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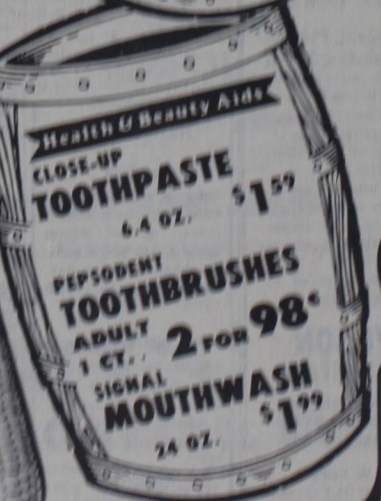
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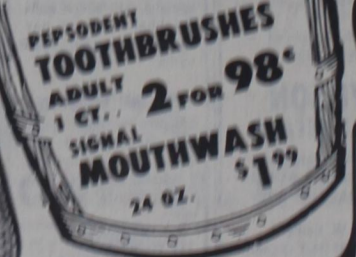
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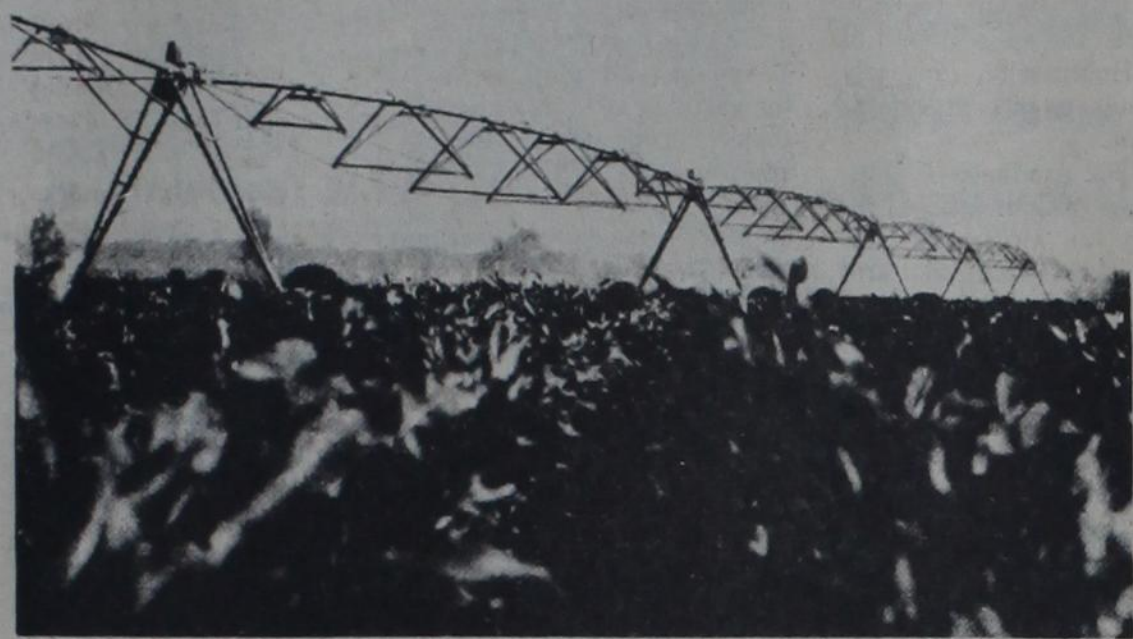

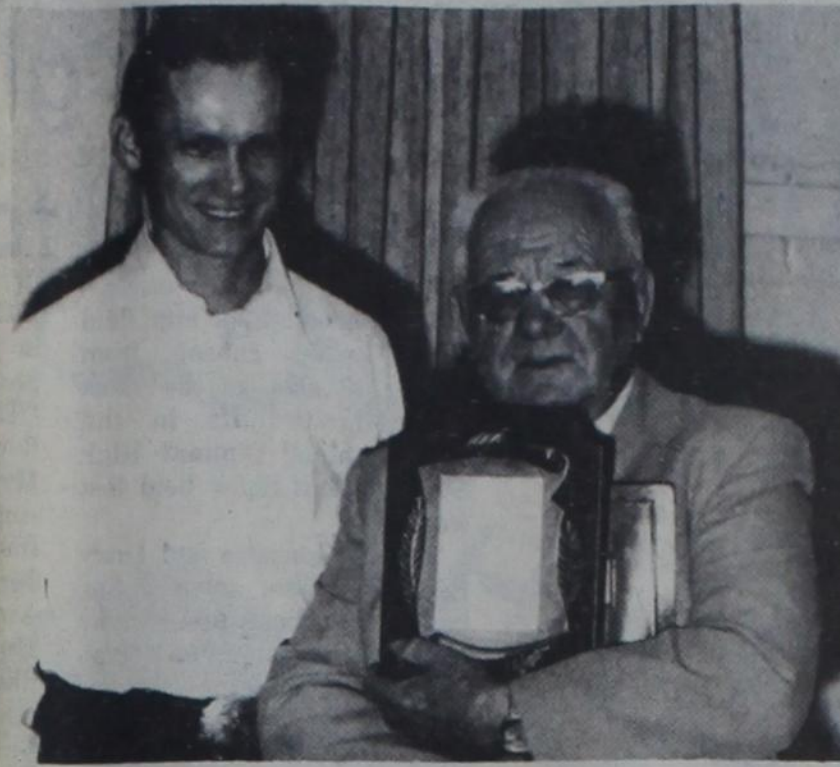

## Temple's wife campaigns here

Campaigning in Dimmitt last Wednesday, Ellen Temple, wife of Democratic candidate for governor Buddy Temple, warned that Texas is facing critical issues in the next decade but that the answers to solving these problems is not more taxes.

Mrs. Temple urged voters in the Democratic primary to look carefully at the tax proposals of the various candidates.

"Buddy feels the state can meet its obligations without additional tax burdens on its citizens and solve pressing problems in education and law enforcement," she said.

"On the other hand, Attorney General Mark White is proposing that the state's oil and gas severance tax be increased.

"I think energy costs are high enough, and the simple fact is that Texans consume more than 50% of the oil produced here and nearly 75% of the natural gas. More taxes on these products would result in higher and higher utility and energy bills for Texans — not for out-of-state customers."

"The key to making our homes and streets safer is more and better-trained police officers," Mrs. Temple said. "The prevention of crime is just as important as the apprehension and conviction of the criminal."

Mrs. Temple said her husband will propose increased teacher benefits, including salary hikes, to keep qualified teachers in the classroom and recruit promising educators.

"If we don't make teaching competitive with other industries and professions, more and more teachers will flee the classrooms each year and then we'll have a real disaster," she said.

Mrs. Temple is a former teacher (high school English, elementary school art), and now is a publisher of children's books in Austin. She also has been active in civic affairs in Lufkin and Diboll. She and her husband have four children.

## O'Hair threatens religious programs

Madalyn is also campaigning to remove all Christmas programs and Christmas songs and carols from public schools.

further limit or restrict our religious freedom. This can be done through your personal letter of protest to the Federal Communications Commission, 1919 "M" Street, Washington, D.C. 20054. Don't think that your one letter is insignificant, because if individual Christians will take the time to write, we can defeat Mrs. O'Hair's attempt to destroy our religious freedom.

I am an American citizen and proud of our heritage that has been passed down to and for us over the years. I am also very much aware of the place of religious faith in our heritage as a country and the importance of freedom of expression of that faith, we, as Americans, now enjoy.

Therefore, I protest any human effort to remove from radio or television any programs designed to show or teach faith in God or a Supreme Being.

If Christians would express these or similar sentiments to the Federal Communications Commission, we could not only defeat Mrs. O'Hair's ungodly petition, but also demonstrate our faith in God and the value we place on our religious freedom and heritage.

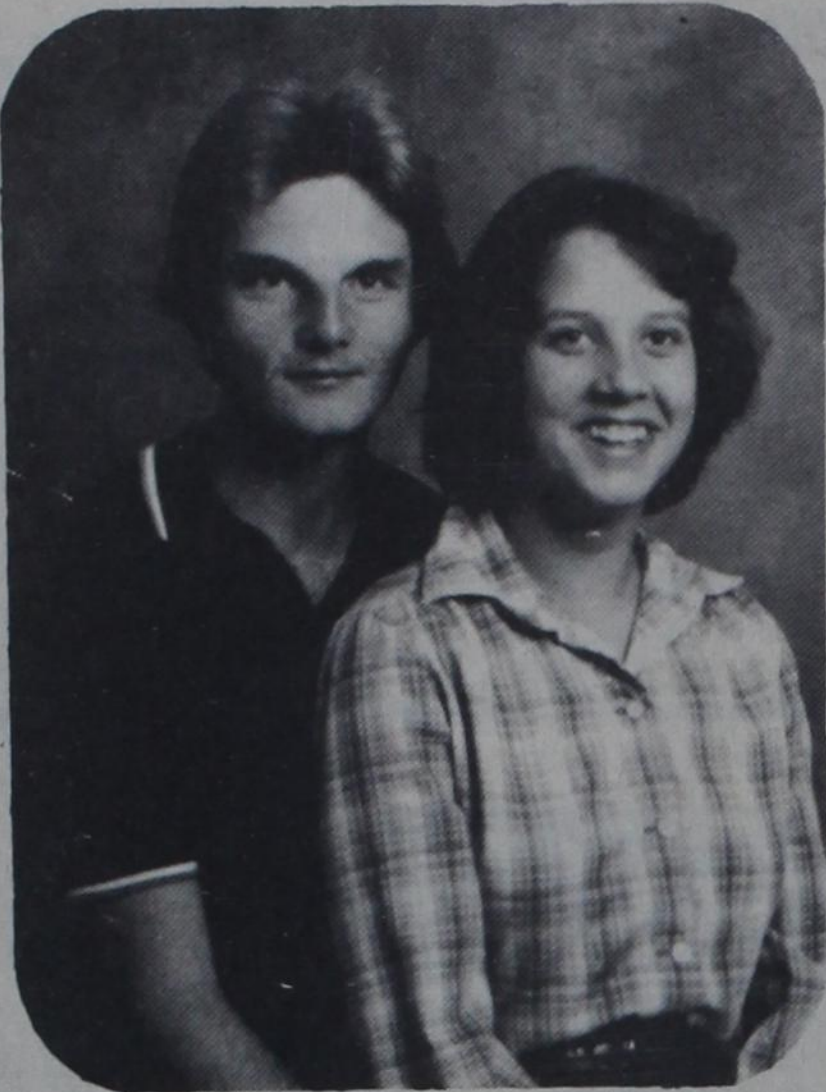

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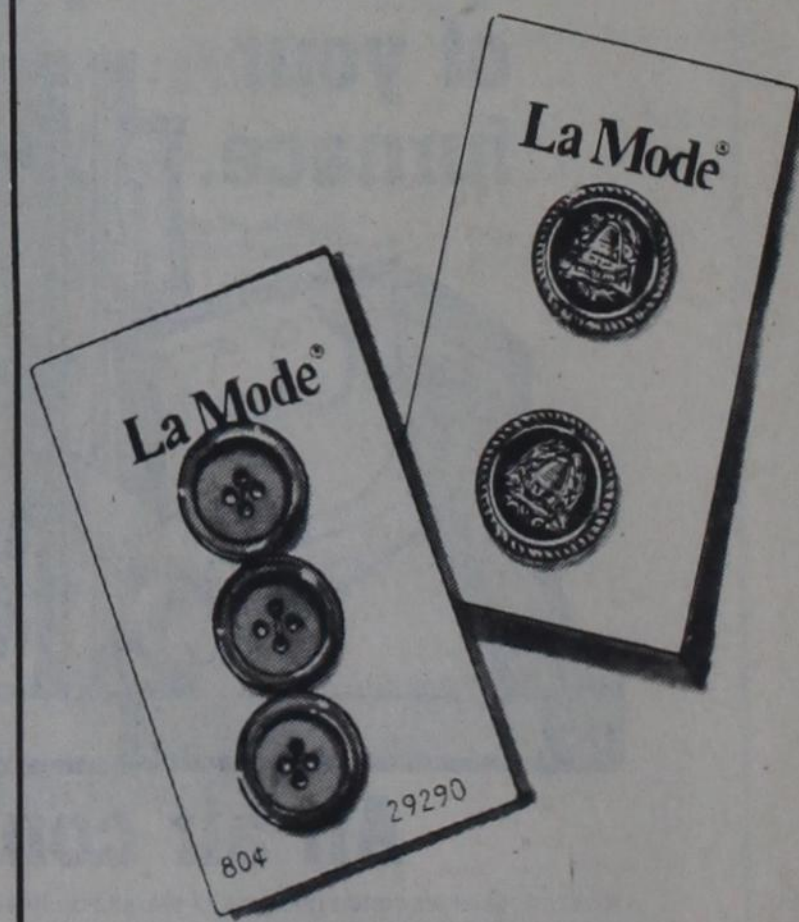

terraces and two tailwater pits, has laid 14,280 ft. of underground pipeline, has developed grassland and pastureland, contours his farmland and rotates his crops. Heard also has soil tests run regularly to maintain a high level of soil fertility.

These practices, Hunter explained, have enabled Heard to maintain a high production efficiency while conserving his soil and water.

Mrs. Hoskins, who teaches fifth and sixth grade science in Hart Elementary School, was cited for making the study of conservation a regular part of her curriculum. She also conducted a poster project for her students this year to help acquaint them with different conservation practices and teach them the importance of conserving soil, water and other natural resources.

Approximately 100 attended Friday night's banquet in the Expo Building. The program featured music by Zelda Ellison and the Frio Trio, displays of children's conservation posters, and a catered barbecue dinner.

I don't know to just what extent the Commissioner of Agriculture can help the farming industry, but I doubt if the present incumbent has the talent or ability to give maximum service. His style and type of

campaigning is almost a sure bid for defeat.

I will vote against James Nugent for Railroad Commissioner. I don't know anything about his opponent, Ralph Pacheco. Judged by the way the present commission has been performing, any change

would have to be an improvement.

There are a lot of good people running in the local races to choose from.

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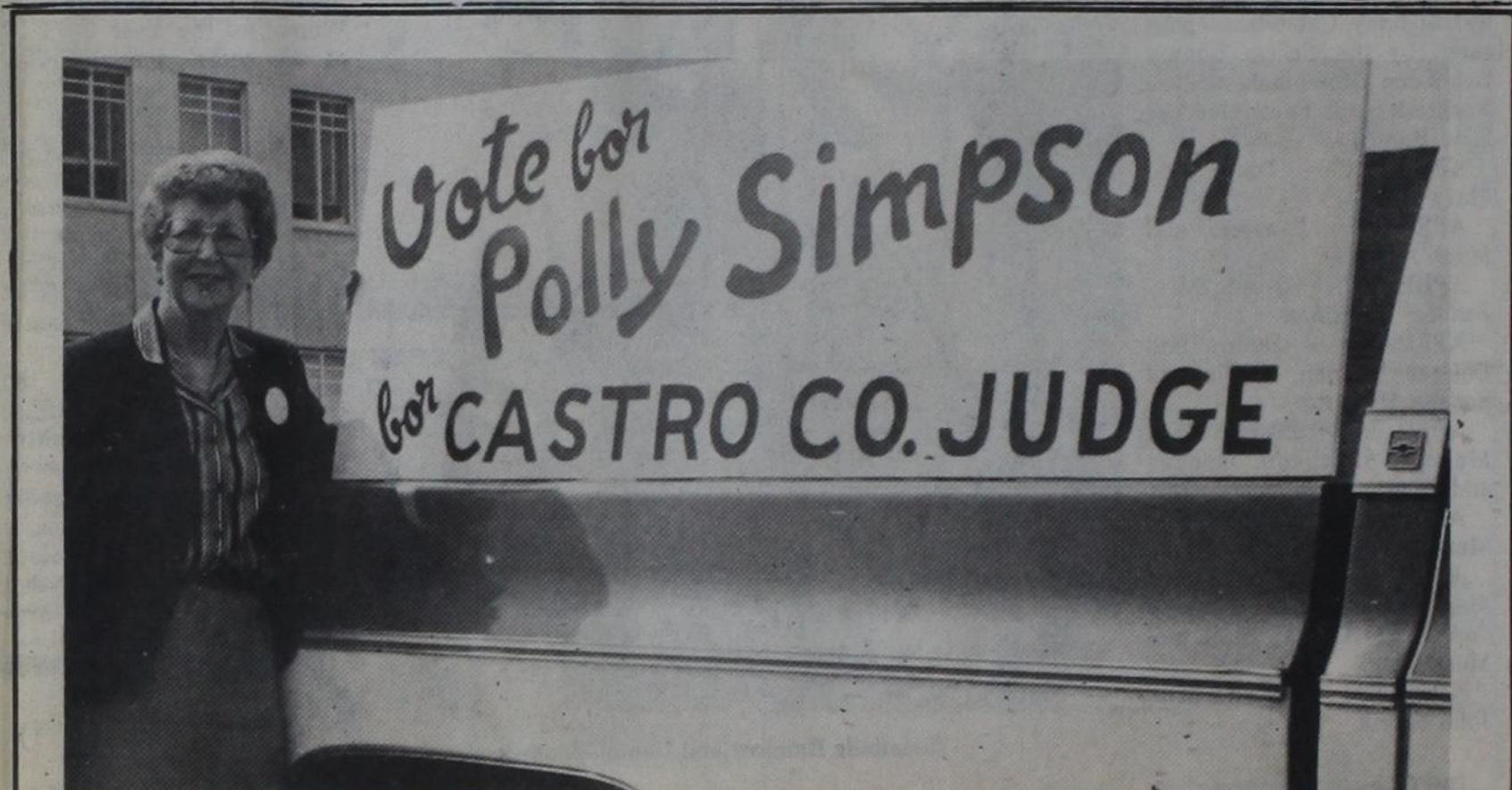

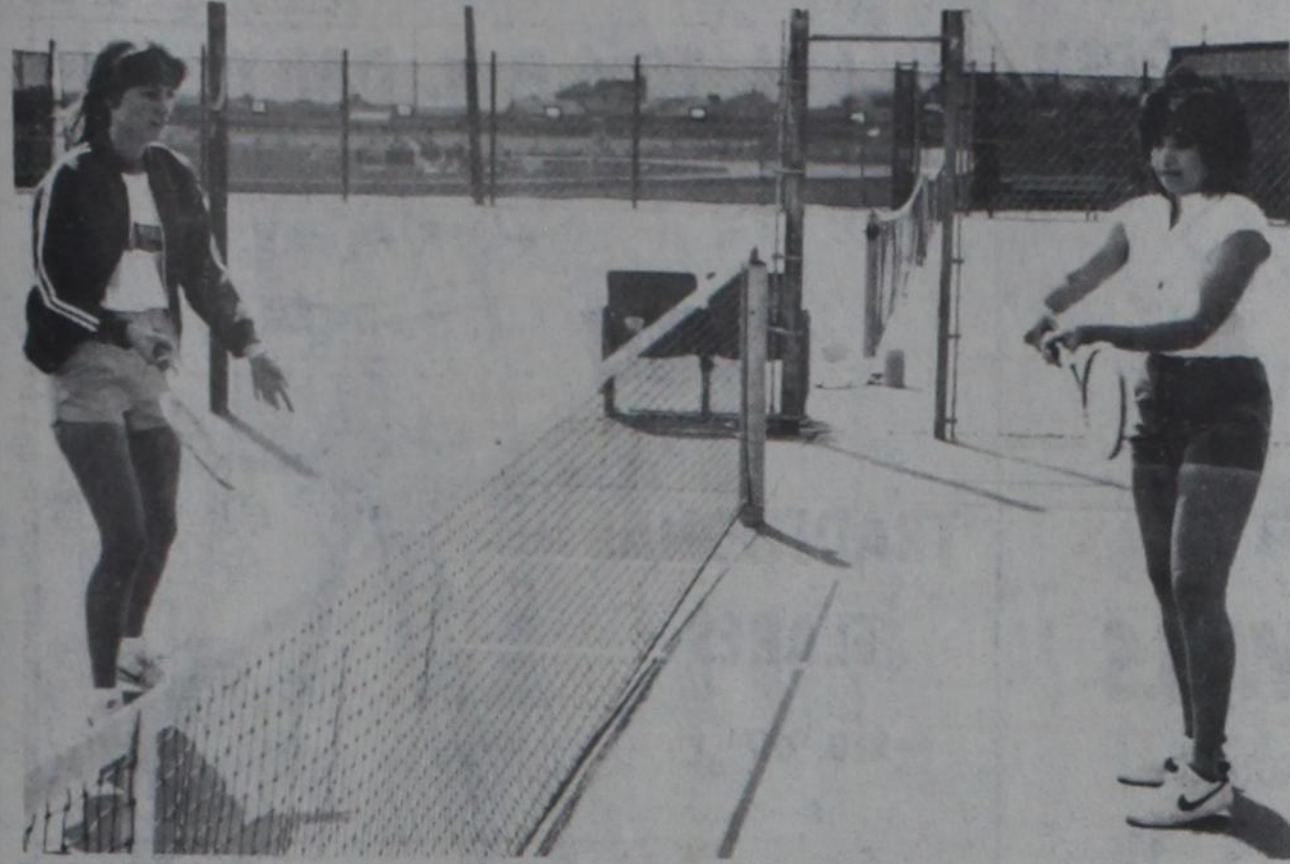
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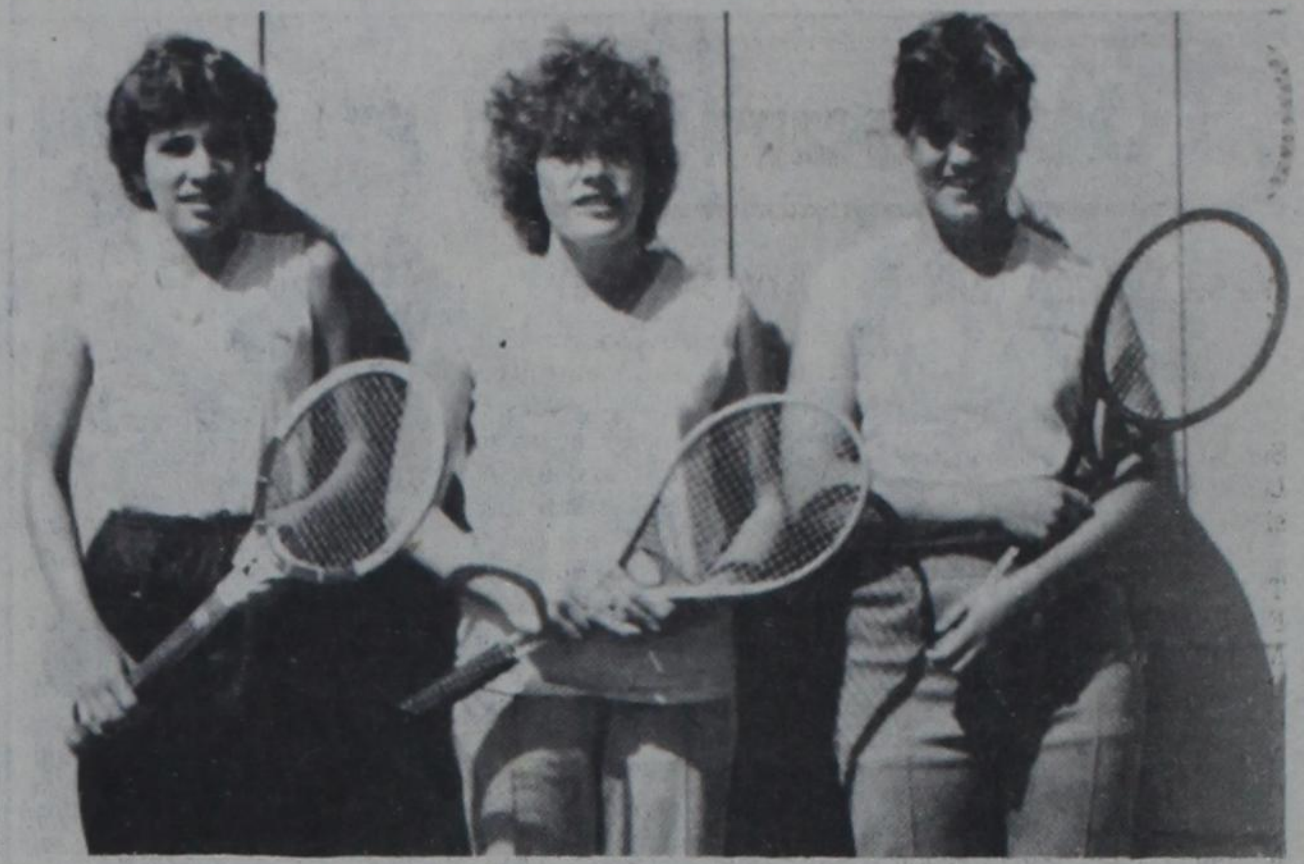

# Records fall in Jr. Bobcat Relays

Twenty meet records and five school records were broken or tied in the big Dimmitt Junior Bobcat Relays Saturday.

Nine freshman boys' teams, 14 eighth grade teams and 14 seventh grade teams competed in the meet in brisk but sunny weather.

Hereford Stanton edged Plainview Blue 134-128 for the team championship in the freshman division, while Dimmitt placed fourth with 50 points.

The eighth grade division saw a tight race in team totals, with Muleshoe garnering 87 points for first place. Dimmitt finished fifth with 55, and Nazareth came in 12th with 4.

Plainview ran away with the seventh grade team trophy, racking up 138 points, while Muleshoe was second with 83. Dimmitt ranked sixth in team totals with 35, while Nazareth failed to scratch.

Ignacio Sifuentes tied both the meet and school records in the freshman pole vault with a leap of 10 ft. He now shares the two records set by Espinosa of Dimmitt in 1981.

In the eighth grade high jump, Mark Smothermon cleared 5-5 to set a new school mark and tie the meet record that was set in 1979.

Mark Shackelford of Dimmitt and Rasco of Muleshoe both cleared 9-6 in the eighth grade pole vault to tie the meet record. For Shackelford, it was a new school mark also.

Dimmitt athletes knocked over two meet records in the seventh grade weight events. Todd Durham tossed the

discus 113 ft., 3 ins. for a new meet record, and Milton Carrasco heaved the shot put 42 ft., 9 ins. for a new meet and school record.

# Historians attend state conference

Mrs. L. B. Bowden and Mrs. Clyde Vick of Dimmitt flew from Lubbock to Austin Friday afternoon, and drove to Brenham Friday night to attend the last sessions of the Texas Historical Commissions three day Annual Historic Preservation Conference.

They arrived in time to make the candlelight tour of Brenham Friday night, touring three of the homes that were built before 1900 and have been restored to their original state. Families of the descendants live in the homes today.

The Holt-Schleider-Krause House is preserved Victorian architecture. It has the high ceilings and staircase. The Ross-Carroll-Bennett House built in 1893, a 2 1/2-story Victorian cypress structure is one of Brenham's most memorable landmarks. The L. E. Dittman house was Greek Revival built about 1869 furnished with many antiques. There were two other houses on the tour which ended at midnight and there was not time to see the other two.

Saturday morning they attended the session on "Museums-Exhibits and Conservation" with David Ross, director of the Sam Rayburn house, leading. After this conference they went to different conferences from 10 until noon.

Clara attended the "Oral History-What to Do After the Transcribing" by Thomas L. Charlton, director, Baylor University Program for Oral History. He has written a book on the subject.

Teeny attended the session on "Protecting Landmark Sites: Reports from the Front Lines." There were four speakers - Curtis Tunnel, the new Executive Director of the Texas Historical Commission, who is an archeologist and an anthropologist, was the first speaker. He spoke on preserving landmarks. Dr. LaVerne Herrington with a degree in archeology, spoke on archeology, antiquities and recorded Texas historical landmarks. Bob Mallouf, a state archeologist since 1970, spoke on archeology and the importance of recording sites before pot hunters destroy them. Stan Graves, an architect of Tennessee, spoke on restoring courthouses. All showed slides to illustrate their lectures. The conferences were held in the Holiday Inn in Brenham.

At noon everyone went to a huge tent that had been erected in the middle of the street in front of the Giddings-Stone Mansion and after a barbecue luncheon, the awards were presented under the "Big Top." They both received the award certificate from the governor and the chairman of the awards program. The governor and Gerald George were the keynote speakers.

After the awards presentation, a tour of Washington County was made by bus. It included the dedication of an official Texas Historical Marker at the Hunt-Hardy House at Old Gay Hill. Governor Clements and Nancy were also at this ceremony.

At the Independence Baptist Church, the pastor seated the bus load of people and explained that it was the oldest continuing Baptist Church in Texas, active since 1839. The adobe building burned in 1872, but it was replaced by a rock structure the same year. Membership is less than 100, but there are

more than 50 enrolled in Sunday School and more than 40 in regular attendance with an offering near \$500 each Sunday. The pew where Sam Houston sat is marked with a US flag and a smaller Texas flag. There were other points of interest on the tour, lots of bluebonnets, Indian paintbrush, and other wild flowers. They stayed in Giddings both Friday and Saturday nights and flew home Sunday evening.

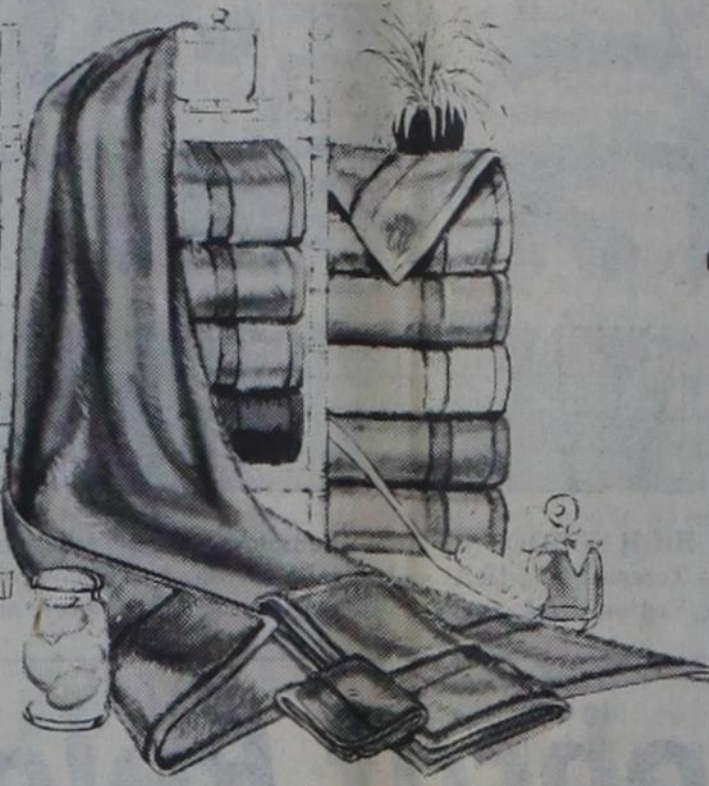

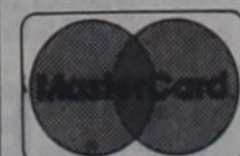
