BELL CASTING IN OLD JAPAN People Gather in Thousands to Wit-
ness Ceremony Which Has Deep
Religious Significance.
The making of the bell in old Japan was accomplished by great and solemn
rites. Marjorie Latta Barstow writes Asia. For months, sometimes for years, the community had been con-
tributing of its bronze and copper ornaments and precious possessions.
For many days before the casting there were prayers to determine the
auspicious moment at which to begin,
and to put all spiritual beings and ministers of grace in a propitlous
nood. Pilgrims came from all the wood. Pilgrims came from all the
surrounding country, for the Japanese
