Hospital board plans 16.67% tax hike

The Castro County Hospital Board proposes to increase property taxes by 16.67 percent to service a capital budget of some \$58,000.

From a dollars-and-cents standpoint, the tax increase is mild - a hike from 12 cents to 14 cents per \$100 valuation, based on the new full-marketvalue assessment system.

The "capital budget" that must be raised by taxes amounts to only 20-22% of the hospital's total budget. The property tax - which applies to all property owners in the county - is used to make up the deficit between the hospital's income and its expenses.



Neither rain, nor flood, nor the shortage of science teachers is keeping local schools from opening on schedule this week.

Heavy water damage in Elementary Richardson School almost made it necessary for many students to start classes today in local churches.

But Principal Elmer Berryhill reported Wednesday morning that "everything is straightened up pretty well, and we're enrolling on schedule."

The school building was being re-roofed when last week's heavy rains came. Water ran from the roof into some of the walls, creating a near-flood in five south-hall classrooms and the school library, and causing water damage to two rooms in the north hall and the cooking area of the school kitchen.

With ceiling tiles falling in and up to two inches of water standing in some rooms. school administrators made provision to hold classes in local church buildings if necessary, until mop-up operations could be completed.

Meanwhile, the roofers brought in extra crews at mid-week.

The situation appeared to be under control by Wednesday, and administrators were expecting to start classes as planned today.

Soybean situation 'highly volatile'

Sovbeans, a cash crop of growing importance in Texas, will likely face ups and downs in the marketplace this year.

Extended wet weather in parts of the state this spring dealt a hard blow to the Texas soybean crop, causing some farmers in coastal and eastern areas to replant as many as three times. This means considerable added expenses plus low yield potentials from these late plantings.

"The fact that the average price of beans to farmers is about a dollar higher per bushel now than at this time last year should encourage producers to forward contract at least part of the crop,' points out Johnny Feagan, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "This would assure a profit on part of their crop and reduce their risk.

"How much of a moneymaker Texas soybeans prove to be this year will depend on the weather during the rest of the growing season, the overall US crop and export demands," points out Feagan.

The total US crop will likely exceed 68.7 million acres, with some double planting behind wheat still underway. That acreage is 2 percent below last year. About 15 percent of the acreage is estimated to be doublecropped, and these acres usually produce lower yields. This, in conjunction with expected lower yields from late plantings, should keep the national average yield somewhat below earlier USDA predictions of 29.5 bushels per acre.

The Texas crop will likely total 700,000 acres, about the same as last year. It would have been up considerably favorable with spring weather.



Texas will need to decide soon if they wish to sign up for Federal Crop Insurance.

The insurance, available from any local Federal Crop Insurance Corp. representative, replaces the disaster payment program that has been in effect in recent years. Producers interested in insurance protection should contact local FCIC representatives for the sign-up deadline. The FCIC program is sponsored by the US Dept. of Agriculture.

"Federal crop insurance protection is available to all wheat and barley producers in Texas," points out Dr. James Ahrenholz, economist in management with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"The premiums are tax deductible, they need not be paid until the crop is harvested, and the insurance policy can be used as

Premium rates for the 50 and 65 percent level of coverage include a 30 percent reduction as a program subsidy," notes Ahrenholz. 'The premium for the 75 percent coverage level includes a reduction which is 30 percent of the 65 percent level premium."

The economist gives this example in explaining the crop insurance program. If a farm in northern Texas has an average historical yield of 25 bushels of wheat per acre, the producer can select coverage levels of either 12.5, 16.5 or 19 bushels (50, 65 or 75 percent of the historical average, respectively). If he chooses the 19 bushes per acre coverage and a price level of \$4.50, his premium, for example on a Cooke County farm including subsidy, would be \$7.75 per acre.

Premiums will vary according to the coverage and price level chosen by the farmer as well as by the location of the farm, says Ahrenholz.

For the cost of the premium, the farmer (in the above example) is buying income protection (at the selected price) for himself when his crop yield drops below the 19-bushel level. If his yield is reduced to 10 bushels, then he will receive an indemnity for nine bushels (19 minus 10) at \$4.50 each







Cool germination test results are being coolly received by many cotton agronomists, who say the lower-than-usual vigor demonstrated in cotton seed indicates the test itself, is at fault. Designed to provide an indication of early-season seed vigor, the test is, according to a Texas Agricultural Extension service agronomist, more rigorous than standard ger mination tests. And, even though most of the test seed fell below normal test values, this does not necessarily mean that cotton farmers will face a severe vigor problem in 1981. Most researchers believe that the poor results are more associated with the test itself than with the seed quality. Although a reliable test is being worked on, it appears that this year planters will have to rely on their own past experience and judgment in assessing potential performance.







Dimmitt's net payment this August is \$19,333.24, compared with last years \$11,311 August payment.

Bullock said on a statewide average, sales tax payments are up this year by nearly 12 percent over 1980.

ditions range from no aphids. to fields with upper leaves cupped and wilted from aphid feeding, to fields with aphids flying out or being reduced by predators. Aphid treatment may be considered when leaf yellowing, excessive square shed or plant stunting occurs. Mid and lower leaves should not be allowed to suffer heavy aphid infestation as these leaves are feeding developing bolls.
