FIND HIDDEN TURKEY NESTS When Confined in Pen Until Late
Day, Laying Hen Will Go A quick and easy way to find stolen nests of turkeys is to confine the
birds from early morning to noon. The laying hens will then g straight to their nests to lay the egg which they are holding, say poultry
spectallsts of the United States De partment of Agriculture. When turkey hens have free range they nes usually in obscure places and often
wander a haif mille or more from home before they find a nesting place that suits them.
If attractive nesting places are pre-
pared about the barnyard, the turkey paredimes lay in them. Such nests areetmes easily made from boxes or bar-
arels, or by scooptng out a little eart
res rels, or by scooping out a little earth
in the shape of a shallow bowl, plling in the shape of a shallow bow, pilin
brush round it to satisfy the hen's de sire for secluston. The nest most pre-
ferred by turkeys consista of a barrel terred by turkeys consiste of a barrel
lald on Its alde, in which straw or hay
is placed when contined in a breed. is placed. When confned in a breed.
ing pen several turkey hena may lay

each bird usually makes her own nest. Turkeys do not range far during cold weather. In the north, where the
