REGISTRATION AT UNIVERSITY WILL BEGIN A WEEK EARLIER

Austin, Texas, August 17.—Registration for the 1922-23 session of the University of Texas will begin at least a week earlier than usual this fall, according to the announcement in the anual catalogue which is being mailed out to the prospective students. Examinations for admission will begin September 18, continuing through September 21. Registration will begin on Thursday. September 21, and will continue through Saturday, Sept. 2. Candidates for degrees in 1923 may register on any of the three registration days: other former students only on Friday and the afternoon of Saturday; firstyear students only on Thursday and the morning of Saturday. Registration also will begin on September 21 in the College of Mines and Matallurgy at El Paso. In the Medical Branch at Galveston, registration will begin on Wednesday, September 27.



Austin, Tex.-For the ensuing scholastic year the public schools of Texas receive \$10 for each child from the state available school fund, this apportionment having been made Friday by the state board of education on a basis of 1.292.658 scholastics, s decrease under last year of 5,333 in the scholastic age, and a reduction in the allowance of \$3 per child. The present apportionment of \$13 for each child is vet unpaid

An estimate of the income of the state school fund for the coming year is as follows: One-fourth of occupation taxes, \$47,721; two-thirds of poll taxes, \$600,000; supplemental tax \$58,-\$33; delinquent taxes, \$569,156; insolvent, \$52,023; penalty, \$14,333; depository interest, \$34,962; income from ed by law. 
