The Dimmitt City Board of Aldermen began discussion on the budget proposals for fiscal 1982-83 and gave final approval to the Revenue Sharing budget at its meeting Tuesday night.

The Revenue Sharing Budget was passed with no changes from what was approved at the board's last meeting.

The proposed city budget allows for \$1,352,510 in revenue and the same amount in expenditures, causing an allowed deficit of \$75,833 for depreciation that will be covered by the city's \$522,742 operating reserve.

Water service is the biggest income source for the city and \$425,500 is set in the budget for it. Current taxes is the next largest source of income at \$328,656 of tax revenue set on an estimated \$99,895,757 worth of property in the city.

Largest planned expenses will come in the water and sewer department to the tune of \$444,176. The administrative department has the second largest expense budget, \$249,361.

Projected capital outlays for all departments total \$197,214 and will include seal coating and paving, the purchase of a street sweeper, two police cars, well pumps and lines for ie water system, dumpsters, a mowing tractor for park maintenance, and purchases or civil defense and the fire lepartment.

The board voted to table any action on the budget until the next meeting May 3. In other business, the

board: -Agreed to authorize City Manager Paul Catoe to prepare bid specifications for the purchase of a street sweeper and a tractor mower.

-Passed an ordinance closing the east-west alley on Block 168 that runs 120 feet between Front Street and SW Sixth Street as requested by N. A. Bryson, whose home is within five feet of the alley's

-Agreed to the use of the city flatbed truck to aid in clean-up efforts Saturday.

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

He was the brother of Mrs. V. C. Hopson of Dimmitt. The sporting goods repre-


sentative died at the Granville C. Morton Hospital after a long illness.

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


