County Judge, John T. Banks, informs us that while in Austin recently he made a personal visit to Governor Neff in the interest of securing a pardon from the State prison for Clarence Barber, who was sentenced to two years from this place at the March term of District Court last year on a charge of burglary.

Judge Banks says Governor Neff gave him a hearing on the subject, but announced that it would be impossible for him to grant Barber a pardon at this time. He gave as his reason that there are now about 1500 young men serving terms in the State Penitentiary for first offenses and who have served a greater portion of their time than has Barber and have records as good as Barber's, and he said it would not be justice to those fifteen hundred young men to grant a pardon to Barber when they rightfully feel that they should have a pardon before him.

COMPTROLLER TO COUNTY TAX ASSESSOR; WOMEN'S POLL TAX

"You are instructed to assess all male and female inhabitants of the County, between the ages of 21 and 60 years, (where they have no legal exemption) an annual poll tax. You are also instructed to assess husband and wife jointly with all community property owned by them, and assess each with a poll tax on the same inventory, where both are liable for a poll tax.

As there has been some controversy among various citizens regarding the legality of assessing women for poll tax, the above paragraph, which recites the law governing the matter, is published in order to alleviate any doubt which may be entertained by the general public on this particular subject.

RUSH PRELIMINA Y WORK ON NATION-WIDE HIGHWA'S SYSTEM

Highway construction will not be delayed by the requirements of the new Federal highway act. The Federal highway system will consist of roads not exceeding 7 per cent of the total in any State, designated by the State and approved by the Secretary of Agriculture. Work is being rushed by all the highway departments on the preparation of maps of the proposed system, but naturally such an important matter will take some little time and consideration. The Government suthorities will insist that important through routes meet at State lines which require conferences between authorities of different States.

In order that work will not be delayed pending the approval of each State system the Secretary of Agriculture has amended the Rules and Regulations for Federal Aid to permit the in mediate construction of such roads as it may reasonably be anticipated will become part if the system.

State nighway officials are being advised that the anticipated route of which the reads to be built is a part should be as long as practicable, preferably entirely across the State. A map must be submitted showing the route, other possible routes and connecting routes. If this is found satisfactory the project will be spproved for immediatte construction.

The State of Washington submitted on December 27 the first conplete State system, and others are expected in a short time.

\$9,000 DEPOSIT RECOVERED

Dr. Aureliano Urrutha recovered judgment in the Seventy-third District Court yesterday morning from the State National Bank in the sum of \$9,-000 plus the interest on that amount from April 18, 1921, the date upon which Urrutia claimed he was refused payment of the whole of \$15,000 alleged to have been deposited in the bank April 12, 1921.

Urrutia's petition recited that he had deposited \$15,000 and that when he had attempted to check it out later the bank would not pay him but \$6,000. The bank contended that a mistake had been made by the employe in making out the deposit slip. The bank claimed that the employe had found his mistake immediately after Urrutia left the bank, but that when Urrutia was asked to consent to a correction, he refused to do so .---San Antonio Express.

Just Supposing.

Condition of Affairs Would Seem to Prove That Mother Nature Can Make Errors.

A freak of nature, proving of more than ordinary interest, is a goodp sized island in Puget sound, which is apparently dying from old age. It was observed last summer that every fir and cedar tree on the island was dead. About the water's edge vegetation appeared withered and a thin vapor hung over the island during the day. Never inhabited, and about 100 acres in extent, the island has for years been noted for its growth of wonderful trees.

Firs three feet in diameter grew so thickly as to make travel through them almost impossible. Both cedar and alder flourished. The ownership of the tract has been in litigation for years and the timber could not be logged.

Now there is not a living thing on the island. Not a crow rests on the dead tops, and as boats pass, an occasional crash tells of the falling of a great tree.

Scientists who have visited the island in the last few months believe the land has soured. The growth of trees and vegetation has been so rapid and dense as to exhaust the humus in the soil. Another theory is that the soil rests on a rock base and the rootlets of the plants have come into contact with the brine of Puget sound to such an extent that the salt has burned out the plant life.

FRENCH FARMERS MADE GAINS

Assertion That They Realized Large Financial Benefits From the War Seems Reasonable.

A class of French society that gained large financial benefits from the war is the farmers. They have become of late a great force in French politics, thus far only defensively, in avoiding taxation, but later they will surely grow more aggressive.

In the old days many, if not most, of them used to rent the land they tilled, but now the tenant farmer has ceased to exist-they have all recently bought their farms. There were 2,000,000 American soldiers in France, and it is estimated that, on an average, they spent a dollar a day apiece out of their own pockets; this makes \$2,000,000 a day, and most of it went to the French farmers, to say nothing of the millions spent by our government to

supply rations to these very soldiers. The difference between the city profiteers and the farmers is that the former are few, while the latter represent a very large vote, which has the same results that it would have in any

other republic, viz., those representing the large vote are not taxed! The needs of the French budget will doubtless bring about a correction of this state of affairs, when the farmer vote will have to pass from the derill in the Outlook.

Japanese Glycerin Production.

Until the outbreak of the war all the glycerin used in Japan was imported from the United States and European merce (Shanghai), but the enormous demand resulting from the war led to the establishment of a factory under the protection of the Japanese government, which has reduced somewhat the volume of imports of glycerin. Originally the manufacturers of glycerin in Japan used only fish oil, but are now adding to the supply by using tallow, vegetable wax and coconut and bean oils. China's imports of glycerin during 1920 showed a fair increase. Out of a total valued at about 107,000 haikwan taels, the United Kingdom supplied over 60,000 taels' worth; Japan, 25,000 taels; the United States, 11,000 taels; the Netherlands, 3,000 taels, and Switzerland, 2,500 taels, while Germany also sent some small supplies. Shanghai is the largest absorbing center, taking about 63 per cent of the total importations of glycerin into China, (The average value of the haikwan

Church Treasure Recovered.

LYCURGUS DID NOT "BELONG" Old Gentleman Wrong in Classing Him

as One of Seven Wise Men of Greece.

The seven wise men of Greece, whose names and sayings have come down to us from antiquity, have been distinctly secondary in renown recently to the several score wise men of the nations gathered here in the conference on the limitation of armaments.

But the ancient wise men are not forgotten. Here and there are men who treasure the sayings which those worthies handed down to us. They are keen on the proper prenunciation of their names, and know to a degree in which Grecian state they lived. One of these scholars came in last week to settle a dispute, says the Washington Star. Several of his friends, in whom the fine flower of learning had not withered any more than it had in him, were disputing about those seven wise men of Greece.

"They could only think of six," declared the gentleman, nodding his white head. "I said the seventh was Lycurgus. Am I right?"

The seven wise men of Greece, not having figured in the news for a few years, it was no easy task to locate them. But a fat volume finally gave them up-and Lycurgus was not in the list.

Blas, Chilo, Cleobulos, Pittacos, Solon. Thales and Perlander were the seven wise men. Everybody remembers Solon as the man who got off that really tremendous saying "Know thyself." Cleobulos is credited with a good one too. "Avoid extremes." This latter is the famous "golden mean" of Epicurus.

FRUIT OF AMERICAN ORIGIN Gourd Known as the "Pantama" in the Canary Islands Long Known to Mexican People.

In Spain and the Canary islands has long been grown a kind of gourd, the size of a small watermelon, green blotched with white, which is very good to eat. It is called "pantama," and until recently botanists have supposed that it came from the Far East. It turns out, however, that this gourd is of American origin, and was fore the days of Cortez and Montezuma, being known to them as "chilacayote," the Detroit News states.

A curious thing about it is that its white flesh, when the gourd is cooked. resolves itself into long filaments resembling vermicelli. Cut in quarters ferred to cold water, whereupon with same amount as before. a little stirring, the pulp detaches itself from the rind and takes the form of slender threads, which may be served with soup, with milk, "au gratin" with cheese, or in various oth-

er ways. In the Canary islands the vermicellilike filaments are converted into a delicious candy by putting them into boiling sirup and cooking until the sirup cracks in cold water. The candy thus made is pretty, transparent, light yellow in color, and is called "angels' hair.'






Meanwhile, Louise Birch, the best beloved aunt, sat frowning at the blue and red fire fairies, dancing impudently over the crumbling log.
