

## Garcia found guilty; gets suspended term

Domingo Garcia, 21, of Hereford was found guilty last Thursday evening of attempted murder in the Jan. 18 shooting of Ruben Herrera, 32, of Dimmitt.

The jury for the 242nd District Court returned its verdict after almost two hours of deliberation, following a three-day trial.

In another 47 minutes, the jury of seven men and five women set Garcia's punishment at a 10-year probated sentence with a \$5,000 fine.

District Judge Marvin Marshall will hold a hearing next Thursday to determine

the restitution due to the Ruben Herrera family.

Sometime after that, officials of the Immigrations and Naturalization Service will be here to determine if Garcia is a Mexican alien and if he should be allowed to stay in the US to fulfill the court's order to pay the fine and make restitution. Garcia is presently in the custody of the Castro County Sheriff's Dept.

The victim was shot in the left side of the head with a .410 shotgun in East Dimmitt. The shooting left Herrera paralyzed. He lives in East Dimmitt with his wife and two young children.

## County okays fans for Expo Building

The Castro County Commissioners approved the purchase of additional radio equipment at \$10,076.80 for the four fire departments in the county and decided to stir the air in the Expo Building.

The current radio system needs to be updated, said a representative of R & R Electronics Supply. Firemen from Dimmitt, Hart, Nazareth and Sunnyside said that the current system is not sufficient. Much of the old equipment is obsolete, they added.

With the new repeater system, all the fire departments will be able to use the same bay station. Four new 866 VHF mobile radios will be added to the current system. The cost of the new equipment, antennas, installation and frequency changes in the old radios will come to \$10,076.80. Payment will be due after the new system is completely set up and all the radio channels synchronized.

The Castro County Fire Association, including all four fire departments inside the county, will have to reapply for radio operators' licenses.

The commissioners approved the purchase of five

fans for the County Expo Building to help alleviate the excessive buildup of summer heat inside the metal structure.

Four 52-inch ceiling fans will be installed in the arena area at \$147.40 each, and an oscillating wall-mounted fan will be installed in the kitchen at \$171.40.

The fans will circulate the air inside the building and will help to bring fresh air inside, said Bill Williams of A-1 Mechanical.

In other action, the county governing board:

—Heard a report about the progress of the Running Water Draw Structure Site No. 1. District Conservationist Gary Rainwater said that the site contains five or six feet of water at the principle spillway. A dedication service will be held in September, he added.

—Heard a report from Seth Halbert of the Central Plains Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center about its operation. He also requested that the commissioners consider allocating \$3,520 to the center for the 1982 fiscal year to begin in September.

## Wet weather brings 'mixed bag'

June's weather delivered a "mixed bag" to the county's farmers. The abnormally high rainfall was great for the corn and milo, detrimental to the ripe wheat crop, and disastrous to the cotton.

The rainfall total for the first five months of 1982 was running four inches below last year before the fourth wettest June on record brought 5.62 inches of moisture, raising the rainfall count for the year to 9.31 inches.

The year's total to date is now running about three-tenths of an inch above last year and about two inches ahead of the comparable period in 1980.

Cotton and wheat are suffering most from the extra moisture — especially in parts of the county where killing hail accompanied thunder showers during the month.

"The wheat harvest has been slowed down. This time last year we were almost through," said Rick Byers of Sunnyside Grain.

The dampness has diminished the quality of the wheat, and has also spurred the growth of weeds that are becoming a problem for harvest crews.

"The cotton is poor — really not doing very good at all," Eddie Matthews of Easter commented.

Cotton producers have had to stand by and watch their crops suffer first from hail and now from root rot and blight resulting from the abnormally wet conditions.

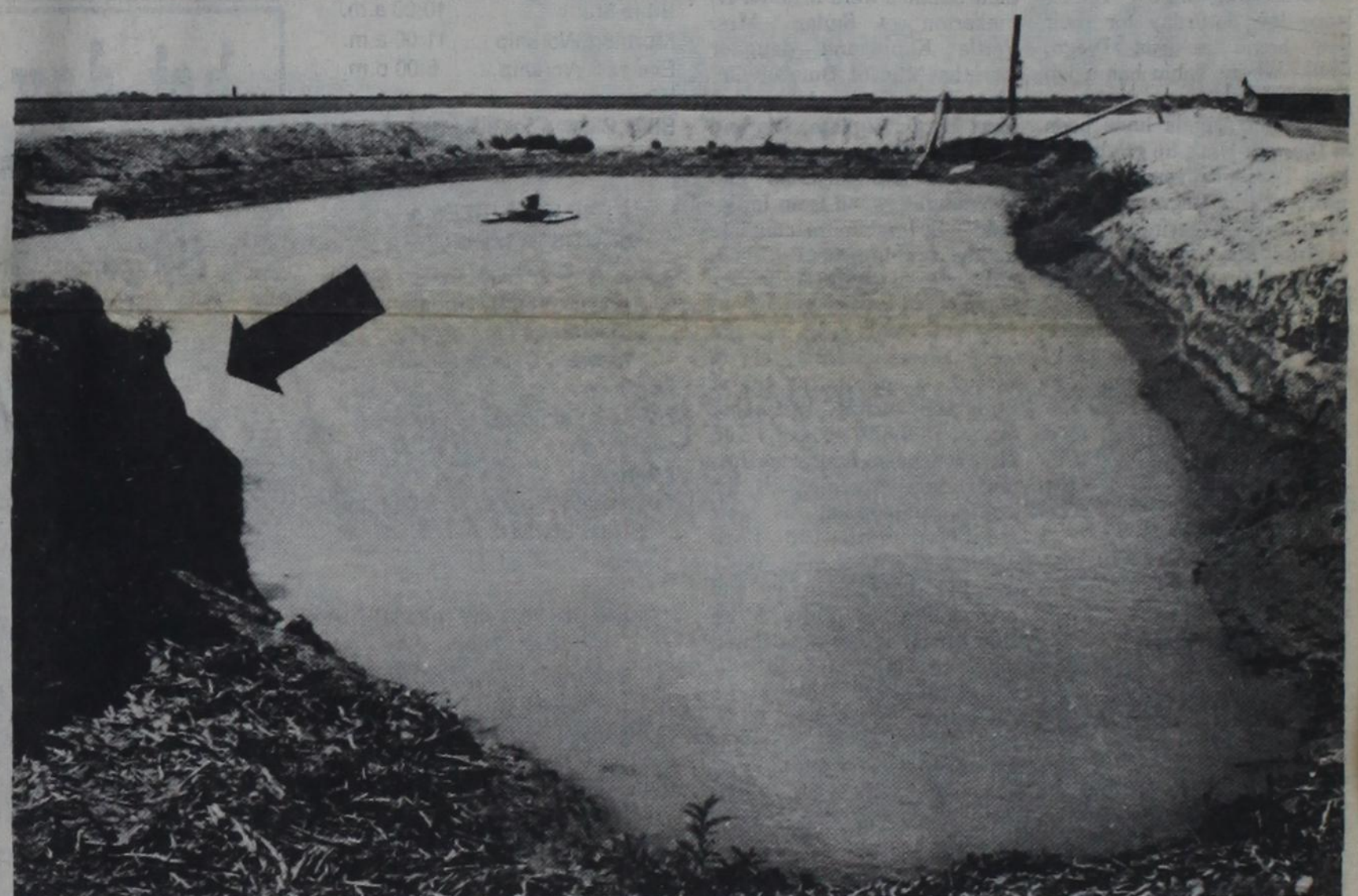
County Extension Agent Charles Hottel estimated that about 5,000 acres of wheat and 20,000 acres of cotton have been abandoned or replanted.

The replanting has been mainly to soybeans, sunflowers or grain sorghum. Soybeans seem to have been used for the second planting more than any of the other replacement crops, and it appears the bean acreage will be above normal as a result.

The wet weather has also affected the onions in the area. "The harvest is later than usual and the bulbs may be a bit smaller right now," Allen McClure of Dimco Industries said, "but they should be ready to harvest in about two weeks."

According to McClure, the harvest of onions and potatoes may be underway by July 12.

Not everything has suffered from the elements, however. Corn, milo, soybeans and sunflowers are flourishing. The moisture has enabled some of the hail-damaged crops to make a comeback, and it has given replanted crops a good start.

## Boy, 6, drowns Thursday

A six-year-old Dimmitt boy drowned last Thursday in a tailwater pit about a mile and a half south of the city. Noel Veto Rendon fell in the water about 1:30 p.m. when he and his older sister were playing with frogs near the pit.

Three neighboring men, Mike Baca, Andy Rogers and Joe Reyes, tried to retrieve

the boy's body but the water was too deep and cold, witnesses said.

The Castro County Sheriff's office was notified of the accident at 1:40 p.m. and called out county and state officers, who searched unsuccessfully for the boy's body. Officers then notified a water-search unit in Hereford and

located two Dimmitt scuba divers, Roger Allison and Jeff Robertson.

After Allison and Robertson collected their gear and arrived at the scene, it took the divers only five minutes in the water to find the boy's

body, which was on a ledge about eight or 10 feet under the surface.

"From what I understand, the boy was in the water at least an hour and a half," Allison said.

Rendon was rushed to Plains Memorial Hospital of Dimmitt. After resuscitation efforts and emergency procedures failed to revive the boy, he was pronounced dead at 3:15 p.m.

Services were held Saturday in La Asambleia Cristiana, Inc. of Dimmitt. He is survived by his mother, Clemencia Rendon of Dimmitt, his father, Enrique Rendon of Amarillo, two sisters, a brother and two grandmothers.

## Board to see applications

The Dimmitt Board of Aldermen is planning to meet at the end of the week to go over applications for the position of police chief. The city has been without a police chief since June 16, after the aldermen asked Ron Mitchell to resign from the position.

Seven completed applications and seven additional resumes without applications have been received, City Manager Paul Catoe said. One of the applicants is local, and the others are from out of the county, he added.

He added that the city aldermen hope to meet either Thursday or Friday night.

## Cotton, Inc. plans office in Far East

Ray Joe Riley of Sunnyside recently received an update on Cotton Incorporated's plans to open an office in Osaka, Japan, this October, following the opening of a similar office in London this past April.

Local grocery stores will stay open. Dimmitt Medical-Surgical Clinic will be open, and a doctor will be on call for emergencies.

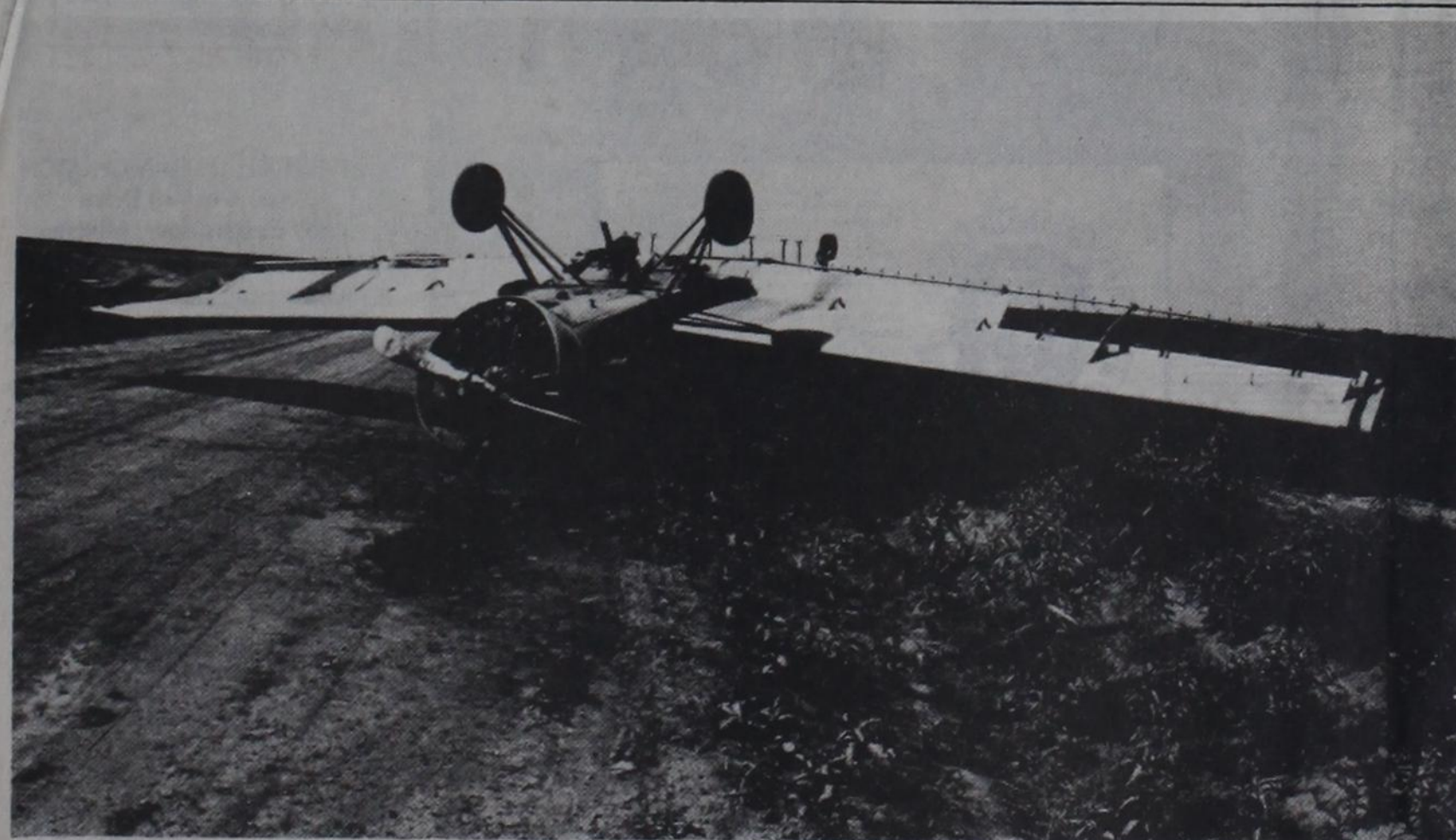
The Castro County News office will be open Monday and will take news as usual.

## Plane flips; pilot okay

A Plainview pilot escaped serious injury last Thursday when the spray plane he was flying had an apparent brake-lock while landing and overturned.

The pilot, Harold Harbour, suffered only minor injuries in the accident, but the plane, a Thrus Commander, was considered a total loss.

The mishap occurred about 10:30 a.m. six miles west and a

mile south of Hart. The plane was owned by Central Plains Spraying, Inc., co-owned and managed by Albert Key of Hart. An apparent factory defect in the brake was blamed in the accident. The plane overturned in a ditch adjacent to the county dirt road being used for a landing strip.

The plane had been spraying potatoes shortly before the accident, and was empty at the time of the crash.

## Make Fourth of July weekend 'crash free'

"The two most dangerous things the driver of a motor vehicle can do is to speed or drink and drive. Those two violations will account for most of the traffic deaths during this July 4th holiday," said Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Dept. of Public Safety.

The population in Texas is increasing; so is traffic on the highways. More people are expected to be on our highways this 4th of July weekend than ever before.

The Department will be conducting "Operation Motorcide" during the weekend, trying to make everyone

aware of the traffic problem. Every available trooper will be working, trying to help cut down on the needless traffic deaths but will need the help and cooperation of the entire motoring public to be effective in reducing accidents.

"We don't have enough people to stop all traffic violations. We need the voluntary compliance by the motoring public, in obeying the traffic laws, in order to be successful in reducing accidents," Major Bell stated.

"If people will just slow down and not drive if they have been drinking, many of the deaths that occur on our highways can be prevented," Major Bell added.

"Driver attitude is of great importance in preventing crashes, especially over a heavy traffic weekend like July 4. Texas drivers can reduce the number of collisions they are involved in by driving defensively," said James R. Halverson, Texas Safety Association vice president for traffic.

The association actively promotes traffic safety and driver improvement through the National Safety Council's Defensive Driving Course (DDC). Last year in Texas more than 230,000 persons took the eight hour course.

"When driving, anticipate what the other driver will do and always have an escape route," Halverson said. He also noted one of the basic lessons of the DDC which is to complete one crash-free auto trip at a time.

"This means to make each trip in your car a safe trip, one with no crashes," he said. "We believe most crashes and collisions can be eliminated by defensive driving."

Be sure your Fourth of July weekend is crash free. Drive defensively, buckle-up, and drive the posted speed limit, he added.

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# 'Cotton telegram' tells it like it is: bad

An urgent telegram from Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. to Secretary of Agriculture John Block told the sad story.

Asking that appropriate action be taken immediately, the wire advised the Secretary that "Hail, rain, wind and cold temperatures have

destroyed an estimated 1.5 million acres of High Plains cotton," and that such "unprecedented losses and the pre-existing financial plight of producers clearly justify activating the disaster payment program authorized in the 1981 farm law."

Copies of the telegram went to area representatives, Texas senators and to House Agriculture Committee Chairman Kika de la Garza.

Putting the disaster program into effect would mean more and possibly quicker income on lost crops and crops not planted because of insufficient moisture, and also would provide additional income on weather-damaged crops yielding less than 75 percent of the farm's payment yield.

Without the disaster program the farmers who planted

cotton, whether or not it is harvested, could expect target price payments of from 10 cents to 13.92 cents per pound times the farm's payment yield, the actual payment rate depending on the average price paid to all US farmers for all cotton during the 1982 calendar year.

Disaster provisions of the 1981 farm law under a given set of circumstances permits the Secretary to pay producers who were never able to plant or whose cotton has been destroyed 23.67 cents per pound times 75 percent of the farm's established payment yield. This payment could be made as soon as calculated, and the same farmers later would be eligible for the target price deficiency payment times the other 25 percent of their payment yield.

Crops carried to harvest under the disaster program would be eligible for the 23.67-cent per pound payment times the difference between actual yield and 75 percent of the payment yield, plus the deficiency payment rate on that portion of the payment yield not receiving a disaster payment.

"Secretary Block has agreed to send one or more department officials to see for themselves the sorry state of our crops," notes PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson. "And, thanks to the National Cotton Council we have the full support of every segment of the industry, so we are encouraged that the Secretary may be persuaded to use his authority to give us as much relief as possible within the limits of the law." On other fronts, emergency

federal loans are being sought for farmers through the FmHA and by way of asking the President to designate the High and Rolling Plains as disaster areas.

"Relief from all these sources and more is going to be necessary to forestall economic convulsions more severe than any ever seen before in the agricultural sector," Johnson said, "and we can only hope that federal officials will recognize this fact and act accordingly."

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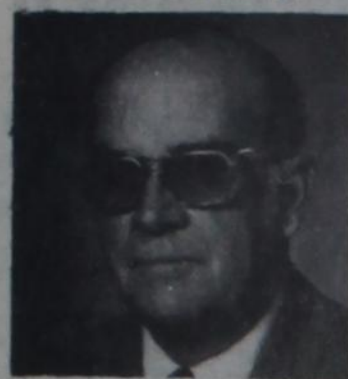
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Ever wonder what it would be like to drag-race through a mud pit?

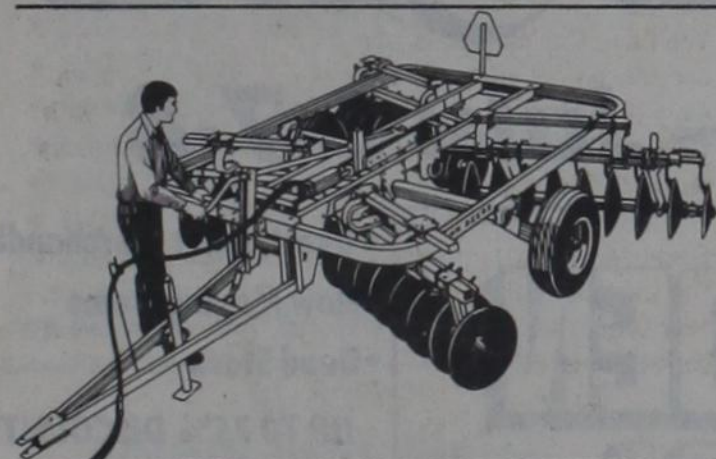

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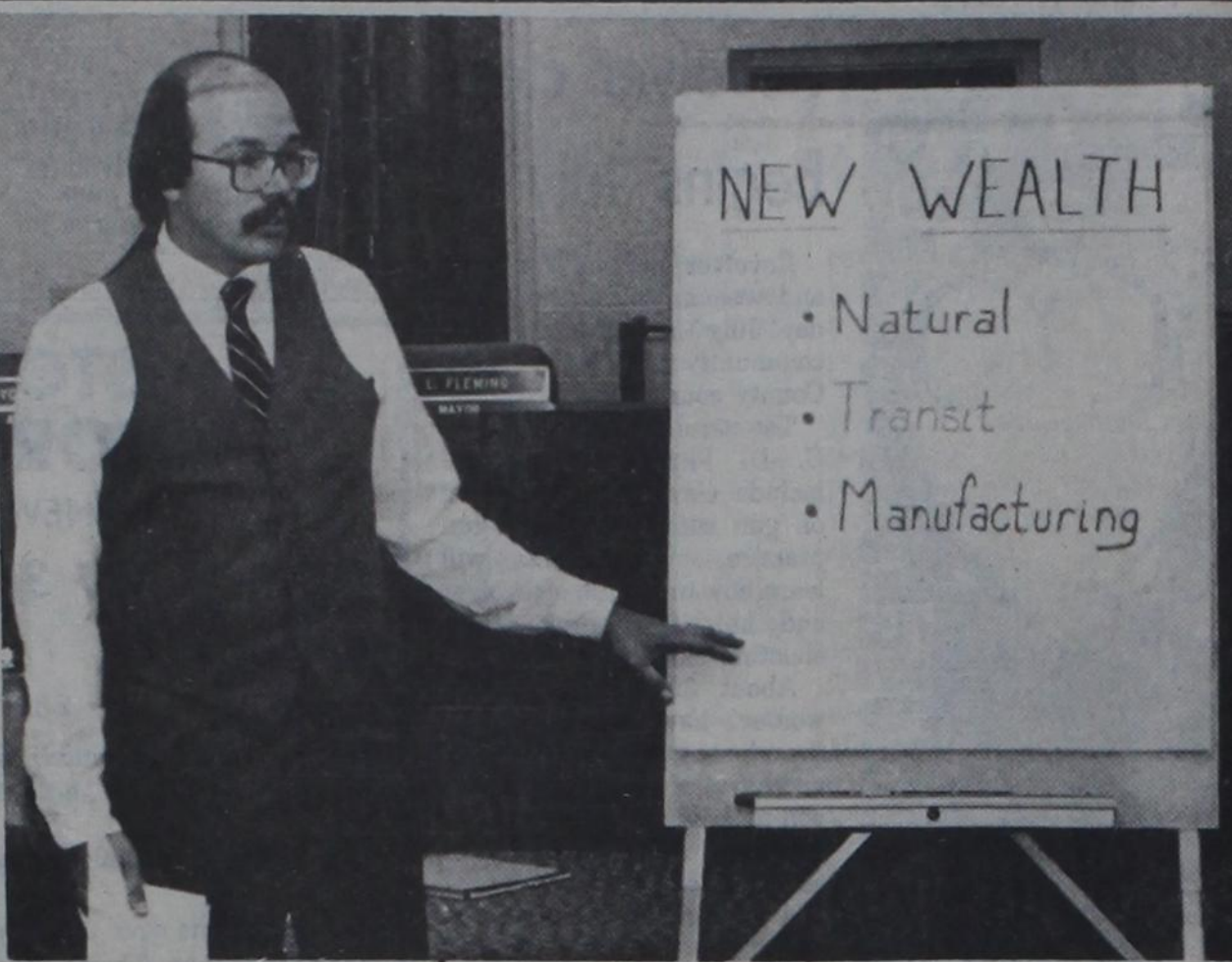

**Farm program payment yields to be revised**

The U.S. Dept. of Agriculture's decision to modify procedures for computing farm program payment yields for the 1982 cotton crop was praised recently by National Cotton Council President Ed Breihan of Lubbock.

"The modifications will help ease the current economic distress of cotton producers, and we commend the USDA for its action," Breihan stated.

The Council president has urged revision of the procedures earlier in a letter to Everett Rank, administrator of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The letter pointed out that changes which were made earlier this year in procedures have caused "precipitous drops in payment yields on many farms already on the brink of economic survival."

Particularly hard hit, the Council president stated, were areas in the Texas Plains, southern Georgia, and counties in Mississippi which have experienced extreme drought over two or more years in the last five.

Breihan urged the ASCS to take immediate steps to moderate, if not eliminate, the impact of the procedures, pointing out the 1981 farm act clearly provides authority for the Secretary of Agriculture to adjust abnormally low yields caused by natural disaster.

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### Meteorologist explains tornadoes to Rotarians

Dr. Richard Peterson, a meteorologist from Texas Tech University, recently presented a program on tornadoes to the Rotary Club. Peterson explained a sketch of a tornadic thunderstorm. He also explained that a meteorologist does not see a tornado on radar. What he does see are cloud formations that contain rain and hail. The severity of a storm can be determined by these formations, he explained. He showed a slide presentation and a movie, that were taken mainly in this area, of the different cloud formations

that are favorable for the development of funnels. The slides also showed various tornadoes in progress. The movie showed the development and life of several tornadoes. The tornado that hit the Nazareth area in May of 1980 was the subject of some of the slides.

Dr. Peterson said that it was once thought that tornadoes only appeared singly. Now it is known that several small funnels will rotate around a common center. He also said that the visible appearance of a tornado is not an indication of its destructive force.

The information that Dr. Peterson related was collected by a "fraternity of storm chasers." The fraternity, consisting of government researchers, college faculty, graduate students and weather forecasters from Texas and Oklahoma, take movies and photographs of tornadic storms in progress. According to Peterson, the data they collect is then used to help predict and understand severe weather.

### Wise air use can reduce cooling cost

Using outside air wisely can reduce energy use for residential air conditioning. During spring and fall periods when average outside air temperatures are comfortable (82 degrees F. or below), whole house or attic fans can be used to pull outside air into the home and remove heat, points out Dr. Bill R. Stewart, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. However, this practice may not be desirable for those with allergy problems.

A whole house fan is usually installed in a hallway ceiling or other convenient location so that it can pull air through any or all the rooms, notes Stewart. Air flow will depend on having windows or doors that will open in each room to admit air. Then openings must be adjusted to equalize the air flow or to control the velocity of air through the room.

Whole house fans should be rated to provide an air flow of 10 cubic feet per minute (cfm) for each square foot of house area. Thus, a 1,000 square foot home would need a whole house fan rated at 10,000 cfm.

Where fans are installed in the ceiling to exhaust air out through the attic, be sure there is enough attic ventilator outlet. Attic screened vents should have 1.75 square feet of area per 1,000 cfm of fan capacity, says the engineer. These may be gable vents, under eave vents or roof vents.

When whole house fans are installed in ceilings they should be covered when central air conditioners are used to prevent excess attic heat from entering the home through the fan openings.

Another method of reducing air conditioning bills during the summer, particularly for those homes with low levels of ceiling insulation, is to provide attic ventilation, says Stewart, since air will try to rise as it is heated.

Attics can be ventilated by providing adequate outlet vents near the peak of the roof along with the same amount of inlet vents at the eave. Both inlets and outlets should be uniformly distributed to provide uniform replacement of attic air.

Research with attic ventilation has shown that attic temperatures can be reduced substantially by providing about one square inch each of vent outlet and inlet per square foot of ceiling area, notes the engineer.

The greater the difference in height between inlets and outlets, the greater will be the ventilation rate. High peaked roofs are easier to ventilate than low sloped roofs.

Some roofs are not easy to ventilate by gravity systems, so power vents can be used. However, research in the Houston area has indicated no significant saving in energy use when a home had a ceiling insulation level of R-19 (6.5 to 8 inches of insulation).

Attic ventilation is most effective when the ceiling insulation level is below R-11 (less than 4 inches). However, if investing in energy-saving material or equipment, the wisest choice would be to increase the ceiling insulation level, says Stewart.

**Social Security in Castro County** By **JANICE GRANN**



Any of you who may have filed a Medicare claim within the past year are very much aware of the fact that a major change has been taking place at Texas Blue Cross Blue Shield. We recently received the following press release which should bring you up to date on the progress of the insurance company's new computer system.

On May 4, 1981, Texas Blue Shield (TBS), the Medicare carrier for Texas, began using a new computer system to process your Medicare claims. The new system was the first in the nation to process bills from hospitals, nursing homes, doctors, suppliers and home health agencies together to create a total medical history for each beneficiary.

The system has allowed TBS to reduce its Medicare staff and, therefore, its administrative costs while improving processing time. The average length of time TBS has a claim before writing a check has been reduced from three weeks to two.

As with any major change, especially one involving computers, numerous problems were encountered during the first few months after installation of the new computer system. Not only did the computer system change, but all the clerical procedures for processing claims were also modified. In fact, most clerks had to be taught how to key or

type information into a computer.

Another side effect of the systems change has been an increase in processing errors. One clerk described the increase in error rates as similar to what happened when she got her first electric stove. "I learned to cook with gas and I guess I just had to burn a few things before I got used to not being able to look at the flame."

Even though the error rate has declined, there are still problems with incorrect names, addresses and health insurance claim numbers. Therefore, you should be sure to file your claims with exactly the name and number shown on your Medicare card. If your doctor completes the form for you, check your records during your next visit to be sure the information he has in accurate. Using a nickname or your middle name will cause significant delays in payment.

In the past, telephone service representatives answered inquiries about claims status by looking at microfilm listings which were often not up to date. With the new system, each clerk has direct access to the computer. More current information on your claim's status will be available.

Sometimes, however, the service representative will not be able to answer questions about the claim immediately because the computer system may not be working. Fortunately, this should not be much of a problem because the system is working more than 90% of the time.

However, one problem that still exists is a large backlog of correspondence. It is expected to take about six months to reduce the backlog to normal levels.

Therefore, if you have a question, try calling the toll-free telephone service rather than writing a letter. The toll free telephone service (1-800-442-2620) is available from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. each work day. You will have better luck getting through early in the day (before 9 a.m.) or after 3 p.m.

The Dallas-Fort Worth metro line (647-2282) is not as busy as the toll free service.

These numbers are shown on the statement entitled "Explanation of Medicare Benefits." Please have your health insurance claim number and claims information handy when you call.

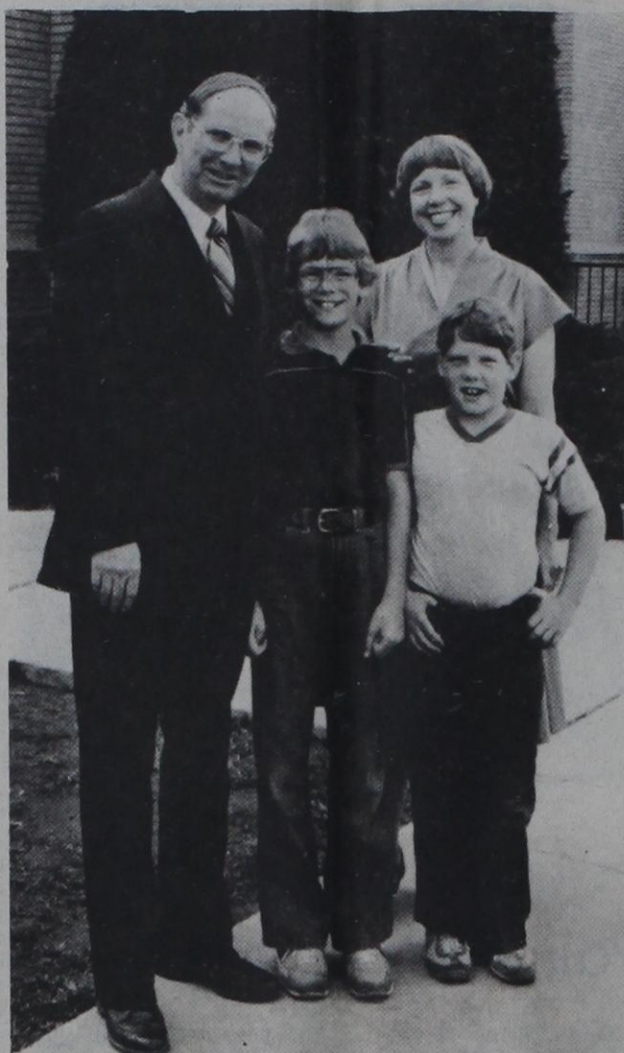

## VETERAN'S SERVICES

Recent information from the VA states that the veteran population was reduced in numbers for the first time in 17 years, because Congress added certain civilian groups and women who were engaged in full-time special services during World War II.

If you have observed the obituary column of your daily paper over the past few years, you have noticed that many World War II veterans die in their 60s. This is partly due to the fact that they served during their country's emergency and while a small percent could not prove service-connected disabilities, they suffered them just the same in our country's service in the time of need.

There was added stress for the Korean and especially Vietnam veterans, whose commanding officers were restrained from winning these wars. We are glad that our State of Texas has originated an Agent Orange Assistance Program.

Our office is available to assist veterans, their dependents and survivors, to apply for all benefits provided either by the VA or the State of Texas. Come see us.

A report from the Texas Veteran Affairs Commission of Texas shows the monetary benefits to eligible claimants in four categories in our county to total \$690,170. This includes \$536,280 in compensations and pensions, \$106,532 in readjustment and vocational rehabilitation payments, and \$47,358 in insurance and indemnities.

It does not include medical benefits, schooling, etc., for which this office has services in many ways. Federal benefits for our county citizens are most likely over one million dollars. We do not claim to have been involved in all applications, etc., but this office is much more important and needed than most realize for both state and federal benefits.

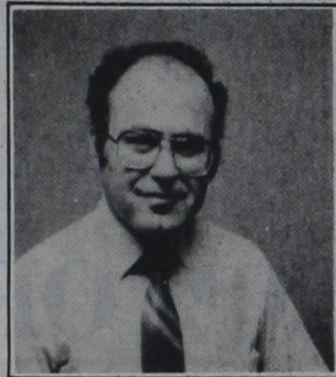

### YOUR CITY AT WORK

This week I would like to emphasize Section 8-31 of our city code which primarily deals with fireworks. The 4th of July is just around the corner and I'm sure many Dimmitt residents will be purchasing fireworks for their children.

Fireworks can be a source of enjoyment for the whole family if they are used in a safe and legal manner. However, I would also like to point out that they can be very dangerous if used in an irresponsible manner.

Section 8-31 specifically deals with the use and sale of fireworks within the city limits. It states the following:

#### ARTICLE 3 FIREWORKS SECT.

Section 8-31: Discharge, sale, etc., of fireworks:

(a) "No person shall cast, throw, or fire any squib, rocket, torpedo, grenade, cap, cartridge, or other combustible fireworks of any kind in the city."

(b) "No person shall exhibit, or have in his possession with intent to give away or sell, or offer for sale, within the city, any squib, rocket, torpedo, grenade, cap, cartridge, or other combustible fireworks of any kind in the city."

rocket, cracker, or torpedo, grenade, cap, cartridge, or other combustible fireworks of any kind.

(c) "This section shall not apply to the sale of fireworks by wholesalers to other, or to the sale of such article at wholesale merchants conducting business entirely within the city, or to the sale of fireworks for private or public demonstration as provided."

This simply means that the sale or use of fireworks within the city limits is strictly forbidden, except for the use of certain wholesale activities as described in Sec. 8-31, c.

I hope that all parents will emphasize the proper and legal use of fireworks to their children, as this section has been formulated for the safety and enjoyment of all city residents.

KDHN Radio will be sponsoring a public fireworks display at the rodeo grounds just east of the city at 10 p.m. on July 3. I think that this is a great way for all of us to get together and celebrate the 4th of July. I hope that everyone has a happy and safe holiday.

## USDA task force surveys damage

Deputy Assistant Secretary of Agriculture John Ford and

a five-man task force team flew over Castro County Wednesday to assess hail and disease damage to area crops.

Ford will report back to Secretary of Agriculture John Block, who will then decide in a few weeks whether to implement a disaster relief payment program provided for in the 1981 farm bill.

Monday, Congressman Kent Hance also toured farms in the Lubbock area "to look at the damage in person," so that he could reinforce the need for disaster relief pay-

ments when he returned to Washington.

"Not very many farmers, in fact, maybe only a little more than one-half, can make it if they (Dept. of Agriculture)

don't reinstate the disaster program," Hance said.

Hance expressed optimism about the chances for disaster relief payments, after he saw the devastation to the South

Plains cotton crops.

Tony Price, vice-president of the Texas Cotton Ginners Association, said that about 170 or more than 360 gins in the High Plains may have to decide whether or not to open up for business this year.

The crop damage in the High Plains is estimated to be more than double any previous amount recorded.

### Fire calls

The Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Dept. received only one call this week concerning hot

brakes on a truck. Sixteen fire fighters answered the call at 9 a.m. Tuesday. The truck was located one mile south of Dimmitt on US 385.

The department answered five alarms in the month of June with three inside the city and two in the county. Two injuries resulted from one fire involving hazardous material.

Two fires were accidental, one was an automobile, one was a smoke scare, and one was industrial. The department also answered a community service call in June.

### Accurate certification will make a difference

Aug. 1 is the final date to report spring seeded crops, cotton, corn, grain sorghum, etc. Remember that dryland and irrigated land must be measured and certified separately.

You may revise your acreage report at any time before it is spot checked. Wheat acreage reported as irrigated and found to be dryland, (or vice-versa) will cause the farm to be ineligible for program benefits.

An accurate and timely crop certification is all that remains for those farms that signed to participate in the program. However, your certification must be within your permitted.

Cover crops planted on Conservation Use Acreage cannot be harvested in any manner. Nor can they be grazed until Nov. 1.

Wheat may be planted on CUA and grazed Nov. 1. However, wind and water erosion must be controlled.

Land tillage and practices that control weeds, enhance soil moisture and prevent erosion such as stubble mulching, mechanical or minimal tillage or chiseling are approved. This land must be at least 66 feet wide and contain at least one acre. Also, it must have been devoted to a small grain or row crop in either 1980 or 1981. Wet low lying acres are not eligible.

Requests are now being taken for cost-share practices to be carried out prior to Sept. 30. If you are interested please come by the ASCS office and visit with us.
