, and voted to hire Randy Waldrip as a new Vocational Agriculture teacher at Dimmitt High School.

Waldrip, who has been student-teaching at Springlake-Earth High School, will replace Jon Davidson, who is moving to White Deer.

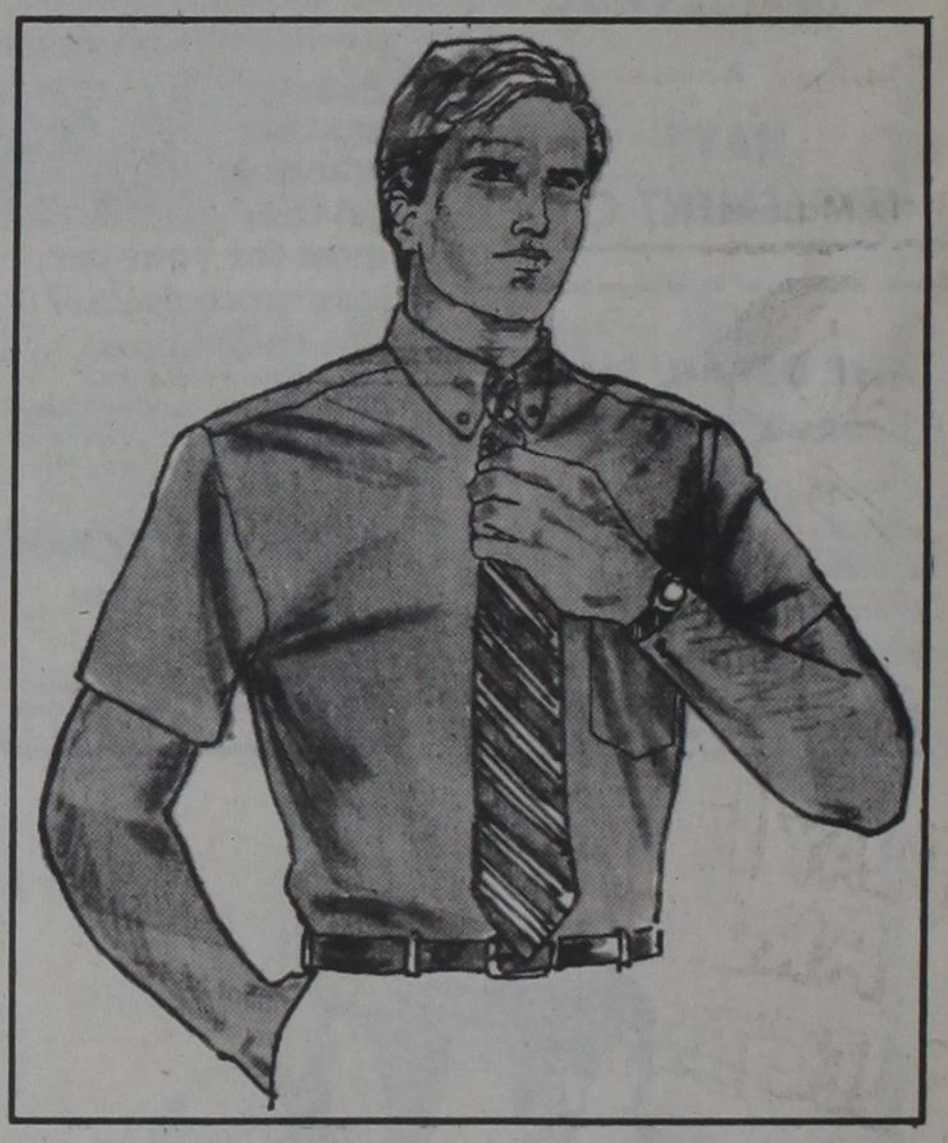

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Barker serves Pakistanis as 'Sister Sharon'

The Muslim women of Multan, Punjab, Pakistan call her "Sister Sharon."

The tall, fair-skinned American woman is a nurse and midwife at the Women's Christian Hospital in Multan, and she helps to bring their children into the world and to keep both mothers and babies healthy.

"Sister Sharon" (the word "sister" is British terminology for "head nurse") is Sharon Barker of Dimmitt, a medical missionary who works with 25 other nurses and midwives, 11 missionaries and 40 midwifery students at the 75-bed hospital.

Barker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elvis Barker of Dimmitt, is fighting an uphill battle against unsanitary folk-medicine customs and the genetic problems caused by intermarriage.

The infant mortality rate in Pakistan is high, with 40% of all children dying by age 5. But the mortality rate is dropping, partly because of the work of such missionaries as "Sister Sharon."

"Most marriages in Pakistan are between first cousins," she said. "The usual match is for the sons or daughters to marry the mother's nephews or nieces. That's where most of the problems come from in childbearing and inherited traits."

In Pakistan, couples don't marry out of romantic love, she explained. Instead, marriages are arranged by the couple's families.

After a three-day wedding celebration, the bride moves in with the family of her husband.

"The ideal woman in Pakistan is one who is a good wife," Barker said. "She shows respect for her husband by being modest in public (keeping her face and body covered at all times — especially her hair, lips and ankles), being faithful, being a hard worker, and bearing children — preferably sons."

If a woman bears healthy

sons, she's in good standing with both the family and Islam society. But if she is barren, or her children are abnormal or all girls, she usually seeks help.

"The illiterate practice is what we call 'folk Islam' — the wearing of charms, the following of superstitions, etc.," Barker said. "The main leader in folk Islam is the 'saint,' who is believed to have special powers and be a special friend of Allah. They work out of 'shrines' that were built in honor of past saints, and practice folk medicine as well as serve as spiritual leaders.

Taking the advice of a 'saint' can be hazardous.

"We had one woman who came to our hospital with her baby almost dead from malnutrition and dehydration," Barker recalled. "It turned out that she had taken the baby to a saint when it was two or three days old, and he told her not to look at her baby for seven days, so she didn't. When she finally did look at her baby, it was dehydrated and malnourished, and she brought it to the hospital. The baby died."

Barren women often will go to a shrine to seek help in becoming fertile.

"If a woman cannot have babies, it's always considered the woman's fault," Barker said. "Also, it's considered the woman's fault if she can't have sons, although anyone with medical knowledge knows better. Yes, we tell them this, but they might not always believe it."

One of the big problems Barker and her staff have to fight is infection among women who have given birth in the customary manner — at home, with delivery by a *dhai* (pronounced "dye"), or lay midwife.

"The *dhais* consider birth a dirty business, and they don't believe in sanitation during birth," Barker explained. "Often a *dhai* will place cow dung on the fire for heat, then go about her business of examining the mother or delivering the baby without washing her hands. Birth-caused infection is quite common, and it can threaten the child's life or cause the mother to become sterile."

Barker's typical workday at the hospital starts at 7:30 a.m., after breakfast at 6:30 and chapel at 7. She and the other members of the hospital's all-woman staff see 120 to 140 patients per day. They conduct clinics in gynecology on Mondays and Wednesdays, prenatal clinics on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and family-planning and post-natal clinics on Saturdays. There are no clinics on Friday (the Islam holy day) or Sunday.

"In our family planning clinics, we encourage the women to space their children at least two years apart," she said. "That's mainly for the benefit of the children."

She added, "The hospital doesn't perform abortions, although we have had some women who requested them."

Although Pakistani customs may seem strange to Americans, ours seem just as strange to them.

"About 30% of their TV programming is from the US," Barker said. "They consider American women very immodest, and American society decadent."

Barker's nurse's uniform in Multan is a white *shalwar-qamiz* — the traditional slit coat with baggy slacks — and black shoes. She also wears a *depata*, a veil draped over the shoulders which can be pulled over the face or head to conform to the country's custom of modesty.

Barker is a registered nurse with specialties in obstetrics, gynecology and pediatrics, and is also a licensed midwife. She has been serving at the Women's Christian Hospital in Multan since September 1981, and will leave Sunday to begin another two-year assignment, following a six-month furlough in the US.

She said she anticipates spending her entire missionary career with the people of Pakistan.

"I feel I'm doing God's will, and I'm serving where God wants me to serve," she said.

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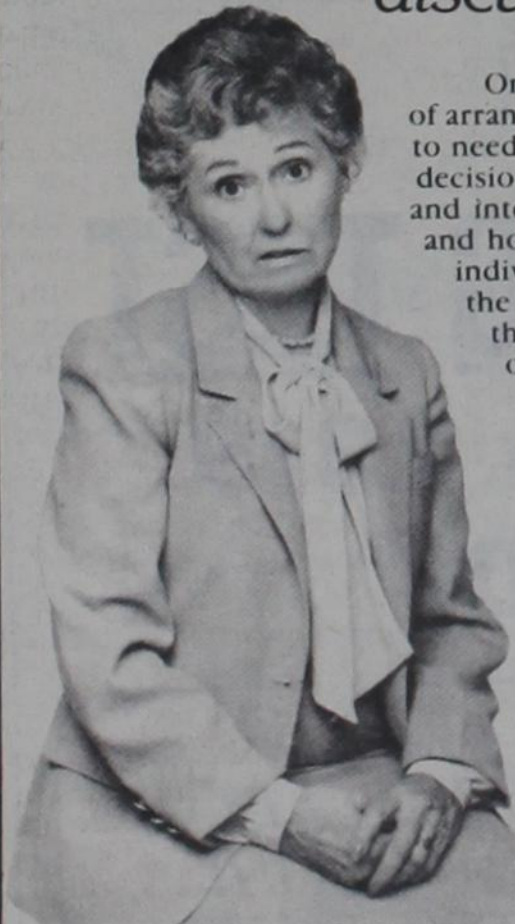
