Owner Has Made a Study of the
SCientific Effect of Goat's Milk on Babies and Says Thousands of Families in city Suburbs of America
Could and Should Raise Nannies.

the credit of having established and
superintended a mollel goat farm fo
the sole purpose of demonstrating that
it is feasible for any private family
with a backyard to keep a goat for its the growing problem of the distribu tion of milk in large cities. She is
Miss Josephine J. Jenks, a daughte of William P. Jenks, a New York Miss Jenks is a mere slip of a girl.
Her interest in goats began when she acquired one for a pet five years
ago and grew until she determined make a hoobby of the raising of nan
nies. She is perhaps the only shep.


She has bullt and laid ont as a re-
sult of her own study and pianning
model barns and pastures on a portion of her father's 800 -acre estate, known
as Mount Kemble Farm, near Morris-
town, N. J. She owns thirty milch goats, about twenty kids and a num
ber of imported bucks. Made Goats a Study
Merely having goats for pets did
not satisfy Miss Jenks. As she grew older, she began to rend about them origin, their needs in the way of pas origin, heir needs in the way of pas
turage and care during the winter months, and finally to determine their
economle value. She read books about economle value. She read books about
goat-raising in foreign countries until she settled in her mind that if it was
fose fensible for familles to use goat's milk
fnstead of cow's milk in Switzerland, Instead of cow's milk in Switzerland,
England, Africa and India it would be fenginde in America. Her father
pampered her hobby and bought her a number of forelgn goots, incluting
some valued at $\$ 500$ each. No shepsome valued at $\$ 5000$ each. No shep-
herdess in France or Switzerinnd was
prouder of her herd than was Miss prouder of her herd than was Miss
Jenks of hers.
But having become interested in

## Country's Output of Gold and Siliver Declining Each Year.

## Production of both gold and silver

 declined last year, Director of the Mint Baker announced in making pub-Hic revised figures which showed the production to have been: Gold, $\$ 60,333$, 400 ; silver, $\$ 63,533,652$. In fine ounces,
the output totaled $2,918,628$ of gold and $56.682,445$ of silver.
The director placed the loss in the production of gold as compared whe
the previous year at $\$ 8,313,300$, while he slump in silver mining reduced the utput by $11,127.000$ ounces.
California led in the production of gold, the state's output being 841,838
ounces, worth $\$ 17,398,200$. Colorado anked second with a gold production 481,984 ounces, valued at $\$ 9,963,500$. production of silver with an output of rent market about $\$ 16,800,000$. Utah was second with 12,542,623 ounces.
