#### KATEMCY CITIZENS HOPE TO · ESTABLISH CREAMERY STATION

It is announced that a number of the progressive citizens of the Katemcy community are working on a plan whereby the Mistletoe Cream Company will establish a cream station at Ka-

County Agent, W. J. Marschall, accompanied by Messrs. W. E. Jordan, W. M. Martin and A. E. Grosse, attended a meeting held at Katemcy Tuesday night, the purpose of which was to discuss methods and means of proceedure.

It is said the Mistletoe Company has agreed to establish a cream receiving station at Katemcy if the people of that community will equip themselves with a certain number of good cows with sefficient production to warrant the station. Mr. Marschall announced yesterterday that the farmers of that section already have some good jersey cows and will immediately get in the market for some more good ones. He said sixteen people signified their intentions of wanting to buy cows and a committee was appointed Tuesday night to investigate and ascertain prices at which the required number of cows could be purchased and to formulate other necessary plans in connection with getting their undertaking started to functioning at an early date.

A meeting will be held in that community a little later on to perfect plans and to start the project to working.

#### JUDGE BANKS AND COM. BUTLER VISIT SAN SABA ON ROAD BUSI.

County Judge, Banks, and Morgan Butler, commissioner of precinct No. 2, accompanied by Rev. Farmer and T. Simon, of Fredonia, made a trip to San Saba Tuesday. The former two gentlemen went to that city to meet the commissioners court of San Saba county on a matter pertaining to the road to Pontotoe from Fredonia. This section of road has been in very bad shape for many years and it is said the reason for it, is, that the road lies in San Saba county and that county will not spend any money in keeping it up, as no San Saba county people use

Judge Banks stated the purpose of their trip to San Saba was to confer if they will consent to having the lines between Mason and San Saba counties changed slightly so that the roadbed might be thrown wholly in Mason county and thereby arrange matters so Mason county can lawfully expend Mason County funds in building and maintaining it. He reported, on his return, that indications are that the proposition made by them to the San Saba court will be accepted, but will not know until later just what action they will take.

## How About \$14,310,200,000

While the New York slickers are busy trying to steal a few hundred thousand dollars from one another calling the accomplishment a day of good business, while the Broadway lounge lizards are cluttering the streets of our cities and boring us with their silly chatter, the great American farmer comes along with a production of goods worth \$14,310,200,000 for the year 1922. When one thinks of this accomplishment in terms of service to America, everything else vanishes from view.

The crops harvested during the year were worth \$8,961,000,-000, while the value of farm animals and animal products footed up to \$5,349,200,000.

The outlook for 1923 is even brighter.

The spending power of country America almost staggers the imagination even as it is, and with a steady growth in sight. The year 1922 shows an increase of nearly \$2.000,000,000

over 1921. What the increase for 1923 will be is speculative. Texas led all the states in 1922 in the value of farm crops and animals, footing up to a value of \$1,091,500,000. Iowa came second, and Illinois third.

It is the farmer and the demands of the farmer that keep the manufactories of the East busy and hold labor at its task. How important it is that each should understand the problems and ambitions of the other, the farmer and the bricklayer, the mill worker and the farm hand-the real men of America, the sustainers of American life.

## On With the Motor Power

Every mile of good roads laid by states, counties, towns and villages has a bearing on the nation's business so far reaching that it would puzzle the mind to follow it to its logical conclusion. Of course, the natural tendency is to look at the benefits that come nearest and soonest to hand, benefits which are indisputable, providing unwise financing of such improvements does not more than offset the good that is bound to be gained.

Reports from all over the country show that interurban freighting is on the increase due to good road building, particularly where the terminal facilities of railroads are congested. This means more motor trucks, more men at work, more money earned, and a consequent greater spending power. Haulage of farm products to shipping stations spells more business for the farmer, and better still makes his marketing more elastic.

The effect is also seen in the great increase of bus transportation in districts where the street car has not shown its nose as yet, bringing business into the small towns. Trade is rapidly increasing, particularly where the merchant has vision to send his message to the outlying districts through the local press.

There is but one way to stabilize the world's currency and bring commercial progress. That is to fix definitely and finally the indemnity that Germany is to That indemnity when fixed should be underwritten. And when underwritten it would become valuable commercial paper throughout the world.

As an illustration: Suppose they say that Germany shall pay twenty billion sold dollars, which would be a very reasonable amount. Germany could pay that amount, but she should be given sixty or eighty years in which to pay it. Suppose we say eighty years. Then, she would have to pay \$250,000,000 a

If you fix the note at twenty billion dollars, turn the note over and let England and America endorse it, then it becomes worth face value throughout the world and would be a good investment for any individual or for any country. America could afford with England to guar-antee the payment of \$250,000,000 per year to France and Belgium.

Looked at from a selfish standpoint, it would be worth commercially a thousand times that amount of money to America and England. Fix the amount definitely and finally. Give Germany eighty years in which to pay it, endorse her note for that amount, underwrite her securities, and let her begin to reconstruct her commercial institutions and to ener the marts of the world.






