#### SUNSHINE VARIES WIDELY IN AMOUNT WITH SEASONS

The amount of sunshine possible in any locality varies widely with the seas in m'ddle and high latitudes, says the Wea her Eurenu of the United States Department of Agriculture, Further variations are caused by the conditions of the sky locally in respect to clouds or fog. During the season of the longest days of the year the sun rises along the central-northern border of the United States about one hour earlier than in the extreme South, but this condition is reversed during the shortest days. I. the extreme southern portion of the United States the shortest dar of the year is only about three hours shorter than the longest day. but in the extreme northern part there is a difference of about eight hours, reckening from sunrise to sunset. The fewest hours of sunshine in sum

mer are found along the north Pacific

coast. Summer sunshine east of the

Mississippi a chages less than 10 hours

a day, but except along the Pacific

Great Plains the daily summer averages to the west of the Mississippi generally exceed 10 hours. The maximum amount for the summer as a whole ocurs over the western portion of the plateau and in the Great Valley of California, where the sun shines nearly 14 hours a day with almost continually cloudless skies. This is about 95 per cent of the possible amount of sunshine Cloudy weather in winter in the Lake region, the upper Ohio Valley, and the Appalachian Mountain districts, as well as in the far Northwestern States, reduces the winter sunshine to two and one-half or three hours daily average, which is from 35 to 40 per cent of the possible amount. The winters are sunniest in extreme western Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, and extreme southeastern California, where the averages for the December to February period range mostly from seven and one-half to eight hours a day. The percentage of sunshine is high also in the South Atlantic and Gulf States,



#### STUDENTS ENTERING TEXAS U. MORE PHYSICALLY FIT THIS YR

Austin. Texas. Nov. 29.—That a higher per cent of students entering the University of Texas this session are physically fit than ever before, is the statement of Dr. C. W. Goddard, chief of the medical staff, in giving out the results of physical examinations given to freshmen this fall. A smaller per cent of both men and women have been either exempted from physical training or assigned to limited physical training it is stated, and few of the students are inclined to avoid the required physical training course. There were 214 students treated in the hospitals between the dates of September 21, registration day, and November 1, but a large per cent of them had denque fever, and it is thought that many of them arrived at the University with the disease, which has been prevalent, but of a mild type.



A YOUNG man who recently inherited a mammoth fortune speaking of what his friends called his "good fortune," said:

If I entertain my friends moderately I learn that I am accused of being miserly. If I entertain them lavishly I know they must feel that I put them beyond the hope of reciprocating courtesies. I find my money is putting my friends to the test quite as much as me. I am anxious to use my money for the good of others, not alone for my good.

"Those who can share that thought with me and help me in that desire are few. My 'good fortune' has built a wall about me."

Money is the insgnia of labor. It represents the investment of brawn and brain. He who wastes it wants. He who squanders it upon his own pleasures and pastimes is forced to feel the waste even though his resources be so inexhaustible that he may never feel the

Man's worth is measured by his earnest ergerness to help others.

The closest personal advisor of one of the richest men in America recently told us that his friend, whose income was over half a million dollars a day, needed no counsel in the game of getting, but he eagerly sought help in the game of giving. To help men without hurting them was the problem which perplexed



#### PUGET SOUND TO GULF HIGH-WAY ASSOCIATION MEETING DREW BIG ATTENDANCE HERE

(From Brady Sentinel)

Brady was host yesterday to the annual meeting of the Puget Sound to Gulf Highway Association convention in one of the livliest and most peppy meetings ever held by the association.

On account of a slow, but heavy ra'n which fell here Tuesday afternoon it was feared that the attendance would le small but early Tuesday night delegations from different towns along the route began to arrive and when the con \*vention opened Wednesday morning at 10:00 o'clocck. 12 of the 22 counties along the route in Texas were represented. Delegations from Howard, Lynn and Randall counties were forced to turn back on account of heavy rains. A wire from the County Judge at Big Springs stated that eight cars had started from that section and it was much regretted that they had to turn back, John Boswell, of Plainview, secretary of the Association, with Hon. Lee Satterwhite, of Amarillo, were first to arrive, coming in Monday afternoon, Mr. Boswell assisting Secretary Cargill of the Brady Chamber of Commerce, in arranging for the meeting.

After a snappy concert by the Brady Municipal band the convention was opened in the district court room at the Brady Courthouse after invocation by Dr. Buren Sparks, pastor of the Baptist Church.

The welcoming address was made by Judge Evans Adkins, of this city, and the response by F. R. Senor, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce at Fredericksburg. The balance of the morning session was taken up with a splendid address by Judge W. W. McCrory, of the State Highway Commission, his theme being "Co-operation Between the Highway Commission, the County Governments and the Highway Associations of the State."


