County draws boundary plan

Castro County's commissioners will submit their own alternative plan for redrawing the county's precinct boundaries.

The commissioners finalized their plan in a special meeting last Wednesday, in time to meet the deadline for submitting it to the Justice Dept., in compliance with a federal court order.

A judgment made against the county in 1980 ruled that the lines must be redrawn to give Mexican-Americans a clear majority in at least one precinct. The lines were changed in 1980, but the ruling required that the lines be re-adjusted after the 1980 census.

In the county's proposed new plan, all of the line changes would fall within the city limits of Dimmitt, so that road maintenance areas would remain fairly equal out in the county. It would basically follow the lines drawn in 1980, with a few changes — such as the widening of Pct. 4's corridor, making Pct. 1's corridor pass down the middle of streets and alleys, and placing homes in the Sheffy Addition and those that are located on the west and north side of Western Circle Drive in Pct. 3.

The plan submitted by plaintiff Carmen Catano and lawyers from the Texas Rural Legal Aid would have made most of the changes from the 1980 lines out in the county, splitting the City of Hart.

The county's lawyer and consultant in the case, Dennis McGill of Lubbock, said that he felt that the plan drawn up [See COUNTY, Page 15]

Man, 74, held after shooting

Jeremiah Worsham, 48, of Dimmitt was fatally wounded in a shooting incident Tuesday night, and police were holding a 74-year-old city man as a suspect Wednesday morning.

The incident occurred at approximately 7:30 p.m. Tuesday at a home in the 400 block of Northeast Sixth Street, police said. Worsham was taken to Plains Memorial Hospital for emergency treatment, then was transferred to Amarillo's Northwest Texas Hospital, where he died Wednesday morning.

Police took the suspect into custody Wednesday morning, but had not filed charges by press time.

Pheasant hunt plans set

Except for a few last-minute details, everything is set for the Dimmitt Kiwanis Club's annual Pheasant Hunter's Breakfast and hunting preserve project.

The breakfast is set for 5:30 to 9 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 12, opening day of the pheasant season, and will be held in the Castro County Expo Building. Hotcakes, eggs, sausage, biscuits, jelly, butter, syrup, coffee and milk will be served

at a cost of \$3.50 per person. Club President Jimmy Davis suggested that members be prepared to work on the same work detail they were assigned to last year.

For a \$50 donation, hunters will get breakfast and the right to hunt on more than 10,000 acres of Castro and Parmer County land for the two weeks of the season, ending Dec. 27.

The permits are for

pheasant only, and the hunter must furnish his own valid Texas hunting license.

Also, the Dimmitt High School Key Club will be conducting a special sale on a shotgun at the breakfast.

The Kiwanians are also asking the Key Club, as well as members of the Dimmitt FFA, to act as guides or to furnish information at specified locations for the opening

day only.

At the Kiwanis Club's Monday meeting, member Alex Glass introduced Doug Henry, director, and the Dimmitt High School Show Choir for the program.

Sales tax rebates down from last year

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has sent checks totaling \$96.4 million to 948 Texas cities as their share of the 10% city sales tax for November, with the cities in Castro County getting \$20,765.24 for their share.

The statewide payment for this November is \$16.3 million more than was received during the same period in 1980.

The total of payments so far for 1981 is \$614.7 million — a 16.6% increase over payments for the same 11-month period in 1980.

The city with the highest rebate payment for November is Houston, receiving \$20

million. Ten cities received no payment at all.

The optional 1% city sales tax is collected along with the state 4% sales tax by merchants and businesses, and is rebated each month by the comptroller to the cities where it is levied.

Dimmitt's payments to date for 1981 are up only 2.93% over the same period in 1980, while the month's rebate is 30% below what the November payment was in 1980.

However, Dimmitt's 1981 November payment of \$16,812.61 is way ahead of the 1981 October payment of \$9, [See SALES TAX, Page 15]

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Public meeting set on RCA proposals

A public meeting will be held at Amarillo Monday to discuss the Secretary of Agriculture's preferred soil and water resources conservation program put together as a result of the Resources Conservation Act (RCA) of 1977.

The meeting will be held at Texas A&M Research & Extension Center from 1 to 3 p.m.

The public is invited to comment on the preferred program, which features expanded roles for local and state governments and the targeting of USDA dollars and personnel to conserve soil and critical resource problem areas.

Farmers, ranchers, USDA personnel, conservation district directors, ASC county committeemen, county extension agents, and others are

being invited to attend.

Barney G. Lee, district conservationist for SCS at Dimmitt, said the Secretary's proposed program would concentrate more USDA assistance in areas where soil erosion and other problems threaten to reduce agricultural productive capacity and to increase agriculture production costs. Basic USDA technical and financial assistance would continue in all areas.

The program would use local and state conservation coordinating boards to identify critical problem areas, set priorities, and develop programs for local and state action to solve the problems. These boards would be based on existing organizations — conservation district boards, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) commit-

tees, Extension advisory boards, and other groups.

Based on the recommendation from these local and state boards and national priorities, more USDA assistance would be aimed at reducing the most serious soil erosion and related problems.

The RCA Program report and a summary leaflet with a response form can be reviewed at the local SCS or Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office at Third and Bedford in Dimmitt.

The basis for the program is an appraisal of the condition, trends and natural resource problems of the nation. Published in two reports, the appraisal is also available for public reference in the two USDA offices.

Conservation plan--I What are the problems?

[Editor's note: The US Dept. of Agriculture has identified the critical soil and water resource problems of the nation, analyzed them, and proposed a national conservation program to address them. This is the first in a series of three articles that outlines the conservation problems, trends and analyses, and the proposed national program.]

America will face reduced agricultural productive capacity and increased production costs unless the critical soil and water resource conservation problems of the nation are addressed. This is the conclusion of a three-year study by the US Dept. of Agriculture.

The study was required by Congress in the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA), according to Barney G. Lee, Soil Conservation Service (SCS) district conservationist in Dimmitt.

Specifically, the RCA study

showed that:

- One-third of America's cropland is eroding faster than the soil can rebuild itself through natural processes. Unless corrective actions are taken, the acreage of this excessively eroding land will increase further.
- Floods threaten human life, cropland and other property, livestock and crops in upstream watersheds. Greater damage is likely in the future.
- Depletion of groundwater threatens the continuation of irrigated agriculture in extensive areas of the West.
- Deterioration of water quality may limit the use of water for irrigation, municipal and industrial supply, fish and wildlife habitat, and other purposes.

These RCA findings are based on the most intensive and accurate appraisal of the country's nonfederal natural resources ever conducted, Lee reports.

"Much of the data came

from on-site examination at about 200,000 sample points across the United States. In Texas, some 14,550 sample points provided information for the national summary," Lee says.

The information gathered included data on land uses, soils, erosion, prime farmland, cropping sequences, and crop residue treatment.

Beside the SCS inventories and other USDA studies and evaluations, the RCA process drew on studies made by the Dept. of Commerce, Bureau of the Census, Fish & Wildlife Service, Environmental Protection Agency, Water Resources Council, Bureau of Outdoor Recreation and others.

RCA Appraisal Part 1, the first of three major documents, contains detailed information on the resource base — status, conditions and trends. A reference copy of all three major RCA documents is available for use at SCS and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices throughout the state.

Copies of a short leaflet summarizing the RCA findings and proposed conservation program are also available at the two USDA offices. It contains a pre-addressed, postage-paid response form that people may use to comment on the program.

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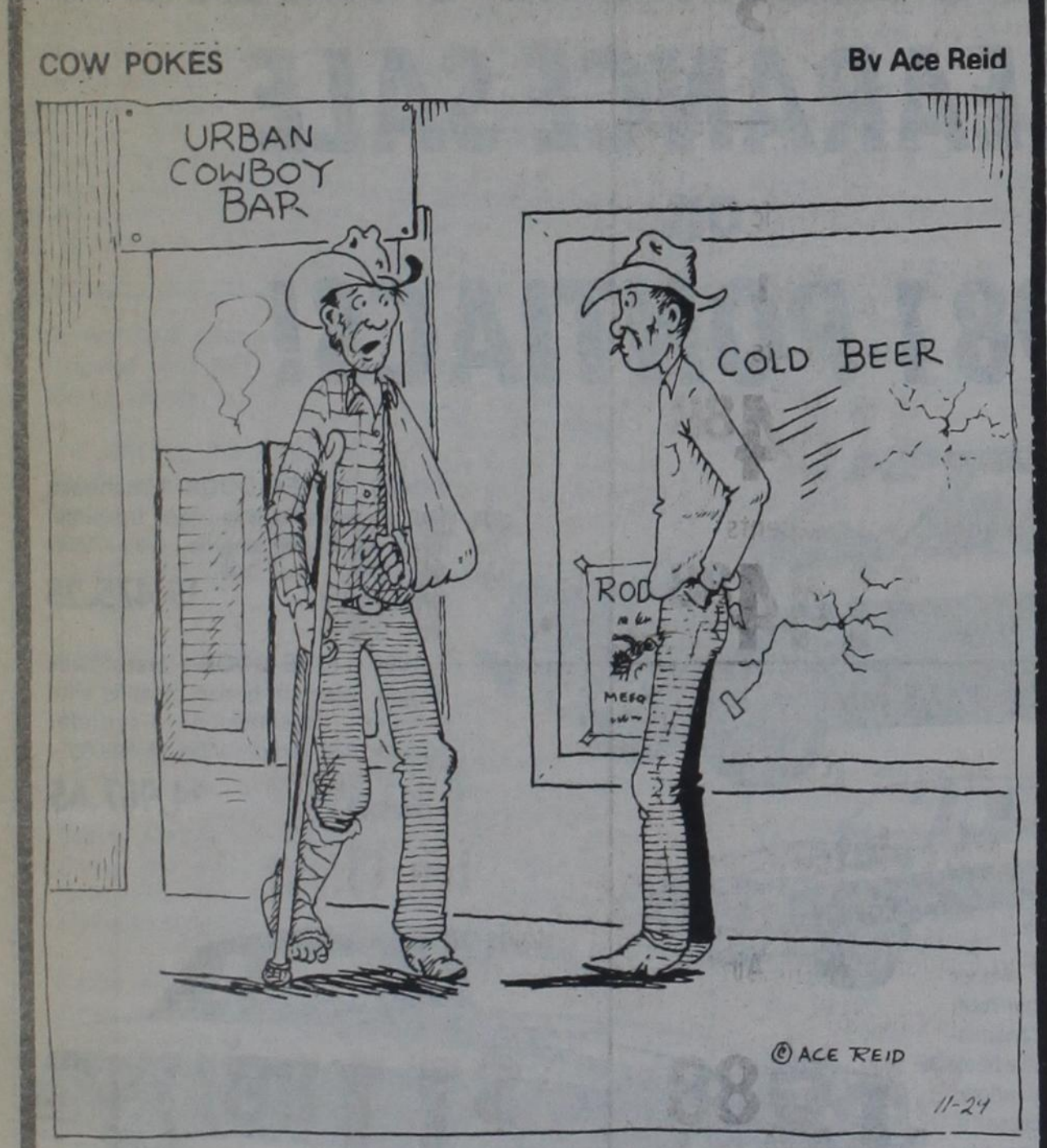
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Dulaney earns AF commission

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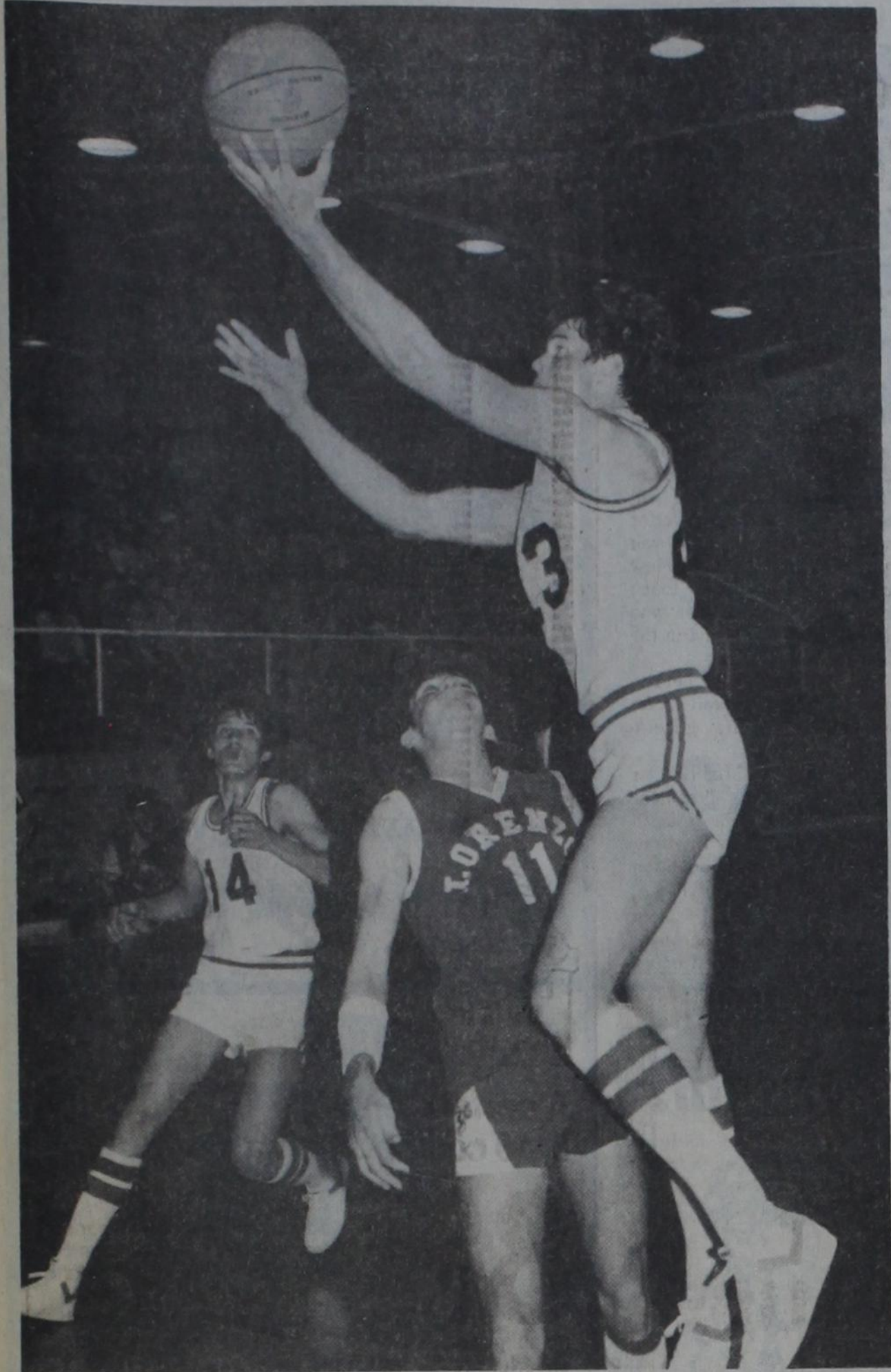
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Four Bobcats named to all-district grid team

The victory kept Monterey undefeated at 5-0, but the Plainsmen went on to lose to Dallas South Oak Cliff, 62-57, in the championship game Saturday.

PUBLIC NOTICE

In accordance with rule 052.01.00.043(a) of the Public Utility Commission of Texas' Rules of Practice and Procedure, Continental Telephone Company of Texas announces it has petitioned the Commission for increased rates to offset costs associated with a change in accounting for inside station connection costs.

The increase is the result of an order by the Federal Communications Commission, directing telephone companies to expense certain station connection costs in their accounting procedures. The increase in rates to result from the accounting change will produce an increase of less than one half of one percent in gross intrastate revenues of the Company. The increase will not affect monthly recurring charges but will be reflected as an additional element to nonrecurring service connection charges when a premise visit is required.

In a separate action, Continental Telephone Company has petitioned the Public Utility Commission to amend its tariff by adding a \$7.50 service charge for each check returned to the Company unpaid due to insufficient funds. The new service charge is intended to offset costs of administering unpaid checks and will affect gross revenues by approximately \$35,000 annually.

The effective date of these rate changes will be based upon approval by the Public Utility Commission.

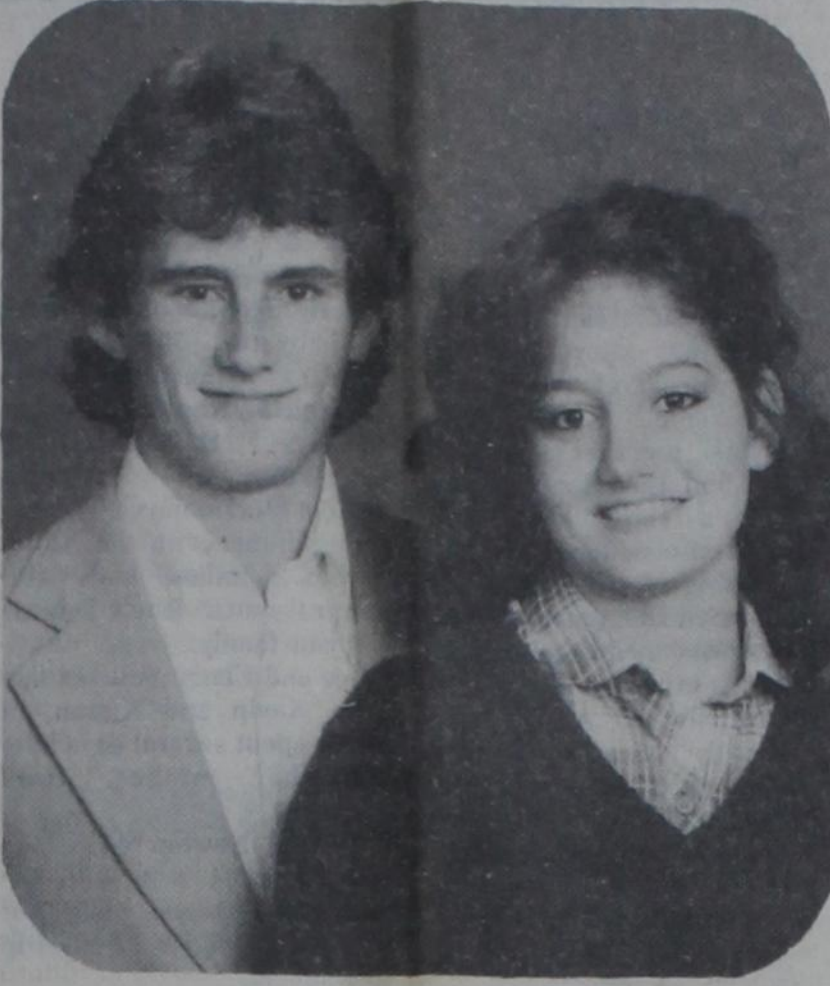

The "View from the Library" a couple of weeks ago featured an item on the upcoming program on Texas literature. It was introduced by the sentence, "Culture is coming our way," or something to that effect.

As one reader put it, "It was like there was no culture here and that it was slowly reaching up toward us." Yes. That was the idea entirely. Though, to be sure, the article did not attempt to talk down to anyone. It is just a view from this writer that some things around the Texas Panhandle can be regarded as cultural while other things can't. Even some of the things which are otherwise regarded as cultural when done elsewhere don't come off as such when presented here and around. (No examples, to protect the guilty).

Besides, the article was about Texas literature, not literature in general. How many Texas poetry readings have you attended lately (especially around here)?

(I must confess personally that, like many readers, a Texas poetry reading leaves me pretty cold. I'd much rather have to sit through an old school film entitled "Life Story of an Ant.")

Quickie reviews... to perk an interest:

"Baby Love" by Joyce Maynard, author of "Looking Back": This effort not recommended.

"Cultural Atlas of Africa," edited by Jocelyn Murray: Brand new, soon to be available for check out. Wonderful pictures and up-to-date information.

"City Kid," by Mary MacCracken: Recommended.

"Through the Narrow Gate," by Karen Armstrong: By an ex-nun who didn't enjoy the experience. Pretty good, but mushy in places. British slant.

"Bismarck," by Edward Crankshaw: Bio of Otto von Bismarck, ruler of early 20th century Germany. Book is as formidable as its subject. Highly recommended, however.

"Old Glory," by Jonathan Raban: British writer's tale of his trip down the Mississippi. Good reading with some pretty descriptions and some not so pretty. Mr. Raban also wrote at length about his trip to Arabia, in a previous book called (wow) "Arabia."

"Decline and Fall of the Roman Church," by Malachi Martin: A readable history of the church from its beginnings. The author was a Jesuit, so his opinion of modern Christianity may not be appreciated by some readers.

Record, "Woody Guthrie": Old recordings of Mr. Guthrie now in an anthology. Crude, rude, but interesting for some.

Record, "The Planets" by Holst: Performed by Boston Symphony Orchestra, directed by Seiji Ozawa, the cute Japanese on PBS.

Record, "Classic Collection of Jazz": Smithsonian collection of old jazz recordings. Quality is great, music is good for those who like jazz, old or new.

Deadline extended on storage offers

The deadline for approved grain elevators and warehouses to offer extended storage agreements to USDA's Commodity Credit Corp. has been moved back from Dec. 1 to Jan. 8, according to Everett Rank, CCC executive vice-president.

The action was taken at the request of some warehouse operators who said they will not be certain of the amount of space available for such agreements until completion of this year's corn harvest, Rank said. Warehouses that already have submitted offers may resubmit them by the new deadline if they wish.

CCC historically has entered into one-year contract with commercial facilities to store government-owned grain and processed commodities. Under extended storage agreements, warehouses will be permitted to offer CCC specific amount of storage

space for a specified period of time. If CCC accepts the offer, it will pay storage charges on a special schedule of rates.

CCC on Jan. 29 will notify those warehouses whose extended storage offers CCC accepts.

USDA is interested in extended agreements as a cost savings measure.

by the commissioners last Wednesday is "a defensible plan."

Originally, the commissioners had been working toward establishing Pct. 1 as the minority-dominated precinct, as TRLA lawyer Al Kauffman had already suggested. But in gathering figures, they decided it would be easier to shift the minority bloc to Pct. 4.

McGill said that under the county's final proposal, the Pct. 4 population would be 57% Mexican-American, while Pct. 1's would be 50%.

The commissioners approved the proposed plan unanimously.

Both plans have been submitted to the US Justice Dept., which must act on the matter within 60 days.

At the commission's request, McGill may go to Washington, D.C., to explain details of the county's plan, "as long as the opposition does not interpose with objections, which would make it futile to go because of lengthy litigation which might ensue," McGill told them.

However, if the TRLA has a "reasonable complaint" about the county's plan — one that could be easily resolved to the satisfaction of both parties — McGill said he would be "willing to negotiate on behalf of the county."

The commission also tentatively agreed to change Justice of the Peace precinct boundary lines to conform with the new county precinct lines.

Farmers Union proposes Farmers Bill of Rights

"The economic crisis in rural America is growing worse each day, yet the Reagan Administration is only aggravating the problems through their domestic policy," charged Mike Moeller, President of the Texas Farmers Union.

Moeller spoke following a two-day session of the board of directors and county presidents of the Texas Farmers Union in Abilene last week which called on the Congress to adopt a "Farmers Bill of Rights."

Castro County Farmers Union President Bart Kaderly said the Farmers Bill of Rights reflects the policies adopted at the recent CCFU county convention.

"The House-Senate Conference Committee on the 1981 Farm Bill is under severe pressure from the Reagan Administration to weaken farm programs which have been the historic base of the high productivity of American agriculture. Unfortunately, the committee appears to be yielding towards setting low price supports which will make the 1981 Farm Bill the worst bill in history," Moeller stated.

Even if the best sections of the House and Senate versions were adopted, producers will still be facing low prices on commodities. The TFU Board has urged the

Congress to push for the strongest bill, even if it would risk a presidential veto.

"With the realization that we will effectively be stuck with a 'Farm Bankruptcy Act' next year, the TFU is calling for a Farmers Bill of Rights," Moeller declared.

As a result of the action by the TFU Board and county presidents, the family farm organization will be calling on Congress to adopt legislation for producers' protection.

In the Farmers Bill of Rights, the Texas Farmers Union is calling on the Congress to adopt the following:

- Family farmers and ranchers should be free of regulation under the anti-trust law.
- Family farmers and ranchers should have the right to bargain directly with prospective buyers of their products.
- Family farmers and ranchers should have the right to negotiate all exports of U.S. agriculture products.
- Family farmers and ranchers should have the right to democratic referendum and should be allowed, by referendum, to manage the supply of farm products.

"If the Reagan Administration is sincere about wanting to get government out of agriculture, they will push for this program," Moeller said,

Blacks treated unfairly here

Dear Editor:

I am writing this to let some people know just how I feel about the way they treat Black people.

Their way is not fair. We make one mistake and we are looked down on as a nobody. They say, "You don't want to be seen with that person." If we write a check and it is returned, then they say, "Don't take another check from that person," but I know lots of people who write checks that are returned, and nothing is said.

You walk into their store and they give you a dirty look and watch you like a hawk. If one of your kids calls and asks if you are in the store, they say, "I hope not," and hang up the phone on the kid. That is no way to treat any kid, no matter how you feel about the parents.

You think about all these things, and about some of the other things that some of your big wheels do, and it never makes the paper, it is kept quiet, and they get their job back.

Just look around and see how many black people are in your store, or on other jobs besides hard-work jobs like Amstar or Goodpasture; that's the only place they think we should be.

If I were going to write a check and didn't want to pay for it, I would leave town. But I pay for every one of mine. Sometimes I don't balance my book right, and it is off. But we all make mistakes, because no man is perfect in this world.

I don't want anybody to give me anything, or my kids. What we get, we earn. Many

Black people feel the same way — they just want to be treated fair, like you treat the rest of the people.

This letter is not intended to start trouble, but to let people know that we have feelings, too, and that we can be hurt.

I love this town. I think it has lots of good people in it, and would not want to raise my children anywhere else.

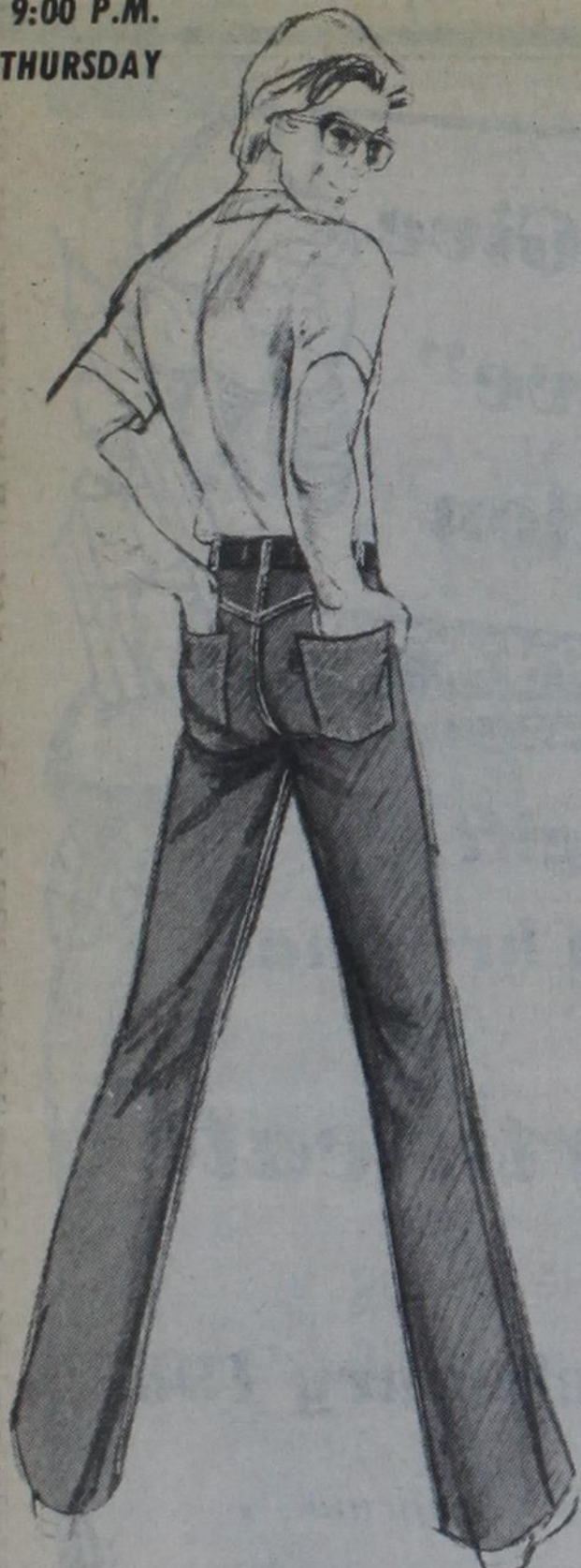

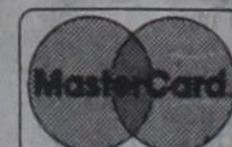
