At one time it looked as though Mason would be able to secure a modern and up-to-date High School Building by no other method than through private donations, at the very least there is left to mebut the amendment to the State Constitution carried last November, making it possible for school districts to levy a rate of and not to exceed \$1 on the \$100 valuation of taxable property. Prior to that election a 50 cent tax rate was the limit, and while the Mason Independent School District has assessed the 50 cent tax rate for several years, the money derived therefrom was not sufficient to run the school and at the same time create a sinking fund with which to make any improvements in our school building. A bond issue to meet the requirements of our building needs is now possible whereby a few months ago it was not, because the tax rate could not be raised above 50 cents and that amount would not carry a bond issue, after the expense of running the school was paid. It is estimated that in order to float a \$75,000 bond issue, it will require only a slight increase in the present assessed tax rate of 50 cents on the \$100 valuation of taxable property.

Mr. J. S. King, assessor for the Mason Independent School District, informs us that the present valuation of taxable property in the Mason Independent School District amounts to a little more than \$1,800,000. Now, if the reader wants to have the pleasure of figuring this proposition out for himself, let him do do; taking the valuation at round figures as stated above. The tax rate has been 50 cents and the amount of money derived for school purposes therefrom would be \$9,000. This amount runs the school and the increase over the 50 cent rate, to float a \$75,000 bond issue can be figured easily, since such an issue would require but an additional \$1875 a year to be raised. The interest to be figured at 6 per cent and the bonds to run for a period of 40 years.





HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11

Proposing an amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Legislature may grant pensions to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows, who have been citizens of Texas since prior to January 1, 1910, providing that all soldiers, sailors and their widows eligible under the provisions hereof shall be entitled to be placed upon the rolls and participate in the pension fund created hereunder; levying a tax of seven \$(\$.07) cents on the \$100 valuation of property in this State for the payment of such pension, providing that the Legislature may reduce the rate of pension for such purpose, fixing a time for the election to be held on such amendment, and making an appropriation to pay the expenses thereof.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 51: The Legislature shall

have no power to make any grant or

authorize the making of any grant of

public money to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever, provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent or disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors, who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1910, and to their widows, in indigent circumstances and who have been bona fide soldiers or sailors prior to January 1, 1910, and to indigent and disabled sol-State of Texas during the war between as may be required of him by law. Said election the protection of the frontier against of the militia of the State of Texas who were in active service during the war between the states and to the widows of such soldiers who are in indigent circumstances and who were married to such soldiers prior to January 1, 1910, provided that the word "widow" in the preceding lines of this Section shall not apply to women born since the year 1861, and all soldiers and sailors and widows of soldiers and sailors eligible under the above condition shall be entitled to be placed upon the pension rolls and participate in the distribution of the pension fund of this State under any existing law or laws hereafter passed by the Legislature, and also to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law, provided the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home. There is hereby levied in addition to all other taxes heretofore permitted by the Constitution of Texas a State ad valorem tax on property of seven (\$.07) cents on the \$100.00 valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the organizations and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia; provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate herein levied, and provided further that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases

of public calamity. Sec. 2. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 2, Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by providing that only native born or naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State, and permitting either the husband or the wife to pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt therefor, and permitting the Legislature to authorize absentee voting.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as heeafter to the receipt therefor, and permitting read as follows:

Section 2. Every person subject to voting." none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a quali fied elector; provided, that electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt Confederate army and navy, frontier therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. 

Section 1. That Article 17, Section 58. of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter

The Legislature shall have full power and authority to provide by law for the management and control of the Prison System of Texas; and to this end shall have power and authority to place the prison system under the supervision, management Practice State and Federal Courts, and control of such officer or officers as the Legislature may from time to

time provide for by law. Sec. 2. The above constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words: "For the amendment of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners." And all those opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words: 'Against the Amendment of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commission-

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law.

Sec. 4. The sum of \$5,000.00 or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.
