Thursday after a three-day session ag. gregated $\$ 3,402,409$. Some of the con.
srent sruction for which this of theney wan
slloted will take mere allotted will take more than twelve
months to complete and in allotting the monts to complete and in allotuing the
amount the federal appropriation for the fiscal year beginning July 1 next has been exceeded, the commission an
nounced. However, it was stated, that nounced. However, it was stated, that
the difference between the amount al. lotted and the 1923 apporpriation will be taken care of out of the 1924 appro-
priation. riation.
In announcing the awards the com
mission issued the following state ment:
"The commission, in making these allotments, has taken into considera tion the fact that there is a great deal
of highway work to be done in the near future and if we had attempted to finance all of the work entirely from the appropriation for the fiscal year
1923 a large number of projects would have received no aid whatever. Ac cordingly, it has been the policy of the ommission to allot only such aid out ably be required during that period and in order to get the projects now under construction and those already
financed completed, it will be the en inanced completed, it will be the en
deavor of the highway commission to extend the construction begun with funds allotted out of the 1923 appro priation to completion out of the ap.
propriation from 1924 and 1925 , in or der to connect up the projects now be ing constructed and on which work will soon start, making as much mile age of connected roads as possible." Fort Bend county received the larg-
est amount of aid, $\$ 249,000$, with Jefferson county second, $\$ 217,000$, and Ter
