The court has a light docket to dispose of this term, although it is believed the court will be in session longer this session than it was last term.


There are thirteen cases on the crimi nal docket which will be taken up next hunting this season as they did last week, there being three pistol cases, three theft cases, three violations of

# **USE OF X-RAY MAY CHECK BOLL WEEVIL**

#### Theory Advanced by Engineer for Making Eggs of Insects Sterile.

New York .- The ravages of the devastating boll weevil throughout the etton fields of the South, which Dr. L. O. Howard, chief of the bureau of entomology, estimates has caused a rop loss in five years of not less than \$1,600,000,000, may yet be checked or wholly eliminated by the use of the X-Ray as a sterilizing agent.

That is the belief expressed after much research by Dr. Miller Reese Hutchison, electrical engineer, who said that his theory for the sterilizing of the boll weevil by the applicaion of the X-ray had been laid before Professor Michael I. Pupin, head of the school of electrical engineering in Columbia University, and also Dr. Franeis Leroy Satterlee of Flushing, L. I., one of the world's leading authorities n X-ray activities, and that both had been much impressed with the practisability of the proposed remedy and had expressed a hope that it might be thoroughly tried out in the cotton

Dr. Hutchison became interested in he subject not alone because he is a sative of the South, but as a result of a letter written to him by Harvie Jorian, secretary of the American Cotton Association, from St. Matthews, S. C. Replying to that letter Dr. Hutchison recently wrote in part: "It is known that sterility can be induced in the male and female of the entire animal kingdom and all kinds of eggs by the intelligent and local application of Xrays. The boll and, in fact, all parts of the cotton plant are transparent to X-rays. Therefore, why could not the ags laid by the moth and the weevil aatched from the eggs be made sterile by the application of X-rays from a pattery of tubes mounted on highwheeled vehicles straddling several rows of plants and drawn along by a properly constructed and equipped ve-

"Heavy sheets of lead properly bent and placed over the tubes would shield he operator, concentrating the X-rays town and producing sterility in every egg and weevil on the plants."

The use of poison gas as an elimiaating agent, Dr. Hutchison does not think feasible, though the suggestion has been attributed to Brigadier General Amos A. Fries, chief of the chemical warfare service of the army. If ased in sufficient volume to penetrate the cotton boll Dr. Hutchison believes the gas would prostrate everything and everybody in the vicinity.



# IN STATE IS URGED

#### Commissioner Says Texas Is In Danger of Losing Federal Aid.

Austin, Tex.-The state highway commission has received applications for aid for road construction from Titus, Coleman, Fannin, Somervell, Travis, Collins and Lamar counties. An application was also received for designation on highway No. 19 in Brazoria and Fort Bend counties.

R. M. Hubbard, chairman of the commission, has given out a statement in which he declared that Texas is in reat danger of losing federal aid. The statement follows:

"Texas must make adequate provisions for maintaining the highways on which federal aid has been used at an early date or lose her federal aid allotbut one gathered a Pennsylvania ment. CORRECT TIME TO CAPONIZE

Impossible to Determine by Age as All Breeds Do Not Develop Alike-Watch Comb.

This is a question asked more frequently than any other by novices. It

It is impossible to tell the best time for caponizing by the age, because all do birds of the same breed and hatch; some will be small of body with large comb and wattle developments, while others will show very little comb and be large and vigorous.

With any breed when the comb and wattles begin to grow you may know that the reproductive organs are growing correspondingly; when the little comb begins to redden you may know

that the organs are receiving more blood for their very rapid growth; as they receive more blood the danger of an operation is greater, for the artery carrying the blood to the testicle is larger and in more danger of being ruptured.

Therefore, if you wish to operate at the perfect time watch the growth of the comb and wattles; when they are just "showing red" is the best and proper time; then there will be little danger to the life of the bird, less pain and no "setback" to speak of; while if you wait until the comb is bright red and the wattles hang considerably there will be more danger of death and more "slips."

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## EARLY HATCHED FOWLS BEST

Pullets Mature So That They Begin to Lay in Fall When Fresh Egg Supply Is Low.

Every fall hens take a vacation. In doing so they have very important business on hand. Typically femiatne by nature, they insist upon having a new dress each fall. During their vacation they are engaged in shedding their old plumage and in growing new. and their energy is so occupied in this way that they lay few or no eggs. The process of molt or changing their plumage takes at least three months on the average, and it is due to this three months' vacation that the supply of fresh eggs is so scarce during the fall and winter. Early hatched pullets mature so that they begin to lay in the fall and early winter, and it is upon these early hatched pullets that the poultry keeper must depend for his supply of eggs during the time the old hens are molting and resting from quit laying, he sure that you hatch problems concerning printing. early and have a nice bunch of early hatched pullets coming along to supply the eggs at that time.

#### MALES FAVOR SCRATCH FEED

Better Plan to Have Medium Sized Fowis Than Too Large, Especially for Erseding.

Cockerels usually eat more scratch feed and less made than the pullets do. Feeds which develop a medium sized bird are better than to have the cockerels develop into too large roosters, especially those to be saved for breeding purposes.



As the chicks grow they need more room. It does not pay to let them crowd.

Beware of musty, mouldy, sour, or decayed food. It is sure to cause trouble.

Tough grass is of no value as a green food. Better sow some quick growing crop.

Feed hoppers greatly reduce the work. If they are kept filled, the chicks will never go hungry.

Two-year-old hens had better be sent to the market. They seldom pay for their feed if kept over the third

Grit and oyster shell should be included in the ration for both young and old. To neglect this would be poor economy
