It is stated that the proposed increase in maintenance tax carried by a vote of 35 to 6 and the election pertaining to the issuance of bonds for a school building carried by a vote of 36 to 5.

Constitution to be Texas ments to the place. voted on by the people at a special election to be held July 23, are:

Abolishment of offices of the three prison commissioners, and placing management of the prison system under one hand.

Increasing salaries of the Governor from \$4,000, to \$8,000; Attorney General from \$4,000 to \$7,500; Land Commissioner from \$2,500 to \$5,000; State Comptroller from \$2,500 to \$5,000 and Secretary of State from \$2,000 to \$5,000.

Increasing the Confederate pension tax from 5 to 7 cents on the \$100 procerty valuation. Adoption of this amendment would give the Confederate veterans a material increase in pensions.

Increasing per diem of members of the Legislature from \$5 to \$10 per day for a session of 120 days, and \$5 per day thereafter. The lawmakers now receive \$5 per day for a regular session of sixty days and \$2 per day thereafter. The amendment also proposes to reduce the mileage or traveling expenses to one-half of what it is at present.

Providing that only native born or naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State, and also providing that either the husband or wife may pay the poll tax of the other and permitting the Legislature to authorize absentce vot-


in the event this amendment should be adopted a person would have to be fully naturalized before being permitted to vote, also it would authorize a person to vote in a general election without being present, just as it now permitted, under the abseutee voting law, in primary elections.





After a short business session the meeting was closed and a social hour enjoyed by all present. . During this hour, delicious refreshments of ice cream and cake were served to the fol-



Plant Care.

The room in which palms and geraniums are kept should not be allowed to get cooler than 40 or 45 degrees. The palm should be placed in a partly shaded spot, but never where it may come in contact with gas or cold draughts. It should never be placed in the direct rays of the sun. The leaves should occasionally be sponged with fisholl soap and warm water. It should not be too well watered, and perfect drainage is necessary to successful culture. The geranium requires plenty of sunlight and its roots should be kept moist. It should be sprayed with tepid water occasionally to keep the foliage bright and green and prevent dust from lodging on the leaves.



COTTON ACREAGE IN TEXAS

IS REDUCED 4,000,00 ACRES

DALLAS, Tex., June 15 .- The cotton acreage of Texas will be reduced approximately 4.000,000 acres this year, according to the report compiled by E. F. Shropshire, Director of the Cotton Division of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, which estimates the reduction at ::3 per cent. This report is made up as an average arrived at from nearly 2,000 estimates made by the county judges, bankers, and secretaries of commercial and agricultural organizations for the various counties. Reports were made from 170 cotton counties and some counties were represented by as many as 38 estimates. "This report further indicates a re-

duction in the use of commercial fertilizer in that part of the State where it is used, of approximately 65 per cent, which naturally means a further decrease in yield of the acreage painted in those counties." Mr. Shropshire ; your little girl lives?" said.






