Program scheduled on lowering estate taxes

Farmers and ranchers have been concerned for years about high taxes that erode their estates. Now the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has developed a special program to help take the bite out of high estate taxes.

Three two-day seminars are planned which will help farmers and ranchers learn how to reduce taxable estates and learn new methods for passing their operations to the next generation.

These special seminars on "How to Lower Your Estate Tax Burden" are scheduled in Lubbock June 18-19, in Wichita Falls July 22-23, and in Amarillo Aug. 27-28.

Each seminar will begin with a discussion on estate taxes, including deductions, expenses and tax rates, points out Dr. Wayne Hayenga, a lawyer and Extension Service economist.

Basic estate planning devices will be explained in depth. Among these are wills, by-pass trusts, gifts, equalizing estates, disclaimers and property titles.

There will also be a separate segment of the program devoted to treating beneficiaries fairly.

Another discussion will

center on estate planning tools for agriculture and will deal with corporations, partnerships and selling part of the business to heirs.

The second day of the program will be devoted to special estate tax rules for agriculture. These include special farm land valuation, deferred estate tax payment rules, life insurance, "flower" bonds and other property.

Joining Hayenga in conducting the program will be Extension economists Marvin Sartin, CPA, and Norman Brints.

Estate planning is a step toward reduced taxes, points out Hayenga. This program should start when you plan to inherit substantial property, when you have an active and growing business, when you still have time to take tax-saving actions, when you have minor children, and when your children marry or divorce.

Grain Sorghum Board calls for nominations

Grain sorghum producers in a 29-county area of the Texas High Plains will elect four members to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board Sept. 15.

Terms of four current board members expire at that time. They are K. B. Parish of Springlake, Larry Witten of Olton, Ralph Mabry of Lubbock, and C. P. Smith of Hale Center. All incumbents are eligible for re-election to the six-year, non-salaried position as long as they are bona fide grain sorghum producers.

Any person in the 29-county TGSPB area who produces grain sorghum and is subject to the board assessment is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their

tenants and sharecroppers. Any person eligible to vote is also eligible to make nominations for director.

Qualified persons wishing to have their name placed in nomination for membership on the board may do so by application to the organization, signed by himself and 10 others who are also eligible to vote.

All nominations must be filed by Aug. 15, at the TGSPB office, Box R, Abernathy, 79311, to allow time for adding their name to the ballot. Forms are available at that office.

Ballots will be mailed to voters and must be returned to the TGSPB office by Sept.

15. Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot by Sept. 2, may obtain one at the local county agent's office.

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Alcoholism hearing set Friday in Tulia

Residents of Briscoe, Swisher, Castro, Parmer, Deaf Smith and Oldham Counties are being invited to participate in an alcoholism hearing Friday at 1:30 p.m. in the Swisher County Courthouse in Tulia.

The purpose of the meeting is to give area citizens a chance to learn about alcoholism treatment programs and legislation that effects alcoholism programs.

During the meeting, presentations will be made by Jim Anderson, director of the Panhandle Alcoholic Recovery Center, John Velky, area coordinator for the Texas Commission on Alcoholism; and Wayne Hughes, regional alcoholism services director for the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. The PRPC is co-sponsoring the meeting.

Anderson's presentation will center on the PARC facility located at the old

Amarillo Air Force Base. Anderson has been director of the facility for almost a year. He will also talk about the operation of the MH/MR Regional Family Service Center.

Velky will present an update on major legislation that affects the alcoholism field. He will discuss a bill that would change the legal status of the public inebriate and another measure that would take funds from the liquor by the drink tax and divert them for the use of alcoholism treatment programs on the regional level.

Another aspect of the hearing will be an explanation of the Regional Alcoholism Advisory Committee by Hughes. The committee is being re-organized on a regional basis, and Hughes hopes to get local citizens involved in a policy-making board. In the near future the committee could be making major decisions about alcoholism programs in the Panhandle. That will be particularly true if the state legislature agrees to release additional liquor tax money for the TCA to pass through to regional programs.

The fate that befell Humpty Dumpty is hurting egg producers according to the U. S. D. A. which reports although the average U. S. laying hen produced a record 243 eggs last year, that total could have been as high as 260 per hen, had the shells been just a fraction sturdier. Not only a direct cash loss to the producer, shell breaks also cause additional problems in terms of appearance, for example. One broken egg in a carton can soil the others, classifying the entire contents as "dirty". Shells too fragile for mechanized gathering systems result in a 7 percent loss even before they leave the hen house, according to some estimates. Studies completed in 1970 indicated that up to 11.8 percent of eggs were cracked or smashed between nest and carton. Research continues for a solution which will toughen up shells while not causing any reduction in the quality of the egg itself.

Hance says antibusing vote is 'move in right direction'

US Rep. Kent Hance said the House approval of an antibusing amendment last week "is a step in the right direction, but stronger action is needed still."

"The House approved antibusing language on the Justice Dept. authorization bill that forbids the department from bringing "any sort of action to require directly or indirectly" the busing of students to any school but the one closest to their home, except when special education is needed.

This would virtually take the government out of the desegregation business, since

Congress has already stopped the Justice Dept. practice of cutting off federal funds to schools to force them to implement busing.

"The effect of the language we approved would be to prevent the Justice Dept. from filing or intervening in court suits which seek to desegregate school systems by busing students beyond the neighborhood school," Hance said. "School districts presently under court order will not immediately change, but the Justice Dept. cannot now reinstate most of those same suits which have a time expiration date. We should begin to see relief over the next two or three years at most of the affected school districts."

Although the Justice Dept. could not intervene in legal battles, the bill would not prevent federal courts from ruling on busing suits brought by individuals.

"The House and Senate both passed this bill last year and it was vetoed by the President," Hance explained.

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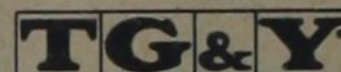

Social Security in Castro County

Young people planning to work for the first time this summer should be aware that the first step is to get a social security number — and the time to take that first step is right now.

Many young people may not realize that getting a social security number takes a little longer today than it did for their parents. Mom and dad probably walked into a social security office one day and walked out with a social security number and card. Today many of you can even apply by mail if you wish, but either way it takes about six weeks to receive a social security number and card.

The major reason for the difference is that the application is now more closely scrutinized to assure the applicant's correct identity, age, citizenship, or lawful alien status.

When the social security system first started 45 years ago and in its early years, the concern was to make it as easy as possible for people to get a social security card. Now that the system is a household word — the nation's primary means of providing an income to a family at the retirement, death, or disability of the breadwinner — the major concern is that the card and the rights it represents are protected from fraud and

abuse. Moreover, the social security number represents your key to your earnings record and future benefits based on it. Eligibility for benefits is based on your date of birth, and the amount is based on your covered annual earnings shown in your record over your working lifetime. Incorrect information on the application for a number could seriously affect your benefit rights later.

Many employers will not hire you unless you can show a social security card because the law requires them to collect and pay social security taxes on the earnings of each person they employ, and they need a correct social security number for this purpose.

People 18 or over must apply for a card in person, but people under 18 may apply by mail or phone.

If you were born in the United States, a birth or baptismal record will be necessary for proof of age and citizenship. For proof of identity, you may accept any document which includes your signature, photograph or physical description, such as driver's licenses, draft card, voters registration card, marriage record, school identity card, newspaper birth announcement, and similar documents.

If you were born outside the United States but are now a citizen, you will need to submit either a US passport, a naturalization certificate, a US citizen identity card, a certificate of citizenship, or a consular report of birth.

If you are not a US citizen but are living in or visiting the US and want to apply for a social security number, you will need an Alien Registration card I-151 or I-551, or US Immigration Form I-94, I-185, I-186 or I-586 (and SW-434, if applicable), I-95, I-184, or other appropriate immigration forms. You will need to bring them to the office in person.

Wright was a 1976 graduate of Dimmitt High School.

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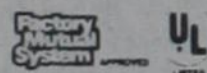

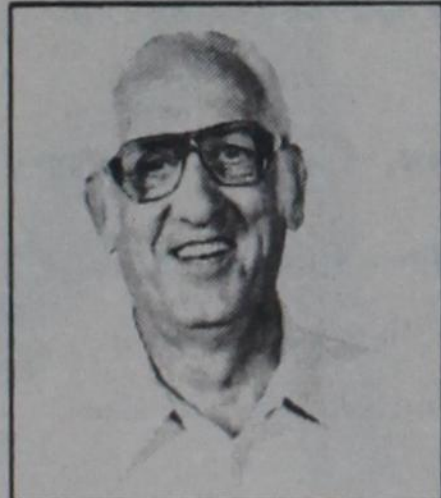

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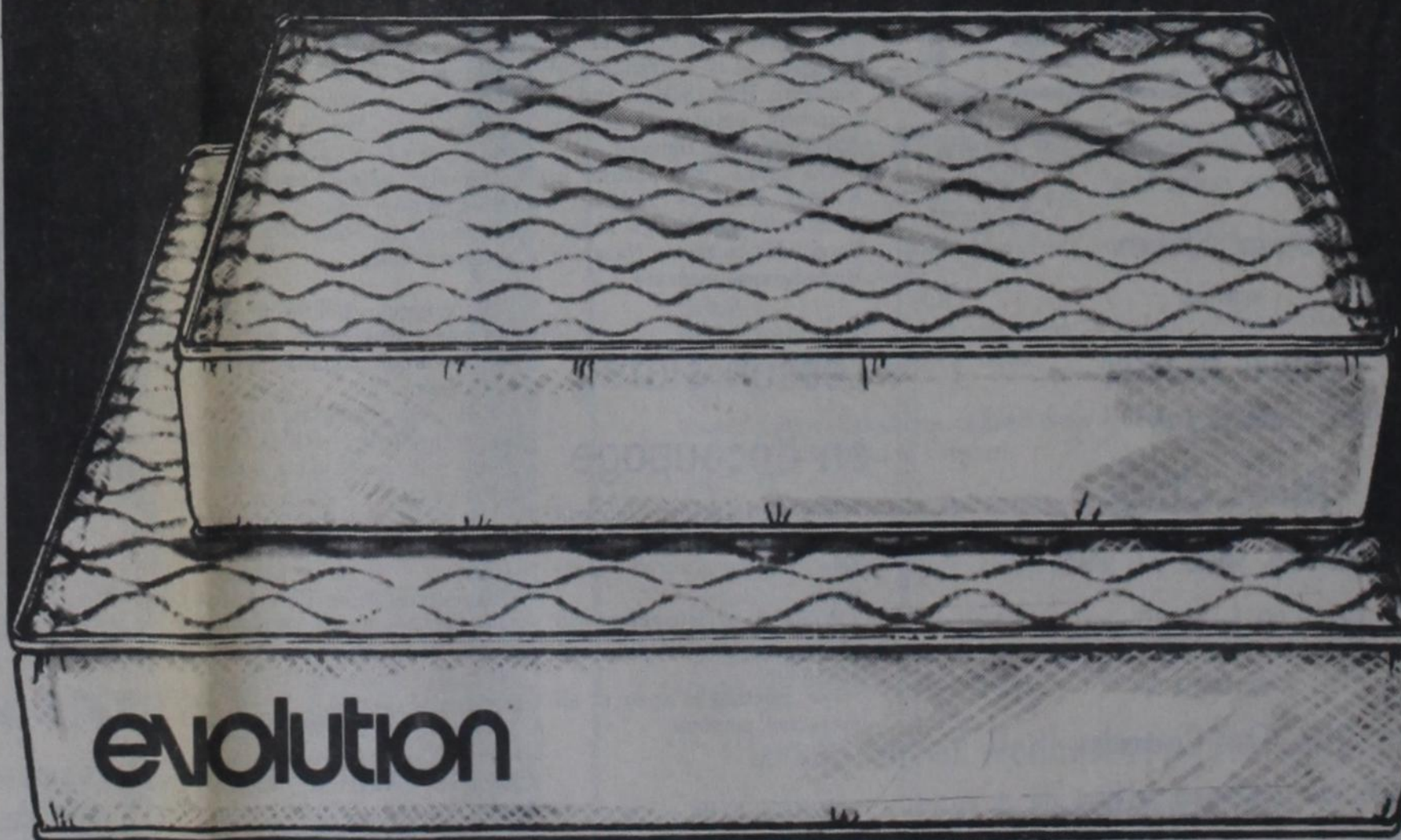


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
