HIGH SCHOOL TO IN-ICE TRUCK COLLIDES CREASE LENGTH RECI-PERIOD SOON

SCHOOL DAY WILL BE MADE FOR-TY MINUTES LONGER IN HIGH SCHOOL

At a meeting of the high school faculty Tuesday afternoon it was decided to change the schedule of classes in order to provide class periods of 45 minutes instead of 40, as has been the case here for a number of years. This change was made necessary by a recommendation of the State Committee on Affiliation, and by the large classes this year.

In order to provide for this lengthened class schedule, the school day will be made forty minutes longer. That is, school will begin at 8:40 in the morning. The noon intermission will be only 50 minutes instead of sixty, dismissing at twelve and taking up again at 12:50 instead of one. School will then dismiss at 4:10 instead of fear. This change will not affect the grades below the high school except for the ten minutes at noon

It has been decided by the faculty also that two credits toward graduation be allowed on music, debating, declaiming, or athletics, provided the work done is approved by the faculty. ANIMAL'S LEG BROKEN BY FORD AT THE NOV. EXHIBIT CAR; NEITHER RIDER NOR DRIVER INJUKED

"Mike" Beyer, who drives the ice wagon for the Mason Ice f Power Company, and Walter Jacoby were the parties who escaped uninjured in an accident which occurred Wednesday morning on the street just south of Grosse's Lumber yard and immediately in the front of the residence of A. E. Grosse, when "Mike" who was traveling northward in the ice wagon, met Mr. Jacoby on a horse. The car was so close when Mr. Jacoby noticed it that he could not get his horse out of the way, and the front of the car struck the animal on the hind leg, breaking it in two places.

Upon being struck, the animal fell and Mr. Jacoby managed to escape uninjured, and Mr. Beyer was only jolted a little, the car not being damaged.

The accident occurred shortly after eight o'clock Wednesday morning, and according to reports from parties who witnessed the accident, Mr. Jacoby who is employed as a workman in the construction of a barn on Post Hill, had borrowed the horse from Mr. Gus Eckert to come to town to get some nails, and had just gotten on the animal in front of Mr. Grosse's Lumber Yard and started off with the package of nails in his hand. He was riding on the left side of the road and when he discovered the car approaching, he attempted to turn stid farther to the left and Mr. Beyer turned to the right became excited and as a result the accident occurred.

Fortunately, neither Mr Beyer nor the horse which had its leg broken was killed a short time afterwards, to prevent it from suffering intense pain caused by the injury.



2990 Convicts in Texas Prison, Month's Report

Austin, Tex .- The monthly report of the board of prison commissioners for August, as submitted to Governor Neff, was made public Thursday. The report shows that the number of convicts in Texas penitentiaries August 31 was 2,990, there having been 92 new convicts enrolled during that month.

According to the report 30 escaped during August and 16 were recaptured, leaving a balance of 14 which will be carried on the September report, very probably. Of the 30 that escaped the forth in the report. Two were returned for violation of parole and one returned voluntarily from parole and one from furlough.

Texas Makes Record In Road Building

Austin, Tex .- At the close of the fifth fiscal year since the passage of the federal aid road act, which was signed by the president July 11, 1916, the states and federal government had completed 7,469 miles of road and 17,-977 miles additional were under construction and half completed.

Texas ranked first in the number of miles completed, with 682 miles out of 7,469, the total for all states.

The total estimated cost of the 682 28-2tp miles was \$5,812,851, of which \$2,446,-065 was federal aid. Texas also comes to the front with 1,631 miles under construction, leading Iowa, second to Texas, in the number of miles under construction, by almost 500 miles.

> The total estimated cost of the 1,631 miles under construction is \$23,485,-280, of which \$8,947,190 is federal aid, being over \$2,000,000 more than her closest second.

WORK DONE BY HUMAN HEART

Doubtful If Any Machine Made to Man Can Equal It in Amount cal Labor Performed.

The pulse of the great Napoleon is said to have made only 50 beats a minute. Eighty is not an unusual number. But, supposing the case of a heart that beats 75 times a minate. expelling ten cubic inches of blood at each "stroke," it is apparent that the little pump delivers 45 cubic inches in one hour, over a million cubic inches in a day, or (as may easily be reckoned) about seven thousand tons of vital fluid in a twelvemonth. In figuring this out, a scientist calls attention to the fact that a human heart has four compartments-two auriges and two ventricles. The auricles are merely reservoirs. The energy developed by the pump is furnished by the right and left ventricles-the right one sending impure blood to the lungs and the left one forcing the pure blood into circulation. The left ventricle alone uses in a day enough energy to raise one ton 90 feet. All the blood pumped by one heart engine in one year world suffice to fill a tank 61 feet long, 61 feet wide and 61 feet high. Or. # the tank were cylindrical and 50 feet in diameter, it would have to be 135 feet high in order to hold the 1,730,-000 gallons pumped by a single heart in the course of a year.

Puncture-Resisting Tire.

A newly patented puncture-resisting tire has two ring-shaped sections of molded rubber sponge, one fitting within the other, and the whole closely filling the tire casing. The inner ring occupies the center of the tire. It is of variable size, and serves as a wedge to spread out the outer ring. The larger it is the more it compresses the air cells, and the greater the pressure on the tire. The wir cells, existing in great number, ere claimed to give greater resilience than the single air-inflated inner tube.
